Zoning Board extended authority — Planning Commission to plan new authority for the community in the future and pass information on to the Board.

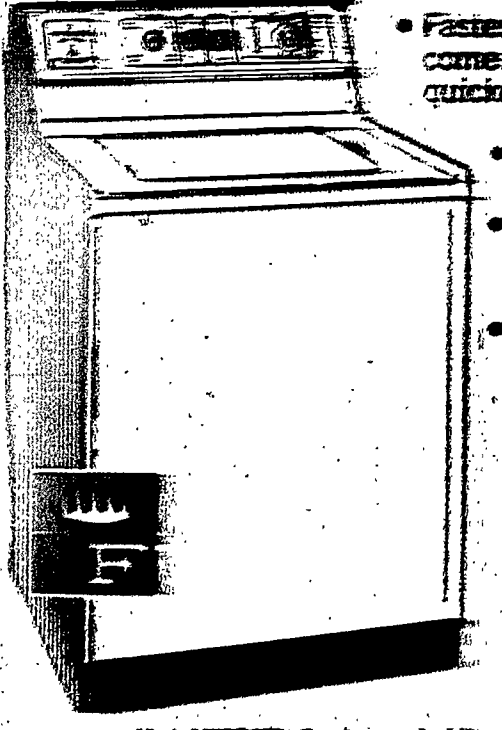

Leske Explains Annexation Plans

In a Saturday morning press meeting, Park Commissioner Jack Leske reviewed Niles Park District's efforts to annex the industrial area which is presently in the Skokie Park District, but which is in the Village of Niles.

A February court date will decide the fate of the area, which presently pays about \$22,000 annually for park taxes.

In the many data sheets Leske presented one showed the area under consideration has an annual valuation of about \$10,000,000. Based on 1965 figures Skokie's Park District had a total assessed valuation of \$365,130,603 while Niles Park District figures are \$116,357,600. Based on population Skokie's 74,000 person area had a per capita rate of \$4,934 while Niles' 28,000 population had a rate of \$4,156 per person.

Further Leske figures taken from the official journal (IAPD) for Illinois Parks, showed if the annexation was successful Skokie would still have \$4,799 to Niles \$4,513 assessed valuation per capita.

In further compilations Leske recorded figures from the County Clerk's office which

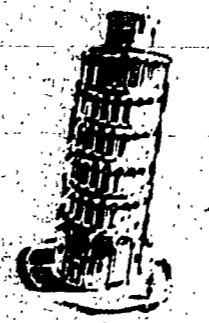

Niles Fire Dept. Warns About Rag Type Dolls

A stern warning was issued by the Niles Fire Department to Niles parents to watch out for an imported rag-type doll which has proven to be highly flammable and dangerous.

The dolls, which are about 10 inches high, and were sold locally, can be identified by a marking on the bottom of the right shoe, which states, "The Sutton Co., Style 555." The doll is hazardous because the head is filled with dry sawdust and the face covering is of nitro-cellulose, which can ignite in an explosion-like burst of flame, by simply coming into contact with a heat source.

According to Fire Chief Albert L. Hoelbl, two complaints were received by the de-

partment's fire prevention bureau, and the two merchants involved immediately removed the doll from sale when told of the potential hazard. All other sources in Niles where these dolls might be on public sale were contacted, but no other outlets were discovered.

Chief Hoelbl said that if any parents find these blond-haired raggedy dolls, to wrap them and bring them to either of Niles' two fire stations for disposal. Do not throw them away in rubbish containers, Chief Hoelbl warned, as other children might find them and keep them.

The dolls were manufactured in Poland and imported from England.

Referendum Date Changed..

Dist. 63 Holds Special Meeting, Sets Mar. 11 As Bond Issue Day

School district 63 unexpectedly changed the date of its bond referendum from Feb. 18 to Mar. 11, at a special meeting held Wednesday night, Jan. 4 at East Maine Junior High school.

The reason given for changing the date was that the Dist. 63 referendum would then coincide with High School district 207, which also held a special meeting the previous evening and stated it would not be ready with its referendum until the middle of March.

Board members of district 63 felt it would be better to ask the residents of the district to vote the polls once, instead of twice; it would be cheaper for the taxpayer to go to the polls just once and there would be a greater chance for better and larger vote.

If the high school district picks up its cue from district 63 and asks for a Mar. 11 date, the people will be voting on approximately \$20,000,000 at one time. The referendum will contain two ballots, district 63 for \$5,000,000 and 207 for between \$14,000,000 to \$15,000,000.

This total amount altho voted or at one referendum, is for an overall five-year plan to finally bring the school system and the educational program up to the level of long range, good education for all students

in the area. As stated at the Wednesday night meeting, unless this referendum is passed as soon as possible, these two school districts will suffer from an overcrowded condition for some time to come.

Stressed by the Dist. 63 board was the fact that over this five-year period, taxes would tend to go up a minimum amount as the assessed valuation of the land is still continuing to rise rapidly due to the large amount of construction underway. The example was given that the past year's estimated increase of assessed valuation was \$6,000,000, altho there was, in reality, a \$13,000,000 increase in assessed valuation. This bond referendum is based conservatively on the \$6,000,000 of assessed valuation per year.

Therefore, it is considered more than likely that taxes will rise only a minimum amount. The board stated it will have the exact figures for the public on or about Jan. 20, after Municipal Research Associates gives its report.

The Dist. 63 board members were deadlocked on whether to change the Feb. 18 date to Mar. 11 in the hope of selling the high school referendum at the same time, or perhaps going it alone on the Feb. 18 date.

Mrs. Irene Luck, Mrs. Sylvia McNair and Arnold Kapp favored the Mar. 11 date, feeling the same children were involved, only at a different stage of their education; William Ciwolink, Ted Davis and Gordon Kopald were in agreement to keep to the original February date. They hoped Dist. 207 would choose the same date.

After discussion, Kopald, who felt that with district 207 showing good faith of perhaps going for the whole package of \$15,000,000 including the building of Maine North which would service the district 63 area, changed his "no" vote to "yes" for the benefit of the future education of the children of the district.

There is a special meeting Thursday, Jan. 12 at which time district 207 is expected

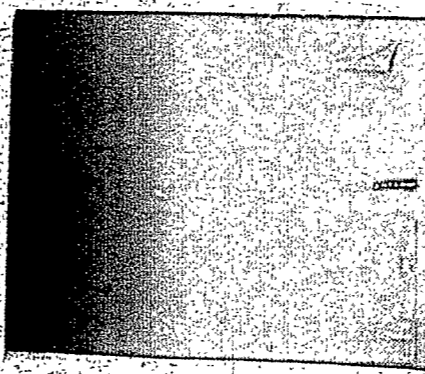

Illinois Bell Telephone Highlights Services Rendered To Public During '66

An unusual combination of story-making service expenditures and rate reductions highlighted 1966, Illinois Bell telephone's Skokie-Morton Grove Manager Art Wiederin, said today.

"More than \$220 million was spent throughout the company's territory on new construction," Wiederin said. During 1966, our capital spending was invested in land, buildings, wire and cable, switchboards, telephones, racks, tools, and many other things needed for modern communications.

"In spite of this record expenditure, we were still able to implement further rate reductions in Illinois, making telephone service a better buy than ever before," he added. Reductions, changes and new services in 1966 made possible more than \$8,500,000 in annual savings for Illinois Bell telephone users."

Rate cuts effective May 27 included a reduction from \$4.92 to \$2 in the one-time charge for standard color phones and the elimination of a \$5 one-time charge for changing residence telephones to Touch-tone service.

On July 2, charges were cut in many long distance calls within Illinois.

Rates were also reduced for Wide Area Telephone Service (WATS) in Illinois, various private line services, the Card Dialer (an automatic dialing device) and volume control phones, which are used by persons with impaired hearing or weak voices.

On December 1, a business telephone service called "MerchLine" was introduced within the Chicago Metropolitan Area.

This service provided package rates for businesses making large volumes of calls throughout Chicago and the suburbs.

"The fact that we were able to reduce rates during a year which necessitated record spending illustrates the importance of research and the development of more economical manufacturing techniques," said Wiederin.

"A major share of the credit for providing customer savings must go to scientists at Bell Telephone Laboratories and to Western Electric, the manufacturing and supply arm of the Bell system. Recent improvements in telephone technology and continuing efforts to increase efficiency and cut costs enable us to provide better service at lower prices.

"And speaking of rate reductions, we'd like to remind customers of our Call-Pak calling plan. This bargain calling package has proven very popular in the Skokie-Morton Grove area. Some 29,980 customers here use Call-Pak. We think there are many more who might save money using this plan instead of the standard billing arrangement."

As the number of customers and their need for greater telephone communications services grew, so did the need for more telephone employees to provide these services. To help meet the demand for employees, Illinois Bell opened an area employment center in Evanston at 1520 Chicago Avenue.

"Opportunities are available for qualified high school graduates and those with some college experience who would like to be part of the growing communications business," Wiederin said. "Progress in the telephone business is based on

individual merit and opportunities are unlimited. We opened this employment center in order to better serve this area."

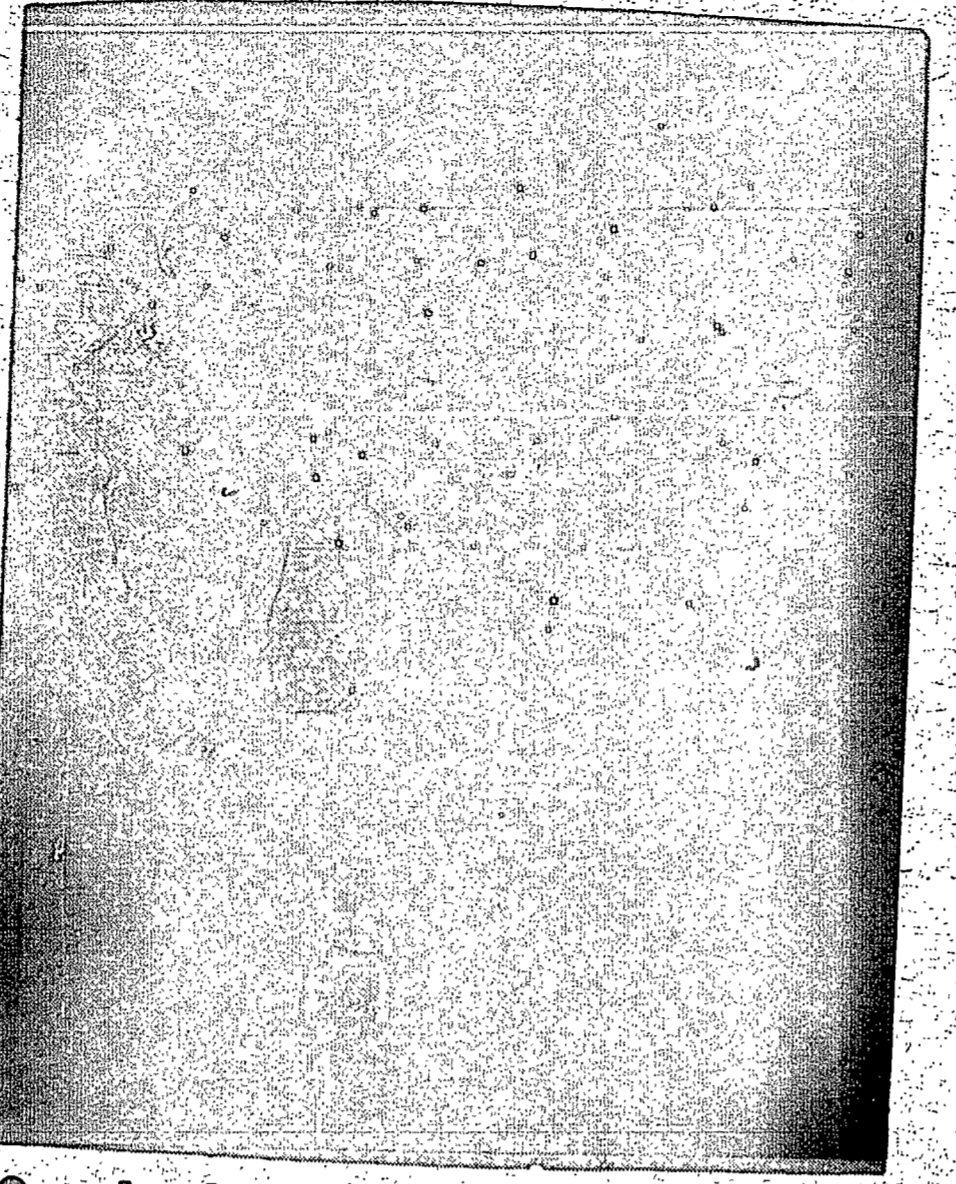
Record telephone company expenditures and record demand for telephone service were noted by local management in year-end statistics gathered in the Skokie-Morton Grove area. An average 470,000 telephone calls were placed each weekday here according to Mrs. Mildred Avery, chief operator.

"Although many of their calls are now dialed direct," she said, "telephone users can depend on the operator behind the dial to help with emergencies and special calls. In fact, we need more operators!"

In order to provide its services in the Skokie-Morton Grove area, Illinois Bell and American Telephone and Telegraph Company spent \$8,316,000 locally in the form of wages to employees, property taxes and other purchases and payments including purchases by Western Electric.

Wire Chief Arnie Nelson, who is responsible for installation and maintenance of telephone equipment, says that as of the end of 1966 there are about 115,400 phones in service here. The volatile movement of today's suburban community was dramatically illustrated with 17,900 new phones being installed for a net year-end gain of 6,500 in the Skokie-Morton Grove area.

Said Manager Wiederin, "Speaking in behalf of the 402 telephone company employees who work in Skokie and Morton Grove, and the 316 who live here, I'd like to wish all our customers a happy and prosperous new year. We are looking forward to serving you during the year ahead."

Post 134 Holds Christmas Party

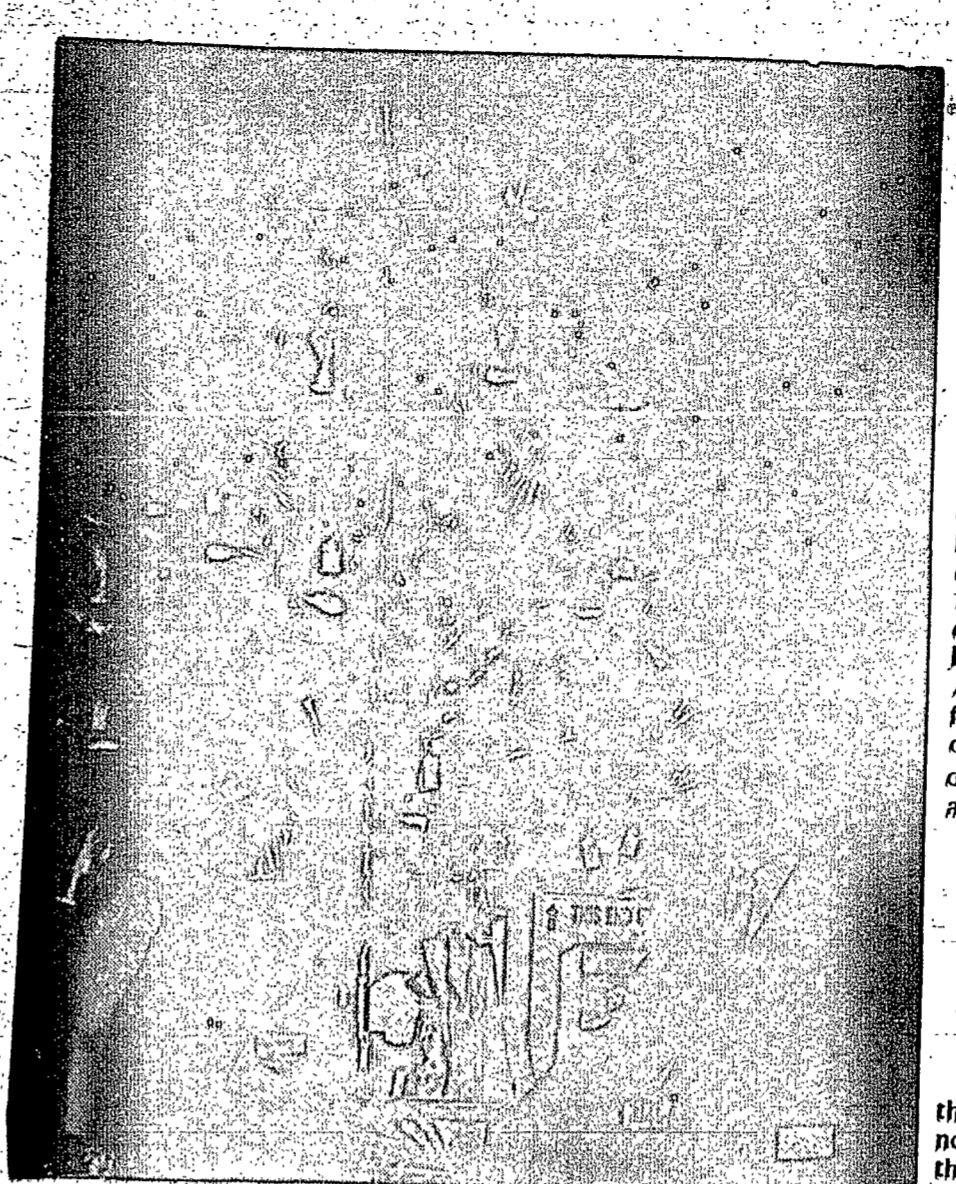

showed the average rate per \$100 assessed valuation for the period from 1958 thru 1965 as being .175 in both park districts. He went on to point out the AVERAGE rate of the two districts will remain constant.

As an addendum to these figures Leske reminded industry only .53% of the real estate tax bill paid by industry went for park tax. "The greatest portion of their tax monies go to the schools!" was the final statement on park taxes.

In one other point of significance Leske's report voted about 45% of the park money derived from the proposed annexed area would return to Skokie, because of their present indebtedness rate (referring to the paying for bonds which were approved during this time must obviously be completed).

In closing Leske said the 45% would phase out to 0% during the next 20 years.

Initially, Leske said, even while the 45% would be returned to Skokie, the individual Niles homeowner could expect an immediate saving of about 35%.
