Film Benefits Hospital

The world has waited in wonder for three years to see who George Lucas will present as Yoda's "other hope" to help Luke

Skywalker combat the dark side of the Force.

For the kids at San Diego Children's Hospital and Health Center Yoda's "other hope" will be a present from the people at Lucasfilm Ltd., in the form of a benefit preview of Return of the Jedi" to help combat pediatric disease.

"I see these benefits as an expression of Lucas' feelings of commitment to the American public," said benefit organizers, who asked to remain anonymous. "He could have presented the typical major studio premiers in Chicago, New York and Los Angeles. But he preferred to make Return of the Jedi available to local theaters in twentyone cities.

"Lucas felt the success of the Star Wars Saga has been due to the interest of children and the child in all of us. Therefore he wanted to return to these young Jedi a support for their future.

"The introductory letter from Lucas stated, 'The preview showing of *Return* of the Jedi benefit must be staged to help raise money to combat child related disease and/or to ease the conditions or problems of economically disadvan-taged children."

"Lucasfilms' policy is to allow each community to organize their own benefit



needs. Therefore the funds received from this San Diego benefit will go directly to the Children's Hospital. This has genera-

> "The desire of the volunteers, like Lucas, is to step back from the spotlight so the public will focus primarily on the programs and needs of the hospital.'

In regards to their own involvement in the benefit. the organizers commented: "Everything our company does is anonymous. We are underwriting the cost of the benefits so that the \$75 per ticket will go directly to Children's Hospital. We ect the sellout audie will raise a total of \$32,750.

"The evening of the performance there will be a sunset patio buffet at the Fletcher Estate with Darth Vader as guest. Then buses will shuttle these "Friends of Yoda" to the preview. We now have sold two-thirds of the tickets.

Rodgers commented on the contribution of the benefit on behalf of Children's Hospital. "In our

applications to Lucasfilms we highlighted certain programs which are unique in this county. We see Children's Hospital as the hope of the future.

'The neo-natal unit transfers children to our intensive care newborn high risk life support system. Ten years ago these children would not have survived, without this high technology geared to pediatrics. The life support systems are very similar to those used by our astronauts.

'We emphasize that technology is the wave of the future. But one thing that cannot be replaced when dealing with children is the tender loving care. Right next door to a complex operating room we position a recovery and playroom. Our closed circuit television has frequently shown Star Wars and the Empire Strikes Back. Brothers and sisters are encouraged to visit, which is unusual in most hospitals.

"In the time it will take some people to wait in line to see Return of the Jedi our one day operation program will treat the children and return those future Jedi back to their parents.

Ironically, the purpose of Children's Hospital relates directly to the Japanese definition of Yoda (Yodai): health, medical diagnosis and the improvement of

one's health. Return of the Jedi could very well describe the volunteers and donors of this benefit. Lucas also used the Japanese term Jedi (Jedai) meaning: One who gives their trust to a stronger force, one who is the spirit of their time, and one who supports ideas and events that will influence the future.







base 100 miles from the Honduran-Nicaraguan border. India and Pakistan ceased diplomatic relations. The US options were to continue the conventional war, reposition the navy, or appeal to the UN (the engagement occurred in international waters).

The Soviets had the options of continuing the air-sea war, pulling their navy into port and letting 100,000 men roll over the pro-western forces from Bulgaria, or appealing to the UN.

They also had to worry about the East German trade unions, and the East German army. During the repressions, a few cities, under martial law, revolted.

Move four was the last move in the game. While the US had continued the air-sea war, the Soviets had pulled into port. Their navy in the Adriatic had taken a severe beating, as had their aerial units. On land, however, the 130,000 Soviets were rolling over the pro-west forces, while in Germany, other Warsaw pact forces had forced German units (both Eastern and Western) into positions up to 50 km from the

In other words, a full conventional conflict between NATO and Warsaw Pact forces had erupted on the European continent.

Each side now had four options:

1. Agree to the Chinese/UN ceasefire (which has no serious disadvantages for either side).

Fight the conventional

3. Use small numbers of tactical nuclear devices (the "little" five kiloton exploders) on vital targets. The US player had a general shot against vital transit points, while the Soviets would have used theirs on the American aircraft carrier in the Adriatic.

4. Launch a pre-emptive strategic first strike against the other country's nuclear


As usual, each side debated the options, although for a longer time than usual, then voted on the alternatives. Both sides choose option #1.

The game leader then took a poll to see how we thought an actual event of what type would end, with eight choices ranging from the conclusion that we reached (a cease-fire almost immediately) to all-out nuclear war.

Most of the players voted for the option that matched the conclusion of the game.

POPULAR LITERATURE: THE DETECTIVE NOVEL

Instructor: Ernest Larsen

After a brief look at the social and aesthetic patterns set in the stories of Poe and Dovle, this course will concentrate on the so-called hard-boiled school of American writing, the novels of Dashiell Hammett, Raymond Chandler, and James M. Cain. Long held in some disrepute as a literature almost as defective as it is detective, the best urban mysteries of the Thirties now appear to be as resonant as any contemporaneous literature. A literary tool sharp enough to expose social, psychological, and even political, contradictions, the detective novel as it developed after the Thirties will be critically examined in the Oedipal mysterica of Ross MacDonald, the police procedurals of Sjowall-Wahloo, the formal parodies of 'straight' writers like Thomas Berger, and the instructor's own revisionist novel, "Not a Through Street".

The San Diego Repertory Theatre's outstanding production of Mark Medoff's Children of a Lesser God is a compelling journey into the frightening and fascinating world of the deaf. This Tony Award-winning drama introduces the hearing population to a language and a culture traditionally foreign to the theatre, the domain of the spoken word. This touching love story of a hearing man and a deaf woman reveals the realm of silence, "a silence full of sound," in which the deaf live.

James Leeds is a former campus radical and Peace Corps volunteer whose desire to help others draws him to work as a speech therapist in an institution for the hearingimpaired and the deaf. Sarah Norman is a 23-year-old nonspeaking deaf woman alienated by the attitudes of normal people toward the "lesser" members of society.

Unable to hear or speak since birth, Sarah's life is governed by the hearing community. Believed to be mentally retarded as a young girl, Sarah was placed by her unsympathetic mother in an institution for the deaf, where she has lived for the past 18 years of her life. Defiant towards those who have defined her existence for her ("She says..., She means..., She wants..."), Sarah isolates herself inside her hardened exterior shell. Now too old to stay in the school, this homeless woman remains as a maid in the dorms.

She refuses to learn to lip-read or speak, insisting that her language of signs is an adequate form of communication in her situation.

James becomes Sarah's teacher, friend, and lover, the only person who tries to understand her as an individual. Their relationship is strained by the common activities the hearing take for granted in daily life: listening to music. answering the telephone, conversing over Italian food. playing bridge, and even the personal and intimate, making love. Penetrating her silence, James discovers Sarah to be a sensitive, intelligent, loving human being.

The team of Peter A. Jacobs and Ralitsa Popcheva as James

and Sarah is exceptional. Jacobs performs the role of James, described by director Sam Woodhouse as more challenging than King Lear, with great sensitivity, and emotional range. Appearing on stage for the play's entire two-hour duration. Jacobs portrays masterfully what amounts to a dual role. He speaks his own lines in both English and American Sign Language.

At once heartwarming and heartbreaking, deaf actress Popcheva accomplishes no less a feat. For the role of Sarah, Bulgarian-born Popcheva had to learn American Sign Language (which is completely different from her native sign language) and minute visual gestures from other cast members in place of

verbal cues. With her limitless exuberance and fluid hands. Popcheva creates a poetry of language and motion all her own.

This powerful production, enhance by a strong supporting cast, including another deaf actor and a hearing-impaired actress, succeeds in bridging the worlds of silence and sound, making the word "handicapped" irrelevant. As director Woodhouse relates, "Sign language is not painting pictures in the air.it is just talking, Deafness is not a world without sound, it is just a world."

Children of a Lesser God continues at the 1620 Sixth Avenue playhouse downtown San Diego through June 11.



Galas will premiere new work

Avant-garde singer/composer Diamanda Galas will present a solo concert of her own compositions at 8 pm Saturday, May 21, in Sherwood Hall at the La Jolla Museum of Contemporary Art.

Diamanda will perform the San Diego premiere of "Panoptikon," a work for sole voice, live electronics and fourchannel tape: and "Wild Women with Steak Knives," for solo voice and four microphones.

This will be Diamanda's first San Diego concert in two years, and it will be her only local concert this year. She currently is a visiting researcher at the Center for Music Experiment at

Diamanda performs what she calls "expressionist real-time composition and kindred operatic rituals, i.e., rock performance, Greek tragic theatre, German Expressionist performance and other ecstatic theatres."

Her work, she wrote, "is primarily concerned with the execution, sequentially, chordally, and/or contrapuntally, of different 'processes of concentration. 'mental states,' or 'dramatic states,' for which vocal sound is the primary physical coordinate . . . It is operatic performance I speak of, not mere 'singing.' The performance practice I describe demands a total discipline of the performer as composer, poet, actor, and virtuoso vocalist.


