

Giant clouds of yellow and white smoke rose a half mile, drawing many spectators. Some of the spectators, seeing the desperate situation, pitched in with firemen to help beat out the ground blaze. The fire started behind an Ann Arbor Trail home. A resident wanted to burn off grass along a fence row and took precautions to plow a furrow around the fence, but a strong wind carried the fire across the plowed ground.

Within a matter of minutes the fire swept across fields and up behind homes along McClumpha and Ann Arbor roads. Firemen received four different calls and the trucks sped from one home to another to snuff out fire which crept up near barns and garages.


SECTION 1. Section 1 of the Canton Township Building Code, an Ordinance entitled:

An Ordinance enacted pursuant to Act No. 185, Public Acts of 1943 as amended, to regulate the erection, construction, enlargement, equipment, alteration, repair moving, removal, demolition, conversion, use, height, area and maintenance of all buildings and structures in the unincorporated portions of the Township of Canton; to provide for the issuance of permits and collection of fees thereof; to provide penalties for the violation thereof; declaring and establishing fire limits; defining the scope and authority of the Building Inspector; and repealing all Ordinances and parts of Ordinances in conflict therewith except the Zoning Ordinance of the Township of Canton.

**Liquor By Glass** (Continued from Page 1) resent situation constituted "hypocrisy"; that the May-flower was "the center of much of Plymouth's business and social activity"; that right now was a time when the city could ill afford to ose one of its best known landmarks.

Plymouth now has only three places which sell beer and wine by the glass — Mar-quis Toll House, Box Bar and the Mayflower Tap Room. The city commission in the past has indicated that it would permit no more than three such licenses. It is not known yet how many licenses the commission would permit allowing liquor by-the-glass. To get the issue on the bal-lot next November, signa-tures of 1,335 qualified elec-tors must be secured on patitors must be secured on petitions. These signers must be residents of the city and registered electors.

The formula for arriving at the number of signers is pas-ed on 35 percent of the total votes cast in the city for the secretary of state in the last election. In the last election, held in 1956, there were 3,815 votes cast.

It was this failure to secure enough qualified signatures which doomed the local option in 1956. Only 876 signatures were needed at that time but it was found that many signers were unregistered as city voters and some had signed twice. Plymouth voters rejected the liquor question last in the



# **Electronic Brain Keeps Tab of Direct Dialing Process**

Plymouth one and two-party telephone users will be able to dial direct to nearly 40 million telephones in 24 states, Washington, D.C., and Ontario, Canada when Plymouth's new dial telephone service is inaugurated at 2:01 a.m. on Sunday, April 20, R. D. Maurer, Plymouth manager for the Michigan Bell Telephone Company, announced today.

Local users will be able to dial virtually any community in southeastern Michigan's 313 area by the simple two letter, five numeral system following the cutover, Maurer said. In dialing outside the 313 area, however, a code must be dialed to bring the customer into that dialing area followed by the numbers.


