SUBJECT: SHAEF Approval for Repatriation of Sick and Wounded Prisoners of War

Yudoleon: This is Lt Col Yudelson of the Personnel Division, Wer Department General Staff, speaking.

Hayn: This is Lt Col W. L. Hays.

Yudelson: Is Mr. Warner present?

Hays: Yes.

Yudelson:

Mr. Plitt and Mr. Herrick of the Department of State are sitting here with me. I have before me a paraphrase of telegram no. 11430 to the State Department from the London Embassy, dated December 24. This message indicates that telephonic approval has been received from SHAEF to a repatriation of German, British and American seriously sick and wounded Prisoners of War via Switzerland as the exchange point. It is noted further that this approval was to be confirmed in a message to the United Kingdom Base Section. Before this country can reply to the German proposals to conduct this exchange through Switzerland, it is

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necessary that the State and War Departments receive specific approval from SHAEF to this operation. Have you received the confirmatory message referred to by the Embassy in its message to the State Department.

Eays:

No, only via telephone. I have just this afternoon wired you, wired AGWAR, and stated that SHAEF, G-4 has told me that it will be agreeable with them provided the Swiss trains can carry all of the losd over and above the numbers which were given in UK Base wire to AGWAR, No. 18888, Dec. 21st. You should have that wire in a few hours.

Yudelson:

We have your message to which you make reference, and for your information word has been received from the American Legation, Berne, which indicates that the Swiss are prepared to make available seven or eight hospital trains completely staffed for the purpose of transporting the sick and wounded from Marseilles to Switzerland and return.

Hays:

That is right, I have also received that information from the Foreign Office here today, and we know the number who can be cerried on each of those trains, and that information is going to go to you in my wire this afternoon.

Yudelson:

Has SHAEF confirmed that approval of which you speak by a message from their Headquarters?

Haye:

I think it is perfectly safe in doing so, however, SHARF bas not notified either me or the British authorities in writing that it is approved.

Yudelson:

I see, but the only condition that has been imposed by SHAEF has been that the Swiss accommodations which are being made available must be sufficient to take care of moving all repatriables from Marseilles to Switzerland and back, over and above the accommodation which SHAEF itself has proposed to make available to us. Is that correct?

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Hays:

That is correct. In addition to that, SHAEF G-4 has advised me today that they are taking the matter up with SOLOC and as soon as they hear from SOLOC, they will advise me in writing.

Yudelson:

Then I may take it that SHAEF's concurrence in our proposal is also conditioned by a need to refer the matter to SOLOC, is that correct?

Hays:

No, that is not correct. They are simply taking the matter up with SOLOC in regard to other matters, but they wanted to get the other matters from SOLOC before they sent me any vire. I requested that they send me a vire and then send me additional information that they were getting from SOLOC a little later. The message they wanted from SOLOC was whether or not the sufficient coal could be furnished for the trains at Marseilles, which is a trivial matter.

Yudelson:

I see. That does not affect their agreement in principle to the repatriation as proposed?

Hays:

No, that wasn't based on their hearing from SOLOC in that regard. I think that you are reasonably safe in concluding that is is entirely agreeable with SHAEF to proceed as planned.

Yudelson:

Fine. Can you inform the War Department to this time as to whether the British Foreign Office has dispatched its message to the Germans accepting the German proposal for the repatriation through Switzerland? That is the message which was conveyed to the War Department in substance in your UKX 18888 of 21 December?


Hays:

Let me read the telegram, it is not very long, which I am sending you this afternoon. May I do so?

Yudelson:

Yes, if you please.

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Hays:

"Reference WARX 81584, December 23rd. SHAEF G-4 informally advised UK Base today that entire exchange of seriously sick and wounded prisoners of war through Switzerland agreeable provided that the Swiss hospital trains will be available and able to handle repatriables in excess of figures set forth in our UKX 18888, December 21. British Legation in Berne has informed Foreign Office that Swiss Government can supply seven hospital trains, each with capacity of 360 passengers including 150 litter cases.

Foreign Office is anxious to inform Berne along line indicated in our UKX 18888 with changes in number of repatriables mentioned in second paragraph WARX 81584, December 23, and will do so immediately upon Peake's confirmation of SHAEF formal approval of operation of entire exchange via Switzerland. SHAEF informally advised UK Base that is reasonably certain the United States can provide coal at Marseilles for Swiss hospital trains used in proposed exchange. SHAEF is contacting SOLOC reference this coal matter and will confirm to UK Base immediately upon receipt of definite information from SOLOC and UK Base will then promptly advise AGWAR. It is respectively suggested and requested that all cables from AGWAR to UK Base for Hays, attention Combined Reputriation Committee be repeated to SHAEF Main for G-1 as well as G-4. This may help to clarify and expedite matters for which SHAEF's approval and clearance are necessary. Please advise State.

Yudelson:

Fine, thank your very much.


Hays:

Mr. Warner suggests that I ask if State is forwarding note to Berne on basis of this telephone conversation so that we may inform Foreign Office.

Yudelson:

Just one moment, I'll ask Mr. Plitt. Mr. Plitt of the State Department. advises me that they will forward the U.S. message to Berne on the basis of this onversation, and that you may inform the Foreign Office accordingly, and this message will be repeated to the Embassy in London at the time of its forwarding.

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Yudelson:

One question more, can you tell me if it is proposed that the U.S. held German repatriables in ETO are to be transported to Marseilles or whether they are to be moved via Switzerland across Western France?

Hays:

They are to be moved from Northern France and brought to the UK and forwarded from the UK by ship to Marseilles except possibly 34 who are held by SOLOC and are now located in the extreme southern part of France and fairly near Marseilles.

Yudelson:

What is the tentative date of arrival of the shipping from UK in Marseilles?

Hays:

That is unknown at the moment. I would say approximately the 25th of January. It should be the 23rd or possibly 24th ..... in time for the exchange on the 25th. Did I make that clear?

Yudelson:

Yes, they will arrive at the Port of Debarkation on 23 January in time for the exchange to take place in Switzerland on 25 January.

Hays:

It is planned to arrive at 23, but that may not be. It will certainly be in time for the exchange on the 25th. All we can say is that it will be in time for the 25th. We cannot give the exact arrival date of that ship at Merseilles at the moment.

Yudelson:

One final question. Has French approval to the use of Marseilles and to the transportation of repatriables across Southern France been received by the British?

Hays:

So far we do not know. We will let you know about that in the morning. They have not heard this afternoon and as soon as they hear we will let you know. They assume that it is all right and we will let you know as soon as they know.

Yudelson:

Fine. Do the British propose to go shead in the event such approval is not forthcoming?

Has Mr. Warner anything to say? if he does, I'll put Mo.

Hays:

He wants to speak to him.

Warner:

The delay is not due to anybody's fault here in London.

Plitt:

Yes, I understand.

Warners

The British have been trying as hard as we have. They sent it in a telegram dated today and they have not got a reply from the French, but they assume that no difficulties will be encountered.

Plitt:

We sent a telegram to Paris on Saturday morning.....

Warners

Yes, I have that here.

Plitt:

Asking for the French approval, but we have received no reply.

Warner:

They are probably closed over there too, I imagine.

Plitt:

The British have not had a reply either.

Plitte

They have not received a reply either?

Warner:

No, but they dor t expect any difficulties. It is only a matter of courtesy in doing it that way.







Colonel McCabe returned from Tashkent today and reported that he had taken 100 Army and Navy internees to Ashkabad in accordance with escape plan devised by the Russians.

Upon arrival at Ashkabad on 7th December he was informed that because of "Too much noise in United States newspapers on the subject of internees escaping from Russia, instructions had been received that this group would be held in Ashkabad".

On 10th December Moscow issued instructions that the group would return to internment at Tashkent. This was done and McCabe returned to Moscow this morning.

While at Ashkabad 34 of the internees tried to escape but they soon found it was hopeless because of the extreme cold and uninhabited difficult terrain. Most of them gave themselves up and the remainder were easily apprehended.

I presume the newspaper stories which caused the Soviet action were those of Pearson and Cassidy referred to in my M 21933 of December 4th.



After the return to Tashkent, the Soviet officer in charge of the escape telephoned to Moscow. Later when slightly intoxicated, he confided to McCabe that possibly the escape would be arranged again in about one month.

I do not know how much credence to give this but I shall of course see the General of the NKVD who is in charge of the project in Moscow and try to have it arranged again.

There are now 130 internees at Tashkent with more coming from the Far East. We shall send a complete roster tomorrow.

Colonel McCabe will be in Washington in the near future and I shall have him report to Admiral Scheurman and to General Bissell with complete details.



Herewith follows text of US note to Swiss concerning proposal for an exchange of sick and wounded. Begins proposal: "Please inform the German Government that the Government of the United States proposes an exchange of sick and wounded prisoners of war upon the following basis:

- 1. This operation to take place on or about January 17. It is suggested for the consideration of the German Government, subject to the agreement of Sweden, that the Port of Goteborg be used as the exchange port to which German repatriables from the North American continent and western Europe, other than those included in paragraph 2, will be brought.
- 2. In connection with the return of these German sick and wounded, it is proposed that the German Government employ the hospital ship Gradisca to collect. from Mediterranean ports to be designated later, the

German repatriables who may be held in U.S. custody in that theater, and to deposit these sick and wounded at Triesto or other port to be agreed upon. In order to facilitate the movement of German repatriables, the Government of the U.S. would be villing to arrange for the Gradisca to make call prior to the exchange date and remove such German repatriables as can at that time be delivered to German custody. Except for such special call, any remainder of German repatriables to be carried by the Gradisca will be delivered contemporaneously with the Goteborg Operation.

- 3. If the foregoing is agreeable, the number of German sick and wounded to be returned through each of these points would be notified sufficiently in advance to permit the German Government to make appropriate arrangements.
- 4. The number of German seriously sick and seriously wounded prisoners of war in U.S. custody to be returned to Germany in this operation is expected to be about 2800. This number includes personnel in categories II A and II B of the model agreement annexed to the Geneva Prisoner of War Convention, who have been found eligible for repatriation by mixed medical commission and U.S. military medical officers in accordance with the recent arrangement between this government and Germany.
- 5. This government proposes to dispatch nominal rolls of those German prisoners of war who will be repatriated in this exchange not later than 10 days prior to the exchange date. For its part, this government expects the German Government likewise to transmit not later than 10 days prior to the exchange date, lists of American personnel who will be repatriated in this exchange by Germany.
- 6. Further, the United States Government expects to be assured that
  - (A) The lists furnished by the German Government comprise all U.S. sick

and wounded in German custody who, at the time of dispatch of these rolls, have been found eligible for direct repatriation or hospitalization in a neutral country, by either mixed medical commisssions or German military medical officers;

- (B) After the transmission of nominal rolls, Germany will continue to examine sick and wounded U.S. prisoners of var and will return those found eligible for repatriation in time to be included in the exchange;
- (C) That all U.S. personnel in (A) and (B) above will be repatriated in this exchange.

The Government of the United States now furnishes to the German Government the equivalent assurances as to those Germans in its custody determined to be eligible for repatriation.

- 7. The Government of the United States is informed that the German Government apparently was not able to return at Goteborg, Sweden on the occasion of the September 8, 1944 exchange, 5 United States seriously sick and seriously wounded prisoners of war who had been approved for repatriation by the mixed medical commission in its May 1944 tour of German Prisoner of War Camps. This government expects that the German Government will also include these individuals in the group to be returned in this exchange.
- 8. The U.S. Government proposes to use the motor ship Gripsholm and such additional supplementary shipping as may be necessary to convey German repatriables in U.S. custody to the exchange points. Upon the acceptance of these proposals by the German Government, this government will request assurances of safe conduct from the German Government and its associates as to the

the vessels used in this exchange. In this connection this government recalls the incident which occurred off Kristiansand, Norway on 11 September 1944, when the M.S. Gripshohn, which was carrying United States and Eritish repatriates from the exchange port at Goteborg, Sweden, was stopped and forced to put into Kristiansand where 2 members of the crew were forcibly taken from the vessel. The United States Government desires assurances that the German Government will not interfere in any way with any of the vessels to be used by the United States in this exchange, the members of their crews or the passengers being carried aboard such vessels.

9. If the German Government is agreeable, the Gripsholm and supplementary shipping used by the United States in this operation will also carry prisoner of war mail and relief supples in both directions.

Flease request the Swiss to transmit this proposal to the German Government by 6 December, if possible, and to ask the German Government to reply urgently, and, if possible, by 13 December as to whether it agrees to the proposals made herein, in order that the necessary technical arrangements for this very considerable movement may be initiated within the necessary time."




British view that exchange of sick and wounded should be made before U S returns surplus protected personnel to Germans indicates minunderstanding of U S position. The proposal transmitted by our previous messages (ourads 59300 and 59301 of 7 November) contemplates only that the message outlined in ourad 59300 would be transmitted to the Germans prior to the presentation of parallel messages on behalf of the United States and British Commonwealth Governments initiating negotiations for another exchange. It is intended here that the proposals for exchange of sick and wounded will be transmitted to the German Government 24 or 48 hours after transmittal of our proposals relative to the return of this surplus of protected personnel. There is no connection between these 2 proposals except as to the timing as described above. The purpose of this timing is to keep separate the negotiation regarding protected personnel and that regarding sick and wounded. United States committed itself in connection with the last exchange at Goteborg on 8 September 44 to return its surplus protected personnel as soon as practicable after the precise number was ascertained and without regard to future exchanges of sick and wounded. The Germans were informed at that time that these numbers would probably be known by mid-September, and on 23 October asked to be informed when the United States proposes to return such personnel. There is no surplus existing within continental United States but U S Forces in Italy and ETO are holding a surplus of approximately 3600. Upon securing satisfactory conditions from the German Government, which are necessary in view of the Goebbels statement, the United States must return this surplus as soon as practicable. It is important that we make clear our intention to fulfill our commitment subject only to the condition that the German Government agree to give us satisfactory assurances. In this connection you are referred, for information, to message being dispatched from State Department to U S Embassy London with regard to paroles heretofore taken from protected personnel, which apparently sets forth German understanding as to Article 9 of Red Cross Convention.


US is not prepared to accept the position that there does not exist an obligation to return these surplus protected personnel if Germany gives satisfactory assurances against employing them as combatants.

It is considered here that in the present circumstances the earliest practicable date for an exchange of sick and wounded would be on or about 17 January and this date is recommended for consideration subject to finding a solution of the present shipping difficulties which are discussed below.


In connection with proposing a January date for an exchange and in determining the exchange port or ports to be utilized, the following data is submitted for consideration:

utilized, the following data is submitted for consideration:
(A) The Gripsholm will be available subject to the reservation of 850 spaces needed for that number of German civilians to be exchanged at the same time and subject also to the consummation of this exchange so that the Gripsholm may be back at New York on or about 1 February 45 or shortly thereafter.

(B) The United States will be returning approximately 1100 German sick and wounded prisoners of war from continental U S in addition to the above number of civilians. Canada may return 100 prisoners of war, making the total from North America approximately 2050. In order to return all of these personnel it will be necessary to utilize at least 2 vessels in addition to the Gripsholm. U S military authorities state that United States hospital shipping will not be available in January for a Goteborg run but could be utilized to return substantial numbers of sick and wounded through Marseilles in the event Switzerland should be included as an exchange point. The Canadians have offered a vessel for a December exchange date and are now investigating whether it will be possible to use this ship for a January repatriation. Will it be possible for the British to furnish the necessary supplemental shipping in the event Goteborg is the only exchange port agreed upon? be borne in mind the fact that there were in United States custody in Italy as of November 10 approximately 557 repatriable sick and wounded prisoners of war, which number may be increased by January. It is not known here what number of German sick and wounded repatriables are in United States custody in ETO.

In view of the foregoing it is recommended that you again canvass with SHAEF the possibility of an exchange through Switzerland around the suggested date of 17 January or shortly thereafter.

There is no data here as to the number of German POWs the British intend to return or as to the shipping possibilities on your side. Therefore it is recommended that the above data furnished by us and the proposed message referred in ourad 60190 be referred to the Combined Repatriation Committee for use in connection with the preparation of draft proposal to Germany for an exchange of sick and wounded POWs. It is understood this draft will be submitted to U S for approval.

I am concerned over the dissemination that has already been given regarding the escape of internees from Russia. War Department message WARX 47045 addressed to me was sent to General Eaker for information. This morning I received a message from General Giles in Cairo asking for information on the subject.

I am afraid that a leakage would be fatal to Soviet confidence in our security which at best is shaky but which was improved by the manner in which the last group of internees were handled. For this reason I am addressing this message to all those headquarters who know of the prospective escape with the request that the knowledge of it be restricted to the fewest possible number, all of whom have had impressed upon them the necessity for secrecy.

I do not know the date of the escape but would like to handle it as it was handled before. I will let Connolly know in ample time for their reception and departure from Teheran. Connolly will then arrange with Giles for their reception and departure from Cairo by







The ambassador has recently persuaded Mr Molotov to arrange for the release of American Airmen interned in Russia. As a result, I was informed this afternoon that the 62 internees now at Tash Kent will be joined in two or three weeks by 28 additional American Airmen now in Siberia or Kamchatka. When this is done an escape will be arranged for these prisoners similar to the one that took place last February. There are 11 American airmen who are in hospitals in Siberia and as soon as they are well enough to travel, arrangements will be made for their release.

I shall, of course, impress on all of these men the necessity for secrecy in the matter. Most of the internees are Navy airmen. I would like to have instructions from the Navy and from the Army Air Forces as to where they wish these men sent upon their being assembled in Teheran.







- 3. British feel that the suggestions contained in paragraph ten, WAR 82918, relating to Mister Magann and RAMC Staff boarding the Gripsholm in British waters, require adjustment and are cabling Naesmyth to confer with you on the matter.
- 4. British Foreign Office has received telegram number 928 from their representative at Stockholm which is paraphrased as follows: "British and American repatriates will be brought direct to Gothenburg on German Red Cross ships and also by train and ferry boat route via Tralleborg, arriving approximately same time as Gripsholm and Drottningholm carrying German repatriates. Technical reasons make it desirable for German repatriates to proceed to Germany as soon as possible. Proposal is made therefore that Germans who are to leave Gothenburg via Tralleborg should depart immediately after Gripsholm and Drottningholm arrive, and the remainder of the Germans to leave Gothenburg on German Red Cross ships as soon as they have been embarked. Such a proposal would likely result in German repatriates leaving Swedish territory before British and American repatriates sembark. This possibility is increased since the ship owners indicate that the Gripsholm will be in drydock for approximately seven days. It would be understood however that German repatriates would not be allowed to leave Swedish territory until all British and United States repatriates enter Sweden.



Combined Repatriation Committee met this afternoon to discuss proposed exchange. Upon basis of information at hand committee decided to propose Gothenburg as only available port. Approval of this port is being asked of British Chiefs of Staff here and SHAEF. Decision expected Monday.

British held prisoners in Middle East and Northwest Africa are being concentrated in Algiers. With a view to using shipping space to best advantage, committee inquired whether, and expressed the hope that, Gripsholm, if available, could proceed from New York to Algiers to United Kingdom port now undetermined, thence to Gothenburg, thence back to United Kingdom port, thence to New York. Please advise whether Gripsholm is available and whether suggested route is satisfactory. If request of committee for Gripsholm is granted, numbers to be transported on it are 17 from Australia, undetermined number from United States, and 228 from Canada, all of foregoing to be embarked at New York; approximately 500 British-held prisoners at Algiers, not including French-held repatriables. British plan to provide another ship from United Kingdom to Gothenburg and back to United Kingdom to care for British repatriates at Gothenburg who cannot be





In order to present united front we normally coordinate such matters with British and when we informed G-1 British of our decision they agreed entirely but requested that in view of British holding Italians in India, South Africa, Australia, etcetera outside SACMED jurisdiction, the matter be put up to Combined Chiefs of Staff for ruling of universal application.

Added factors are:

have to be indefinitely detained anyway.

B. Militarizzati have talents exploitable in service units.

C. We consider that any ruling other than that Militarizzati should be considered prisoners of war would open the doors for other groups such as territorial militia guards and forest police, to claim that they too should not be detained as prisoners.

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### PARAPHRASE OF TELEGRAM

I am submitting a full report by airmail of a march by German prisoners of war through the streets of Moscow. The following is a summary of the report:

I and several members of the Embassy staff withessed the march from various points along the route. It took place on July 17 and the prisoners were enroute to prisoner camps. Nineteen captured German generals headed the procession of 57,600 prisoners. The generals were followed by groups of other officers. All of the prisoners were captured recently on the White Russian fronts by the Red Army. The radio and the press had announced that this march would take place and had given instructions to the civilian population that it should indulge in no demonstrations and that it should preserve outward calm. We observed no incidents between the prisoners and the civilian population and the large number of civilians who watched the prisoners march by obeyed these instructions. The Moscow papers of July 18 and 19 published articles describing the procession and photographs of it. The prisoners appeared to be in reasonably good health for the most part but of course they were dirty and unkempt. I have received reports from reliable sources that German prisoners have been seen in the last few days for the first time in the vicinity of Moscow working on farms. They seem to be decently treated and reasonably well fed.

The following is the final text of the Foreign Office secret telegram sent to the British Legation at Bern on July 11, 1944 with respect to a further exchange of seriously sick and seriously wounded prisoners of war (ETOUSA telegram E-36305 to AGWAR July 5, 1944):

#### "IMMEDIATE

Please ask Swiss Government to inform German Government that His Majesty's Governments in the United Kingdom and Dominions are prepared to arrange for a further exchange of all seriously wounded and seriously sick prisoners of war, and surplus protected personnel. It is suggested that exchange should take place on September 1st at a port to be agreed upon. It is of course taken for granted that all those prisoners of war who though entitled to do so did not participate in last exchange will be included in this exchange, as well as all those passed by medical constasions since. Substantial numbers of German prisoners of war will be available for exchange.

Please ask German Government: for immediate reply as to whether they agree in priciple, in order that necessary arrangents may be initiated without delay. Please also ask for infication of numbers available for exchange."

The Government of the United States desires that you inform the German Government that it is prepared to arrange a further exchange of seriously sick and seriously wounded prisoners of war and surplus protected personnel upon the basis of the following proposals:

- 1. The exchange shall take place at a port or ports to be agreed upon.
- 2. A Mixed Medical Commission has just completed its tour of camps in the United States in which German prisoners of war are detained, and has qualified about 125 German prisoners for direct repatriation or hospitalization in a neutral country. This number is in addition to those German prisoners named in the Department's 2127 of 22 June, numbering 37, who since the last repetriation operation were determined to be eligible. If agreeable to the German Government, the Government of the United States is prepared to return all of the above prisoners in exchange for the approximately 250 American Prisoners of warin German custody who were determined by the Mixed Medical Commissions to be eligible for direct repatriation or hospitalization in a neutral country prior to the exchange which occurred at Barcelona on May 17, 1944, but who were not included therein. The date of August 15 or as soon thereafter as may be feasible is suggested for the consideration of the German Government as the date

The Government of the United States would expect nominal rolls of the American personnel who will be repatriated under the proposal cutlined in peragraph 2 to be submitted by the German Government at the earliest fessible date, but in any event, so as to reach the Government of the United States not later than July 25, unless such rolls already have been transmitted prior to that time in execution of Point Quarto of the United States-German agreement concerning the activities of Mixed Medical Commissions. The Government of the United States would further expect to be assured that such nominal rolls comprise all the United States prisoners of var in German custody who were determined by Mixed Medical Commissions to be aligible for direct repetition or hospitalization in a be eligible for direct repatriation or hospitalization in a neutral country prior to the exchange which occurred at Barcelona on 17 May 1944, but who were not included therein. Representatives of British and Canadian Embassies, British Army Staff, and State and War Departments have considered your E-36305 of 5 July and have agreed on the following course regarding initiation of negotiations for new prisoners of war repatriation:

- (A) The Government of the United States will send the German Government a message, the text of which will be set out in oured 62324 of 8 July.
- (B) At the same time, the Government of the United States will send a message to its Legation at Bern, pointing out the German defaults in prior repatriation operations. The Legation will be instructed to communicate the substance of this message to the Swiss Foreign Office, for informal presentation to the Germans when the repatriation proposals are delivered to them.
- (C) The British Government will presumably at substantially the same time send a message in the sense of the proposed text quoted in your E-36305. It is considered that the US and the British texts are entirely consistent and that both can be used to initiate the negotiations. You will note, however, that the US text suggests the substitution of 15 August for "Early September". It is felt strongly that as there is inevitably some postponement from the date originally suggested for any repatriation operation, it will be advisable in making the first approach to the Germans to suggest the very earliest date that would be feasible.

- (D) The US decision to inform the Germans without delay of the number of German repatriables available is due principally to the fact that past experience shows that this will avoid delay. In this connection it is recalled that at an early stage in the negotiations for the last repatriation, the State Department received an inquiry from the Swiss Legation on behalf of the Germans as to the number of their personnel who would be repatriated, together with an indication that until such information was forthcoming the Germans would probably be unwilling to complete the negotiations. In addition, the US concurs in your suggestion to make no mention of examinations by Allied Medical Officers, and feels that it is not called upon to arrange for further tours by mixed medical commissions in the US until the German Government does likewise in Germany. Consequently, the US does not believe that the number of Germans which it will include in this exchange will be increased above the number mentioned in the US text. It is not suggested that the inclusion in the US text of paragraph 2 necessitates any change in the proposed British text.
- (E) The US Government will dispatch its note at 10 o'clock, Washington time, Tuesday morning, 11 July, unless any prior comments from you necessitate delay.

It is anticipated that the Gripsholm will be available for the proposed repatriation, subject only, so far as can be presently foreseen, to the rather remote likelihood that it might be needed at the time in question for a far eastern operation. It is assumed that in that eventuality, US or British or both would somehow find substitute shipping.

Agreement has been reached with German government for exchange of German civilian internees for British civilian internees to take place at Lisbon during the week beginning 12th July. Exchange will involve about 900 Germans detained in South Africa and an equal number of British in German hands.

- 2. German government has proposed that British civilians shall be conveyed by trains in two convoys from assembly points to Irun and thence in Spanish special trains to Lisbon. First convoy will consist of about 435 British subjects and will leave Vittel Department of the Vosges, France, on 9 July. It is scheduled to reach Lisbon on 12 July. Second convoy carrying remainder will start from Vittel and is scheduled to reach Lisbon on or about 18 July. Foreign Office are trying to obtain further details of train times and movements and are taking up question of distinctive marking of trains. These details will be forwarded by telegram as soon as available.
- 3. In view of present air offensive there is some risk that trains conveying these people may be bombed during their passage through enemy occupied territory. It is realised that information at present available is insufficient for you to take precautionary measures to avoid this possibility.
- 4. It is requested, however, that you should note arrangements being made and that on receipt of further details of train and shipping programmes which Foreign Office have been instructed to obtain, all possible precaution should be taken without detriment to operational commitments, to ensure safe passage of trains.

Acting Prime Minister of Australia (replying your W 57142 28th) requested me in a letter dated June 15th to give further consideration of the matter of the release of the Japanese divers and pilots. I replied to him as follows:

"I have given most carnest consideration to your letter of June 15 relative to the inclusion of the 331 Japanese merchant seamen in the proposed British-Japanese exchange civilians. For the reasons set forth in my previous communications I do not believe that these men should be allowed to return to Japan. They are listed as civilians but there is every reason to believe that appreciable percentage are Special Service Operatives for the Japanese Military Services. Probably many of them are active officers of those services. They have a degree of information and movledge of the war situation here, not only in general aspects but in many details, that would be of great value to the enemy. The implacable insistence of the enemy in this matter reflects the extraordinary value he places on their exchange. Their information might result in the loss of many more additional friendly lives than the total number of



- 1. Subject to the availability of shipping, Italian Prisoners of War who reside in Allied occupied portions of Italy should be repatriated, if found eligible on medical grounds by the competent authority of the detaining power either for direct repatriation under the provisions of article 68 of the Geneva Convention of Prisoners of War, or for hospitalization in a neutral country under the provisions of the model agreement annexed to the convention.
- 2. Subject to the availability of shipping and security considerations, Italian Prisoners of War who reside in Allied occupied portions of Italy:

a. Should be repatriated if they are 60 or cror, or are between 50 and 60 and have completed 2 years' internment.

The Japanese replies which were transmitted in the May 9 Swiss note state that on May 6 these replies were given by Japanese Foreign Minister Shigemitsu to Minister Gorge, at which time they talked for 2½ hours on the Foreign Minister's representation. At the same time Minister Gorge was given a 3rd Japanese communication and for his information exclusively he was given the text of the protest from the Japanese concerning the alleged attacks on hospital ships Tatibana Maru and Yosino Maru belonging to Japan, which protest the Spanish Embassy in Washington is transmitting.

According to a Swiss report a long discussion regarding the prisoners of war situation then took place between Shigemitsu and Minister Gorge, during which Shigemitsu said an opportunity would be given Minister Gorge to inspect all the camps in Japan. Going back to the many representations made by Minister Gorge, the Japanese Foreign Minister said that no guarantee could as yet be given to the question of visiting camps in occupied territories as the matter was still under examination, but that he hoped that the enemies of Japan would not thwart the efforts he was making along this line, by starting a new campaign against Japan. According to Minister Gorge his efforts are beginning to show results as he recently had the opportunity to visit the camp at Fukushi and will soon be able to send a delegate to visit the Niigata and Nagoya camps, and has also been promised permission soon to visit the camp at Hakodate.

Further in the conversation it was confirmed by Shigemitsu that any intervention whose prime object is to protect foreign interest in Japanese occupied territories is objected to by Japan. This decision is the cause of the difficulties which keep visitors from the prison camps in these regions, because it is feared by the Government of Japan that permission to visit these camps might be taken to mean that the policy pursued thus far has been abandoned. Shigemitsu's attention was then directed by Minister Gorge to the fact that Switzerland had not drawn the conclusion that authorization would be given the Swiss in the future to take over the protection of the foreign interest there just because Switzerland had been permitted to visit the camps at Hongkong. These two questions can be treated separately according to Gorge's viewpoint,

On this occasion Minister Gorge asked that the War Ministry give more complete replies to notes addressed to it, and stated that refusals would be better than silence as at least by a refusal the Swiss authorities would know how they stood. Shigemitsu gave his promise that this state of affairs would be looked into by him and improved if possible.

State Department urgently called War Department's attention April 12 to note from Swiss Legation transmitting request of German Government for inclusion of eligible personnel from Graf Spee and Tacoma, now interned in Uruguay, in forthcoming exchange of sick and wounded prisoners of war. Swiss note stated that German Government expects an early statement from United States concerning above, and State considers that it is not unlikely that the failure of German Government to obtain repatriation of eligible personnel from these two vessels may be influencing its attitude in respect to repatriation of sick and wounded American prisoners of war whom Germany is holding. Interested U S and British representatives in Washington met same day and agreed to favorable answer in principle to German request, and their decisions were put before Foreign Office by telegram from Halifax dated April 12, number 1862. Local view is that delaying favorable answer in this matter might give Germans a pretext for either rejecting proposed repatriation or deferring its date beyoud the date mutually desired on our side. 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

The German Government's statement contained in your 2209 of April 8 that some American Prisoners of War who have been selected by German doctors will be included in the forthcoming exchange is welcomed by the Department which assumes that there will also be included the 80 seriously sick and wounded American Prisoners of War at Stalag XVII B mentioned in the Legation's 1845 of March 25 as being so selected.

It is assumed by the Department in connection with this statement that it will be impossible to include in the forthcoming repatriation operation prisoners who have been declared eligible for repatriation by the Mixed Medical Commission during its present tour predicated on the exchange taking place on or about May 2. In view of the newly proposed date of May 17, for the exchange it is expected that American Prisoners of War declared eligible for repatriation by the Mixed Medical Commission during its present tour will be included in the forthcoming exchange.

This matter should be brought urgently to the attention of the Swiss authorities with a request to obtain assurances from the German Government in this connection.

Exchange of seriously sick and wounded Prisoners of War is the subject of this message. See in this connection our number 21356 of April 11, 1944.

In February 1944 the United States and British Government proposed simultaneously to the German Government through the government of Switzerland that a repatriation exchange of seriously sick and wounded Prisoners of War be effected at Lisbon on April 12th. The German Government after some delay replied (reference your number E21609, April 2, 1944) that it was agreeable to an exchange on May 2nd or any subsequent date and proposed that, in addition to Lisbon, part of the exchange be effected at Goteborg, Sweden. The Swiss Government has informed the United States and British Governments unofficially that the mixed medical commissions in Germany will not complete until about May 14th their examinations of Allied Prisoners of War to determine those eligible for repatriation (reference telegram number 1957 from American Legation in Bern to State Department, Washington, March 30, 1944, repeated by State Department to Combined Repatriation Committee, London, on same date).

The British Foreign Office intends to reply on April 12th, 1944 to the German Government, in which reply the United States is



requested to join, proposing May 17th as the earliest date for the exchange and further suggesting that the exchange take place at Barcelona, if Lisbon is not acceptable. It is understood here that the British Admiralty has ruled that Goteburg is not acceptable to it as the Port of Exchange and the proposed reply, without specifically saying so, indicates that this port would not be acceptable. The British Government states that the proposed reply has been approved by the operational authorities in London. (Reference telegram number 1712 British Embassy, Washington, to Foreign Office, dated 5 April 1944 and telegrams numbers 3005 and 3006 foreign office to British Embassy, Washington, April 8, 1944.) (Other pertinent messages on this subject are our W-18098 of April 3, 1944 to Eisenhower for Combined Repatriation Commission and your E-21740 of same date to the War Department.)

The reply of the United States Government to the request of the British Government that the United States join in the proposed reply to the German Government has been made through you in our number 21356 this date. The United States desires to join in this reply with the changes suggested in the last mentioned message, subject to the assurance that it has been approved by SHAEF. (The British Government intends to make the proposed reply, even though the United States does not join.)

It is believed that the German Government in its counterproposal with respect to the date and place for the exchange may be seeking a hint as to our future military intentions and plans. Request your personal consideration of the proposed reply to insure that in your opinion there will be no danger of compromising the security of our plans by making a reply to the German Government in which a specific date for the exchange is proposed and by which it will be irdicated to the Germans that Goteborg is not acceptable to US as a port for the exchange.

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

- 1. Representatives of State Department, British Embassy, British Army Staff and Canadian Embassy have jointly considered with representatives of War Department, telegrams numbers 3005 and 3006 from Foreign Office to Halifax, reference your message E 22435.
- 2. War Department desires to proceed with joint accomplishment of the repatriation and agrees in principle with the general terms of the reply which it is proposed that H M G dispatch to the German Government. 

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
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

Item 1 - Paragraph 2, strike the words "In spite of the revised shipping arrangements indicated below, it is hoped that" and insert the words "Arrangements are in hand to." (The reason for this change is to avoid suggesting to the German Government that they are risking our not returning all their eligible nationals).

Item 2 - Strike Paragraph 4 and substitute the following new paragraph (Explanation for this recommendation is given in Paragraph 4 of this message):

"4. H M G note the agreement of the German Government to the use of the Gripsholm for the exchange as well as to the forwarding of next of kin parcels and POW mail via the Gripsholm. Necessary information including route to be followed will be transmitted at an early date to the German Government."

Item 3 - Add a ninth paragraph reading as follows:

"9. H M G understand that the Government of the United States are addressing a substantially similar reply to the German Government."

4. The new Paragraph 4 suggested above is based on assurance now given by the State Department, that notwithstanding Paragraph 5 of telegram 1712 from the British Embassy, Washington, to the Foreign Office, means will be found to insure that a full crew will be available for the Gripsholm for the whole round trip and that she can be relied upon to make the trip as originally planned. The use of the Gripsholm is particularly desirable since she is the only vessel whose availability and adequacy are assured. Further advantages include the fact that use of the Gripsholm for round trip avoids the need for interfering with established hospital ship schedules, and will greatly facilitate the carriage of mail and relief supplies from and to North America as agreed to by the German Government at our suggestion.

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



The Navy Department, in communicating to the State Department the course for the Gripsholm as agreed upon in consultation with the British Admiralty, stated that the course is secret until a definitive agreement with the German Government is reached. If the Gripsholm is to sail from New York in sufficient time for the proposed May 17 exchange date, it is essential that the vessel's course be given the German Government without delay in order to give them the necessary 14 days notice for the arranging of the safe conduct. It is therefore hoped that the British Admiralty can give permission for communication of the course to the Germans now, at least as far as Algiers, or alternatively can suggest another course, the communication of which to the Germans now might not have untoward results.

6. It is requested that the assurance asked for in Paragraph 2 above and approval of the suggested changes in Paragraph 3 above, if obtained, be communicated to War Department sufficiently in advance of British reply to the Germans to enable U S and British replies to be synchronized.



Combined repatriation committee at meeting this afternoon considered the German proposal respecting repatriation, advised to you in ETOUSA cable E 21609 April 2nd. It was sense of committee that protecting power be requested to urge favorable consideration by Germany of proposal for exchange at Lisbon, as projected, on May 3rd; citing in support, that British owned German repatriables from United Kingdom are already concentrated in North Africa; that Gripsholm is already chartered for trip from United States to Algiers carrying Germans from United States and Canada, thence to Lisbon thence to Algiers thence to Belfast thence to United States. The date of May 3rd here suggested is not available, on account of the time requirements for safe conduct approval prescribed by German in para 4 of its reply advised to you in said ETOUSA cable, unless route proposed in AGWAR book message for ETOUSA and Algiers R1199/2796 March 27nd has already been notified to Germany.

These committee suggestions are constrained by advice from Air Ministry that rail communications in Germany and France should be adequate for transporting all repatriables to Spanish frontier and by Admiralty advice that Gothenburg is definitely unacceptable. Security reasons forbid this being made known to Germany.

State Department has repeated to you telegrams No. 1969 of March 31 and No. 1957 of March 30, both from Bern to to War State, since which time we have received your E-21609 of April 2. This message reflects present reaction in Washington to the above telegrams, as expressed at an informal discussion held today among representatives of British Embassy, British Army Staff, and State and War Department. It is also concurred in by War Department operations and intelligence divisions. The course recommended in this message is founded upon the testic policy consideration that we should not give the German Government any impression that we are unwilling to have the exchange operation put off to the most reasonable date which is indicated by the information which Germany has furnished, or that we have any strong preference between Lisbon and Goteburg as the exchange port. In the light of the foregoing considerations, it is recommended that we reply to the German Government in substantially the following sense:

1. While the Governments of the US and of the British Commonwealth regret that it should be necessary to defer the exchange operation beyond the date originally suggested by them, they prefer that the exchange shall not take place until such date as will have enabled the mixed medical commissions to complete their forthcoming tour of prisoner of War camps in Germany, plus such additional time after the completion of the mixed medical commissions tour as will permit the transportation to the point or points of exchange of the prisoners of War who have been approved for repatriation.



It has been generally understood that the commissions next tour through those camps would commence in April and presumably be completed in that month or in May. The Governments of the US and of the British Commonwealth would, therefore, request that the German Government propose to them a date for the exchange operation, such date to be the earliest one which, in the opinion of the German Government, will meet the foregoing practical requirements for making the exchange operation a mutually successful and satisfactory one.

- Regarding the exchange port, the Governments of the US and of the British Commonwealth would point out that the exchange operation will be much simpler to handle if only one exchange port is used. They would further point out that if Lisbon is selected, then, under the German proposal, the seriously sick and seriously wounded repatriates from the US and parts of the British Commonwealth other than the UK would be subjected to the long overland haul which, as the German Government points out, should on humanitarian grounds be avoided. They would consequently recommend that only one exchange port be employed, and would express the belief that upon further consideration, Goteburg might be preferable to Lisbon. They would make it clear in their message, however, that their willingness to agree to the repatriation operation is not conditioned either on the use of a single port rather than 2 ports, or on the use of Goteburg rather than Lisbon as the exchange port. In other words, the above observations would be submitted to the German Government for its consideration, and not as conditions to the making of an agreement.
- 3. British are informing their London authorities in same sense as above. Request your early remarks and recommendations. Your comments are particularly requested with regard to transportation of German sick and wounded from North Africa.




