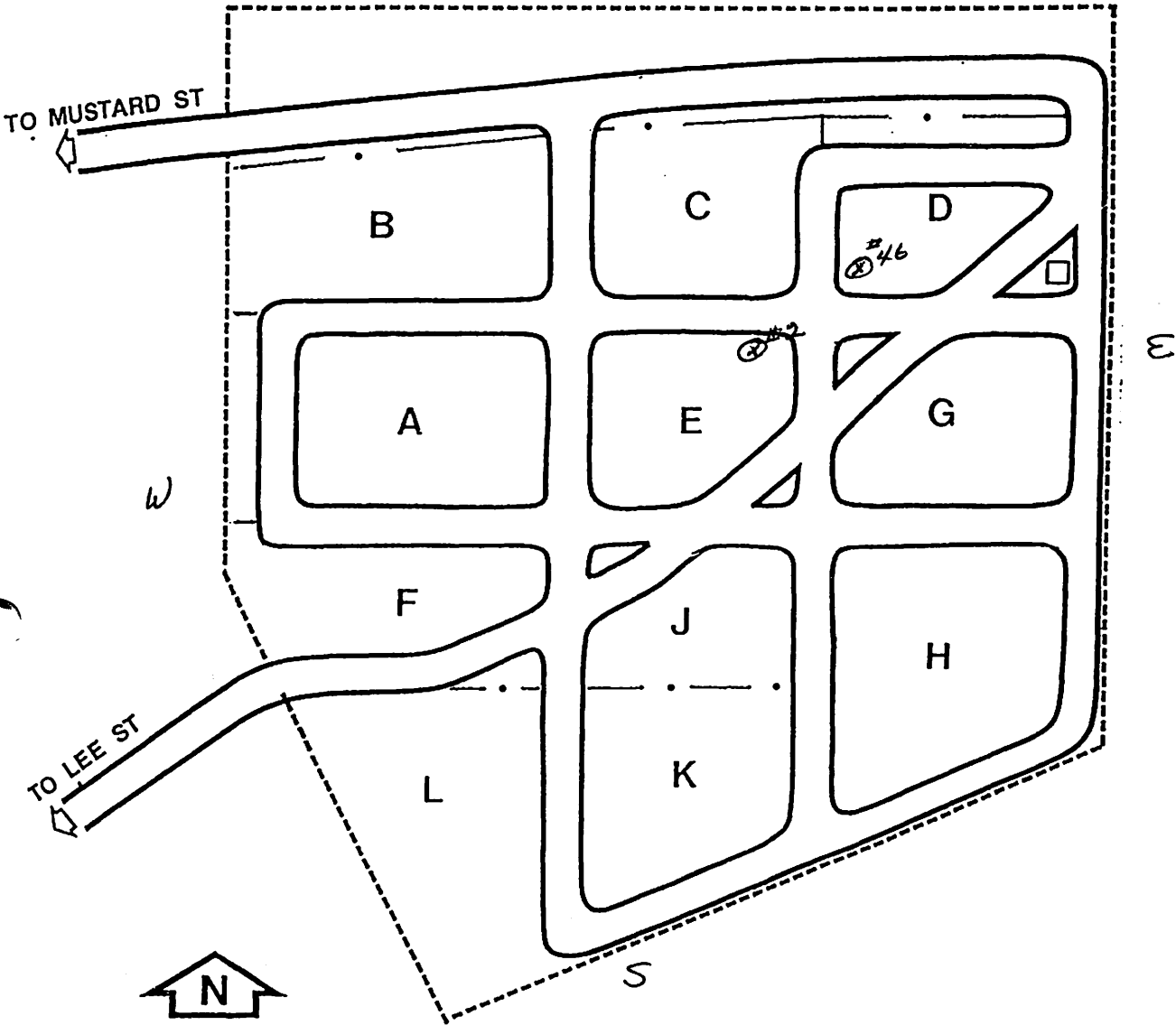

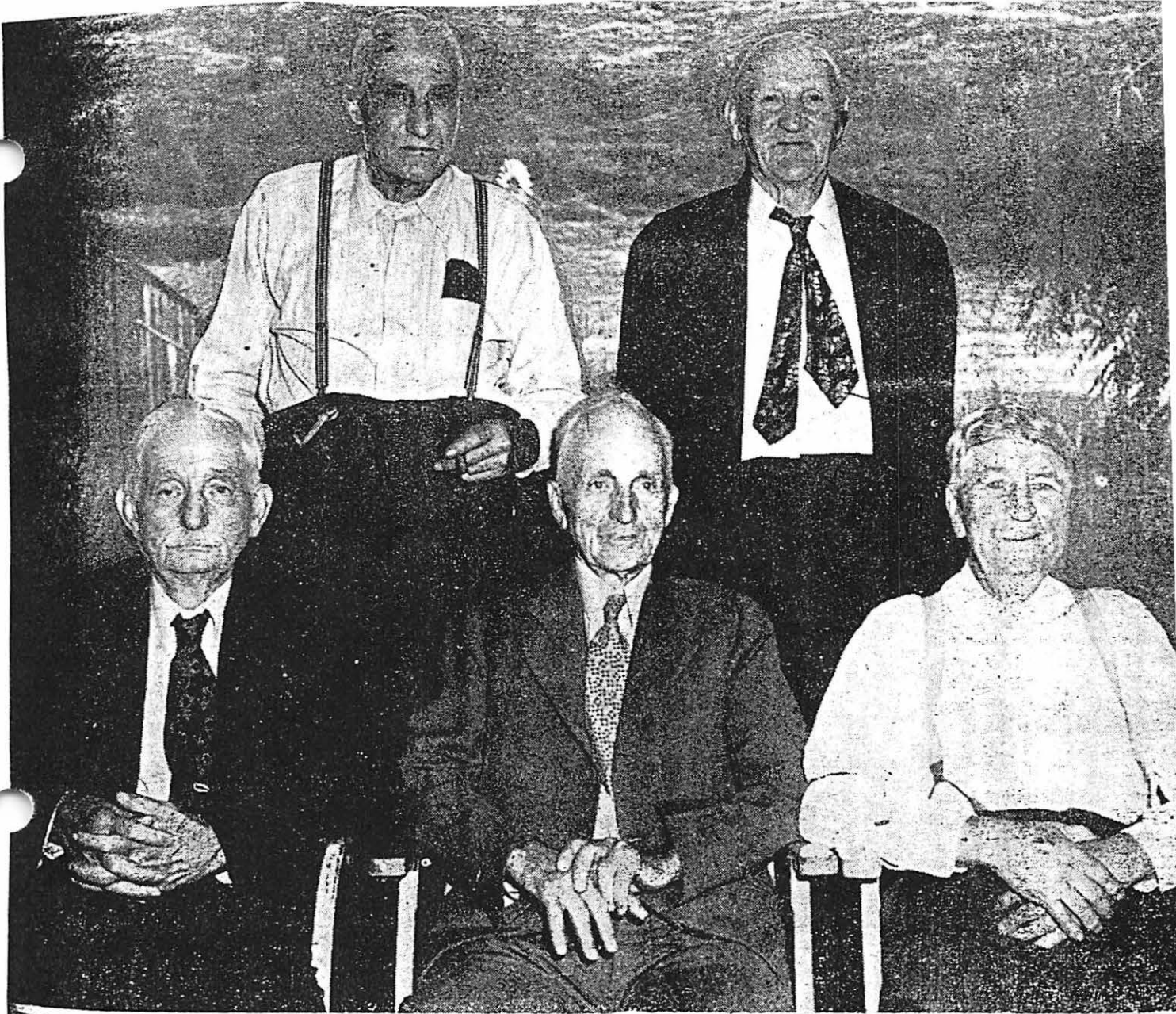

This couple is where I believe the two literal lines merge. George Washington Literal, one of their sons, was a direct descendant of the Dayton families. Harrison B. Literal, another one of their sons, was a direct descendant of the Lewis Co., families.

George Washington Literal (b. abt. 1836 in Floyd Co., Kentucky) first married Matilda Jane Huff, daughter of Jerman W. Huff and Dicy Prater. They had one daughter, Matilda J. Literal (b. October 10, 1859 in Johnson Co., Kentucky). George Washington Literal then married second to Sidney Price (b. abt. 1844 in Kentucky). They had the following children:



Mr. and Mrs. Virgil Literal Monday received a package containing a Jap battle flag, sent them December 8th or 9th by their son Merrill, who was last week reported having died December 20 from wounds received on Leyte. Last week we were unable to contact the Literals for details of their son's life and the obituary was not correct in every detail. Merrill was only two years old at the time the family moved to Dayton, so he did not attend school in Waitsburg. He did not graduate from Dayton high. Merrill was of the first group of 18-year-olds taken from Dayton. He had his physical in August, 1943, and at first it was thought he would be able to complete his last term of school, but new orders were issued and he was inducted in September. He would have graduated at mid-year, according to Mrs. Literal.

It had been more than two months since they had heard from

him, when his folks, Mr. and Mrs. Virgil Literal received the following letter. Merrill is employed in the army in "combat intelligence." Dear Folks:

Did you receive the V-mail I sent you? If you didn't I'm in the Philippines and am ok. The excitement has kind of died down and I'm battling mosquitoes instead of Japs for awhile.

The natives down here make a bamboo pole frame and then weave cocconut palm leaves for a covering. The huts are all raised on stilts to keep dry.

I was able to go down to the river yesterday and I really enjoyed myself.

I got a jap flag and some occupation money.

Woodworth Notes From Philippines

February 25, 1945

Dear Folks:

I got three of your Christmas packages today, and they were in good shape. I sure am glad you know how to pack them, as I get them in much better shape than anyone else. A lot of the fellows are writing home and telling them to put the things in cans. One of the packages had the can of cigars and they were sure fresh, considering. Thanks a lot.

Yesterday afternoon I came back from the creek and Louie was sitting on my bunk. He stayed all afternoon and we went over and saw Alvin for about an hour. He is in the hospital with a fever, but should get out tomorrow. Nothing at all serious. Louie brought his camera with him and got a picture of Alvin and one of me. Will you send me a couple of 116 film and two of 616. Send them in a can, and if you have room, will you send me a couple of cans of plum pudding. One of the boys got a can, and it was really good.

I got your letter with Merrill Literal's address in it. If I had had it sooner while I was there, I might have seen him. I heard he was killed at Leyte. I was very sorry to hear about it. He was so young to have to go that way.

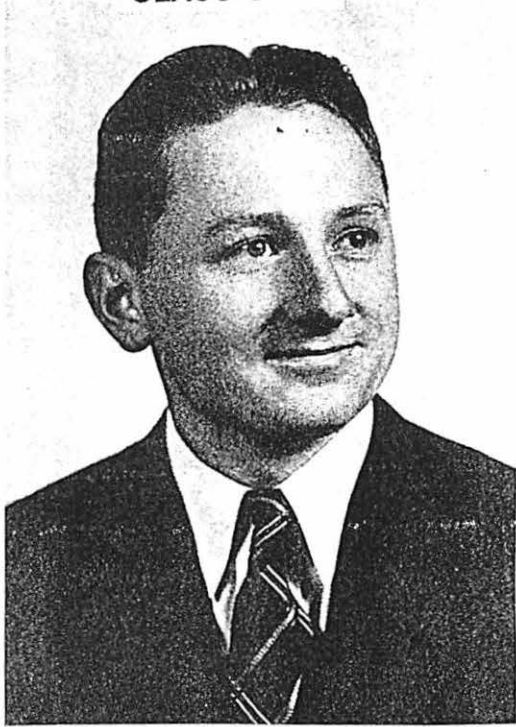

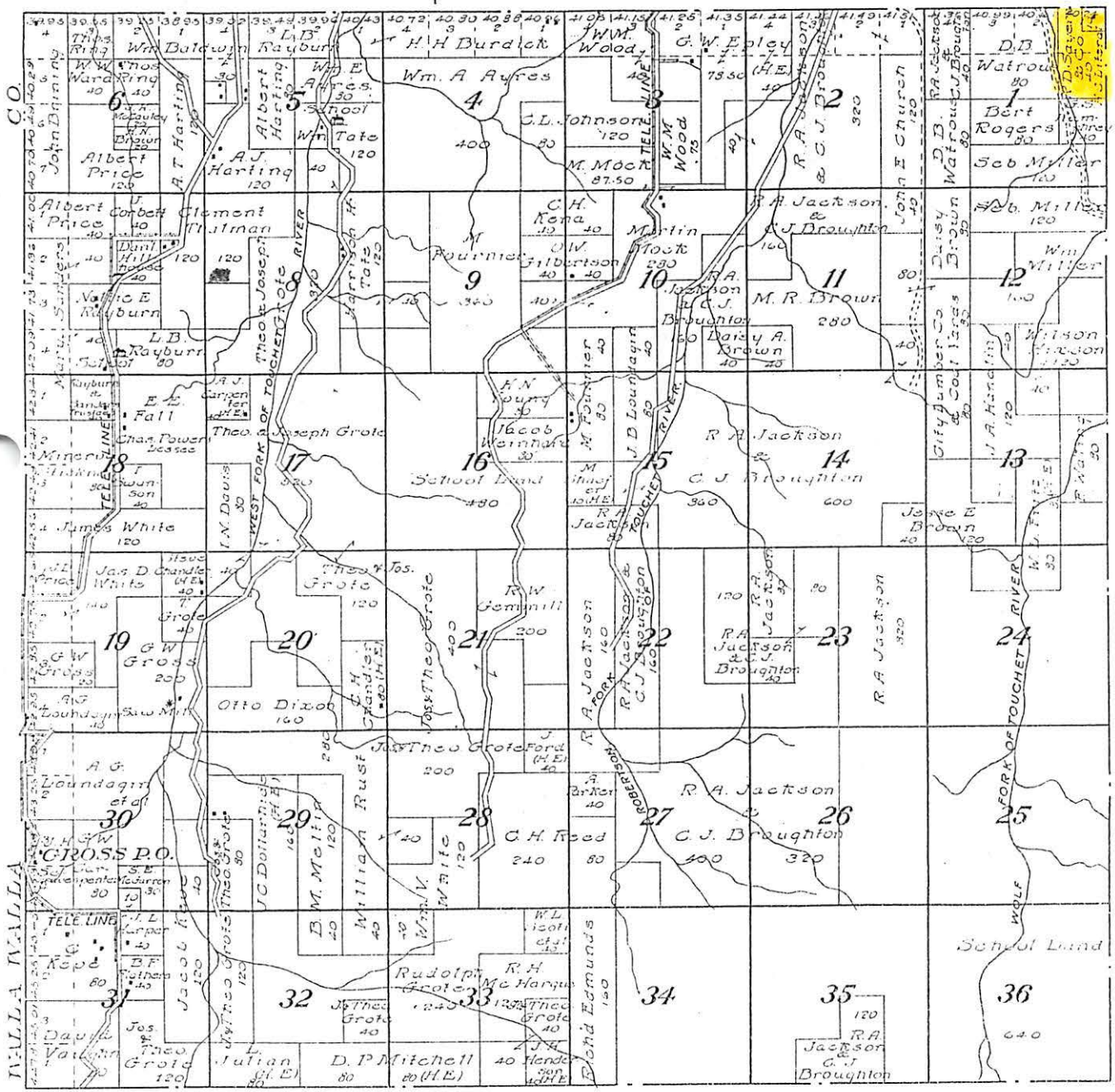


MAP OF

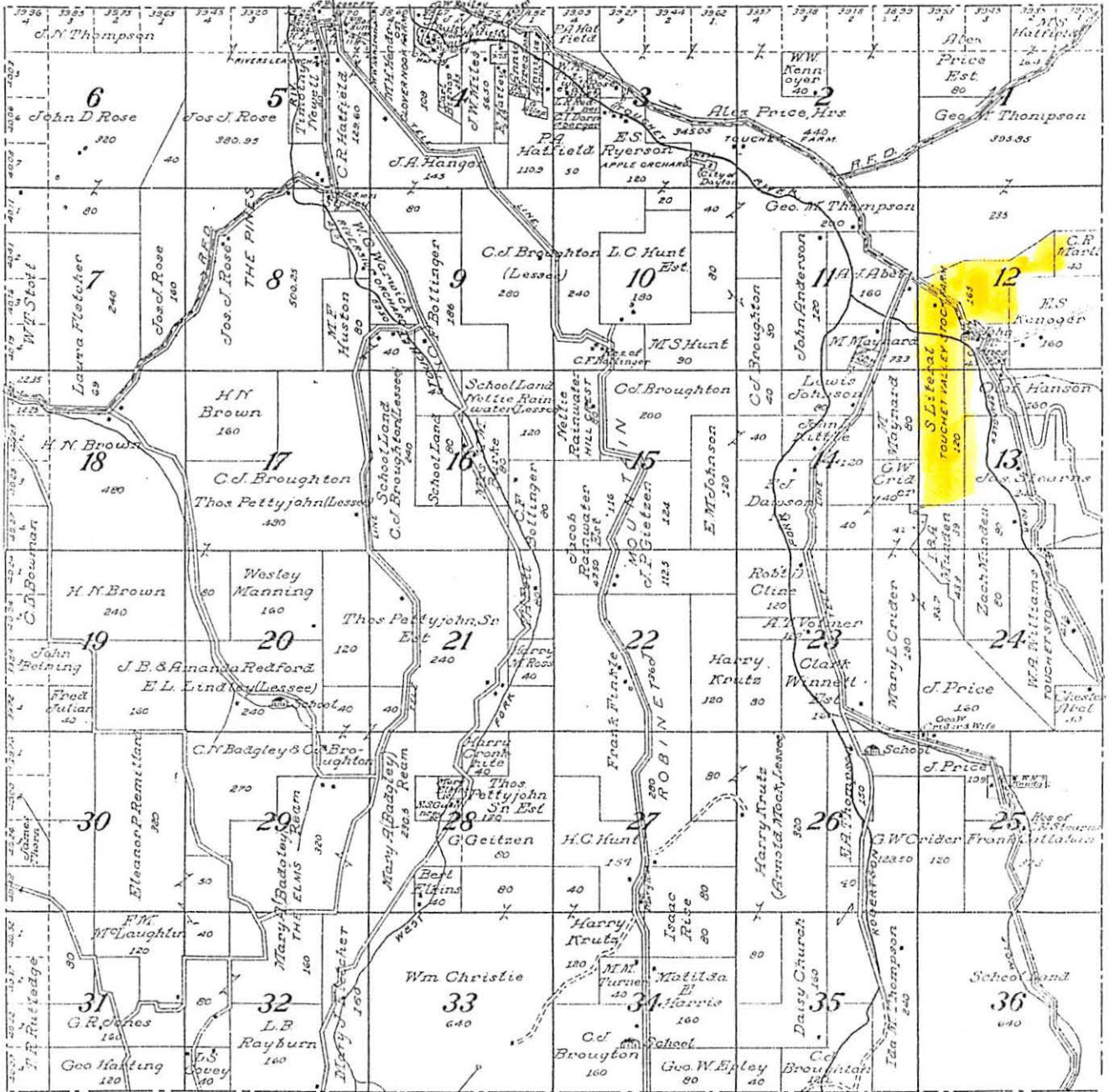
MAP OF

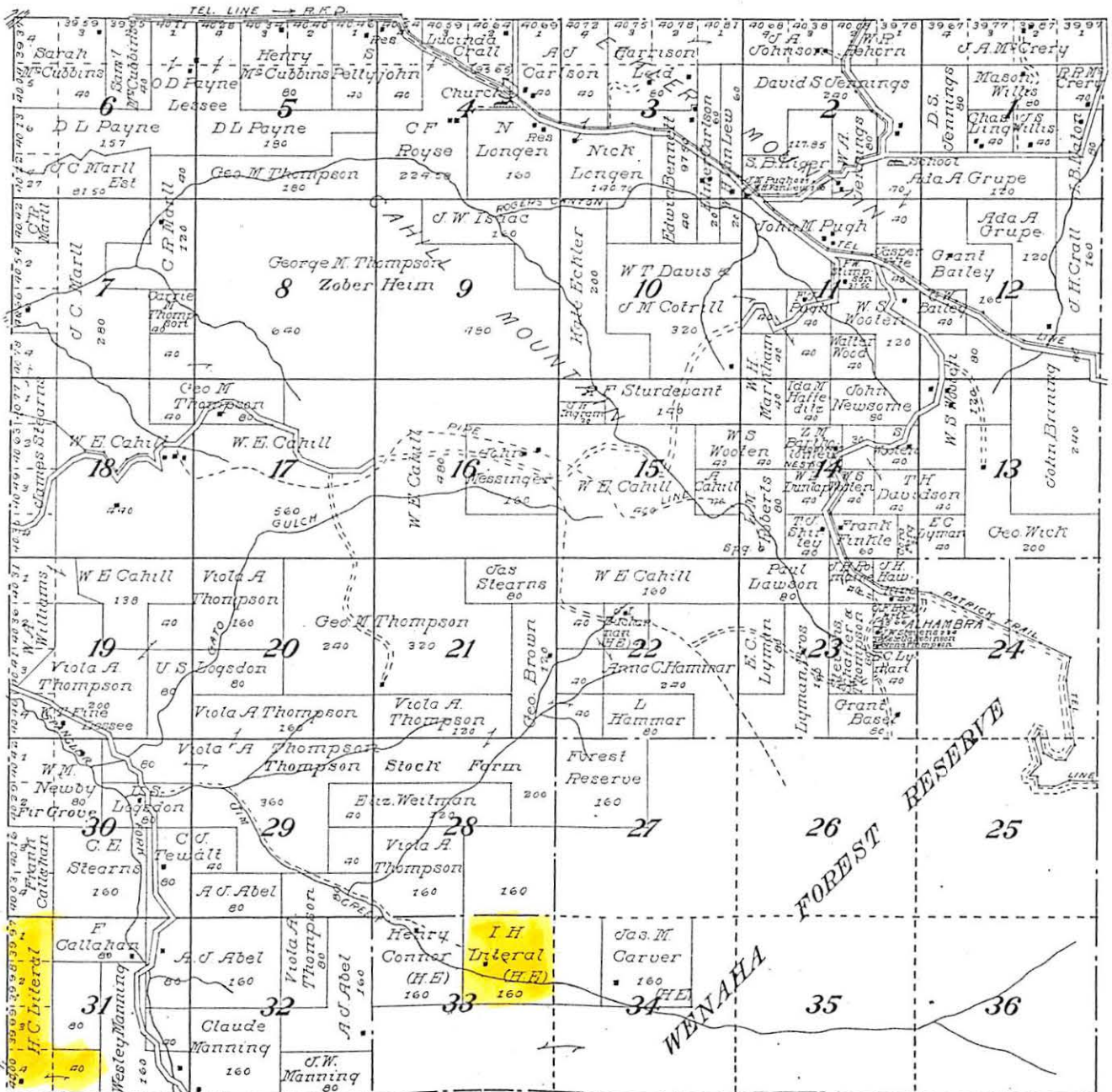

PART OF TOWNSHIP 8 N., RANGE 40 E.

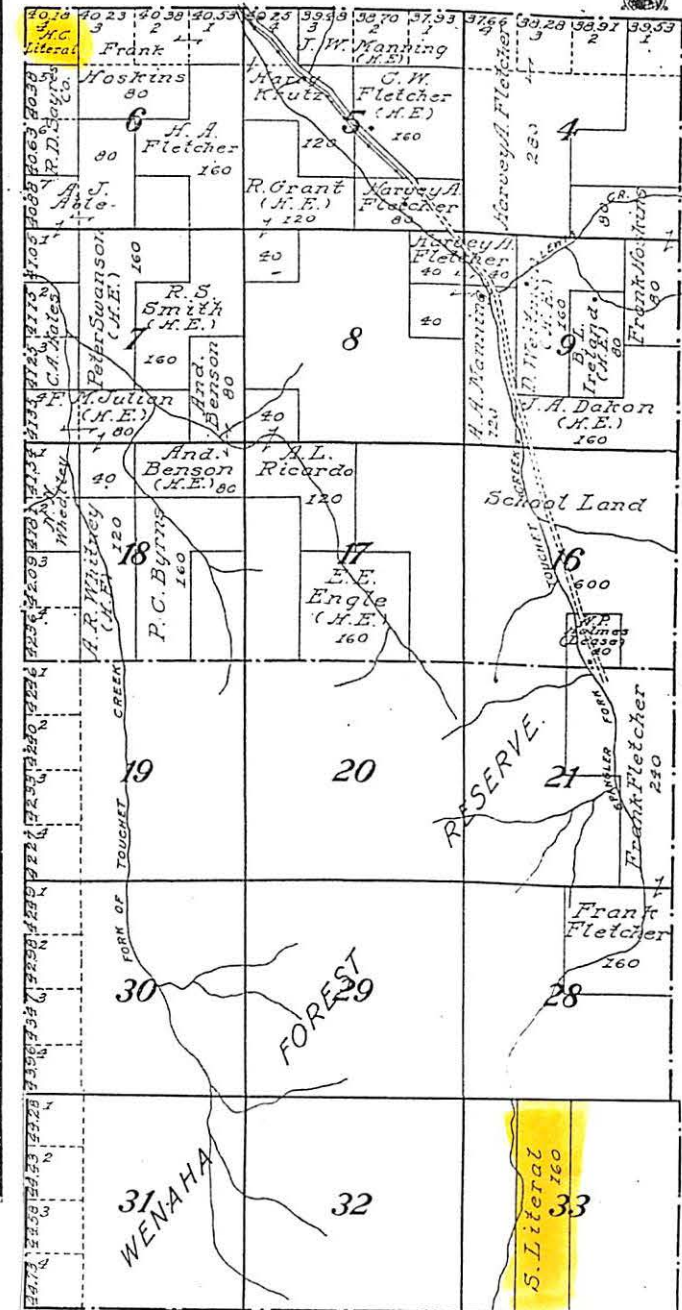
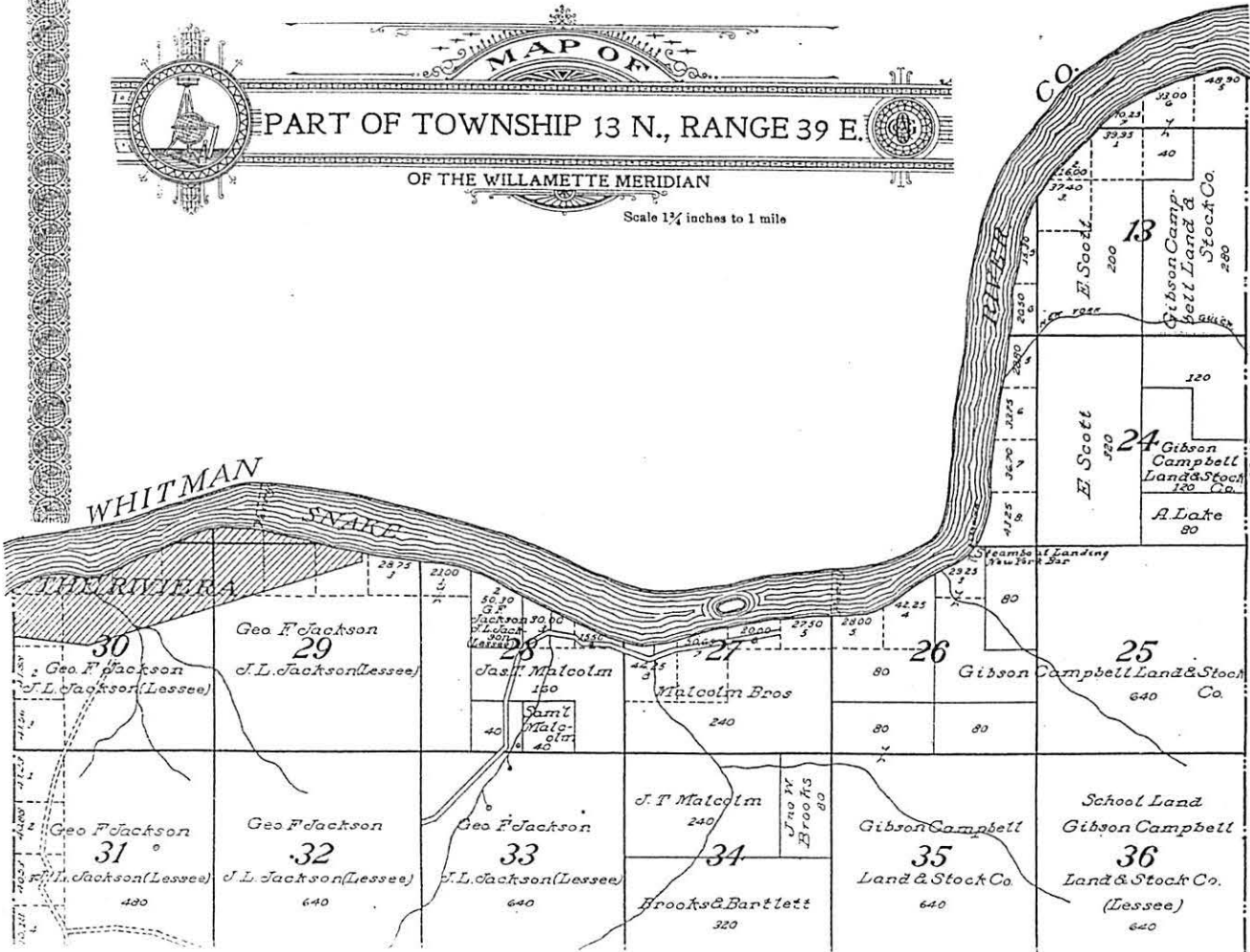

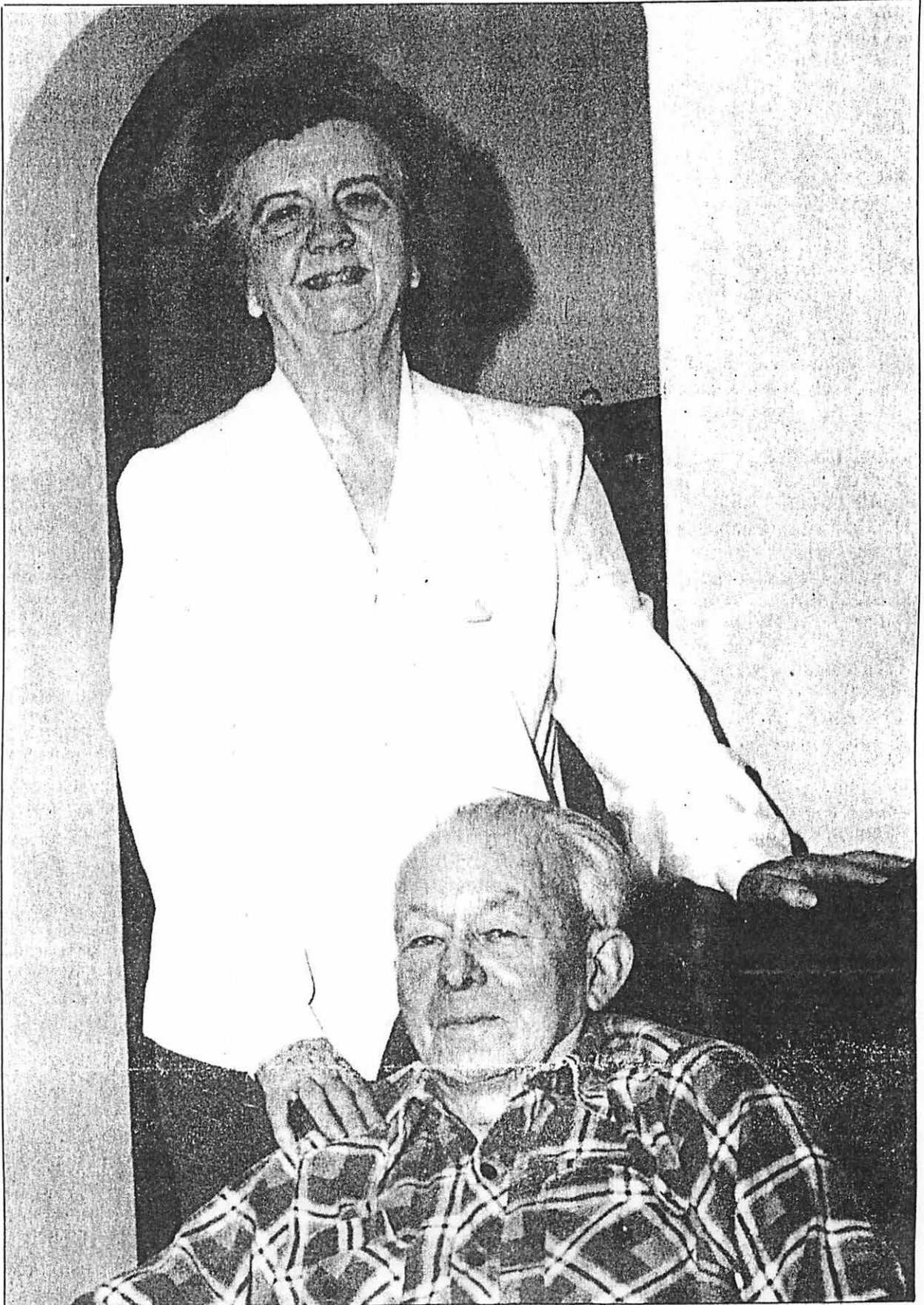
MAP OF

Access to new drug enhances heart patients' odds

On the evening of November 22, 1988, Laura Lee Literal had a heart attack. She doesn't recall having any warning of the impending coronary--it just happened.

That evening, Laura Lee remembers that she and her husband Noal had already finished dinner. She hadn't done the dishes right away because they had wanted to watch a program on television.

Later, Laura Lee walked into the kitchen and began to clean. "I stooped to put something on the bottom shelf of the refrigerator and I felt a sharp pain." She remembers now that she stopped what she was doing and took an aspirin, which was part of her daily regimen to stay healthy.

After 10 or 15 minutes, her left hand went numb and pain shot up her arm. It was then that she knew for certain. Laura Lee walked into the living room

and told her husband that he'd better get a coat on and take her to the hospital. He looked up startled. "I'm having a heart attack," she explained. Noal wanted to know how long this had been going on. Not very long, she replied. It was around 8 p.m.

Before leaving, Noal put his coat on and called the hospital to tell them that they were on their way to the emergency room. Here, Laura Lee says that in their excitement, they forgot to tell the hospital what kind of problem it was and who they were. "Everybody should be able to tell them what kind of emergency they're having," warned Laura Lee. "We learned that the hard way."

It was a blustery night in late November and Laura Lee was very ill. When she got to the hospital, the staff began their work. "They gave me oxygen and took blood," she remembered. She had two needles in each hand and what she remembers most is that her arms ached so badly. "Like a toothache," she said.

Her three daughters arrived. Later they told her that she looked awful, but Laura Lee was glad to have them there.

Although time melted, she was aware that they have given her an EKG, nitro glycerin and a new drug called Activase (a tissue plasminogen activator or T-PA; see sidebar). She remembers Dr. Pepito Emlano leaning over her and explaining to her gently that he thought she should go to Spokane by LifeBird.

Emlano asked her for a decision. She said, you know best, and so LifeBird was called.

Because of the terrible weather that night, the helicopter and its specialized crew took nearly an hour and a half to get to Dayton. Landing at the helipad at Dayton General Hospital was an ordeal. It was now 10 p.m. and Laura Lee was being prepared for the flight. Emlano told her that he was going to give her some Valium for the ride.

"But I don't like Valium," Laura Lee recalled saying.

"You may not like it, but you'll need it," replied Emlano.

He was right. The trip was like a roller-coaster ride, with the wind buffeting the chopper around like a toy. However, the crew was not fighting a head wind, as they had on the way down, and they made it to Spokane in one hour. But their tail wind had its price.

About 45 minutes into the flight, Laura Lee began to feel nauseated. She

asked one of LifeBird's crew members how much further they had to go. He told her that he could see the lights of Spokane. She told him she felt sick.

"Oh, gosh, we don't need that!" exclaimed the crew member to the strapped down Laura Lee. He assured her that her heart was doing well and urged her to hang in there. "All I could think of was 'what a mess this would be'," remembers Laura Lee with a laugh.

But she did hang in there and made it without incident to Deaconess Medical Center. She spent her first two days in the Cardiac Care Unit, where she was watched like a hawk.

"I don't remember too much about it," said Laura Lee. She knew that they were giving her drugs and she saw her family frequently, but it concerned her that they were allowed in for only five minutes at a time. She knew that meant something serious.

She asked her second daughter to look out for Noal. He wouldn't come in the room at first, she remembers, and she believed that he was "scared to death."

There was something else, too. Laura Lee recalled that this young guy, casually dressed in a sweater, kept popping into her room and he'd want to know how she was doing. He looked like some college kid and she simply could not figure out what he was up to. He turned out to be, not just anybody, but her heart specialist.

Other visitors, besides family and friends, were the crew from LifeBird who had brought Laura Lee in. It touched her that they cared enough to stop by. She notes that they are a dedicated bunch providing an invaluable service.

Laura Lee's attitude amazed the staff at Deaconess. As she was wheeled down the hall for test after test, the nurses would ask her if she thought the upcoming test would bother her. She was resolute. She had never undergone most of these tests before, she reasoned, so why should she be afraid?

Someone told her, "Your positive attitude is healing you."

To test how much damage her heart had sustained during the myocardial infarction, Laura Lee was prepared for a test in which dye would run through her arteries. By watching where the dye went on a special video screen, doctors could tell how much injury had occurred.

How the new drug, Activase, works

1. Patients with heart disease typically have a building up of cholesterol or plaque--which damages and narrows arteries. These abnormalities make arteries more prone to developing harmful blood clots.



2. Most heart attacks occur when a clot lodges in a coronary artery, blocking critical blood flow to the heart muscle.



3. When administered, Activase binds to the clot and sets the body's own clot dissolving process in motion.



4. The clot is dissolved and blood flow to the heart is restored.

During the second shot of dye, Laura Lee developed an instantaneous allergic reaction. She began to break out in hives and told her physician that she felt very nauseated. She was given a shot to counteract the reaction and after a while, the test continued.

The results from the test were better than anyone had hoped. Her doctor informed her that she did not have to go through the balloon test, because the first test showed she hadn't sustained too much damage.

Regarding her remarkable recovery, Laura Lee says, "Praise the Lord and T-PA." She returned home after a week at Deaconess and has begun a careful regimen of rest, exercise and a diet to lower her cholesterol level.

The taking-it-easy part of it, however, has not proved to be very easy. Laura Lee has always been an active woman and she finds the enforced rest extremely "boring." The stress from being bored is almost as bad as too much activity, she maintains.

Along with mile-long walks in the morning and the evening, Laura Lee has her blood pressure checked once per week at Dayton General Hospital.

Laura Lee describes the whole event as "frightening." She's grateful for all of the spiritual support lent her from her church and especially for "a great

rural hospital."

Without the presence of rural hospitals, a great many people, including Laura Lee Literal, would not have the opportunity to regain their good health.

Laura Lee Literal is citizen of year

Laura Lee Literal, 1987 Dayton Chamber of Commerce Citizen of the Year, has put her time in working for the City of Dayton.

Literal received the honor February 11, 1988 at the annual chamber banquet.

"I was overwhelmed, to say the least," says Literal about the honor. She was brought to the meeting by daughter LeeAnn, who Literal says, "lied a lot" to get her there.

The family was able to keep Literal in the dark clear up till the award announcement.

LeeAnn McHargue told her mother that everyone working on Main Street was supposed to buy tickets, and since she had never gone before, thought her parents would enjoy going along with her.

This grand scheme now in place, the family made sure that the idea of winning didn't cross Literal's mind.

When the Dayton Chamber president, John Bowles, began introducing the Citizen of the Year, he started by saying that the winner was a woman who was a member of the Methodist Church with three daughters. Literal recalls thinking, "that could be me." But it still didn't sink in.

But when Bowles mentioned the community cannery that Literal managed for several years, it clicked.

"I couldn't believe it," said Literal. And of course everyone urged her to get up and deliver a speech, which is pretty hard when you've been surprised so completely.

Literal was the impetus behind the Columbia Court Senior Citizen's Apartments. She spent five years of her life fighting the bureaucracy and red tape to secure the funds necessary to build the facility.

"It's a project that the town could be proud of," said Literal. She envisioned a senior apartment

complex close to Dayton General Hospital, so that medical care would be within reach for many folks who are without easy transportation.

After lobbying to get Dayton on the list for such a federally financed project and executing the tedious and time consuming surveys required, the agency informed Literal that another survey would have to be submitted, post haste, in order to remain eligible.

So she did it.

Still, things didn't turn out exactly as Literal envisioned. She had requested six of the apartments have two bedrooms, but according to federal statistics, a town the size of Dayton could use only two in such a facility.

Unfortunately, the reality did not bear out the federal statistician—the facility could fill more of the larger apartments.

In addition, Literal regrets that Columbia Court has been forced to allow all kinds of renters, rather than than be limited to senior citizens.

However, difficulties in the management have not dimmed the triumph. Columbia Court Senior Citizen Apartments continue to be a testament to Literal's fortitude.

"It needed to be done," says Literal.

She currently supports the construction of a new Booker building. "The community needs it so much. It's wonderful that (Booker) has been willing to look that far down the road."

Literal is also proud of her three daughters and their husbands: LeeAnn and Butch McHargue of Dayton; Larry and Kay McCauley of Walla Walla; and Rita and Brooks Graves of Walla Walla. She also has four grandchildren.

Literal's contributions to the welfare of Dayton was admirably recognized by the Chamber of Commerce. Congratulations, Laura Lee!

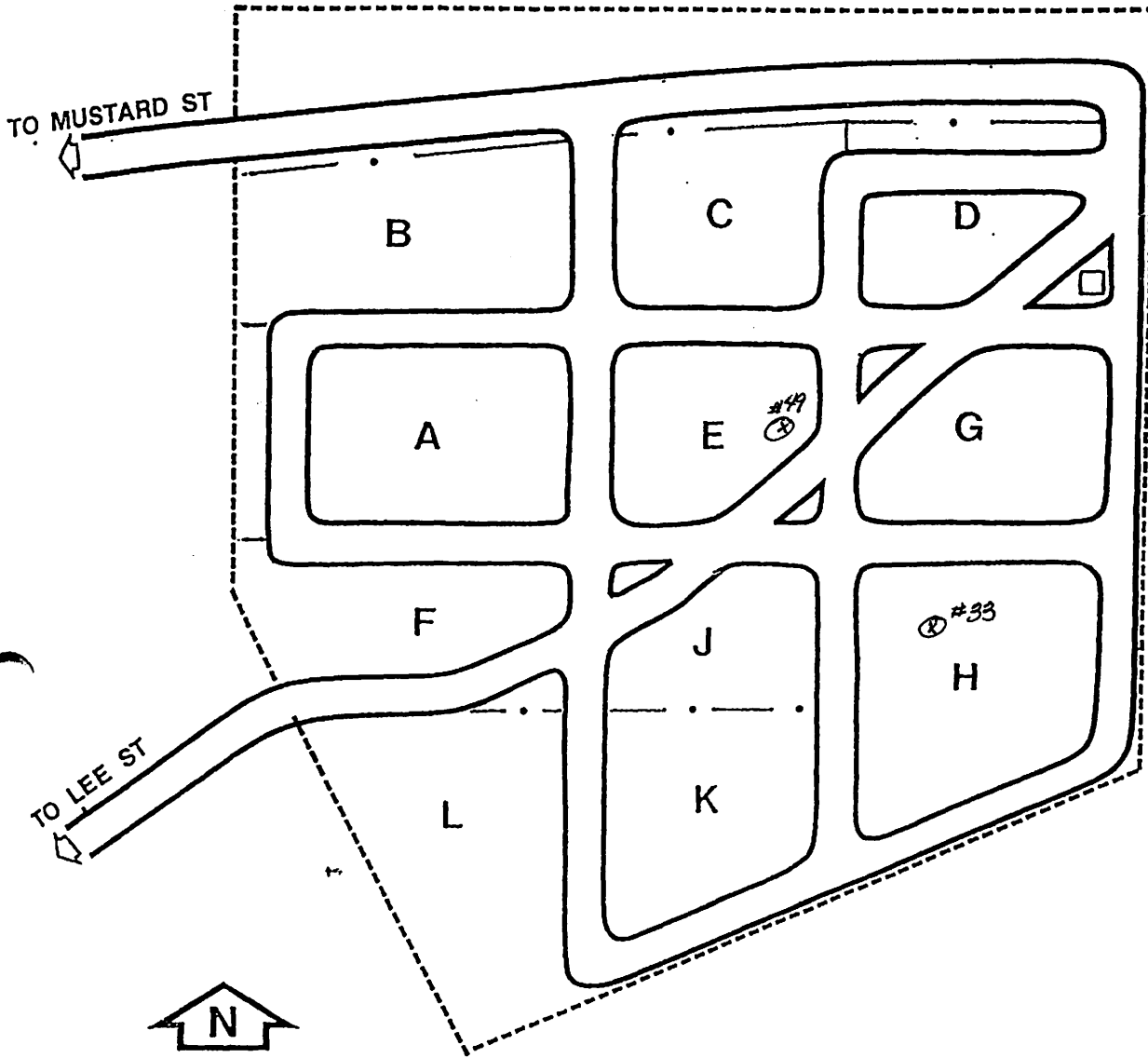

Funeral services were held January 12 from Hubbard-Rogg Chapel for Sterling Literal who died at his home in Dayton January 9. The deceased was born Jackson county, Missouri, January 15, 1867. As a young man reaching maturity, he migrated with his parents to Columbia county 63 years ago and thereafter made his home here. In 1891 he married Maude Abel, member of another pioneer family of the county. The first land owned and worked as their homestead in Hatley which he took up in 1898. During the time he homesteaded, he worked on other ranches of his neighbors. After proving up on the homestead, he sold the place and for years rented the old Abel place now owned by Clark Finck. In March of 1909, Sterling bought the "old home place" near El Grove school and until 1943 they made that their home. 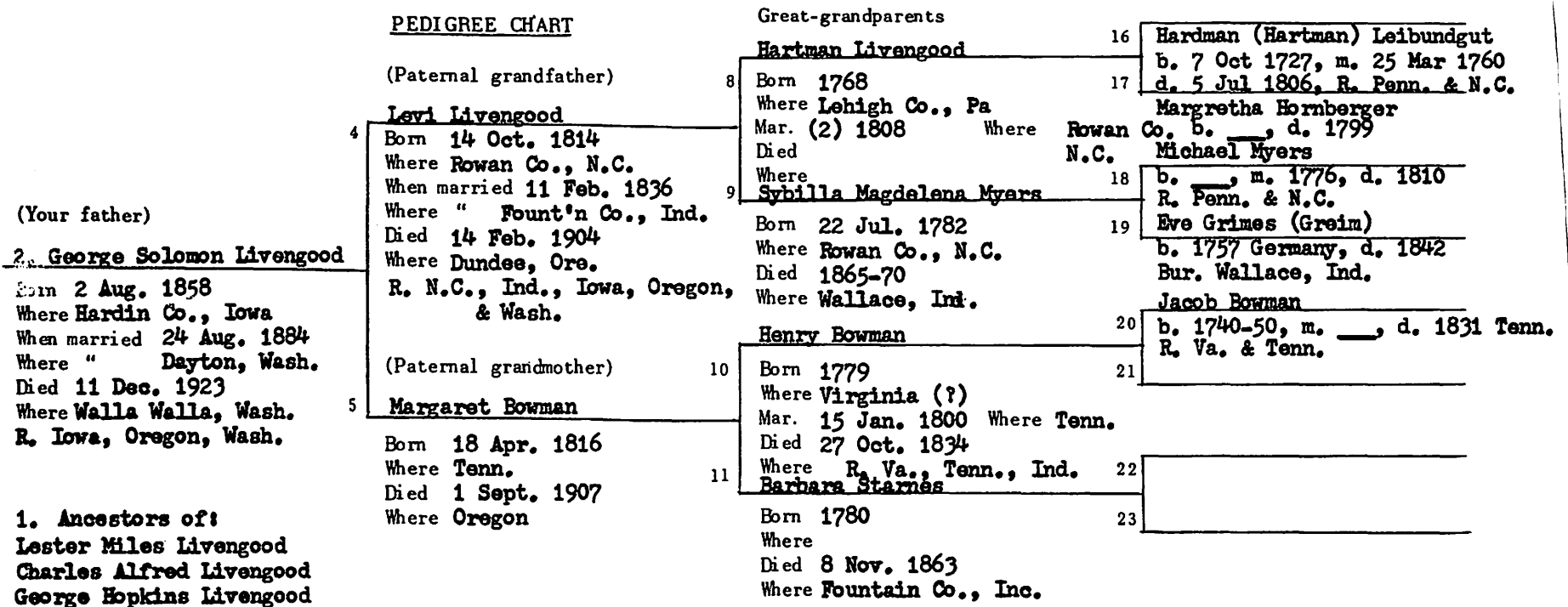

The funeral services will be held today at the residence of Tom Reed, on the upper Patit, at 11 o'clock.

Solomon Livengood was born in North Carolina July 16th, 1819, and at the time of his death was aged 92 years, 2 months and 27 days. At the age of 11 years he moved to Indiana with his mother. They moved to Iowa in 1852, and crossed the plains in 1865, settling in Oregon. Mr. Livengood was with the party of A. L. McCauley, the Baldwins, Stovall, Winnetts and Bundys.

In 1883 the family moved to Dayton, where they resided until 1899, since which time they have lived with his daughter, Mrs. Tom Reed, on the upper Patit. **FRANK LIVENGOOD APOPLEXY
VICTIM—NEIGHBORS DISCOVER

SETTLER, DUES.**

Frank Livengood, pioneer resident of Dayton, was found Monday evening, about 7 o'clock, lying on a bed dead, in the house where he made his home alone. It was evident that death had occurred some hours previous to the discovery of the body as neighbors had not seen Mr. Livengood around the place since the evening before. A neighbor woman, fearing that all was not well with Livengood went to the house and looked through the window, seeing the man lying on the bed. She called Sheriff Ed Moody, who with Prosecuting Attorney E. W. Clark, went to the house to investigate and found that the man was dead. Dr. J. A. MacLachlan was then called and pronounced death due to apoplexy, and said that death had occurred some hours before. There being no doubt that death had occurred from natural causes, no inquest was held.

Solomon Livengood, a respected pioneer of this county, died at the home of his son-in-law, Tom Reed, Friday morning, October 13, at 4:15.

The funeral services will be held today at the residence of Tom Reed, on the upper Patit, at 11 o'clock.

Solomon Livengood was born in North Carolina July 16th, 1819, and at the time of his death was aged 92 years, 2 months and 27 days. At the age of 11 years he moved to Indiana with his mother. FRANK LIVENGOOD APOPLECTIC VICTIM—NEIGHBORS DISCOVERED HE WAS PIONEER RESIDENT OF DAYTON. WAS PLYOR, EARLY IN SETTLED, DIES.

Frank Livengood, pioneer resident of Dayton, was found Monday evening, about 7 o'clock, lying on a bed dead, in the house where he made his home alone.
