

The new Portland State library moved from the confines of the second floor of Old Main to a spacious four story building adjoining the College Center. The library, now containing some 40,000 volumes, when full, will hold upwards of 130,000 copies.

The building was ready January 5, the opening day of winter quarter. Floor space including health service center is 36,405 square feet. The total seating on the four floors and the basement level is 700.

The floors of the new library are planned so as to divide the reading material into the different courses of study at the school. In the basement, the audio visual department is housed under the direction of Mr. Kenneth Butler. Special booths are provided for language students until the new language building is constructed. The main floor contains the reference library, card catalog, and the circulation desk. The first level contains the education division material; the second houses the science and social science materials; and the third floor contains materials pertinent to the humanities division.












ASHER B. WILSON Professor of Theatre Arts





The Portland State wrestling squad, coached by Howard Westcott, enjoyed another fine season. Facing a rugged schedule, the grapplers posted a 10-win and 3-loss record for the season. Defeating such schools as Washington. Oregon, and Fort Lewis army base, and showing well against the Multnomah Athletic Club, Portland State produced two coast champions, Autrey Ehler and Gary Hoagland, while taking third place in the coast tournament. Wrestling, a minor sport at most schools has had such an outstanding record at this school that it may be classed as our leading sport.

A coast champion in a sport is someone to be admired; a man selected as the best wrestler on the coast is even more outstanding; but, when an individual is selected for both awards and, in addition, is chosen the best in the West, then he has reached the top.

The greatest track team in PSC history got off to a rousing start this year with a convincing triumph over both Linfield and Oregon Tech. By swamping both schools, 86 to 45 and 104 1/3 to 26/23, the Vikings bettered six school marks. Lance Newman, OCC half mile champ, set a new standard in the mile, and Jay Hill, a freshman from Grant, knocked almost two seconds off of the half mile held by Newman.

Jon Abraham, sensational transfer from Oregon, ran the hundred in 10.1, which is slow for Jon but is a new school record. Bruce Hansen, also a freshman from Grant, erased Terry Kramer's javelin mark in his first collegiate competition. Tom Lee jumped six feet four inches against Linfield to set a school record.

Last, the mile relay team knocked more than two seconds off the previous school standard. Ralph Davis, starting his sixth year as the Vikings' head track coach, saw his enthusiasm and hard work pay off last year in the form of an Oregon Collegiate Conference track and field championship for the Staters.

Davis concluded his high school coaching career at his alma mater, Jefferson, in 1953, where he assisted in football and was head track coach. Ralph stepped into the collegiate ranks the following year and has been at Portland State since that time. Davis was head football coach during the 1955 and 1956 seasons, and he took over as head track coach in the spring of 1955.





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

A Christmas drive shortly before the end of fall term resulted in the contribution of approximately 1,000 packages of cigarettes and other items to patients at the Portland Veterans hospital. The club also received a sizeable amount of money that went toward the purchase of a wheel chair for a crippled child. Volunteer members of the group constructed a storage room in the arts and crafts section of the college center and participated in the decoration of the college center prior to Christmas vacation.

A dance held in February, numerous informal gatherings, and a pionic spring term were other activities of the Viking Vets. The group also published the VETS NEWSLETTER periodically throughout the year to inform veterans of pertinent information.
