





### Admit Webber Will to Probate

The will of James B. Webber Jr., of 226 Provencal, executive vice-president and general manager of J. L. Hudson, was admitted to probate on Thursday, September 6, by Probate Judge Joseph A. Murphy.

Mr. Webber died of a heart attack on August 27, at Turtle Lake, Mich., where he was vacationing. He was 44 years old.

Court records showed that no value has been set on his estate except "100 and upward," but Judge Murphy said that the estate was worth more than \$100,000.

The will, which was drawn last February 8, left 50 percent of the estate to his wife, Nancy. It also set up two trust funds, one of which gives Mrs. Webber a monthly income for the rest of her life; the other directs that 25 percent of the estate be distributed according to the trustees' discretion.

Named trustees were Foster Winter, treasurer of Hudson; and Miles O'Brien, vice-president of the Detroit Insurance Agency. Mrs. Webber was named executrix.

### Prevention of Blindness Aim of Current Campaign

The Michigan Committee of the National Society for the Prevention of Blindness, has set the week of September 12 through 19 for "Sight Saving Week". Proclamations have been made by Mayor Cobo and Governor Williams to this effect. The slogan is "Be Wise—Take Care of Your Eyes."

Jacobson's has decorated a window to show a vision screening set-up. Last year the Grosse Pointe Alumnae chapter of Delta Gamma initiated such a program for pre-school children. The volunteers were given a course by the MSPB nurse consultant so that all screening would be done under controlled conditions.

Children in six of the seven

Grosse Pointe nursery schools were screened—a total of 229 three, four, and five-year-olds. They were screened for visual acuity, muscle imbalance and symptoms of straining, rubbing, etc., and were referred for professional help if it seemed needed.

The Grosse Pointe branch of the Wayne County Department of Health is cooperating with Delta Gamma. There is an advisory board under the chairmanship of Dr. Fred Lauppe. Its members are Dr. Charles G. Jennings, Dr. Thomas Davies and Mrs. Bertha Williams of the Health Department, and Mrs. F. Roger Bacon. Mrs. John B. Watkins is Project Chairman for Delta Gamma and Mrs. J. Joseph Jennings is recorder.

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### France to Honor Farms Resident

Dr. Clarence W. Wachner, Director of Language Education for the Detroit Public Schools, will receive the award of Officier d'Academie from the French government, at 4 p.m., Wednesday, September 26. The new consul for France in Detroit, M. Jean Desparmet, will make the presentation.

For the occasion the Foreign Language Teachers' Association of Metropolitan Detroit have planned a tea and reception to be held in the David Henry Tea Lounge at the Student Center of Wayne State University.

In presenting this award the French government is recognizing Dr. Wachner's efforts to foster and extend the teaching of foreign languages in the public schools, both elementary and secondary. He has served as a consultant on occasion for the Modern Language Association of America in their study of the FLES program and in the preparation of material for third and fourth grade French in the elementary school.

Currently he is a member of the board of directors of the Modern Language Audio-Visual Project being sponsored by the French Department and the Audio-Visual Materials Consultation Bureau of Wayne State University.

He has written several articles for educational magazines and is co-author of a junior high school text, an exploratory course in foreign language study, entitled General Language, English and Its Foreign Relations.

Dr. Wachner has studied at Wayne State University, the University of Michigan, and the Harvard School of Business Administration, getting his doctorate in administration and super-

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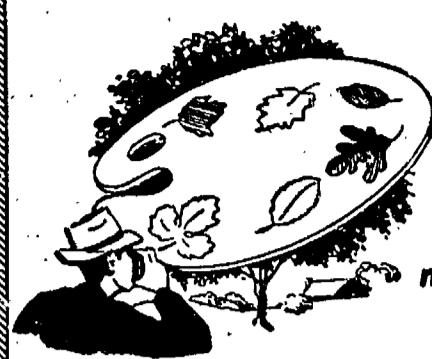

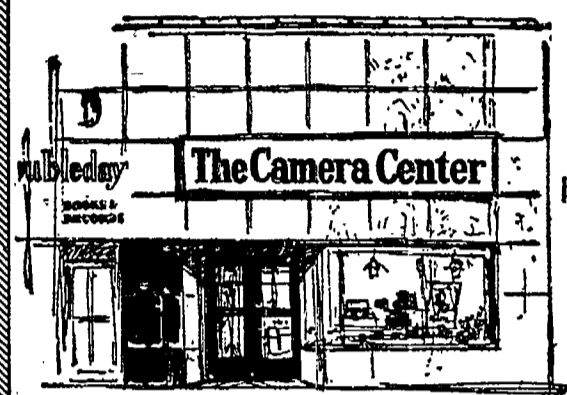

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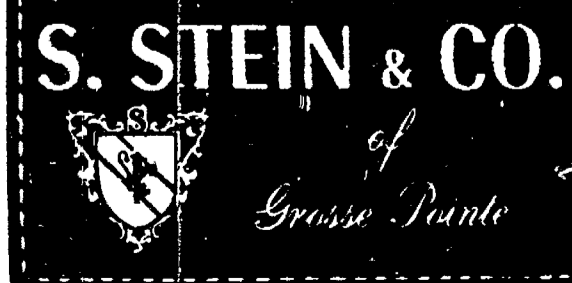

Services for Mr. Brooks, 55, of 1127 Beaconsfield, a Detroit photographer for 28 years, were held on Thursday, September 6. Burial was in Forest Lawn cemetery.

Mr. Brooks died on Monday, September 3, at Flower Hospital.

From 1928 to 1953 he was a

staff photographer at the Detroit News. In 1942, he was the winner of the first Pulitzer Prize, journalism's highest honor, for his picture, "The Picket Line," taken during the 1941 Ford strike at her home.

In 1953, Mr. Brooks left the News to become a commercial photographer.

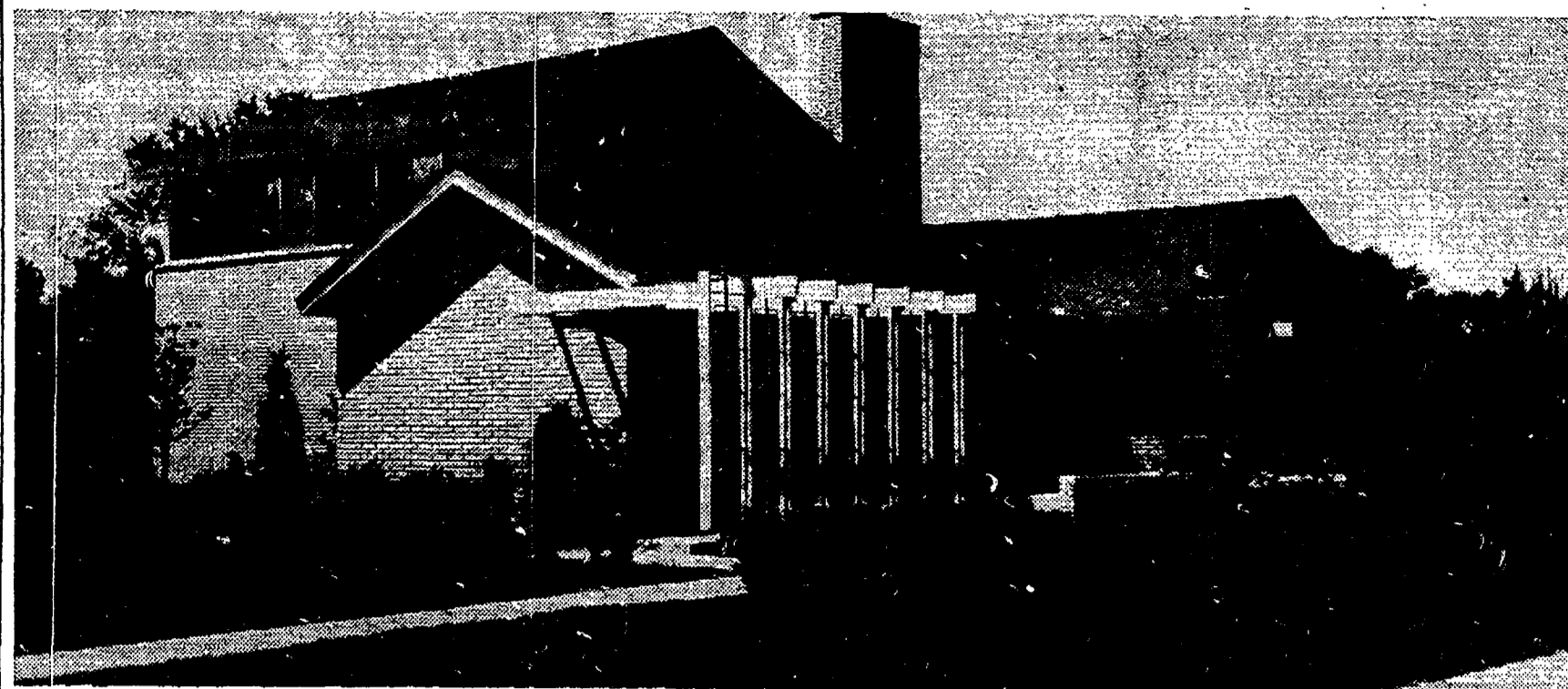
Services for Mrs. Giffin, 58, of 208 Moran, were held on Tuesday, September 11. Burial was in White Chapel Memorial cemetery.

Holiday House Already Visited by 10,000

Interior colors and furnishings were thoughtfully selected by Sterling-LaVerne, interior designer of Grosse Pointe Woods, who worked closely in collaboration with Cox & Baker to complete their architectural ideas to create a harmonious, tasteful whole.

The color scheme of soft clover pink and cream takes balance from the charcoal hues used throughout the house. These colors are blended newly in each area or room... or another color is added for a change of pace and accent. Unusual wallpapers in specially selected colors and original designs have been used with great good taste for backgrounds.

The luxurious cream-colored nylon carpeting in the living room of Holiday House is sumptuous but really practical. Cream walls with a wall of clover pink have one dark charcoal accent in the inside-outside wall of painted brick. The marble-tiled open fireplace soars to the cathedral ceiling and becomes this room's natural focal point.

A wall of sliding glass doors leads to a brick-walled patio which is furnished in correlated

colors. The lounge room has creamy vinyl-tiled floors with a free-form, cream rug in a conversational center. The wallpaper mural along one wall is pale and interesting as to color and theme. Furniture here is deeply inviting, light and floating.

The carefree kitchen of Holiday House is entirely gale-equipped for ease of performance and complete efficiency. Built-in gas range and oven offer "push-button" cooking and the automatic gas refrigerator makes and SERVES ice cubes automatically—eliminating messy ice trays!

A peninsula counter topped in pink plastic houses twin sinks, one of which is shallow for washing vegetables and fruits—the other for general use. A built-in dishwasher and garbage disposer are other easy-go features here. A wall of cabinets in natural combed oak with pink overtones finish provides varied sizes in storage space.

On the pink counter stands a miniature portable television set for the home-maker's enjoyment. The multitude of storage cabinets which virtually line the walls of this carefree kitchen are in natural combed oak with a special finish in pink overtones.

The built-in gas cooking equipment features stainless steel units with push-button cookery for range and oven. The cream colored refrigerator makes and serves ice cubes automatically. A light overhead trellis conceals lamps which give brilliant daylight around the clock. The breakfast space has one wall papered in a white background abstraction of pink and gold.

A sliding wall of glass with integral screens also opens onto the large patio.

The bar at the kitchen's east wall conveniently serves the lounge room and this entire wall contains flush, built-in storage cabinets from floor to ceiling.

Complete privacy has been built into the master bedroom on the first floor. Cream nylon carpeting again is used to cover the floor. A decorative mural, printed in overtones of blue, is highlighted by cream walls and light blue-on-cream Fortisan draperies.

A soft, quilted bedspread matches the drapery fabric.

Abalone tops on the side tables and the triple dresser are enriched with touches of gold and shimmer in the soft light. A combination of gold and silver lamps adds an impression of effortless luxury.

In the second floor hallway, at the head of the cream-carpeted stairs, Cox & Baker have placed a built-in cream-painted desk with telephone. Indirect lighting is used over the desk and over the balcony.

The guest bedroom on the second floor has gold wallpaper, printed in an abstraction of kings and queens, against two white walls.

In the third bedroom, accent colors of light turquoise and soft browns appear in a special wallpaper abstraction, as well as in the bedspread and chair covers and chests in walnut by Brown-Saltman, of California, may be arranged in many ways.

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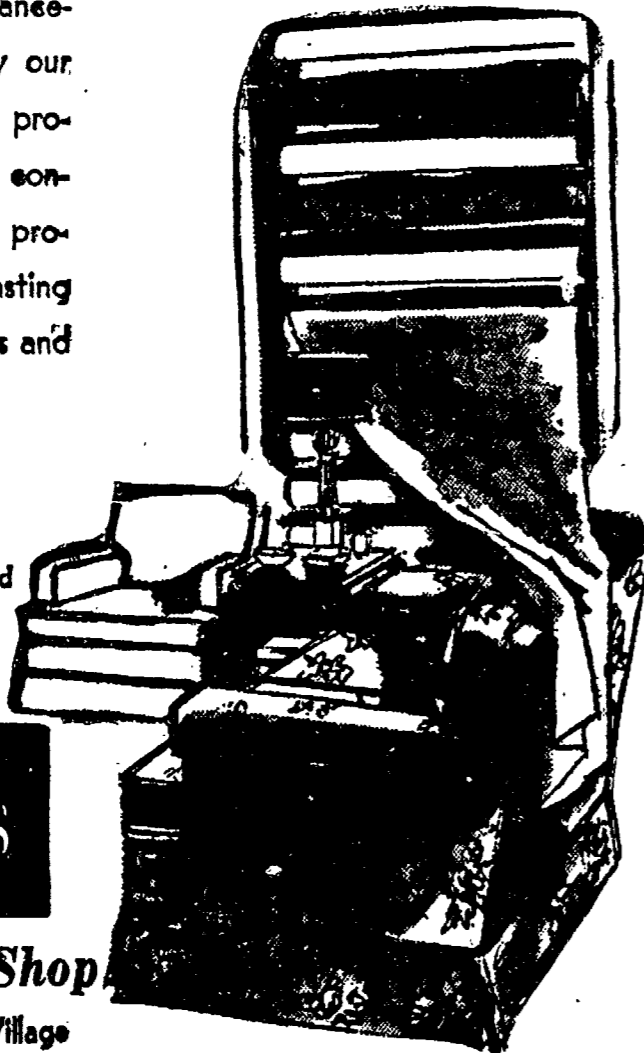

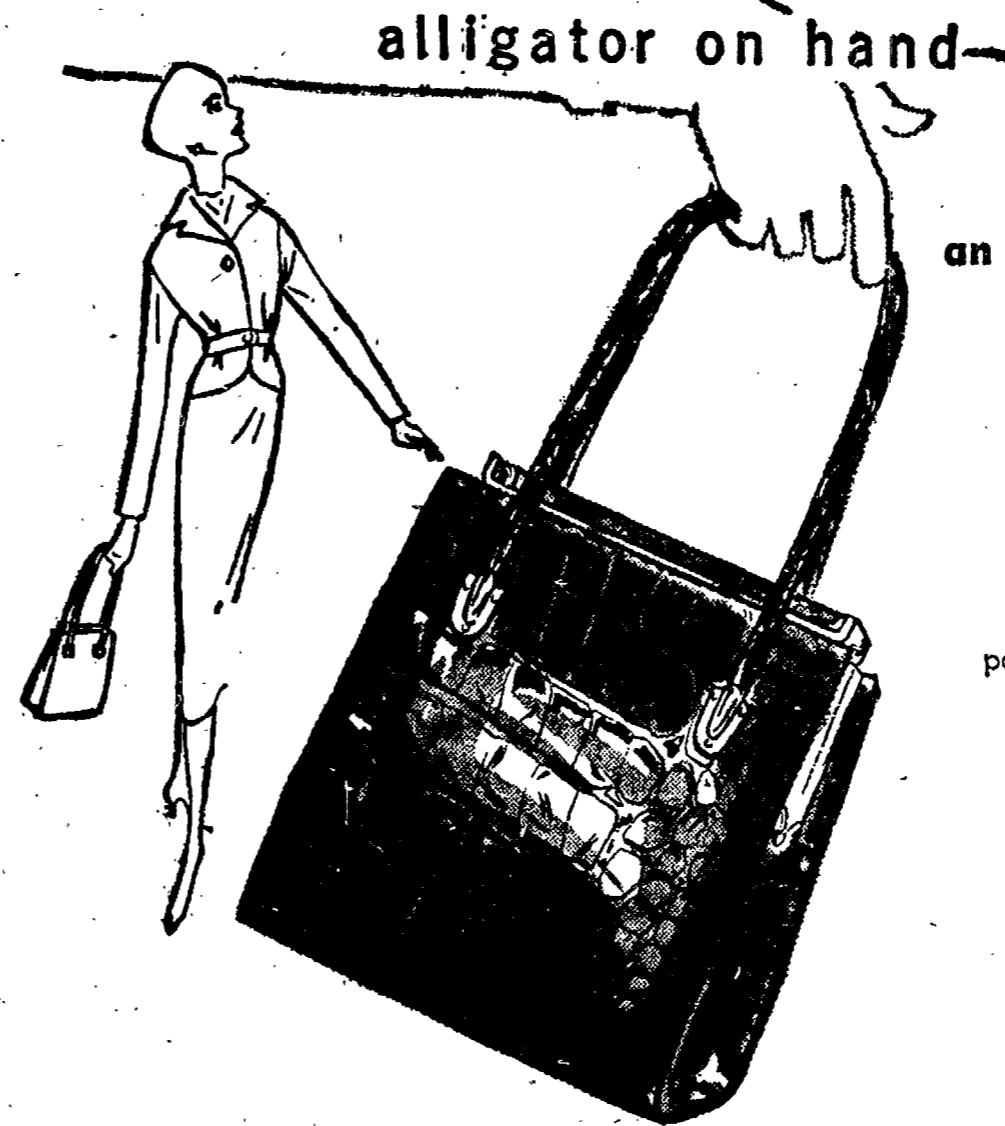

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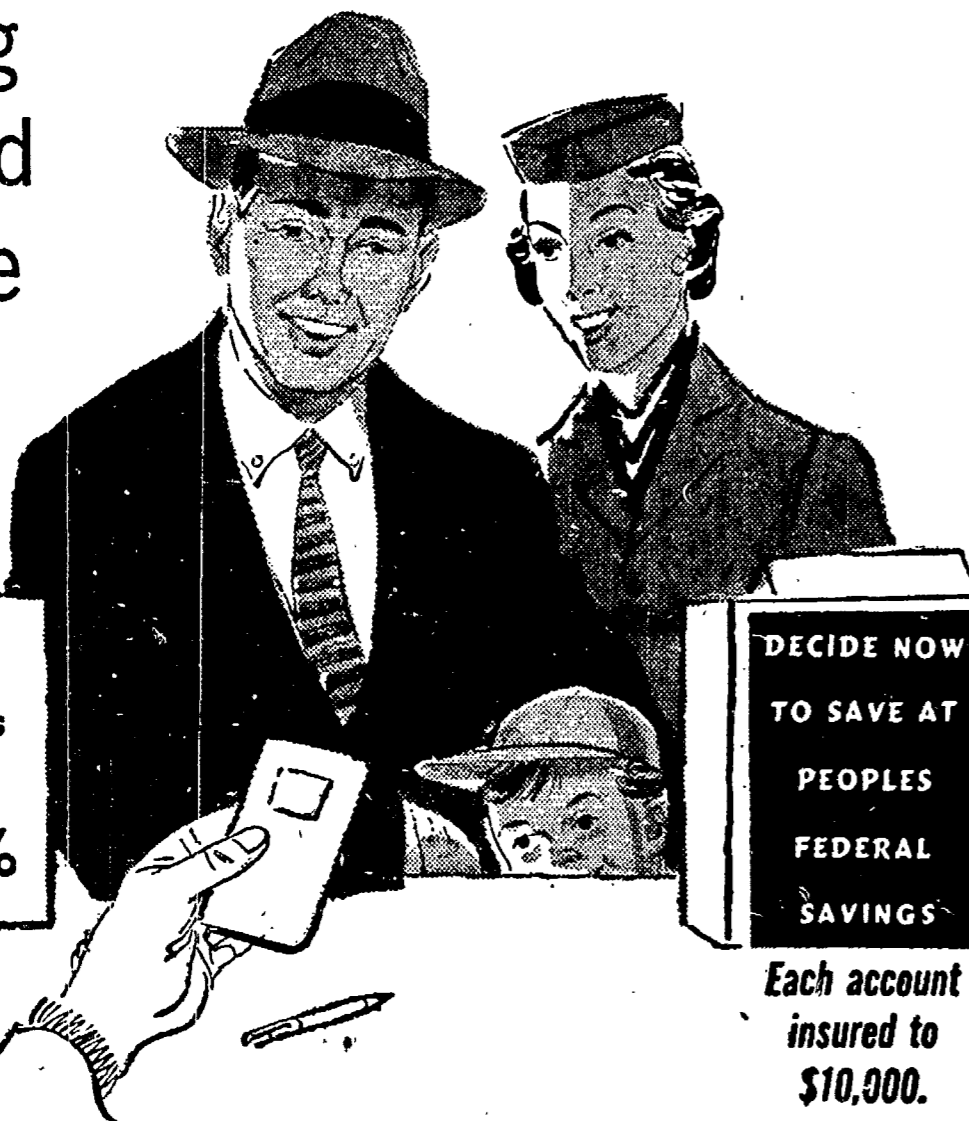
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**UPSIDE-DOWN FALLS**

Water sometimes does fall upward in Honolulu, Hawaii. The phenomenon occurs at Upside-down Falls when a heavy rain falls over the cliffs and water blows upward instead of falling down, as is the case with more reasonable waterfalls.
