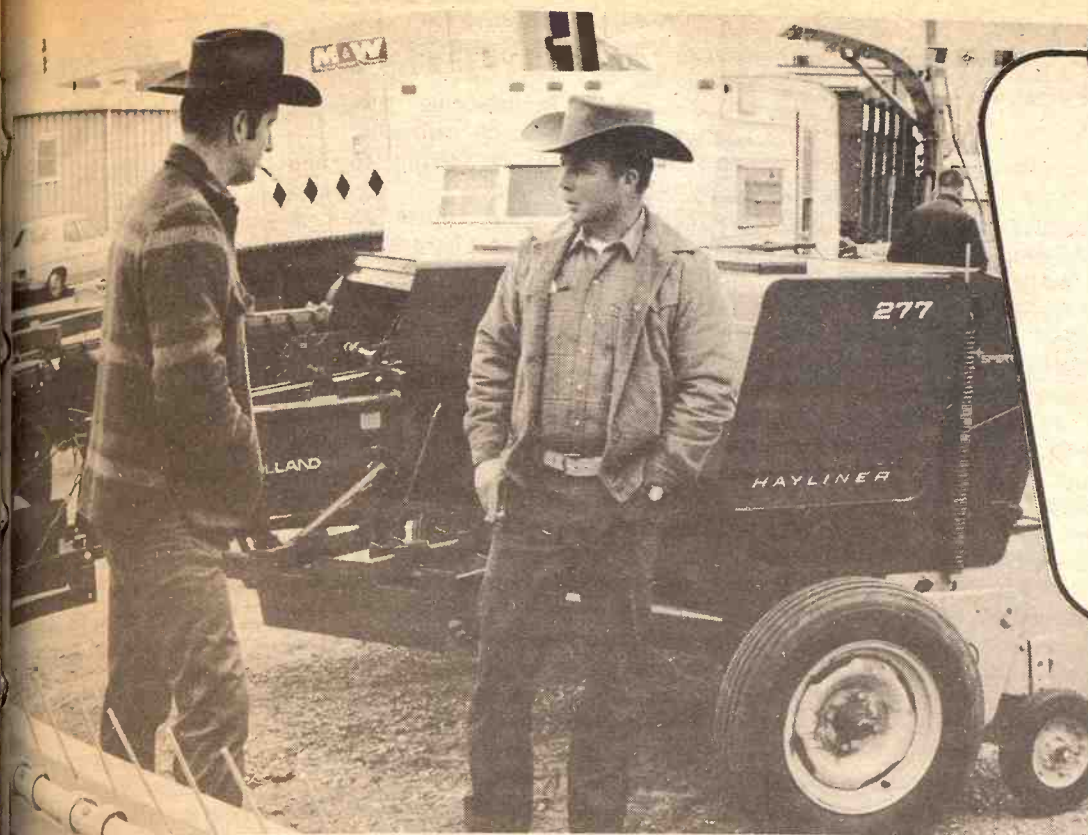

Weather Cuts Crowd At Salina Farm Show

Because of bad weather, Salina's biggest farm show in five years may have had its poorest attendance.

"We take this chance with the weather every year," said co-chairman Wally Nelson "but by having it this time of the year more farmers can attend because they are not busy in the field yet." This is the first year that attendance was cut by snow, which in a five-year average for March isn't at all bad.

The Mid-America Farm Exposition was held in Salina Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday. It was a complete sell-out with 94 exhibitors from all parts of Kansas and 13 other states occupying 123 exhibit spaces in Agriculture Hall, the 4H building, the new Kenwood Hall and the surrounding area in Kenwood Park. Admission to the show was free. Wally Nelson and Kenny Johnson were co-chairmen of the show.

Displays at the show included heavy farm equipment, feeders, trailers, seeds, chemicals, equipment for handling and treating livestock and grain handling machinery. Equipment needed and used in most segments of farming in the Grass & Grain area was represented.

Closing Of Rail Branch Lines Hurting Grain Sales

OMAHA — Two speakers have warned stockholders of Far-Mar-Co. Inc. that best interests of the farmer-owned, eight-state regional grain marketing firm need to be served by a better transportation system.

Eric Rasmussen, chairman of Nebraska State Railway Commission, said that by 1980 in Nebraska and most surrounding states, 50 per cent of the branch-line railroads will have been closed.

He called for new regulations, a

new spirit of cooperation between management and labor, and some helpful attitudes on the part of government and railroad customers to alleviate the transportation problems.

Carl Heaton, director of Commodity Credit Corporation's Kansas City, Mo., office, told the 700 persons attending Far-Mar-Co.'s third annual meeting that sales of grain have been hampered because transportation of grains from storage elevators to market is both uncertain and slow.

Although much CCC grain has been sold in the past marketing year, "I wonder if sales wouldn't have been greater had we had an efficient transportation system," Heaton said.

Movement of grain to make way for the new crop is necessary, but is going slowly, Heaton told his audience. He pointed out that oats and barley have almost glutted country elevators in Minnesota, the Dakotas and Montana.

These two crops have shown increasing surpluses the past two or three years. Country elevators must be at least partially cleared of grain throughout the Midwest to make room for wheat before the harvest begins, he said.

Rasmussen said abandonment of branch lines means country elevators will not have access to railroads, rail cars and transportation to get their crops to terminals.

The lone alternative now to deterioration of railroad transportation is nationalization or subsidization of the railroads in the form of tax relief and other direct methods, he said.

National ownership is common to railroads throughout the world except in the U.S. and Canada, he said.

Nationalizing the 338,000 miles of railroads in the United States would cost \$60 billion in acquisition costs plus rebuilding and refurbishing costs added, he said.

Possible ways to assist railroads included in a recent federal study, Rasmussen said, are:

- Elimination of state and local property taxes on railroads.

- Establishment of a transportation trust fund which could regularly subsidize rail transport.

- Federally guaranteed loans for railroads to continue operations at a high level.

- Federal aid in financing new-equipment purchases by railroads.

- Extensive research leading to more efficient operations.

- Relaxing of rate limits so railroads can increase charges to meet increasing needs.

- Establishment of a transportation commission to oversee rail operations.

Keep Milk Price Support Right Where It Is

Agriculture Secretary Clifford Hardin declined to increase the support price on manufacturing milk for the marketing year beginning April 1, despite pressure from dairymen to do so.

The action leaves the support rate at the current year's level of \$4.66 a hundredweight.

The Secretary noted, however, that President Nixon has directed the Tariff Commission to conduct another investigation of cheese imports similar to the one the commission made last year at the request of the House Ways and Means Committee.

The new investigation, initiated at Hardin's request, also will examine the possibility of keying the 'break' price at which certain import

limitations take hold to the domestic support price for milk.

A year ago, Hardin boosted the milk support price 38 cents a hundredweight, the largest increase ever made at the beginning of a marketing year.

This time, though, the Secretary's decision was that "prices be kept at levels that will permit the overwhelming proportion of milk to be marketed through commercial markets rather than moving into government hands as surplus butter, cheese or nonfat dry milk."

At the same time, Mr. Hardin reduced the government's price for butter two cents to 68.75 cents a pound for U.S. Grade A or higher purchased at New York on or before April 1. The action was in line with the Agriculture Act of 1970, which suspended the mandatory support of butterfat in farm-separated cream.

Record Hog Count - But Buildup Slows

The number of hogs and pigs on Kansas farms on March 1 was record high but showed considerably less increase over last year than on December 1, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock

Reporting Service.

Spring quarter farrowings are expected to be unchanged from a year ago but prospective summer quarter farrowings are moderately below 1970.

Inventories Up

There were 1,996,000 hogs and pigs on Kansas farms March 1, an increase of 14 per cent from last year.

The number was largest for the date in records dating back to 1954.

Included in this total were 279,000 head being kept for breeding purposes and 1,717,000 head for market.

Breeding hogs were down 3 per cent from a year earlier, while market hogs showed an increase of 17 per cent.

The number of market hogs was up in all weight groups with increases from last year ranging from 5 per cent in the under 60 pound group to 32 per cent in the 120-179-pound group.

Pig Crop Up Slightly

Sows farrowing during the December-February quarter totaled 94,000 head, 6 per cent more than a year ago.

There were 688,000 pigs saved during the quarter, up 2 per cent from last year.

Pigs per litter for the quarter averaged 7.32, compared with 7.55 a

year earlier and a range of 6.72 to 7.71 during the previous decade.

Death loss during the winter storms was unusually heavy for the quarter.

Summer Farrowings Lower

During the March-May quarter farmers in Kansas plan to farrow 122,000 sows, unchanged from 1970.

However, during the June-August quarter 84,000 sows are expected to farrow, 6,000 head fewer than during the same quarter in 1970.

10 Corn Belt States

Farmers in the 10 Corn Belt States had more hogs and pigs on hand March 1 than a year earlier but prospective farrowings during the coming quarters are down considerably.

Inventories Up

Hogs and pigs on farms on March 1, 1971 in the 10 Corn Belt States are estimated at 44.0 million head, 9 per cent more than a year earlier.

Hogs kept for breeding are estimated at 6.9 million head, down 7 per cent from last year. Market hogs totaled 37.1 million, up 13 per cent from a year ago.

Pig Crop Up Slightly

December-February 1971 pig crop is estimated at 13.7 million, up 1 per cent from the same period a year earlier.

Sows farrowing in this period totaled 1,983,000, up 5 per cent from December-February 1970.

Farrowings Lower

Hog producers in the 10 States intend to farrow 3,275,000 sows during March-May, 7 per cent less than a year ago.

All 10 States expect to farrow fewer sows except Kansas which expects the same number as last year.

Wisconsin, Nebraska and Iowa expect to farrow 10 per cent fewer sows during this period which is the

sharpest decline reported by any State.

First intentions of farrowings for the June-August quarter show a 15 per cent decline from the comparable period last year.

All 10 States expect declines ranging from 7 to 20 per cent. If these intentions are realized, the number of sows farrowed during this period would be 2,159,000 head.

Start Organizing For Dairy Month

Ralph Bonewitz, Extension dairyman at Kansas State University, is chairman of the June Is Dairy Month program in Kansas this year.

The announcement was made by J.W. Winfrey, manager of the American Dairy Association (ADA) of Kansas in Topeka.

As June Dairy Month chairman, Bonewitz will set the pace in promotions for nutritious dairy products and in helping all Kansans understand the importance and scope of the dairy industry in the state.

Winfrey said Bonewitz's 12 years of intimate contact with the Kansas dairy industry, his knowledge of all phases of the dairy industry, and his popularity as a dairy industry leader in the state were qualifications that led to his selection.

Bonewitz will work closely with the ADA of Kansas in June Is Dairy Month activities.

Aussies Get Bigger Meat Import Share

Nixon administration negotiators have approved a modest increase in Australian meat imports, reflecting that country's successful bootleg operation last year that sent millions of pounds of beef into the United

States through Canada.

The maneuver was indicated in figures showing how Australia and other supplying nations will share in a newly announced meat import program for 1971.

Clifford M. Hardin, agriculture secretary, announced this year's meat imports, mostly beef, will total approximately 1.16 billion pounds, the same as in 1970. But Australia will gain in 1971 meat shipments while neighboring New Zealand and a number of Latin American countries will be held close to last year's levels. Australia will be allowed to ship 560.3 million pounds of meat to the United States. In 1970, including the Canadian bootleg operation, Australia shipped 555.3 million.

Australia and New Zealand normally account for about 70 per cent of the annual quota type meat imports. A system of voluntary restraints has been used since 1968 to keep imports to check. Last year, Australia was limited to 548.8 million pounds. A net of 542.9 million was shipped directly to the United States but an additional 12.4 million came to the U.S. through Canada.

Canada has not been a partner to the restraints on meat imports and was able to ship the Australian meat into the United States freely — in addition to its own — until the border rules were tightened in mid-1970.

New Zealand will be held to a 1971 total of 234.1 million pounds, or 4 million less than last year. Latin American countries will gain very little under the new regulations.

Mexico, the third largest supplier governed by the agreement, will be held to 73 million pounds, compared with 78.4 million in 1970.

Need To Keep Storing Helium, Says Pearson

Citing the step as "a gamble with the future," Sen. James B. Pearson (R-Kan.) has expressed opposition to the recent Interior Department decision to discontinue the Federal Helium Conservation Program.

In a statement before the Senate Interior Committee, Pearson said, "This step may have been taken more in regard to the short-term financial pressures which face the nation than for the long-range needs of the country."

The senator pointed out that the production and stockpiling of helium could go far toward reducing the environmental pollutants which often result from conventional high energy production methods.

He said that helium is the only known element which can make possible a system of electrical production with little resulting pollutants. He also noted that other countries are using helium to cool their atomic reactors, thereby reducing or eliminating the need for water.

But, Pearson pointed out, the "development of these power

systems is almost totally reliant on U.S. helium."

In addition to the question of threat of foreign interests assuming dominance in the manufacture of helium-cooled power generating equipment should the U.S. cease to stockpile the resource and support of its research.

Citing the fact that some six billion cubic feet of helium would be in one year if not extracted from natural gas used for fuel, the senator stated that "the waste can only be considered profligate when we realize that the time is rapidly approaching when it will be in short supply."

MAYETTA INDIANS DON'T LIKE COMMITTEE ACTION

MAYETTA — The tribal committee of the Prairie Band of Potawatomi Indians has stated that a business committee of the tribe has been acting as spokesmen for the entire tribe without authority and that it has refused to call a general council. The committee were set up by a federal act, but tribal action committee said legislation should not have been passed without the approval of the Prairie Band.

Glenn Cunningham Again About To Raise Funds For Youth Ranch

AUGUSTA — Glenn Cunningham, the great miler of the 30s whose youth ranch near here was covered with unfavorable publicity two years ago, is still operating the ranch and again has plans to solicit funds across the state.

Cunningham's hope is that enough financial aid will come in to move the facility to Greenwood county. Cunningham and his wife have for 24 years operated a home for underprivileged children, feeding, clothing and housing them. Cunningham has said he paid expenses out of his own savings and from funds from speaking engagements.

Two years ago there was organized a larger campaign to get funds for Cunningham's ranch. Then the bad publicity started.

It was found that operating a boarding home for youngsters under 16 years of age required a permit

from the Kansas Board of Health. Cunningham didn't have one, and it appeared conditions at the ranch were such that he wasn't likely to get one.

Then it was disclosed that Cunningham and his wife had been taking salaries of around \$33,000 a year to operate the ranch. Figures in fund-raising literature about the number of children who had been helped at the ranch — over 8000 youngsters were claimed — appeared to be exaggerated.

Cunningham was found guilty of operating a boarding home without a license. He was denied a certificate to solicit funds over the state. The solicitation stopped.

Now, there are just older youngsters on the ranch — over 16 years of age. Cunningham says he is not taking a salary. Reporters say the ranch condition is still

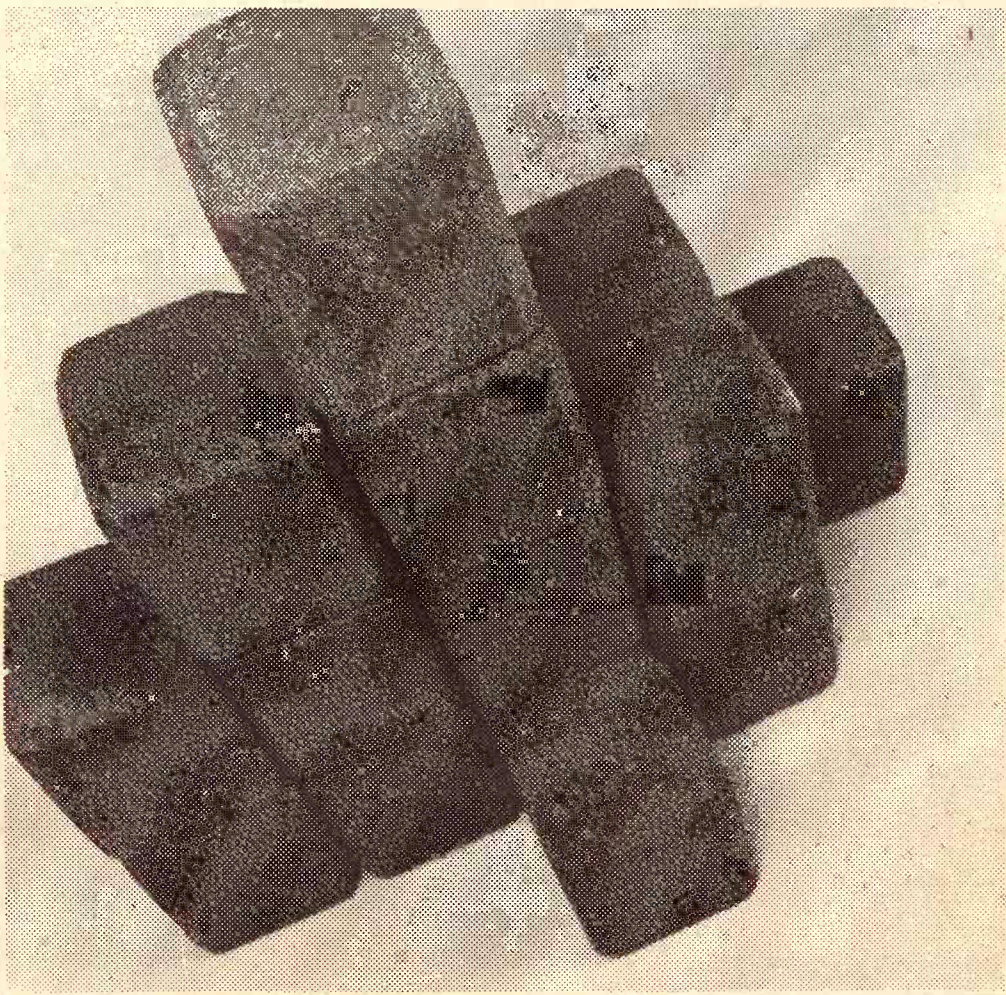
dilapidated, but Cunningham says the facilities are one of the least important things as far as the kids are concerned.

He says he has made a request to the secretary of state to be allowed to solicit funds over the state. He thinks he will get permission.

Despite the bad publicity, Cunningham says he gets no fewer requests for help from juvenile officers and parents with problem children.

There are eight children on the ranch now, and about 20 children have been on and off the ranch since the bad publicity two years ago.

Cunningham has told reporters that he is ready for a statewide campaign to raise funds. If it is successful, he says he intends to move the youth ranch to Greenwood county.

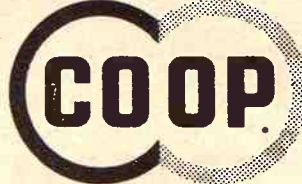

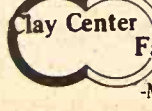

K-State Rodeo Dates April 16-17

Kansas State University's annual rodeo has been set for April 16-17 in Ahearn Fieldhouse, according to Glenn Teagarden, senior in animal science from La Cygne and rodeo chairman.

K-State Chaparajos Club will sponsor the event. Evening performances are set for 8 pm. each day and the afternoon performance on April 17 will start at 2 pm.

"We are anticipating another exciting and entertaining K-State rodeo," stated Teagarden. The rodeo is approved by the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association and contestants from 12 colleges in the Great Plains region will compete.

Cowboy events for the rodeo will be bareback bronc riding, saddle bronc riding, ribbon roping, steer wrestling, calf roping, and bull riding, said Teagarden. Cowgirls will compete in barrel racing, break-away calf roping, and goat tying.

Trophy belt buckles will be awarded top winners in all events with cash awards going to the top four individuals in each event. Trophy saddles will be presented to the All-Round Cowboy and All-Round Cowgirl, stated Teagarden. Team trophies will be awarded to the high scoring cowgirl's team and the high ranking cowboy's team.

Floyd Rumford, rodeo stock contractor from Abbyville, will furnish the livestock for the show. Rodeo clown and bullfighter duties will be handled by Joe Hedrick, vocational agriculture instructor from Horton, stated Teagarden. John McBeth, top professional saddle bronc rider from Burden, and Jon Day, veterinarian from El Dorado, will serve as rodeo judges.

PCA Lending Up 12 Percent

Kansas farmers and ranchers borrowed a record amount of money from their Production Credit Associations (PCA) in 1970, according to Kenneth M. Lyon,

president of Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Wichita.

Loan of volume of the 14 Kansas associations totaled \$311 million, an increase of 12 per cent over 1969. Volume outstanding on Dec. 31 was \$137 million.

The increase in PCA lending volume represents further substitution of capital for labor and the continuing pressure on the profit margins of agriculture, Lyon explained.

"When these factors are added to the rapidly increasing size of the agricultural production unit, the reasons for the larger operating capital requirements become quite evident," he said.

The Wichita bank, through sale of debentures to the investing public, provides loan funds for PCA in Kansas, Oklahoma, Colorado and New Mexico.

In spite of higher money costs, the total loans made in 1970 by the 41 PCAs in the four states exceeded \$1 billion for the first time in history.

Why Not Name Park For Clymer?

Sen. Lester Arvin, R-Rose Hill has asked the Senate Conservation and Natural Resources committee to consider naming the proposed state park in Butler County the Rolla Clymer State Park.

Arvin suggested the name of the El Dorado newspaper publisher as the committee was studying a bill which would designate the park at the proposed El Dorado reservoir as the El Dorado State Park.

"There isn't a man in Kansas who has a more personal love of the

prairie or who has done more to promote Kansas," Arvin said.

The committee took Arvin's suggestion under advisement pending a check with the State Park and Resources Department which had proposed the original name in the bill.

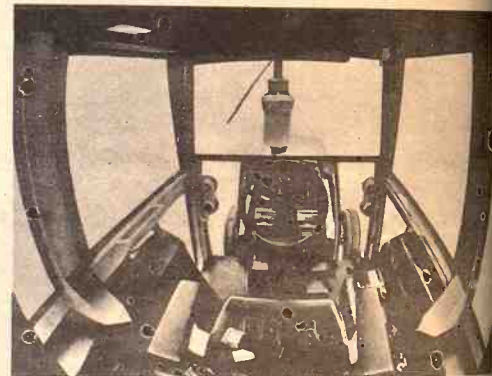

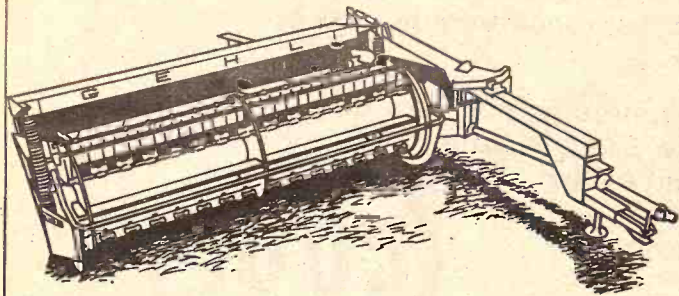

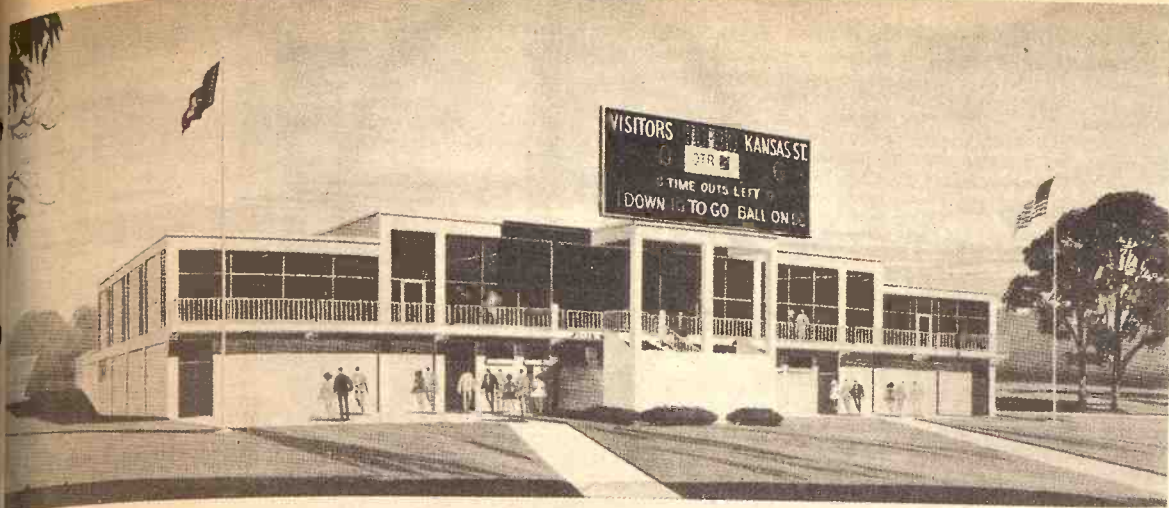

ANOTHER K-STATE FOOTBALL ADDITION

Just three years after finishing a new stadium and a year after carpeting the field with artificial turf, Kansas State University is getting another addition to its football facilities.

This sketch envisions an expanded office and dressing room facility at the north of the stadium, at least part of which should be ready for the 1971 season. Cost of the addition is estimated at \$500,000 to \$600,000. K-State Athletic Department Ernie Barrett said the project has already been funded thru private donations.

Reportedly, the money has been given to the K-State football program as a single donation by one man, who has requested that his name be anonymous. Insiders say, without confirmation, that the man is well known in the G&G area as a feed manufacturer, registered cattle breeder.

Bids for the new facility have already been taken, with a low bid of \$485,743 from R. M. Baril Inc. of Manhattan. The project will include expanded dressing room facilities, weight and agility training rooms for the athletes, a conference room to seat 216 people, reception and lounge areas, film-viewing rooms, and 16 offices.

The new offices will allow Coach Vince Gibson and his staff of assistants to move from space in Ahearn Fieldhouse on the main K-State campus to the stadium, two miles north of the campus center.

Seek To Avoid Coming Limits On Farm Truck Drivers

Federal regulations applicable to the driving of farm trucks are unwarranted on the basis of the safety record of farmer-drivers and would hamper farm production and marketing operations, the board of directors of the American Farm Bureau Federation said in a statement here.

The board recommended substantial modifications in the regulations issued by the U.S. Department of Transportation

which are scheduled to become applicable to all farmers July 1, 1971.

The safety record of farm truck drivers is dramatically better than that of non-farm truck drivers, according to the actuarial data of the National Association of Independent Insurers.

According to these statistics, the amount of bodily injury claims paid per farm truck policy is about one-third of the amount of bodily injury claims paid per policy for all non-fleet trucks.

The modifications in regulations asked by the Federation include an exemption from the regulations for pickup, panel and other small trucks under 10,000 pounds gross weight,

when used for transportation of farm products or supplies and when the driver has met any applicable requirements of state laws and regulations, and an exemption for local handling.

The proposed new regulations would require all farmers, members of farm families and hired employees of farmers to meet the

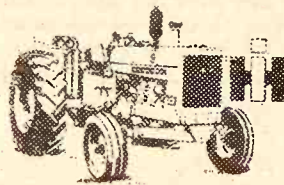
following requirements:

1. Drivers must be at least 21 years of age.
2. Drivers must carry a medical certificate executed within the preceding 24 months evidencing that they meet prescribed physical requirements.
3. Drivers must pass a road test in the use of a truck.
4. Drivers must take a test in the federal safety rules.
5. If the driver is an employee, he must file with the employer on employment, and each 12 months thereafter, a list of accidents, citations and disposition thereof.

6. If the driver is an employer, he must see that employees meet the above requirements.

The employer must maintain a file for each employee, which should contain evidence of compliance with such requirements, and the employer's verification thereof.

These regulations are based on authorizations set forth in the Interstate Commerce Act. The authority to administer certain sections of the Interstate Commerce Act was transferred to the U.S. Department of Transportation when the Department was created a few years ago.

½ cup cocoa
2 cups flour
¾ cup hot coffee
Beat 1 egg white with 1 teaspoon vanilla; add ½ cup sugar and beat

until stiff. Stir in the 2 cups coconut, 1 teaspoon flour and set aside. Dissolve cocoa in hot coffee. Beat 3 egg whites, add ½ cup sugar gradually, beat until stiff; add soda to sour cream. Beat 1¼ cups sugar with the shortening, 3 egg yolks, salt and remaining teaspoon vanilla and half of cocoa mixture. Add 2 cups flour, the sour cream and remaining cocoa mixture. Blend well. Fold in the beaten egg whites. Grease bottom of a 10-inch tube cake pan and turn in a third of the chocolate mixture. Or use glass cake pan. Place half the coconut mixture by spoonful on top. Enjoy Roses More By Keeping Them Insect Free

The "last rose of summer" can sometimes be found quite late in the fall. In fact, there is a constant debate among gardeners as to which are more beautiful, the first roses of spring or the last ones of the season.

As even a first-year gardener knows, there are two major rose-blooming periods during the year — in early spring and in fall. Both seasons provide a splash of garden color that is most welcome.

Some gardeners feel that the flower color of fall roses is much richer. This, they claim, is due to the shorter days and difference in the rays of the sun. But, then other gardeners prefer the longer, more lush stems and possibly larger flowers that are sometimes found in the spring.

But whether your favorite rose blooms are in the early spring or in the fall, it can still be marred by insect pests. Fortunately, gardeners have at their disposal ready-mixed sprays in push-button cans.

Push-button sprays are ideal for spot spraying of individual plants or stems, which may be all that is

necessary in the fall. The best time to use these sprays is in early morning or late afternoon, when the air is calm. Then there is less chance of the spray being blown away and wasted.

One of the more common rose pests is the aphid which can be found on rose flowers stems from early spring right through fall. These pests multiply at a fast rate and seem to pop up out of nowhere. They are most annoying on flowers that are cut and brought into the house for arranging.

When using push-button sprays on plants — all plants, including roses — be sure that the nozzle is kept at least eighteen inches from the foliage. This is to prevent any possible injury to the leaves from the propellant in the can, not from the insecticide.

When both spring and fall roses are beautiful and free from insect blemishes, the debate as to which is preferred will be intensified. Perhaps the answer is that it is a stand-off — both are "most beautiful" and both are excellent additions to the garden picture.

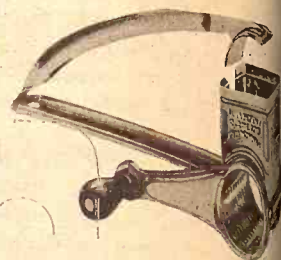

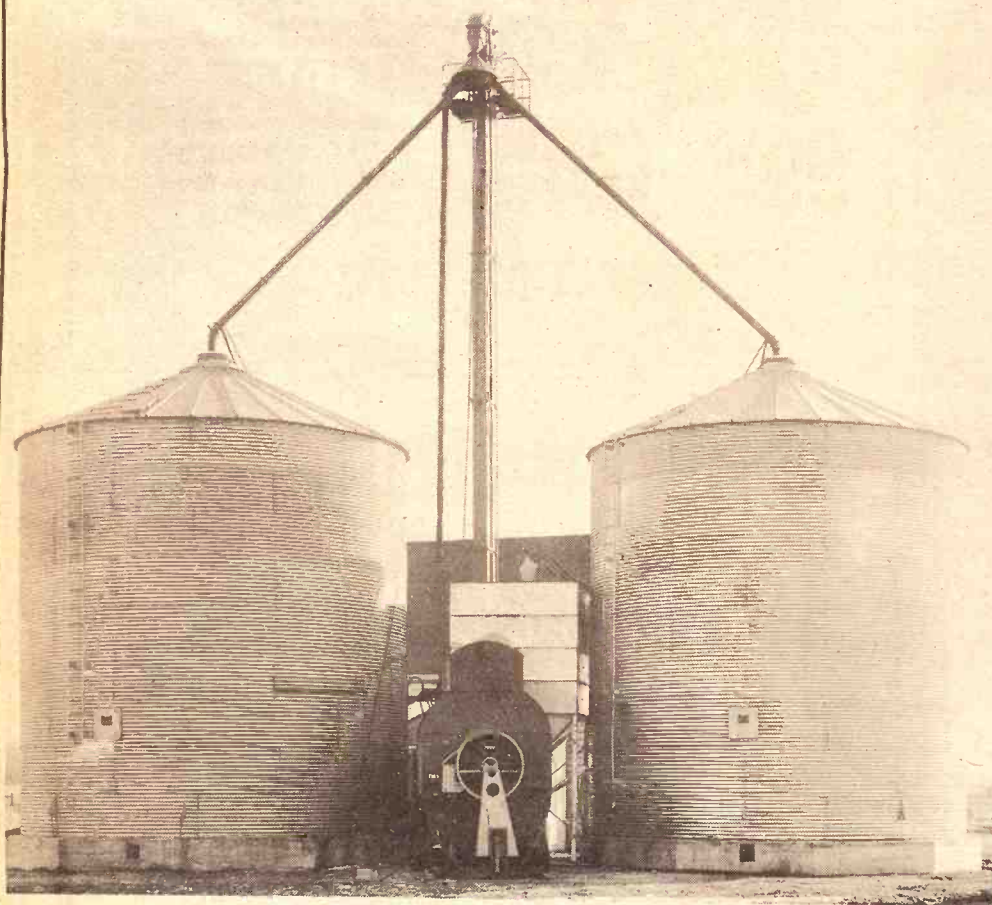

Good Gravy Makes The Difference On Many Dishes

Good gravy makes a world of difference when you are serving chicken on noodles or many delicious American dishes. For roasts or chops or steaks, for stews and pot roasts use same proportion of ingredients. The method varies.

OUR FAMILY GRAVY
1/2 cup liquid (water or stock)
1/2 cup cornstarch
1/2 cup cold water
Salt and pepper to taste
Seasonings to taste
For roast or chicken gravy pour and measure fat, return just enough to cooking pan to provide 1/2 cup liquid for each cup of gravy. Place over medium heat

and stir, scraping pan with edge of spoon to loosen and dissolve brown juices. Mix the necessary amount of cornstarch and cold water together until smooth; gradually stir on hot liquid, stirring constantly, until gravy thickens and comes to a boil. Taste and reason, as needed. Add a few drops of gravy coloring, if desired.

For stew and pot roast gravy, remove meat and vegetables. Estimate or measure the amount of stock for gravy. Skim off excess fat. Add water to make 1 cup liquid for each cup of gravy desired. Place over medium heat. Mix the necessary amount of cornstarch and cold water together until smooth; gradually stir in hot liquid, stirring constantly until gravy thickens and comes to a

boil. Taste and season. Let gravy simmer a few minutes.

Good gravy clues: Use milk for chicken ham or veal gravy. Use part wine for gravy in stews and pot roasts. Experiment with herbs,

spices and seasoning. Use in small amounts. Serve gravy piping hot. Serve in a pitcher to keep hot longer. Gravy thickens on standing. If necessary, stir in a little hot water and reheat.

Bark Covering On Unplanted Areas Can Enhance Garden

Not too many years ago a garden wasn't a garden unless every square inch of ground was planted with turf, shrubs, flower borders or ground covers. Today, unplanted areas in the landscape are most common.

Leaving areas open gives the entire garden a feeling of spaciousness and naturalness. When an unplanted area is left between two shrubs it allows each to have its own individual characteristics and shape.

Unplanted areas can also be a symbol of something entirely different. Oriental gardens, for instance, have much open area which symbolizes water. Plantings and rock outcroppings are set accordingly.

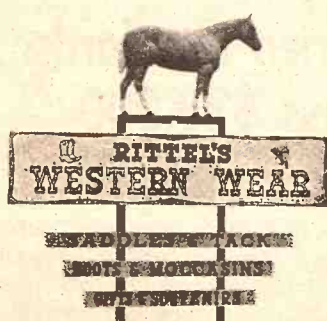
In more contemporary gardens, unplanted areas in large curving sweeps could give the impression of design where plantings would be either difficult to maintain or might cause an obstruction. And, of course, unplanted areas are also used as substitutes for walks, play yards,

even outdoor living areas.

In keeping with the natural setting that these areas are to symbolize, some cover should be applied to the bare soil. Ideally, this cover should be neutral in color, natural in texture and long lasting. A decorative bark covering can be purchased for this purpose.

The depth of the bark covering depends on the use of the area. For general covering a layer of one to two inches is advised. Service yards and walks would call for a two-inch layer; for play areas where there is jumping and falling a four to six-inch layer is recommended.

To aid gardeners, the bark comes

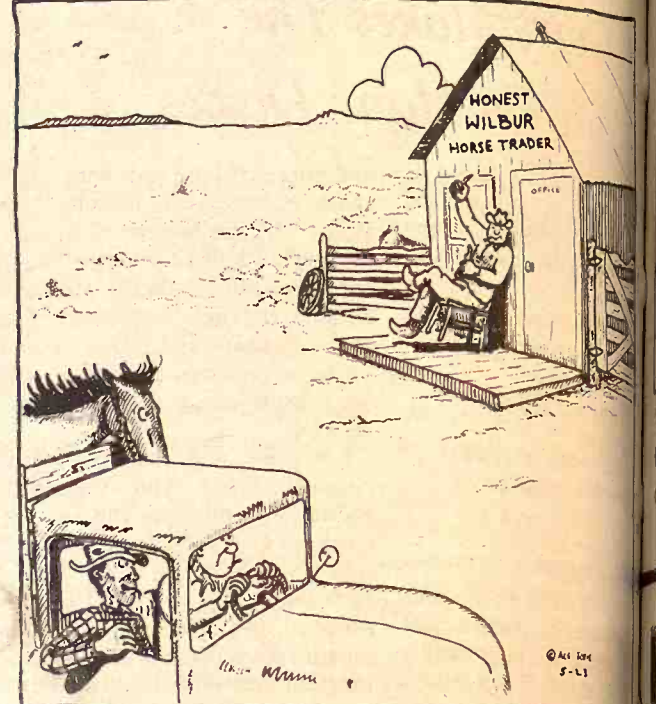

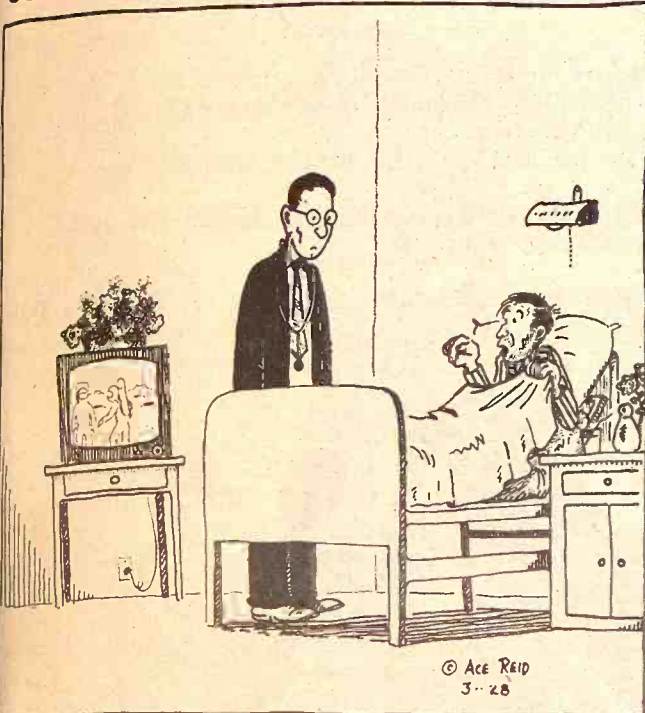

5th Rail Freight Hike In 4 Years

The Interstate Commerce Commission (ICC) has granted the nation's railroads permanent freight rate increases of nearly 12 per cent in the eastern and western portions of the country and six per cent in the south.

Much of the increase given final approval by the ICC was granted last fall in the form of temporary increases. Revenues to be brought in by the permanent boosts falls about \$300 million below the amount sought by the railroads.

The commission order is the fifth to allow increases in freight rates in the past four years.

In addition to general freight rate increases, the order authorizes permanent increases on a number of specific products shipped by rail.

The order terminates requests for more revenues by the railroads dating to last fall. At that time, the railroads asked for an across-the-board hike of 15 per cent.

The ICC at that time granted interim increases of six per cent for southern railroads and eight per cent for railroads in the east and west.

The railroads had estimated that a full 15 per cent increase in rates would yield \$1.5 billion annually.

The ICC order also said that henceforth the railroads must make quarterly reports on how they are correcting reported deficiencies in service.

The first report is due July 1.

In the six-four decision granting the permanent increases, the commission took note of the rail industry's financial difficulties.

Farm Voters Will Register After This Election

Registering to vote will be required of people in rural areas in future elections.

A bill requiring the first state-wide registration in Kansas passed the Senate last week. The House had already approved the bill.

The vote in the Senate was 25 to 14. Chief opposition was from rural senators, who contended permanent registration to vote was an unnecessary requirement on persons in farm areas and small towns where residents are well known.

The present law (which, of course, applies to the April 6 election next week) has required voter registration only in Sedgwick, Wyandotte, Shawnee and Johnson counties, and in first or second class cities.

Sponsors of the bill contended that permanent registration has become necessary because of population mobility and the vote for 18-year olds.

COUNCIL GROVE — K.L. Boyer has been reelected to the board of the Council Grove Production Credit Assn. and been renamed chairman of the board. Davis Jr., and Philip Blender are other members of the board.

Iowa Now Free Of Hog Cholera

An 11-year battle came to a successful conclusion when Iowa was officially declared hog cholera-free March 11.

Iowa had met all except one of the requirements for designation as cholera-free under a federal-state hog cholera eradication program. Iowa had barred vaccination and adopted stringent rules on movement of swine into and within the state. But Iowa also had to be free of cholera for a 12 month period. The last Iowa cholera outbreak occurred March 11, 1970.

The Iowa effort began in April,

1960, when the first exploratory meeting was held. Within a year, the Iowa Hog Cholera Eradication Committee was formed.

In the final stages, indemnities were used to pay for a "depopulation" program. At this stage, if cholera were identified in a swine herd, the herd was literally "wiped out," with healthy hogs sent to slaughter and sick hogs killed on the farm.

Even Cities Short Of Physicians

It's not just the small towns in the G&G area that think they are short of doctors.

The Topeka area is also recruiting physicians. The Topeka Chamber of Commerce says Shawnee county averages 80 doctors per 100,000 population, compared to the state

The report from the Chamber also says that Topeka's doctors are older than average and the shortage could become greater.

MASSEY RECALLS SOME OF ITS LAYOFFS

Massey-Ferguson, which had laid off about 2100 workers in its Canadian plants in the past two months, has started to recall workers after what it had termed "usual seasonal layoffs." About two-thirds of the workers have been called back to work, but Massey officials say about 775 of the workers won't be recalled immediately.

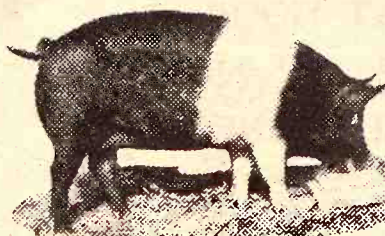

MILK HIKE DIDN'T AFFECT G&G AREA

A few weeks ago, G&G had a story about a raise in milk for the dairy farmer. Enclosed is a letter from Bill Rankin, manager of Grade A operations of the Kansas City division of Mid-America Dairymen, Inc., which should add some facts to the story.

"The recent publicity about the announcement of a milk price increase effective March 1, 1971, has been most unfortunate because the increase will not apply on most of the Kansas City milk."

"The announcement was made from the Springfield office in an effort to solidify price increases in markets such as St. Louis and Springfield where it appeared possible to get and hold the higher price."

"It apparently was desirable from that standpoint to have a regional announcement, which would include the Kansas City Market even though we knew and had advised our customers that the price would not go up except in outlying areas."

"The higher price will apply on milk sold to Kansas City handlers if the milk is then sold in processed form into the areas south of the Kansas City Market such as Springfield, Southern Kansas or Wichita."

"The reason we cannot increase our price at this time is because of the market situation in Iowa. If higher prices can be put into effect there, we could then increase the Kansas City price."

"Much effort has been put forth in the Iowa area but it does not offer much hope for improvement in the immediate future."

Crop Failure Built Into Seeds Of Green Revolution?

Could the new "miracle" grains become the seeds of disaster?

U.S. scientists fear that the cross-breeding of grains may have made crops highly vulnerable to diseases that could wipe out an entire food crop.

To try to avert this, the National Research Council will make the first organized study of the danger.

The study is believed to be particularly urgent in view of the leaf blight fungus that wiped out millions of bushels of the nation's corn crop last year. And the blight is expected to return this year. Corn is the country's most important livestock and poultry feed grain.

This danger to the nation's food crops is the result of the "green revolution" that began several years ago. Scientists found ways of cross-breeding grains to produce spectacular crop yields. Since then, these hybrid varieties of such crops as wheat and rice have spread around the world.

"It is likely," says the council, which is an arm of the National Academy of Sciences, "that a number of major food crops rest on a dangerously narrow genetic base."

In principle it's like the royal houses of Europe. "They've become weaker through inbreeding," says James G. Horsfall, director of the Connecticut Agricultural Experiment Station in New Haven, who will head the study.

Transmits Hereditary Character
Scientists worry that through the

careful selection of plant genes they may have succeeded in feeding people, but at the same time they may have unwittingly opened the door to virulent diseases that can attack these genes. A gene is the element in a cell's nucleus that transmits hereditary character.

In the case of the leaf blight it wasn't the genes that were attacked, but the cytoplasm that surrounds the nucleus of the cell, or kernel.

Superior strains of hybrid seed corn that are used across the U.S. were developed genetically from male sterile parents and, thus, carry the so-called Texas male-sterile cytoplasm. And it was this cytoplasm that the leaf blight first somehow adapted to and then attacked.

The leaf blight hasn't managed to find a way of attacking corn carrying normal cytoplasm. But this cytoplasm has been rejected in the past by seed companies because it isn't adaptable to the wide variety of corn used across the country. Even so, growers have been scrambling to obtain normal cytoplasm seeds for this year's crop.

"We don't know why hybrid crops become vulnerable and that's what bugs us," says Horsfall.

An Early Example

One of the earliest examples of disease attacking a hybrid crop came a few years ago when the U.S. oat crop was decimated. The oats had been developed using the gene from the Victoria variety of oats. This gene was immune to crown rust, a widespread fungal disease. But it wasn't immune to another, far more destructive disease.

Much of the world's wheat crop at present has been developed using the Norin gene. Horsfall says he isn't implying that this variety "is in danger or anything like that." But he believes that the leaf blight has been a warning that all new varieties may be vulnerable.

The National Research Council study will initially focus on the corn crisis with the aim of offering suggestions that might help growers this year. Other major crops such as sorghum, wheat and rice also will be studied.

KU PUTS DATE ON SPRING ROTC REVIEW

The review of ROTC programs at the University of Kansas, cancelled for the past two springs, has been scheduled for April 29. Demonstrators occupied the review field in 1969, and threats of trouble on

campus prompted KU Chancellor Laurence Chalmers Jr. to cancel the event in 1970. Chalmers says a majority of students now favor holding the 1971 review.

STATE OF KANSAS Notice of Submission of Proposed Constitutional Amendment at April 6, 1971 General Election

Senate Concurrent Resolution 12, adopted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas on February 8, 1971, reads as follows:

"Section 1. A special election is hereby called, to be held on April 6, 1971, pursuant to section 1 of article 14 of the constitution of the state of Kansas, for the purpose of submitting to the electors the proposition to amend the constitution contained in Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 11."

Pursuant to Section 1 of Article 14 of the Constitution of the State of Kansas and in compliance with Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 11 adopted by the Legislature on February 8, 1971, a proposition to amend the Kansas Constitution reads as follows:

"Section 1, article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Kansas is amended to read as follows:

"Section 1. Every citizen of the United States who has attained the age of eighteen years and who shall have resided in Kansas six months next preceding any election and in the precinct in which he or she seeks to vote at least thirty days next preceding such election shall be deemed a qualified elector. A citizen of the United States who has attained the age of eighteen years and who shall have resided in Kansas in the precinct in which he or she seeks to vote at least thirty days next preceding any general election, may vote for presidential electors and candidates for the offices of president and vice-president of the United States. A citizen of the United States, who is otherwise qualified to vote in Kansas for presidential electors and candidates for the offices of president and vice-president of the United States may vote for such officers either in person or by absentee ballot notwithstanding the fact that such person may have become a nonresident of this state if his or her removal from this state occurs during the thirty days next preceding such election. A person who is otherwise a qualified elector may vote in the precinct of his former residence either in person or by absentee ballot notwithstanding the fact that such person may have become a nonresident of such precinct during the thirty days next preceding such election if his new residence is in another precinct in the state of Kansas."

Sec. 2. The title appearing on the ballot by which this amendment is submitted to the electors of this state shall be the following:

"Shall the constitution be amended to permit persons eighteen (18) years of age and upwards to vote in all elections, to reduce the residency requirement from forty-five to thirty days for electors to vote only for presidential electors and candidates for the offices of president and vice-president of the United States, to permit electors who have moved from the state during the thirty days next preceding the election to vote only for presidential electors and candidates for the offices of president and vice-president of the United States, and to permit persons who move within the state within thirty (30) days of an election to vote?"

I further certify the foregoing Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 11 is a true copy of the proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of Kansas contained in Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 11 adopted by the 1971 Session of the Kansas Legislature, the original of which is now on file and a matter of record in my office.

A spokesman for the company said, however, that the doctors were referring to a previous formulation that the Oakland, Calif.-based company doesn't make any longer.

The spokesman said Clorox stopped selling Liquid Plumb with a strength of 26 per cent sodium hydroxide last November and changed to a formula with 6 per cent potassium hydroxide. Both sodium and Potassium hydroxide are referred to as liquid lye and are used in many liquid drain cleaners.

The four authors of the article in the medical journal are physicians at the University of Kansas Medical Center.

They said they have treated several children who had swallowed Liquid Plumb and also have tested the product on animals. The physicians reported the drain

cleaner caused severe injury to the esophagus of the children even when only a small amount was swallowed and that the damage began immediately upon swallowing. The rapid damage, they said, meant that antidotes did little good.

Usually, they said, the liquid drain cleaner caused the esophagus to close, requiring surgical removal.

They cited reports that accidental ingestion of Liquid Plumb had increased markedly over the past three years, accounting for 17 per cent of all reported lye ingestions by young children.

"The excessive hazard" represented by Liquid Plumb, the doctors asserted, called for removing the product from markets. However, the doctors listed the caustic agent in Liquid Plumb as 30.5 per cent sodium hydroxide, making

it clear they were referring to the old formulation.

The Clorox spokesman said the company changed the formulation of Liquid Plumb shortly before the Food and Drug Administration proposed last Nov. 18 that all drain cleaners with sodium or potassium hydroxide concentrations greater than 10 per cent be prohibited unless they were packaged in child-resistant containers.

Although he said it was possible the old-formulation product still could be purchased in some small-town stores, the Clorox spokesman said the company had run reduced-price promotions on the stronger Liquid Plumb last November and December to get it off store shelves. He said the company hadn't recalled any of the old product.

The spokesman said Liquid Plumb was the largest selling liquid drain opener. The new formulation has the words "New Faster Action Formula" on the label, he added.

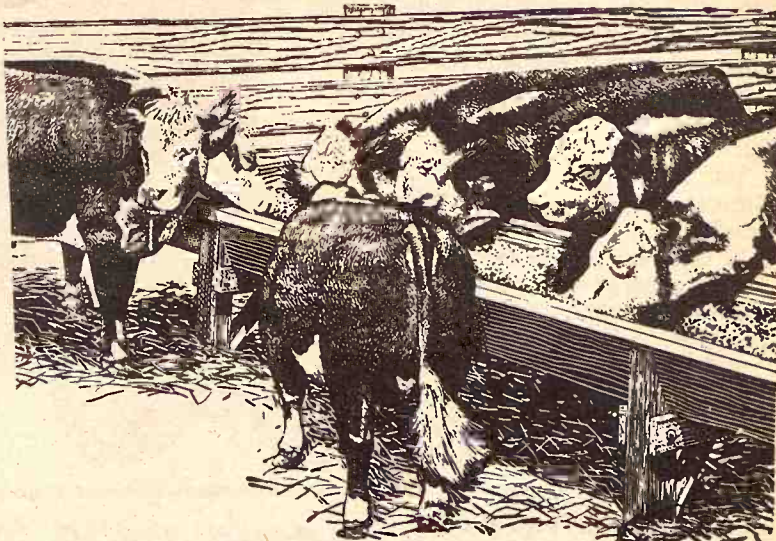

Amazing Turns In Dairy Output

Kansas dairymen are doing a "real good job" if increased milk production per cow is an indication.

In 1961, an average cow in Kansas produced 7,000 pounds of milk each year.

By the 1971 average Kansas cow is producing 8,400 pounds of milk, a gain of 1,400 pounds, according to Ralph Bonewitz, KSU dairy specialist.

Kansas cows under the Dairy Herd Improvement Program averaged 12,700 pounds during lactation.

The 4,300 pounds stepped up production under DHI should make Kansas dairymen consider the program, he said.

He released figures to show that Kansas dairymen are doing a top job of producing as much milk as formerly with fewer cows.

In 1961, there were 3,300 Grade A dairy herds in Kansas with 6,000 manufacturers. This compares with 2,000 Grade A dairy herds at present with 3,300 manufacturers, down a third to a half.

The number of dairy cows in Kansas has been reduced drastically.

In 1943, there were 740,000 dairy cows compared with an estimated 197,000 in 1971, according to Bonewitz.

Milk production is about the same with a fourth of the cows the state had in 1943 with the trend to fewer and larger herds, Bonewitz said.

PLANT TO CAPTURE ANHYDROUS BYPRODUCT

A liquid carbon dioxide recovery plant will be built at Dodge City alongside a Farmland Industries anhydrous ammonia plant. The plant, built by Liquid Carbonics Inc. of Chicago, will produce 225 tons of liquid carbon dioxide recovered from gas from the Farmland plant. The firm has a similar plant next to a Farmland anhydrous plant at Fort Dodge, Iowa. Liquid carbon dioxide is used to make carbonated beverages and dry ice and in processing poultry and meat.

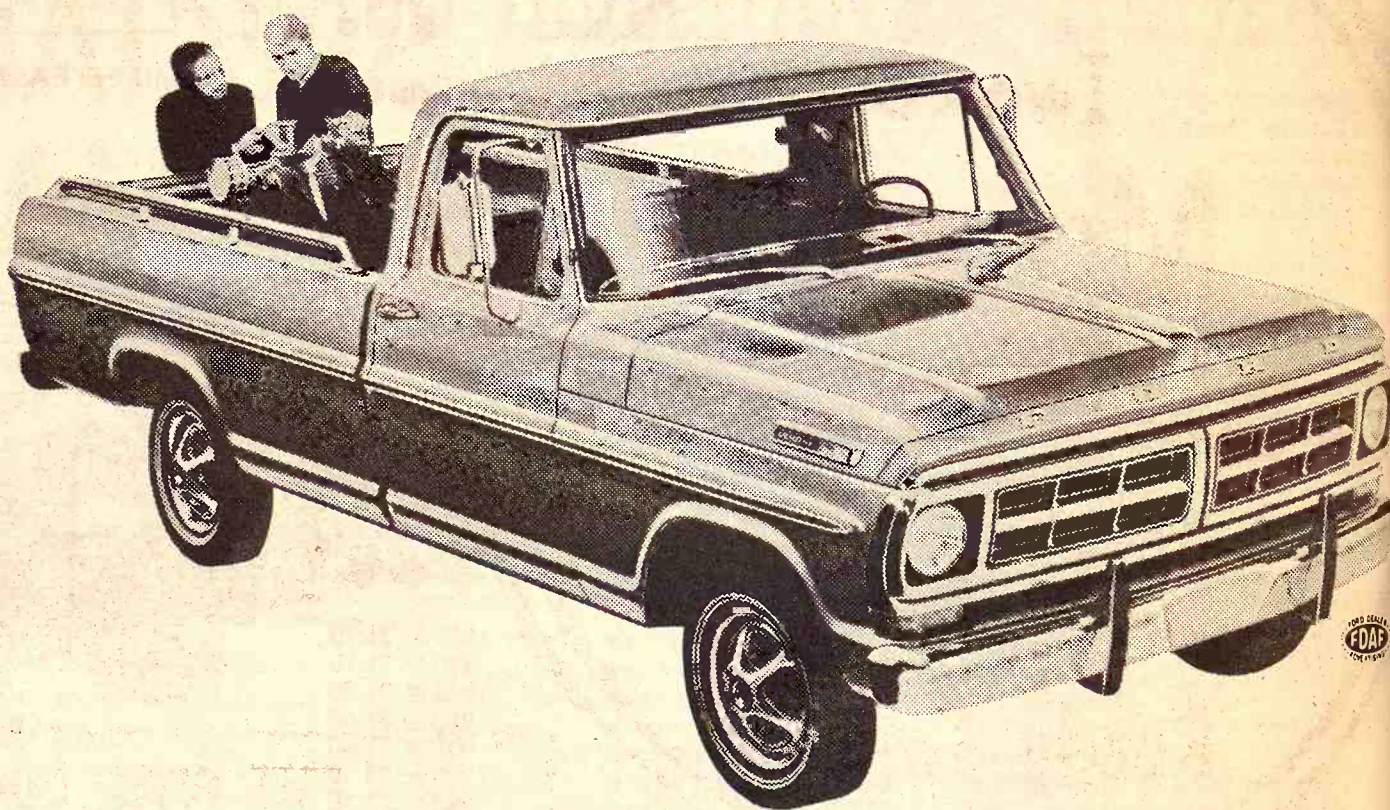

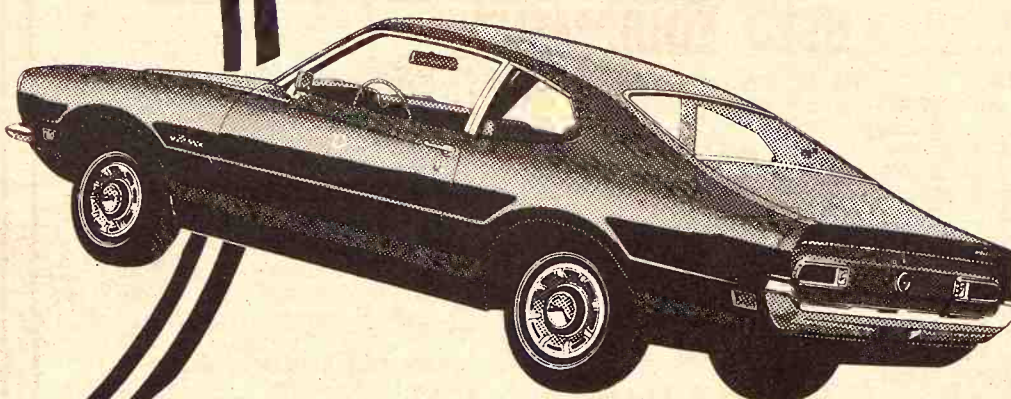

Nebraska Included In Federal Fire On Welfare Pay

Unless last minute accommodations are reached, two states will lose 54 million dollars a year in federal welfare aid this week. Welfare aid programs in four other states are in various stages of jeopardy.

The cutoff would culminate a 2-year administration drive to bring states into compliance with the complicated maze of federal welfare regulations.

Facing the fire next week are Indiana, with 39 million dollars at stake, and Nebraska, with 15 million. They are scrambling to correct what the government ruled in January were violations in their welfare systems.

The government's main complaint is their failure to increase maximum, theoretical payments to families with dependent children to reflect inflationary price changes. Of the 42 states that have met this

requirement of a 1967 law, increased payments and five other states have received a proportionally lowered welfare scale. The four states in various stages of the cut-off process, ranging from hearing to appeal in federal court, are California, Missouri, Connecticut and Arizona.

Farm Bureau Against Bonds

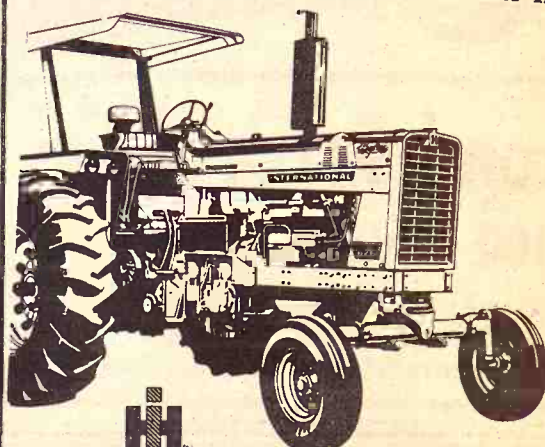
Financing Kansas highway construction through the sale of bonds has met the opposition of the Kansas Farm Bureau.

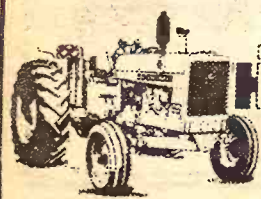

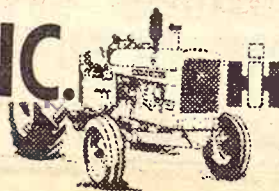

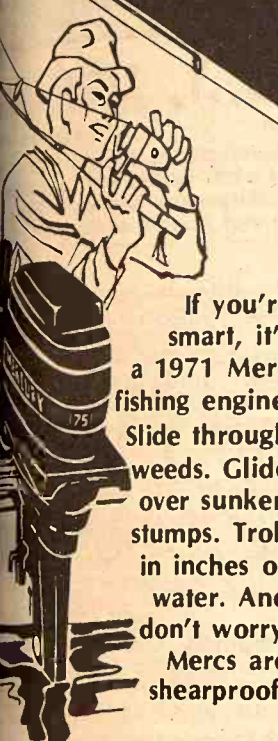

Soybean Acres Won't Meet Projected Demand?

Reaction to the USDA's March 16 report of prospective plantings indicates many observers and officials are becoming concerned over

the possibility of a shortage of soybeans. Planting intentions revealed by the report show prospective plantings of 71,480,000 acres of corn and 46,493,000 acres of soybeans.

Members of the Chicago Board of Trade expressed a composite view that the figure for corn was roughly 1 million acres more than generally looked for and the figure for soybeans was roughly 1 million less

acres than looked for by many in the trade.

Assistant Secretary of Agriculture Clarence B. Palmy following the announcement said he was pleased with the results which did not indicate any upset or surprise.

He did say, however, the outlook for soybean usage and export seems so good that he hopes for a record yield and he hopes also that an increase in acreage may occur if farmers decide to abandon other crops in favor of soybeans either in the set-aside or in making changes in their conserving bases.

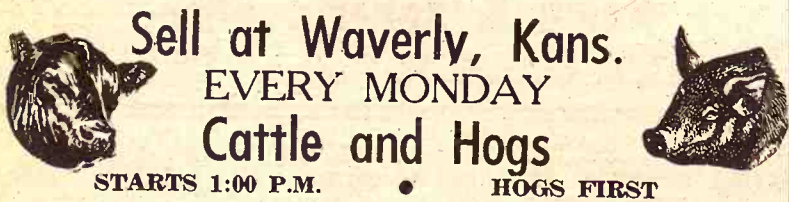
Projecting a yield for the 1971 soybean crop at 26.8 bushels per acre—the same as the 1970 average yield—gives a total production of 1,222,000,000 bushels. Many industry and USDA specialists have predicted a need for at least 49 million acres of soybeans with some industry experts seeing a need for up to 52 million acres to meet the growing world demand.

Questions, Wisdom of New School Buildings

Attention: Taxpayers of Unified School District No. 321. We are again being confronted with a school bond election for the third time to be held on April 6.

Let's think very seriously about the tax burden that will be placed upon us to have our taxes increased by 35 per cent to be paid over a long period of time. We, the taxpayers of Unified School District No. 321 are now paying almost 70 per cent of our taxes for our schools.

I question the wisdom of any new buildings when the Unified School

District No. 321 in its official records indicate the student enrollment reaches its peak in 1971 and will decline by 126 students in the next four years. Do you realize that a 2½ million dollar bond issue will cost the taxpayers in excess of 5 million dollars by the time the bond issue is paid? This is in addition to the 1 million dollars per year already provided for Unified School District No. 321. Since this is an agricultural community the entire amount will come from the land.

Requests of the educators for buildings, facilities, equipment, and what have you should be carefully weighed in relation to quality education. We must return to the practice of economy. The pendulum has been swinging too long too far in the direction of spending unwisely. What we can do in Unified USD 321 is to take advantage of what we have. It is not as though we have no school buildings. Let's repair or remodel what we have.

Do you wish to mortgage your future for years to come? There is a limit to what we are able to pay in taxes. Persons who are tenants on farms or renting homes will have their rents increased by the owners of these properties in order to meet the raise in taxes.

The public should be aware of the fact that farmers received more 20 years ago for farm products than they receive now. The farmers are already overburdened by heavy tax placed upon them. Farmers, wage earners and retired persons are tired of rising taxes. It's high time we call a halt to the unnecessary spending. Building costs are higher now than anytime in history. Now is a very poor time to vote a huge bond issue as advocated by USD 321. Please vote against this proposal on April 6.

End To Yearly Auto Design Changes?

Ford Motor Corp. has made it official.

The annual styling change on new cars, which has been standard operating procedure for nearly half a century, has been downgraded. It isn't dead, but it is being deemphasized because car buyers don't care as much any more, and Detroit can't afford it anyhow.

In the annual report, Henry Ford II, chairman, and Lee A. Iacocca,

president, said Ford has moved "to deemphasize annual design changes" as one of its major new ways of cutting costs.

"Superior styling will continue to be a major factor in car sales, but our customers are increasingly interested in reliability, safety, utility and economy more than in styling novelty," they explained. "In future years, we plan to change the design of our North American

products less frequently and less extensively."

Ford is the first of the "Big Three" auto makers to spell out the news. But in effect, Ford is just making official what has been an industry trend for several years. The auto industry has been quietly downgrading major annual changes as costs of tooling have soared and public interest in car design has started to flag.

Reporters prowling around Detroit's proving grounds in the hope of snapping pictures of new models noticed it first. In comparing pictures of the new models with the previous year, they were hard pressed to point out the differences. One symptom of the change was that stories with sketches of the new models started to disappear. Scalind Down to "Face-Lifts"

The auto makers have continued to make major changes on basic body types, such as full-sized cars, intermediates and sporty cars, generally in three-year cycles. But increasingly the changes have been minor; in many instances, they have been scaled down to "face-lifts," with the most of the changes restricted to grille work and other accessories.

But in marketing new models, Detroit's stress on newness never changed. Continuing to operate on the theory that styling sells, the marketing men, with straight faces, ballyhoo minor changes with the same gusto shown toward radical styling changes to big fins back in the Fifties.

And General Motors Corp.'s cautiously worded guarantee a few months ago that its Vega minicar wouldn't be changed for at least four years was heralded as a revolutionary switch, but an isolated exception to the continuing stress on styling and design.

Now Ford has blown the whistle on all of that. How dramatic its deemphasis will be is difficult to predict. Ford didn't give any clues in its annual report. Whether the other auto makers, which have dropped hints that styling is less important in their planning, will adopt a similar posture is still unanswered.

There is speculation in some quarters of Detroit that the cycles on major changes in design will be stretched out. But sources stress that the deemphasis, and any stretching out, would be gradual and "evolutionary" rather than a radical switch into "frozen" designs

American Hereford Assn. Broadens AI Rules

The American Hereford Assn. has announced its official requirements for the qualification of non-owned sires in artificial insemination programs within registered Hereford herds.

The announcement, which com-

pletes the regulations for the non-owner AI program, comes 10 months after the original announcement which modified generally broadened association's AI rules.

The requirements, which now been added after several months of study, will not go into effect until June 1, 1973. They announced more than two years advance of the effective date that breeders may now start qualifying tests.

Resistance To Closing Santa Fe Flint Hills Branch

The Kansas Corporation Commission (KCC) says it is opposing plans to abandon an 82-mile Santa Fe railway branch line between Moline and Emporia.

Dale E. Saffels of Garden City, KCC chairman, said a protest has been filed with the Interstate Commerce Commission (ICC).

Santa Fe has an application for abandonment pending before the ICC.

The branch line in question includes runs through the county seat towns of Howard and Eureka.

Saffels said the KCC's position is that to grant the railway's request would be detrimental to the general public of the state and especially that portion of the public situated adjacent to the line.

He said the KCC has asked the ICC to conduct a hearing in the vicinity of the proposed abandonment, preferably in Eureka. The commission also asked that it be allowed to produce witnesses, offer testimony and cross-examine the applicant's witnesses.

Counties in the nine districts were
grouped together on the basis of
similarity in such factors as tem-
perature extremes, frost-free
periods, precipitation, length of
normal growing season, major
crops, texture of the soil and other
topographic factors.

The order to each county directs
commissioners there to adjust the
assessed valuation of 11 subclasses
of agricultural property either up or
down, depending on whether the
particular county is above or below
a median for the district.

McSpaden and Malone said the
department used the valuations
certified on each of the 11 classes of
land by each county assessment
official in the district as the basis for
computing what the median should
be.

He said inordinately high or low
assessed values for the 11 subclasses
of agricultural land were tossed out
in computing a median for each
subclass in each district.

McSpaden said the assessed
valuations placed on the subclasses
of agricultural land represented the
collective thinking of local
assessment officials.

Under the present system, the
county commissioners sitting as a
board of equalization sets the
assessed valuation on subclasses of
agricultural land.

Under the present system, two
identical pieces of bottom land
across a road from each other in
different counties could have dif-
ferent values.

It works inequities in those
situations where taxing sub-
divisions, particularly school

districts, include the territory of
more than one county and produces
a situation in which the resident of
one county may be paying more in
taxes on the same subclass of
agricultural land to support a
unified school district than his
neighbor across the road in another
county.

Malone said the state-wide
equalization was mandated by the
State Supreme Court last year in
deciding a lawsuit. The court said
the ultimate supervisory respon-
sibility for insuring uniform and
equal assessment of property bet-
ween counties of the state rests with

Sees Corn Shortage At End

The worst of the corn shortage may be ending. This possibility is indicated by the recent USDA report of Prospective Plantings. It may be the main reason for the decline of corn prices from their early winter high.

where the blight did little damage in 1970.

Corn Crop May Exceed Needs
If the blight damage is about the same as last year and if the weather is near normal, we expect the 1971 corn crop to total about 4,500 million bushels (up from 4,110 million last fall). In addition at least 300 million bushels could be drawn from carryover stocks (which are expected to total 650 to 700 million bushels). Thus, the available supply of corn for the 1971-72 marketing year could be more than 4,800 million bushels — about 300 million bushels more than is being used and exported in the current marketing year.

A production of 4,500 million bushels would require an average of about 74 bushels per acre — 2 bushels more than last year. The weather should be more favorable for corn than in 1970, when the eastern Corn Belt got too much rain in the spring and the western areas too little during the summer.

Even if the blight causes little damage this year, other factors indicate that yields will be below the average of 80 bushels per acre for the three years before the blight. Much of the available seed is not up to the usual standards, some farmers will reduce planting rates, and some will apply less fertilizer because of the danger of loss to the blight.

More Sorghum To Be Planted
According to the USDA report, farmers expect to plant 20.2 million acres of sorghum — 17 per cent more than last year; 10.9 million acres of barley — 4 per cent more; and 23.2 million acres of oats — 5 per cent less than in 1970. With average yields, the production of these feed grains should total about 47 million tons — up 7 per cent from last year. Another 5 million tons can be drawn from carryover stocks (which are expected to total about 15 million tons). Hence, the usable supply of

sorghum grain, barley, and oats may total about 52 million tons. About 49 million tons are being used this year.

Although the danger of a severe feed shortage may end this summer, there will be great uncertainty about corn yields, at least until August. Therefore, prices will fluctuate much more than usual during the spring and summer.

No Surplus Of Soybeans In Sight
The USDA report revealed that farmers expected to plant 46.5 million acres of soybeans — only 7.3 per cent more than last year. If the yield per acre is 27 bushels, the same as the average for the past three years, the indicated planting would produce about 1,250 million bushels. Another 25 million bushels probably will be drawn from carryover stocks on September 1 (which are expected to total only 60 to 80 million bushels). Thus, the prospective supply of soybeans available for use and export in the next marketing year may be around 1,275 million bushels. This would be a little less than the amount being utilized this year, which is expected to total about 1,300 million bushels.

SST Demise Will Take About 600 Wichita Jobs

Probably about 600 men at the Boeing plant at Wichita will be laid off because the supersonic transport program will no longer get federal support.

Cancellation of the development program for the SST by the Defense Department will have a greater

effect on the Boeing plant at Seattle. But the Wichita plant had been employing about 600 workers in making two forward fuselage sections for the SST.

agricultural trade protection both
at home and abroad, if American
farmers are to sustain their foreign
markets.

Still Bullish Over Farm Exports

This nation's farm exports will
reach a record \$7.5 billion in the year
ending June 30, Clarence D.
Palmby, assistant secretary of
agriculture, has forecast.

More than 50 per cent of the
soybeans produced in the country,
half of the wheat crop, two-thirds of
the rice and a third of the cotton will
be exported Palmby said.

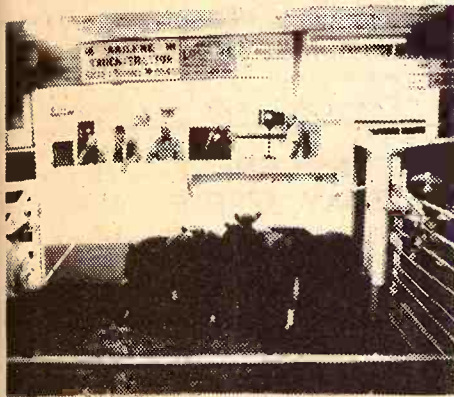
