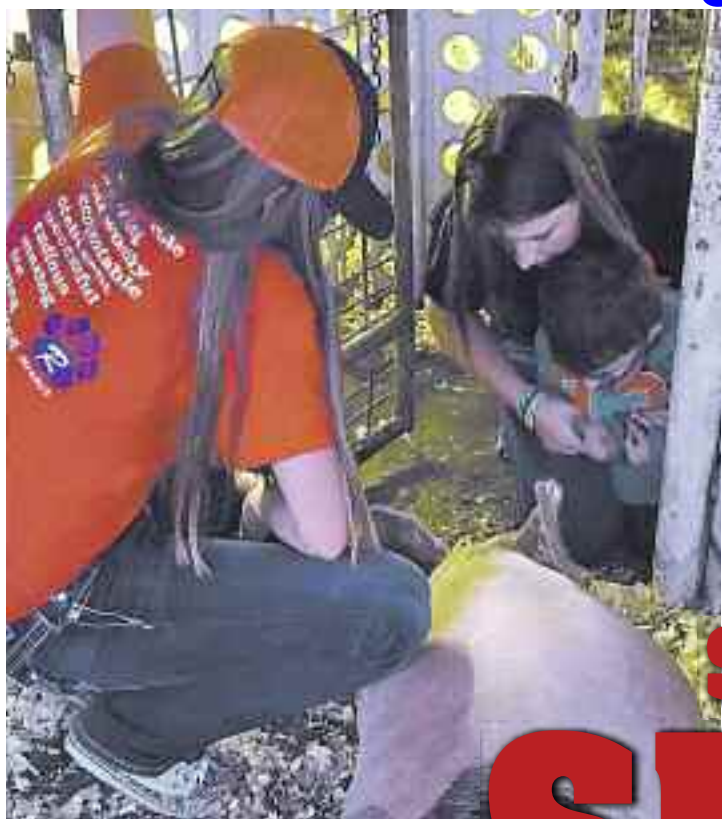

State Parks Seeking Public Comment On Rec Plan

The New Mexico Minerals and Natural Resources Department, State Parks Division, has released a draft of "Viva New Mexico: A Statewide Plan for Outdoor Recreation" and is having a public meeting Thursday, October 15, from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. in Porter Hall, located in the Wendell Chino Building at 1220 S. St. Francis Dr. in Santa Fe.

The public is invited to attend and give public comment on Viva New Mexico, a statewide comprehensive outdoor recreation plan, or SCORP, which provides recommendations to guide local, state, and federal outdoor recreation providers in achieving a common vision for outdoor recreation resources in New Mexico and identifies the economic contributions of outdoor recreation.

Viva New Mexico, New Mexico's SCORP, is an effort required by the U.S. Department of the Interior, National Park Service, which administers the Federal Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF). LWCF funds are provided annually to New Mexico for the acquisition and development of outdoor recreation facilities. The plan helps determine priorities for allocating the LWCF funds. To remain eligible for LWCF funding, each state is required to develop a SCORP every five years.

On October 3, Spaceport America hosted its' first ever open house. The event was completely free to the public; however, there was limited registration for both the public and the media. The majority of visitors arrived in their own vehicles and the remaining visitors arrived by shuttles provided by Follow The Sun Tours and Spaceport America.

Visitors were able to explore the hangar housing a SpaceShipTwo replica. The SpaceShipTwo (SP2) was created to work in conjunction with the White Knight Two, which carries the SP2 up between 40,000 and 50,000 feet or a safe distance for an air launch. When all of the testing for SP2 and WK2 has been completed, SP2 is capable of caring 6 passengers and 2 pilots. In early November, Spaceport America as well as NASA are planning to begin experiments to ensure the success of SP2 and the White

Rec Board Mulls Applications

After agreeing to appoint an apparent sole applicant for a standing board vacancy, members of the Truth or Consequences (T-or-C) Recreation Advisory Board were told that other applications might have been overlooked during recent staff changes at city hall.

With the potential that other valid applications could have been misfiled, members decided to postpone their decision until the board reconvenes in November. In the meantime, the board agreed they would contact administrative personnel to assure all applications were in hand and that all interested individuals would be considered.

Chairman Dr. Greg D'Amour said the current vacancy was created by the resignation of former member Pat Freemyer. He noted the term for that post, as well as his own position, would be expiring at the end of the current fiscal cycle.

PARKS PROJECT REPORT

During his report, Parks and Recreation Department Director Peter Baca said preparations were all in place for the city's Punk Greer Rodeo Arena to host the upcoming Sierra County Fair Horse Show and a scheduled ranch rodeo

competition.

After noting coed softball league play was underway and that youth soccer competition was winding down, Baca said his crew was attending to a number of other projects lined up for the weeks ahead.

Board members were told that later in the week, recreation department staff would be adding some final touches to the newly constructed entrance for Ralph Edwards Park, located at the former location of the city's old firehouse on Date Street. Baca said this work would include the installation of an irrigation system and the planting of a number of trees.

At the same time, Baca reported that his crew would be addressing a necessary clean out of the park's fishing pond. After acknowledging that water was drained to remove cattail growth, he said the recent lowering of levels in the adjacent Rio Grande channel would delay a refilling of the pond.

Baca explained that river water was utilized to fill the pond and said he was waiting for Bureau of Reclamation officials to extend an access channel that would allow the city's pumps to function.

Board members were told that efforts are also being made toward development of a youth T-

EB Contracts To Improve ISO Ratings

Following an intensive discussion in their September 16 workshop, Elephant Butte City Councilors returned focus to the community's Insurance Service Office (ISO) fire rating during their October 7 workshop session.

Members welcomed back T-or-C Fire Chief and Sierra County Fire Administrator Paul Tooley, who presented the board with a proposed contract to aid the city in improving the community's ISO rating.

For a fee not to exceed \$8,137.50, the contract with Tooley's private firm Turbo Design, offered to first assist the city in assessing the community's status regarding all issues addressed in ISO assessments. Tooley said he would then work with city officials in

developing a prioritized plan attending to identified issues and establishing further steps designed to earn the city an improved ISO rating.

During the workshop, board members were told that for insurance companies utilizing the ISO rating system, a one grade reduction in a city's ISO rating could translate into as much as a 10-percent reduction in customer rates. Mayor Eunice Kent noted that in addition to lower insurance fees, a reduced ISO rating would also provide extra revenue for the city through annual fire fund allotments.

Mayor Kent also expressed concerns about the city's water

Reserve Ranger District Plans Burns

Reserve Ranger District fire management personnel are preparing to conduct the 2,500-acre Sheep Basin prescribed fire, approximately ten miles southeast of Reserve, NM off Forest Road 141. Ignitions may occur when conditions are favorable anytime from mid-Oct. into Nov. 2015.

This broadcast burn (activity where fire is applied generally to most or all of an area within well-defined boundaries) will complete the 6,500-acre Sheep Basin project. The Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation and New Mexico Department of Game and Fish provide support for this ongoing wildlife habitat improvement project.

With the onset of winter, district personnel are also planning to burn slash piles at various locations. Those areas will be signed and posted for public awareness. Pile burning will be ongoing throughout the winter

as conditions allow. The objectives of the burns include removing hazardous fuels and reducing the threat of severe wildfires.

Locations of the pile burns are as follows:

- SU slash pit: approximately 4 miles southwest of Reserve, west of NM 12 along FR 578
- Five Bar Subdivision piles: 5 miles southwest of Reserve, east of NM 12 along CAT-B056
- Highway Department piles; along north side of Hwy 12 and Hwy 180 behind Highway Dept. and across from Reserve airstrip
- Black and Deer Timber Sale piles: 12 miles southeast of Reserve FR 141, FR 626 and 179

Smoke will be visible in those areas where the burns are being conducted and may linger at night and during the early morning hours, but normally will decrease as temperatures rise during the day. Drive

slowly and be alert to personnel and equipment while traveling in the project locations.

Pearce Comments On FWS Proposal

Following an announcement this week by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS) of its proposal to list the headwater chub and a population of the roundtail chub as a "threatened species under the Endangered Species Act," U.S. Rep. Steve Pearce issued the following statement:

"The Fish and Wildlife Service has absolutely no reason to list these two species," said Pearce. "States and local authorities have shown time and again that they can effectively carry out conservation efforts."

"This listing could threaten local economies that rely on the Gila for agriculture, recreation and tourism. As we all know, local conservation efforts have been tremendously effective in preserving the Lesser Prairie Chicken and the Dunes Sagebrush Lizard."

"Instead of impeding progress already being made, the FWS should focus on the management and conservation of species already listed and allow the current practices to continue to work."

New Mexico has received approximately \$212 million for Federal agencies, \$42 million for stateside grants, and \$7 million for its Forest Legacy program. Those funds have been used to protect places such as the Petroglyph National Monument and to develop and renovate outdoor recreation facilities at places such as Pancho Villa and Rockhound State Parks.

New Mexico's unique geography combined with its abundant natural resources and the outdoor recreational opportunities that accompany them are part of the reason New Mexico is known as the "Land of the Enchantment." A statewide survey completed for SCORP process found that 93 percent of adult residents participate in at least one outdoor recreation activity.

According to a report prepared by Southwick Associates for the Outdoor Recreation Association in 2013, outdoor recreation supports 68,000 New Mexico jobs and ultimately \$458 million in state and local tax revenue. On average, the 3 million out-of-state visitors who participate in outdoor recreation annually spend approximately \$1,000 per trip, or \$290 per day. Out-of-state visitors who attend outdoor recreation events spend about \$900 on a trip associated with planned outdoor recreation events, an often-overlooked economic driver. An annual total spending estimate for outdoor recreation events in New Mexico from visitors from Utah, Texas, Oklahoma, Arizona, and Colorado is approximately \$385 million.

Viva New Mexico was developed with the thoughtful input of a technical advisory committee that included local, state and federal agencies; members of the New Mexico Recreation and Parks Association; the New Mexico Outdoor Coalition; and the New Mexico State Parks Advisory Board.

system and during subsequent discussion, members agreed that potential ordinance revisions might be needed to ensure ISO mandates could be met.

Later, during the board's regular session, councilors unanimously endorsed a motion to enter into the contract with Turbo Design, emphasizing they would expect to receive an initial assessment report no later than December 2.

SCRDA JPA ENDORSED

Following more than two years of effort councilor Dee Rogers said he was recommending that the city council approve a revised Joint Powers Agreement (JPA) with the Sierra County Regional Dispatch Authority (SCRDA).

He explained that SCRDA's board of directors and area municipal leaders have been working to craft an agreement, which would effectively attend to the dispatch authorities operational needs and at the same time provide an equitable arrangement for financial support from the communities and agencies it serves.

Councilors were told the agreement would accommodate a recently approved gross receipt tax (GRT) referendum, which assures a percentage of revenue derived from local commerce will directly support SCRDA. Rogers noted that while the GRT allotment was approved months ago, the dispatch authority's first payment was just now being anticipated.

Because of the delay in applicable GRT funding and other aspects relating to SCRDA operations that are still being addressed, Rogers said he would expect the agreement to be amended again within the coming year. While

acknowledging that the JPA was still in need of refinement, Rogers said the proposed measure would utilize the number of actual dispatched service calls to each municipality as a basis for their respective funding obligations. He noted this was one of the primary desires set forth by the city council in the JPA revision effort.

OTHER ACTION & ITEMS

Councilors approved the designation of an alternate post for the city's Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) and appointed former commission member Nathan LaFont to serve in this capacity. Council members then moved on to address the full-time post vacated by LaFont and unanimously endorsed the appointment of Bill Kirikos to fill the available seat on the P&Z.

During her report, Mayor Kent acknowledged the past weekend's Oktoberfest event. She said approximately 300 guests turned out to enjoy the festivities, held at Turtleback Mountain Resort's Sierra del Rio clubhouse.

Kent also announced plans to meet with community leaders and officials from area municipalities to bolster support for next summer's Fourth of July fireworks display. She explained how prices relating to pyrotechnic displays have risen significantly and after noting that the annual event provides a boost to the economy for most Sierra County communities, said she would be working to increase future support for the summer spectacular.

During her regular report, city clerk/treasurer Karen Rieth told councilors that a close check of utility records found the city was due approximately \$27,000 in delinquent customer account payments.

Rieth explained that current

regulations pertaining to collection of past due accounts proscribe a lien process, which she said could be expected to cost the city approximately \$1,200 for the first formal notification alone.

Emphasizing that the city would experience excessive costs by pursuing the lien process, Rieth suggested councilors consider ordinance revisions that would allow the issuance of citations, which could then be processed through the city's municipal court.

While no formal action was taken, council members agreed and indicated they would address potential ordinance revisions in the very near future.

Farmers, Ranchers Committed To The Long Game

As a fourth-generation farmer and rancher, you could say farming and ranching runs deep in my veins. My ancestors were farmers and ranchers in Germany and Russia before coming to the U.S., and my family still farms the land my great-grandfather homesteaded back in 1907.

We grow wheat, safflower, millet, corn and alfalfa and raise beef cattle in western South Dakota. Our cattle ranching gets the most interest from folks these days. I often hear questions about how beef is raised and whether it's sustainable. I'm proud of the work my family has been doing for generations to produce quality food and keep our ranch sustainable for more than a century now.

IS BEEF SUSTAINABLE?

Yes. We are committed to raising strong, healthy animals

and protecting our land and water. On our ranch, we have implemented conservation practices that increase our productivity while conserving our natural resources.

On our family ranch, we run what's called a cow/calf enterprise, where we care for approximately 150 momma cows year-round. They are bred to calve each spring, and then raise their calves during the summers and into early fall. When we wean the calves in November, the males (steers) are sold, and we keep all the females (heifers) to eventually replace the older cows of our herd.

When my father started ranching in the early 1960s, he would wean and sell calves that weighed 300 pounds. Today, we are weaning and selling calves that weigh 500 to 600 pounds. How is this possible? Through careful breeding and conservation practices. Every year we evaluate our momma cows' performance and health, and we breed them to select bulls to improve the quality of our herd.

We have also taken on conservation practices that are good for our animals and our land. We worked with our local Natural Resources Conservation District to develop grazing plans and manage water. By rotating the fields our cattle graze in and developing water sources that conserve energy, we are providing our animals the nutrition they need while giving our land valuable rest every year. Building these conservation practices doesn't happen overnight. It's a serious undertaking on our part, and we have been investing in sustainability for generations.

GRAIN OR GRASS DIET?

That's another question people ask all the time. The answer? Both!

All of our cows and calves need a well-balanced diet every day. Full-grown cows have a developed digestive system that allows them to consume grass all year with very little supplement other than minerals and hay. Our momma cows graze pastures year-round, and our calves are on pasture for most of their lives. But calves, right after they are weaned, are still growing and developing, so we introduce a mixed diet of grain, forage and minerals to help them develop in a timely manner.

Avoid Emotional Investment Decisions

What's the biggest obstacle to your ability to invest successfully? Is it the ups and downs of the financial markets? Political events? The fact that you weren't born rich? Actually, the chief hurdle you face is something over which you have control: your own emotions.

Your emotions can lead to a variety of ill-advised investment behaviors, such as these:

- **Cutting losses** - Declines in the financial markets can lead some investors to try to "cut their losses" by selling investments whose price has declined. Yet, when prices have dropped, it may actually be a good time to buy investments, not sell them, especially when the investments are still fundamentally sound.

- **Chasing performance** - In the investment world, the flip side of "fear" is "greed." Just as some investors are propelled by fear of loss, others are motivated by quick, big gains. They may pursue "hot" investments, only to be disappointed when the sizzle quickly fizzles. Instead of trying to "score" that one big winner, you may be better off spreading your investment dollars among a range of vehicles - stocks, bonds, government securities, certificates of deposit (CDs) and so on. While diversification can't guarantee a profit or protect against loss, it may help reduce the impact of market volatility on your portfolio.

- **Focusing on the short term** - When the market is down, you might get somewhat upset when you view your monthly investment statements. But any individual statement is just a snapshot in time; if you were to chart your investment results over a period of 10, 15 or 20 years, you'd see the true picture of how your portfolio is doing - and, in all likelihood, that picture would look better than a statement or two you received during a down mar-

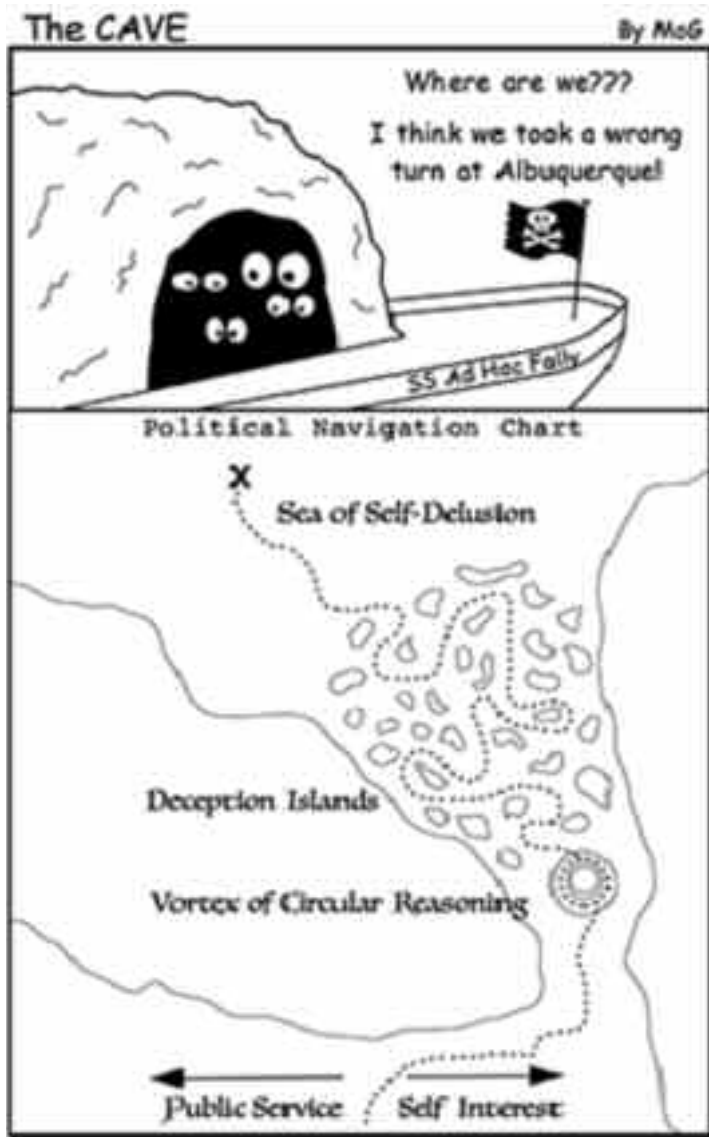
ket. In any case, don't overreact to short-term downturns by making hasty "buy" or "sell" decisions. Instead, stick with a long-term strategy that's appropriate for your goals, risk tolerance and time horizon.

- **Heading to the investment "sidelines"** - Some people get so frustrated over market volatility that they throw up their hands and head to the investment "sidelines" until "things calm down." And it's certainly true that, when owning stocks, there are no guarantees; you do risk losing some, or all, of your investment. But if you

jump in and out of the market to "escape" volatility, you may take on an even bigger risk - the risk of losing some of the growth you'll need to reach your goals. Consider this: If you had invested \$10,000 in a package of stocks mimicking the S&P 500 in December 1979, your investment would have grown to more than \$426,000 by December 2013. But if you had missed just the 10 best days of the market during that time, your \$10,000 would only have grown to less than \$206,000 - a difference of about \$220,000, according to Ned Davis Research, a leading investment research organization. The bottom line? Staying invested over the long term can pay off. (Keep in mind, though, that the S&P 500 is an unmanaged index and isn't meant to depict an actual investment. Also, as you've no doubt heard, past performance is not a guarantee of future results.)

Our emotions are useful in guiding us through many aspects of our lives, but when you invest, you're better off using your head - and not your heart.

MIGRATING MESS

ANIMAL SHELTER CHANGES

Ms. Aubin, I have read your rant about the city maintained shelter in Humane Happenings. I have heard the horror stories about that shelter from you and others. However, that was many years ago and times have changed, as has the city of Truth or Consequences.

We have a different city manager, different commissioners, a different chief of police and our animal control officers are now more in line with what I would call animal humane officers.

While I applaud what you and Dr. Cardwell did in creating a new shelter, it is hardly the ideal shelter. Cats are in the same room with dogs, quarantined animals separated by a little fence and some space. The staff is excellent and takes good care of the animals, but it is still a substandard shelter.

Desert Haven is a wonderful place but it is, of necessity, limited in scope. It helps a tiny segment of the animal population in Sierra County. It does not address the real problems. While you have created your own little "Haven" the rest of Sierra County has been left to deal on its own. Using an example of 30 years ago is not relevant to today's more knowledgeable and caring city of T-or-C.

CAAT has been working closely with the city and Chief Alirez to make sure the new shelter is up to date and run humanely. We have met frequently with commissioners and Mr. Fuentes and brought in people who are in the know when it comes to animals. We have written state representatives to ask that funds for the new shelter be approved. There is now a shelter board and there will be oversight as we asked for. Although the new shelter, when built, will

have to have an open door policy as does the present shelter, we are dedicated to try to reach 90-percent no kill once the shelter is up and running.

The city has maintained an open dialog with shelter professionals such as APNM and the ASPCA. Gassing, shooting and heart sticking animals is no longer the norm. The conditions that once existed because of ignorance are in the past and will not be repeated here.

We have learned and moved on. We are in the 21st century, Ms. Aubin.

Good News From God's Word New Testament Baptist Church

GOOD NEWS

These articles are titled "Good News from God's Word." The good news is that Calvinism is not the Gospel or good news. It is a distortion of what God has revealed to us in His word. It is built on proof-texts rather than on the whole counsel of God.

When brought to its ultimate conclusions, please think of the contradictions Calvinism poses to the word of God. If Calvinism is true then the most popular verse in the Bible, John 3:16, is a lie.

If Calvinism is true then evangelism is absolutely pointless because God has already chosen the few He is going to save and the rest have to go to hell with neither the saved nor the lost having a choice in the matter. If Calvinism is true it is in fact cruel to go into all world and preach the Gospel to every creature (Mark 16:15) and tell them that they can be saved when most of them cannot.

If Calvinism is true then the Lord wasted His time sitting outside Jerusalem weeping over those He wanted to save but could not because they refused His offer (Matthew 23:37-39). If Calvinism is true He is also wasting His time drawing all men to Himself (John 12:32-33).

If Calvinism is true then men definitely have an excuse for remaining in their sin because they have no choice in the matter (Romans 1:18-20).

If Calvinism is true then God is cruel to command all men everywhere to repent when He has not made it possible for them to do so (Acts 17:30).

If Calvinism is true then the Apostle Paul and the Apostle John are both mistaken. Paul said that the Lord Jesus gave Himself a ransom for all to be testified in due time, and that He is the Savior of all men, especially of those that believe (1 Timothy 2:5-6; 4:10). John said that Jesus Christ is the propitiation for our sins; and not for ours only, but also for the sins of the whole world (1 John 2:2).

If Calvinism is true then God will save all because Calvinism says that God applies irresistible grace to those He has chosen to save, and the Bible says that God would have all men to be saved, and to come unto the knowledge of the truth (1 Timothy 2:4), and that

He is not willing that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance (2 Peter 3:9). The sad truth is all are not being saved. The question then is who is thwarting God's will in this matter?

The good news is that Calvinism is not true. God has in fact graciously given to each individual the freedom of choice. Each individual can freely choose whether or not to

believe God.

Each individual who does, of his own free will, choose to believe the Gospel; that Christ died for our sins; and that he was buried, and that he rose again the third day; and who will, of his own free will, choose to call upon the name of the Lord and ask Him for salvation, God will immediately save and deliver from the power of darkness and translate into the kingdom of his dear Son.

God will forgive all his sins and will declare him righteous and will give to him the gift of eternal life and declare him to be His son making him His heir. Now, that is definitely good news.

"Pastors, repent from sins of rebellion, which is as witchcraft, and stubbornness which is as idolatry." 1 Sam 15:23 Most in the Church do not know how to love Jesus and how to allow Him to love them because often it is not allowed on Sunday mornings.

People are not transformed by your words alone but by the Holy Spirit. Your job is to "notice where and how the Holy Spirit is working" and point people to Him as did Naman's servants in 2 Kgs 5:11-14 Then Jesus intervenes and transformation takes place.

PARTICULAR AND UNCONDITIONAL ELECTION

There are two very important matters in true religion, and are unattainable to the natural man. Only those quickened and saved by divine grace can comprehend calling and election.

The word calling in scripture means two things. First the general call, which is meant in the preaching of the gospel to the whole of humanity. Second, and most importantly, is the special call - the effectual call. God, by the irresistible power of his Holy Spirit, calls those whom he chose before the foundation of the earth to become freed from the bondage of sin and become lovers and servants of the Lord Jesus Christ.

Nothing can be more forcibly expressed, nor definitely laid down, than the doctrine of predestination, and is only to be handled carefully by men who are enlightened. This doctrine can be traced through the succession of the holiest of men, from today to the days of Calvin, then to Augustine, on to the apostle Paul and even to the very lips of the Lord Jesus Christ. This doctrine is without doubt taught in scripture, and were not these Armenian charlatans so proud as to not humble themselves, they might come to understand it. This doctrine must be received as the manifest truth, by even the most ignorant purveyors of free will.

Ephesians 1:4-6 - "Just as He chose us in Him, before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and without blame before him in love, having predestined us to adoption as sons by Jesus Christ to himself. According to the good pleasure of His will, to the praise of the glory of His grace, by which he made us accepted in the Beloved."

God's choice of His elect rested solely in His own sovereign will. These acts are the result, not the cause of God's choice.

Election is not determined by or conditioned upon any virtuous quality or act foreseen in man. Those whom God sovereignly elected He brings through the power of the Spirit to a willing acceptance of Christ. God's choice of the sinner, not the sinner's choice of Christ, is the ultimate cause of salvation. Romans 9:15,18 - "For He says to Moses, I will have mercy on whomever I will have mercy, and I will have compassion on whomever I will have compassion. Therefore He has mercy on whom He wills, and whom He wills he hardens." Exodus 33:19, Isaiah 45:9, Job 38:4, Psalm 65:4, 1 Peter 1: 2-3, Jonah 2:9.

NM WRRRI 60th Annual Water Conference On Managing Water

Despite the return of monsoon rainfall this summer, New Mexico continues to be immersed in a prolonged drought, and the state's limited water resources will continue to be squeezed.

Water resource management throughout the western U.S. is facing dramatic challenges that go to the core of our cultural, economic and societal foundations.

This year's New Mexico Water Resources Research Institute's conference, "Coloring Outside the Lines: Can Science Help Us Be Creative and Innovative in Managing Our Water?" is focused on managing the changes in water resource strategies - technology, legal/institutional, and social policy and whether science can help in determining new management strategies.

The day-and-a-half program will be held October 7-9 in Taos at the Sagebrush Inn and Suites. On October 7, participants can register for a tour that looks at acequia connections between the area's hydrology and local community. Ongoing hydrological studies in the area will be highlighted as the tour proceeds along the Rio Hondo/Cuchilla acequia.

Conference sessions begin on Thursday morning with water experts from around the region and nation. Science-based water management of groundwater supplies, hydro-climatology, so-called climate change, and successfully changing institutions will be discussed.

Regional topics to be addressed include land grants, the future of ski areas and watershed restoration priorities. At the national level, drought research throughout the west along with how other states are coping with drought will be featured.

Two luncheons are scheduled. Darcy Bushnell from the Utton Transboundary Resources Center at the University of New Mexico will speak on Thursday on the Abeyta Settlement. Friday's lunch will feature Earl Greene of the U.S. Geological Survey talking about drought research in the western states.

The water conference includes a poster session on Friday morning, where students, faculty, agency personnel, and private sector presenters will showcase their research. Visit the institute's website for the program, which includes speaker biogra-

phies and brief abstracts on their planned presentations: <http://2015.wrrri.nmsu.edu/> or call the NM WRRRI at 575-646-4337.

Register online via the conference website. Regular registration is \$125 and \$50 for full-time students. The registration fee includes both lunches. Members of the press may attend the conference free of charge.

While some students are concerned only with their current studies, others are looking forward beyond graduation next May. This special Moose event focuses on students interested in public speaking and educating youngsters on a variety of topics that range from bullying and peer pressure to drugs and alcohol

abuse.

The Moose Youth Awareness Program has grown over the past 25 years to become a highly recognized opportunity for students to develop and hone their public speaking and leadership abilities.

High school students involved in the program since its inception have reached more than 700,000 youngsters with positive lifestyle messages. In order to participate, students must attend the local State Youth Awareness meeting on October 10 in T-or-C, to gain an understanding of how the program works. During the meeting, students may discuss any issue they wish. Some may base it on direct experiences, such as bullying or child abuse; others may see a problem they want to correct.

Update Of Mineral Cost Recovery Fee Schedule

 The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) has issued a final rule, effective October 1 that implements the required annual adjustment to the fee schedule for mineral cost recovery projects. Specifically, the final rule updates the fees charged to recover costs incurred in processing certain documents associated with oil, gas, coal, and solid mineral activities on public lands.

Consistent with updates to the fee schedules in prior years, this final rule increases the fee schedule based on inflation.

The BLM is authorized to charge cost recovery fees under the Federal Land Policy and Management Act of 1976 (FLPMA) and the 2005 Cost Recovery Rule. This year's adjustment represents the ninth annual update to the fee schedule since the BLM first implemented a cost recovery fee schedule for certain oil and gas activities under the Cost Recovery Rule.

The fee schedule is adjusted annually based on the change in the Implicit Price Deflator for Gross Domestic Product (IPD-GDP) from the fourth quarter of one calendar year to the fourth quarter of the following calendar year. The IPD-GDP is published annually by the Department of Commerce.

Due to the small increase in the IPD-GDP over that period and basic principles of rounding, 34 fees will stay the same while 14 fees will increase. Twelve of the fee increases will

amount to \$5, and the remaining increases will be between \$15 and \$40. The largest increase, \$40, will be added to the fee for adjudicating more than ten mineral patent claims, which will rise from \$3,035 to \$3,075. The fee for adjudicating ten or fewer mineral patent claims will increase by \$15, from \$1,520 to \$1,535.

The BLM has been undertaking the annual fee adjustments in response to recommendations made in a report issued by the Department of the Interior's Office of Inspector General in 1988, which found that the BLM needed to do more to recover its document-processing costs. The fees are based on a common mathematical formula used by businesses nationwide to adjust their expenses.

This fee update rule is based on the change in the IPD-GDP from the fourth quarter of 2013 to the fourth quarter of 2014, which reflects the rate of inflation over four calendar quarters.

Inside the hangar there was a video explaining aspects of the Spaceport as well as facts about space. Pilots and crewmembers were mingling with visitors to answer questions and share information. Outside the hangar Spaceport firefighters stood by three of their vehicles to demonstrate the vehicles and the tools on them as well as their use to the public. Local food vendors Bella Luca, Latitude 33, and High Thyme Bistro came to offer food and beverages to the Spaceport open house visitors.

Roughly 30 aircraft from New Mexico Experimental Aircraft and the New Mexico Pilots Association were scheduled to land for the open house, but due to the weather not all were able to fly in. The aircraft were parked behind the hangar. Everyone could watch as pilots landed and drove up the Spaceport landing strip. At the end of the open house, the visitor count was 540. The CEO of Spaceport America, Chris Anderson, stated they plan to host two open houses a year.

12 Applicants Selected As Producers For Medical Cannabis Program

The New Mexico Department of Health (DOH) announced today that it will be issuing licenses to 12 applicants who applied to become licensed non-profit producers (LNPPs) in the state's Medical Cannabis Program. Licensure is contingent upon the applicants' acceptance and demonstration of regulatory compliance. This will bring the total number of LNPPs to 35.

Secretary of Health Retta Ward reviewed the 17 highest scoring applications, which represent the top 20 percent of total applications submitted. A four-member Scoring Committee of DOH employees recommended to Secretary Ward that she review the 17 highest scoring applications, and that she make her selection from that pool. She adopted that recommendation.

In making her decision about which applicants to license, Secretary Ward considered the individual and aggregate scores given by the Scoring Committee, as well as the notations made by the Scoring Committee members. She

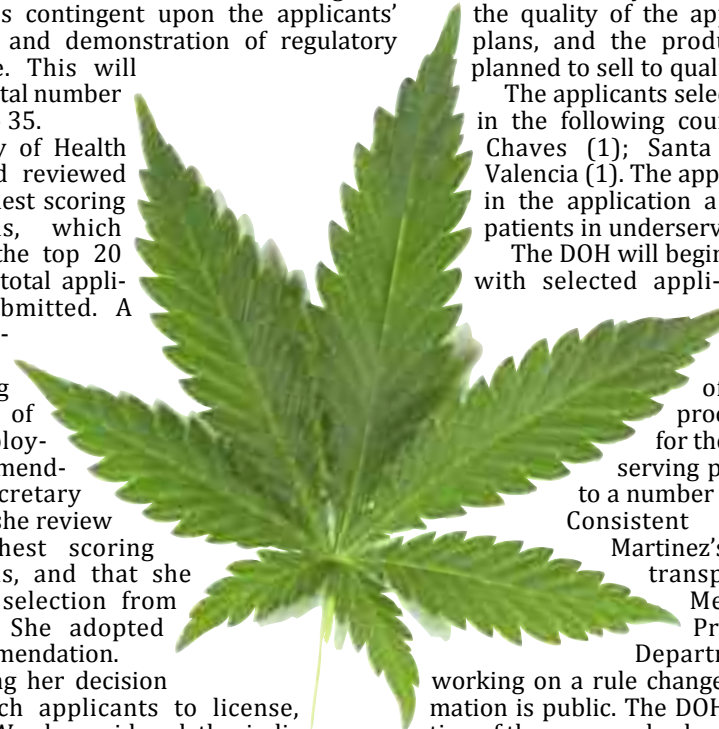
also reviewed and evaluated the content and overall quality of each application, including other factors such as the quality of the applicants' production plans, with an emphasis on location, safety and security components, the quality of the applicants' distribution plans, and the products that applicants planned to sell to qualified patients.

The applicants selected for licensure are in the following counties: Bernalillo (8); Chaves (1); Santa Fe (1); Taos (1); Valencia (1). The applicants demonstrated in the application a clear plan to serve patients in underserved communities.

The DOH will begin setting up site visits with selected applicants, which is one of the requirements as part of the licensing process. The timeframe for the new LNPPs to begin serving patients will vary due to a number of factors.

Consistent with Governor Martinez's direction for more transparency in the Medical Cannabis Program, the NM Department of Health is working on a rule change so that LNPP information is public. The DOH anticipates publication of the proposed rule changes, and conducting a public hearing sometime this fall.

There are 17,537 patients in the program and 21 qualifying conditions.



Quemado Lake: Fishing was fair to good using PowerBait and salmon eggs for trout. We had no reports on tiger muskie.

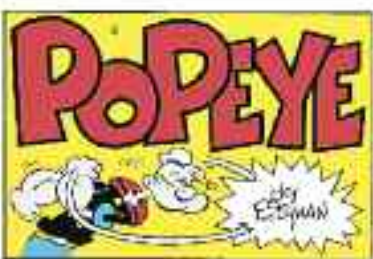

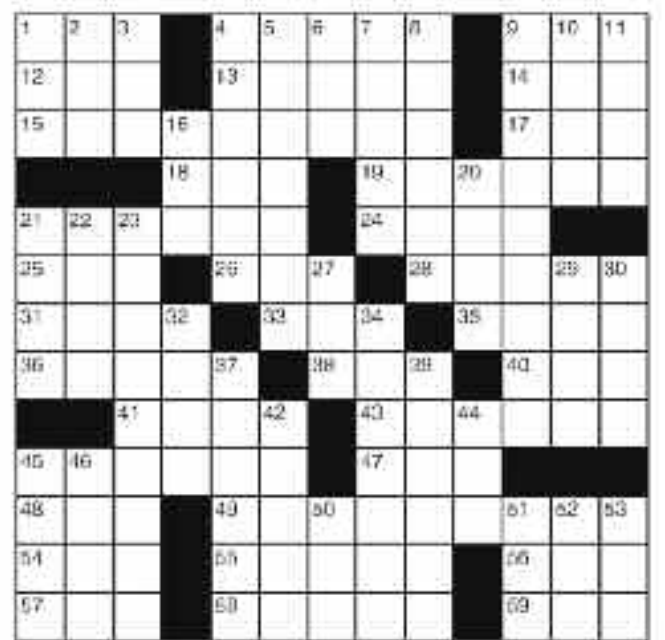

If Trees Could Talk Display

The custom display case was constructed and donated by Wes Burris of Socorro, New Mexico, a member of the New Mexico Trappers Hall of Fame. The wood was obtained from a tree harvested from Ron and Nancy White's property, located adjacent to the Gila Wilderness in Catron County. The tree was probably the last one removed for useful purposes from anywhere in the area prior to a devastating wildfire.

Almost the entire watershed was burned when the Whitewater-Baldy Complex Fire began on May 9, 2012. The U.S. Forest Service allowed two lightning caused fires to burn in the Gila Wilderness under dry conditions during a multi-year drought. The Wilderness area and surrounding National Forest had only received minimal management by the U.S. Forest Service for years. The two fires merged in the dry over dense Wilderness, and pushed by very high winds, scorched nearly 300,000 acres.

Vast areas were denuded, with only the skeletons of burned trees remaining. Wildlife was decimated and fish were eliminated from streams that became polluted with ash and other debris. Significant post fire watershed soil erosion occurred with damage to the mountainside slopes, the streams, and downstream communities. Future erosion and associated damages are anticipated.

The economies of the ranching, hunting and tourism industries, and of the county government and local businesses in Catron

County were significantly adversely impacted. The adjacent counties of Grant and Sierra experienced adverse impacts to varying degrees. The fire consumed 12 residences, including the White's cabin, and remains the largest wildfire recorded in New Mexico.

As her husband was a member of the Air Force, duty called and prompted the family to relocate to Gig Harbor, a suburb of Tacoma, Washington. They then settled into life on the west coast for the next twenty-five years.

During this period of time Karen and her husband divorced. As a single mom she went on to find employment as a drug and alcohol counselor, and later



as a manager for the Fashion Bug clothing chain. At the same time she maintained the household, while also watching her daughters grow up and move on to pursue their own paths.

In 1994, Karen sold her house in Washington and set off traveling. She eventually found her way to Sierra County, where she notes T-or-C's famous healing waters and restful environment convinced her to purchase a home and stay.

Having found a passion for clothing and accessories while working with Fashion Bug, Karen decided to pursue the interest. She soon opened Earth Tapestries, adding her own special boutique fashions

and crafts to the community's offerings.

Over the next fifteen years, Karen operated Earth Tapestries, which specialized in quality resale garments, as well as her handmade hats, jewelry and other accessories. During the latter years of this endeavor, Karen was diagnosed with Fibromyalgia. While working through her symptoms, she ultimately decided to close the establishment and briefly relocated to the San Diego, California area.

As she still owned a house in T-or-C, Karen ultimately found her way back to Sierra County. However, over subsequent years the desire to see other places rekindled again, taking her to Ruidoso where she briefly operated a small boutique, and then once more back to southern California before her latest return to T-or-C.

Once again at home base, Karen struck up a partnership with local pastor, David

Koonce, and together they opened the current establishment at 529 Broadway.

The shop is a combined enterprise, featuring Karen's "Victorian Hippy Chic" fashions, while also serving David's Resale Heaven, which offers donated clothing to benefit the community. While Resale Heaven focuses on donations and does provide thrifty clothing options, Karen stresses the establishment is not "just another thrift store."

Karen explains how the clothes she sells are purchased new, or are high quality resale items, which she personally hand picks and then often enhances. The store also features Karen's hand crafted jewelry, hats and a variety of other unique items. While acknowledging her offerings are priced a bit higher than thrift store

options, she says the quality of the items ensures customers will be satisfied with their purchases for years to come.

Although she has returned to the boutique lifestyle, Karen is working through a semi-retirement and currently opens for regular business only four days a week. On her days off, Karen says she is either working on crafts or on the road with her Shih Tzu, Maxwell, to visit with her daughters and three grandchildren, Zion, Zadok and Elisa.

The Victorian Hippy Chic/Resale Heaven is open on Mondays and Tuesdays from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. and on Fridays and Saturdays from 11 a.m. until 4 p.m. Karen encourages anyone interested in finding that one-of-a-kind item, or maybe just a warm hat for the cold days ahead, to stop by for a

chat and a chance to peruse the inventory.

On October 3, Spaceport America hosted its' first ever open house. The event was completely free to the public; however, there was limited registration for both the public and the media. The majority of visitors arrived in their own vehicles and the remaining visitors arrived by shuttles provided by Follow The Sun Tours and Spaceport America.

Visitors were able to explore the hangar housing a SpaceShipTwo replica. The SpaceShipTwo (SP2) was created to work in conjunction with the White Knight Two, which carries the SP2 up between 40,000 and 50,000 feet or a safe distance for an air launch. When all of the testing for SP2 and WK2 has been completed, SP2 is capable of caring 6 passengers and 2 pilots. In early November, Spaceport America as well as NASA are planning to begin experiments to ensure the success of SP2 and the White Knight Two.

Inside the hangar there was a video explaining aspects of

the Spaceport as well as facts about space. Pilots and crewmembers were mingling with visitors to answer questions and share information. Outside the hangar Spaceport firefighters stood by three of their vehicles to demonstrate the vehicles and the tools on them as well as their use to the public. As the Hatch Valley Bears closed up their non-conference schedule defeating the Tularosa Wildcats with a mercy ruling of 60-6, they look to open district competition with the same ferocity.

Last Friday night, the Hatch crushed their last non-district opponent with a whopping victory of 60-6 using the mercy rule to end the game five minutes into the fourth quarter. The game could have easily been finished by halftime if it weren't for a slight slip up that allowed the Wildcats to score a touchdown.

The Bears then had to go into half and return for a third quarter where they continued their onslaught against the Wildcats on their homecoming night. The Bears were finally able to end the game with over seven minutes remaining in the fourth quarter.

The first quarter started with a Bear touchdown within two minutes of the start of the game, followed up by another within five minutes of the first kickoff. The Bears had four unanswered touchdowns in the first quarter alone.

The second quarter started with the Bears offense hammering the Tularosa Wildcats. There were three more touchdowns, and finally one by the

Wildcats to put some points on the board.

During the halftime break, the Tularosa Wildcats presented their Homecoming Court.

The Bears, who are now 6-0 on the season, totaled 364 yards with 282 rushing and 82 passing while holding off the Wildcats to 10 yards total. The Hatch defense was led by Austin Franzoy with a total of 12 hits, 2 sacks and 3 tackles for a loss. Cooper Carson and Adrian Grajeda both got credit for a sack apiece. Scoring for the Bears were Adrian Grajeda with one rushing and one fumble return. Cade Hackey had a 58-yard reception from quarterback Jared Garay, and a 56-yard interception return. Miah Padilla had 6 carries for 162 yards, 2 touchdowns (1 for 92 yards and 1 for 46 yards). Cooper Carson had a 24-yard reception from Garay, along with a 5-yard rushing touchdown. Garay was 2 for 4 in passing for 82 yards and two touchdowns. Garay was also credited for one rushing touchdown.

The Bears will begin their district competition this week against the Socorro Warriors in an away game starting at 7 p.m.

\$1.5 Million Grant Awarded To Combat Human Trafficking In NM

As part of his commitment to combat human trafficking, New Mexico Attorney General Hector Balderas announced this week the award of \$1.5 million in federal grant funding to combat human trafficking in New Mexico. The collaborative

grants will fund efforts across New Mexico to fight human trafficking, provide services for victims and expand research.

New Mexico is one of 16 sites selected for an anti-trafficking task force award, receiving \$1.5 million to support law enforcement efforts and victims' services for the next three years.

"Human trafficking, modern-day slavery, is not someone else's problem; it's happening across New Mexico, in our communities and in our neighborhoods. The callous disregard of traffickers for the lives of their victims is a tragedy, and we cannot delay in acting to end it," said Balderas. "My office is

committed to cracking down on violent offenders in New Mexico and on criminals who prey on our most vulnerable citizens."

Loretta Lynch, Attorney General of the United States, made the following remarks announcing the grant awards, "I'm pleased to announce that the Department of Justice is expanding our support by awarding \$44 million in grant funding to combat human trafficking. These grants - administered by the Office of Justice Programs' Bureau of Justice Assistance, the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention, the Office for Victims of Crime and the National

Institute of Justice - will fund efforts across the country to fight human trafficking, to provide services for survivors and to expand research going forward.

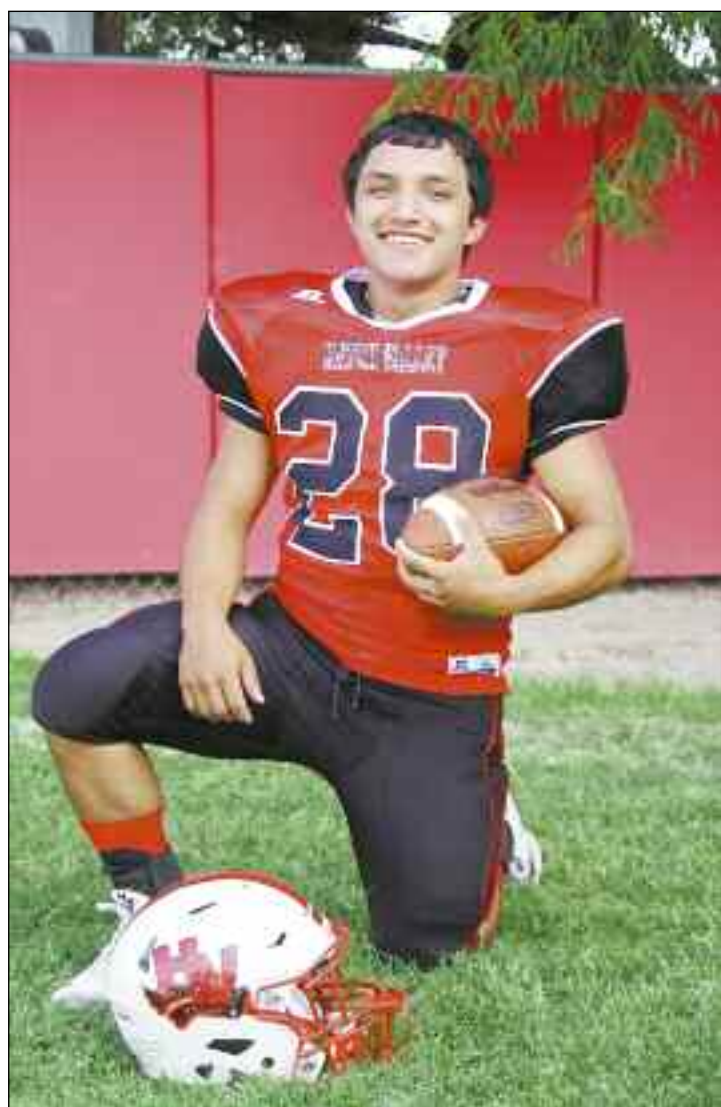

NM WRRI's 60th Annual Water Conference To Look At How Science Can Help Manage Water

By Catherine Ortega Klett
 Despite the return of monsoon rainfall this summer, New Mexico continues to be immersed in a prolonged drought, and the state's limited water resources will continue to be squeezed. Water resource management throughout the western U.S. is facing dramatic challenges that go to the core of our cultural, economic and societal foundations. This year's New Mexico Water Resources Research Institute's conference, "Coloring Outside the Lines: Can Science Help Us Be Creative and Innovative in Managing Our Water?" is focused on managing the changes in water resource

strategies - technology, legal/institutional, and social policy and whether science can help in determining new management strategies. The day-and-a-half program will be held October 7-9 in Taos at the Sagebrush Inn and Suites. On October 7, participants can register for a tour that looks at acequia connections between the area's hydrology and local community. Ongoing hydrological studies in the area will be highlighted as the tour proceeds along the Rio Hondo/Cuchilla

Conference sessions begin on Thursday morning with water experts from around the region and nation. Science-based water management of groundwater supplies, hydroclimatology, so-called climate change, and successfully changing institutions will be discussed.

Regional topics to be addressed include land grants, the future of ski areas and watershed restoration priorities. At the national level, drought research throughout the west along with how other states are coping with drought will be featured.

Two luncheons are scheduled. Darcy Bushnell from the Utton Transboundary Resources Center at the University of New Mexico will speak on Thursday on the Abeyta Settlement. Friday's lunch will feature Earl Greene of the U.S. Geological Survey talking about drought research in the western states.

The water conference includes a poster session on Friday morning, where students, faculty, agency personnel, and private sector presenters will showcase their research. Visit the institute's website for the program, which includes speaker biographies and brief abstracts on their planned presentations: <http://2015.wrri.nmsu.edu/> or call the NM WRRI at 575-646-4337.

Students applying to the U.S. Coast Guard Academy in New London, Connecticut do not need a Congressional nomination.

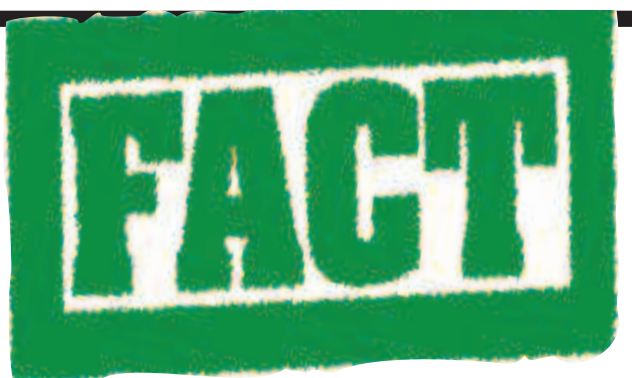
