




## **Regional Reports**



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Arlington, Culpeper, Fairfax, Fauquier, Loudoun, Madison, Prince William, Rappahannock, and Stafford counties; the cities of Alexandria, Fairfax, Falls Church, Manassas, and Manassas Park

It was an unusually cool spring with average moisture, until May, when temperatures were approximately 4°F above average and rainfall was nearly twice the monthly average at both Dulles Int'l and Reagan Nat. Airports. The highlights this season were a Little Gull seen flying over the Lowes Island ponds, a Least Tern at a pond in *Loudoun*, and a flock of Anhingas seen at the Int'l Conservation House. The Northern Shrike continued at Sully Woodlands, *Fairfax*.

#### WATERFOWL-SHOREBIRDS

A Cackling Goose, a fairly rare winter visitor whose late date is 5 Mar, appeared at Algonkian RP 3 Mar (BHe). A pair of Gadwalls was observed flying over Huntley Meadows 28 May (HG), well past the inland 20 Apr late date; the species is a rare summer visitor in the Region. Two Canvasbacks made a late appearance at Mason Neck SP 24 May (PSi), with 5 seen on 28 May (KG), well past the Coastal Plain 10 Apr late date. One to 2 Greater Scaup, a rare transient in the Piedmont, were seen at L. Brittle, Fauquier 6 Mar–4 Apr (GS), while a single was reported at Victory Ls., Prince

William 9 May (ph. TH), past the species' Piedmont extreme late date of 6 May. A late Lesser Scaup was observed at Mason Neck SP 28 May (KG); the Coastal Plain late date is 20 Apr. There were several reports of White-winged Scoters, a rare transient inland, including singles at Pohick Bay RP, Fairfax 11–17 Mar (MR); Occoquan Bay 13 Apr (MR); and Belmont Bay Marina, Prince William and adjacent Mason Neck SP 13 Apr, 5 May, and 28 May (KG, RR); this species' Coastal Plain late date is 15 Apr. Reports of Long-tailed Ducks, a rare visitor inland, included a f. at Daingerfield Is., Alexandria 7 Apr (EW) and a m. at Burke L. Pk., Fairfax 21 Apr (ph. AN, ph. MM). A Bufflehead was observed well past the species' extreme Piedmont late date of 27 Apr at the Int'l Conservation House, Fauquier 6 May (PSa), lingering through 22 May. Single Common Mergansers were seen outside of the species' mid-May extreme late date on the Thornton R., Rappahannock 20 May (BHa), near the Mountain/Valley area where the species is still a rare transient and summer visitor, and on a lake at G.R. Thompson WMA, Fauquier 21 May (ph. ADra), in the w. Piedmont where its summer occurrence is still not as frequent as it has become in the e. A Red-breasted Merganser at Leesylvania 19 May (PSi) was much later than this species' Coastal Plain late date of 30 Apr. A late Horned Grebe in full breeding plumage was found on a small pond near Rt. 7, Loudoun 22 & 30 May (GG); this uncommon transient's Piedmont late date is 20 Apr. Single Red-necked Grebes, a rare transient inland, were observed at Dyke Marsh 1 Mar (CC), continuing from late February; Burke L. Pk., Fairfax 23-24 Mar (NN); and Belvoir Pond 19 Apr (GS). Reports of Black-billed Cuckoos, a rare transient in the Coastal Plain, included singles at Monticello Pk., Alexandria 3-4 May (WY); Brooke Rd. rail station, Stafford 8 May (SK); and Huntley Meadows 12–15 May (QE, HM). A Chuck-will'swidow, rare in the Piedmont n. of the James R., sang for 10 min. at Walker Nature Center, Fairfax 20 May (v.r. SS). An impressive 6 King Rails were encountered at Occoquan Bay 13 May (RV). A Sora, a fairly rare transient and rare summer resident in the Piedmont, was observed at Belvoir Pond 31 May (GS); the late date is 20 May. A Common Gallinule, a rare transient and summer resident in the Piedmont, was seen at Bles Pk. 24–26 May (PN); one was also seen there 19 Apr (DN), which may or may not have been the same one but was not found during the intervening period despite several attempts. The pair of Sandhill Cranes that spent most of the winter at Algonkian RP was seen on several occasions in March (m. obs.), with the last report of a single on 18 Mar; last year these birds apparently didn't remain past late February. Reports of Black-bellied Plovers, a rare transient in the Piedmont, included 2 in Lowes Island 10 May (DCz) and 2 at Woodward Turf Farm 19 May (CH). Five **Whimbrels**, rare w. of the Chesapeake Bay, were observed at Leesylvania 19 May (EW); 13 were reported on the same date at Woodward Turf Farm (TD, ph. JF, CH); the Gold Book shows only 3 Piedmont records. A Dunlin, a rare transient in the Piedmont, was observed at Woodward Turf Farm 19 May (TD, JF), a day past the species' Piedmont extreme late date.

#### **GULLS AND TERNS-PELICANS**

There were several sightings of Bonaparte's Gulls considerably past the Regional late date of 30 Apr: one at Little Marsh Rd. and Impoundments, Fairfax 15 May (KG); 3 at Algonkian RP 15 May (ph. BHe); and one at C.M. Crockett Pk. 16 May (KK). A Laughing Gull, rare in the Piedmont in spring, was observed at the Lowes Island ponds 16 Apr (DCz). Very rare in the Piedmont, with a single Piedmont record in the Gold Book, was a LITTLE **GULL** seen at the Lowes Island ponds 19 Apr (DCz, MT). (One was seen nearby 2 weeks earlier, over Maryland waters of the Potomac R.) Also rare in the Piedmont was a Lesser Black-backed Gull at Trump Nat. Golf Course, Loudoun 1 Apr (DCz). A **LEAST TERN**, a sighting confirmed in eBird of a species with no prior spring records in the Piedmont and only 3 summer records in the Gold Book, was well seen at a pond popular with gulls and terns on Middlesex Dr., Loudoun 17 May (SJ). The earliest of the 3 summer records was 10 Jun (1978), also in Loudoun. There were numerous reports of Caspian Terns, a usually rare transient in the Piedmont, beginning 30 Mar and throughout April at scattered locations in s. and e. Loudoun (as many as 8) and e. Fauquier, including an impressive 16 near L. Ashby, Fauquier 20 Apr (ph. TD). Two **Forster's Terns** observed at Belmont Bay Marina, Prince William 11 Mar (KG, MR) and a single at Meadowood Recreation Area, Fairfax 14 Mar (LC) were considerably earlier than the Regional 5 Apr extreme early date. Four others made a rare Piedmont appearance (usually appearing at larger lakes) at C.M. Crockett Pk. 9 Apr (TD), with a single also at Belvoir Pond 16 Apr (GS). Rounding out the spate of rare spring gull and tern sightings were several reports of Royal Terns, rare inland especially in spring, including one at Crow's Nest NAP, Stafford 5 Apr (ML, JG); 5 at Dyke Marsh 18 Apr (CB); and singles at several locations in Prince William on 21 Apr: Veterans Memorial Pk. (BL, GB); Possum Pt. Rd. (KG); and Cherry Hill Rd. (KG). **ANHINGAS**, a rarity in the state, with few records n. of the James R., made a surprise incursion into the Region. First was 4 seen flying sw. over Grist Mill Pk., Fairfax 4 May (BS); an hour later 12 were observed 35-40 mi. w. on the pond at Int'l Conservation House (GW), with 17 well photographed there the following morning (GW), and at least one lingering through 13 May (GW). On 20 May, 18 were observed flying high over L. Accotink Pk., Fairfax (ph. MM), and on 21 May, 2 flew over Huntley Meadows (HG, GM). American White Pelicans, a rare visitor this far inland, were photographed at two locations, including 13 flying over Aquia Landing Pk., Stafford 3 Apr (ph. DE, fide) and 32 feeding offshore of Crow's Nest NAP, Stafford 6 Apr (ML, ph. GA).

#### **HERONS-CATBIRD**

Reports of American Bitterns, a fairly rare transient in the Piedmont, included singles at Bles Pk. 5 Apr-7 May (BHe, ph. MD, m. obs.); vocalizing on Potts Ln., Loudoun 28 Apr (JC, MG); and Phelps WMA 20 May (TD). Rare away from the coast, Yellow-crowned Night-Herons made several appearances: singles at L. Accotink, Fairfax, near the site of a known past nest 15 Apr (SE) and at Cub Run Stream Valley Pk., Fairfax 18 Apr (PSi); 4 at Leopold's Preserve, Prince William 22 Apr (ph. TH); and one at Julie J. Metz Wetlands Bank, Prince William 9 May (ph. BD). A **Glossy Ibis**, a rare spring transient in the Piedmont, was seen at the Lowes Island ponds 5 May (ph. DCz), and 2 were seen at Occoquan Bay, where fairly rare, 13 May (MR). Mississippi Kites were reported returning to many of the species' habitual Regional haunts in May, continuing the trend of recent years. A Merlin, a rare transient in the Piedmont, flew over a private residence in Taylorstown, Loudoun 28 Apr (GH). Peregrine Falcons had several sightings in the Piedmont, where rare: one was photographed

eating an apparent pigeon in a farm field near Middleburg, Loudoun 10 Mar (ph. LV); one was seen over the Lowes Island ponds 11 May (ph. DCz); 2 were kettling together over Towerview Rd., Fairfax 11 May (SJ); and 2—one a juv.—were hunting over a field at Harrison Rd., Fauquier 19 May (ARo). Single Olive-sided Flycatchers, a rare transient in the Region, especially in spring, were observed at Great Falls NP, Fairfax 20 May (KL, ph. PM) and Phelps WMA 20 May (TD). A Yellow-bellied Flycatcher, a rare transient in the Region, was reported at Huntley Meadows 8 May (RR). Reports of Alder Flycatchers, a rare spring transient in the Region, included one heard at Northside Pk., Fairfax 29 Apr (CF); one at Banshee Reeks Nature Preserve, Loudoun 12 May (MG, v.r. BHe); one at Bristoe Station Battlefield Pk., Prince William 14 May (MR); one at Huntley Meadows 14 May (Voice); 2 at Algonkian RP 15 May (AG, BHe) and again 20 May (v.r. ARa); and one at Wolftrap Stream Valley Pk., Fairfax 27 May (v.r. PK). A **Willow Flycatcher's** distinctive call was heard by multiple birders at Belle Haven Pk., Fairfax 14 Apr (JW); this species is a fairly rare spring transient in the n. Coastal Plain. Reports of Least Flycatchers, a rare transient in the Region, included singles at Franklin Pk., Loudoun 22 Apr (anon.) and Algonkian RP 23 Apr (PL). There was a fairly credible report of a Scissor-tailed Flycatcher along Hwy. 29, s. Madison 5 May (anon.); this is a very rare late spring visitor whose extreme early date in the Piedmont is 19 May. The **NORTHERN SHRIKE** first observed 1 Nov 2017 continued at Sully Woodlands, Fairfax through at least 28 Apr (m. obs.). Single Philadelphia Vireos, a rare spring transient in the Region, were reported at Monticello Pk., Alexandria 15 May (SG) and Leesylvania 19 May (EW). Common Ravens, continuing the species' eastward move, have been documented successfully nesting every year including this one (except for 2014, unknown) under a bridge in a restricted area of n. Fort Belvoir, Fairfax since May 2012 (GF). A **Cliff Swallow**, a fairly rare transient in the Coastal Plain, was seen with a few Bank Swallows at Leesylvania 21 Apr (MR). A Black-capped Chickadee was reported based on field marks and song at Great Falls Forest, Loudoun 15 & 17 Mar and possibly 23 Apr (PL). The **Brown-headed Nuthatch** present at Mountain Run L. Pk., Culpeper throughout the winter was seen again 1 Mar (KK) and may have remained throughout the spring, seen again 25 May (KK). Early House Wrens were reported at Sully Woodlands, Fairfax 23 Mar (QE) and Algonkian RP 25 Mar (RH) (the Piedmont early date is 10 Apr). A **Sedge Wren**, a rare transient in the Region,

was reported at Huntley Meadows 30 Apr (RR). A **Bluegray Gnatcatcher** observed at L. Royal, *Fairfax* 18 Mar (ADri) was nearly 2 weeks prior to the 30 Mar early date for the Piedmont. Reports of **Gray Catbirds** well before the species' 25 Apr Piedmont early date included singles at an Ashby Ponds Court Yard residence, *Loudoun* 18 Mar (DH); a Mt. Gilead Rd. residence, *Loudoun* 29 Apr (LMc); and a Taylorstown residence, *Loudoun* 30 Mar (JST).

#### **GOLDFINCHES-DICKCISSEL**

A **EUROPEAN GOLDFINCH**, possibly an escapee because no plumage wear was evident, was at Cockpit Pt. Rd., Prince William 29 Apr (ph. BHo). Five Chipping Sparrows observed along Shenandoah Path, Fauguier 1 Mar (CL, DL) were 2 weeks prior to the species' 15 Mar Piedmont early date. A Clay-colored Sparrow, a rare transient in the Piedmont, was reported at Laurel Hill Equestrian Ctr., Fairfax 4 Mar (Voice). A **LECONTE'S SPARROW**, a very rare visitor to the Region, was observed at Trump Nat. Golf Course, Loudoun 25 Mar (BHe), where one was also seen twice the previous winter, most recently on 9 Feb. A relatively rare visitor in the Region, a Lincoln's Sparrow was observed at Huntley Meadows 18 Mar (BJ). A **Prothonotary Warbler**, rare in the w. part of the Region, was observed at Phelps WMA 11 May (TD). There were too many Tennessee Warbler sightings to list, belying its status as a fairly rare spring transient in the Region. An **Orange-crowned Warbler**, a rare transient in the Piedmont, was spotted by a group at Great Falls NP, Fairfax 22 Apr (KL). Mourning Warblers, a rare transient through the Region, were observed at multiple locations, including 2 at the banding station at Occoquan Bay 12 May (WT) and singles at Clark's Crossing Pk., Fairfax 13 May (LMe); Bles Pk. 13 & 14 May (ph. EM); Algonkian RP 14 & 15 May (v.r. ARa, ph. AG, BHe); and Upper Occoquan Service Authority, Fairfax 20 May (DM). A rare transient in the Coastal Plain, a Cerulean Warbler made an appearance at Huntley Meadows 27 Apr (EE). Reports of Yellow-throated Warblers, a rare transient in the n. Piedmont, included 3 at C.M. Crockett Pk. 11 Apr (ph. DCa) and 5 there 13 Apr (ph. GS) and singles at Phelps WMA 13 Apr (TD) and as late as 28 May (KK). While not considered rare in the Piedmont, several uncommon warblers made pushes through the area in high counts, notably Cape May Warblers, with 14 to as many as 20 seen on three 2- to 3-hour walks during the 5-7 May period in Prince William, Loudoun, and Fauquier, and 10-11 Bay-breasted Warblers counted on two walks during the

12–15 May period in Alexandria and Fairfax. Dickcissels, still a fairly rare but increasing transient and breeder in the Piedmont, returned again this season to Bristoe Station Battlefield Pk., Prince William, with 6 observed 13 May (TH) and other sightings through at least 28 May. Two others were reported along Brookfield Rd., Prince William 28 May (CL, DL) and a single at the Lorton landfill, Fairfax 28 May (KG).

#### WATERFOWL-SHOREBIRDS

Snow Goose sightings included one at Willow L., Rockbridge 4–18 Mar (m. obs.), one at Luray, Page 21 (JF) & 25 Mar (DG), and 3 in Waynesboro 14 Apr (DP). Three Ross's Geese were found in Rockbridge 2–22 Mar (KK) and one in Rockingham 12 Apr (DH). A Greater Whitefronted Goose was at Greenfield L., Botetourt 9–10 Mar (m. obs.), then 26 (BE) & 30 Mar (LD, PD). One was also found at Nazarene Church 18 Apr (MG). Tundra Swan sightings included 3 at White Post, Clarke 6 Mar (SA), 2 at L. Frederick, Frederick 17 Mar (AB, DB) and 32 near Mint Springs, Augusta (AL, PW), and 112 at L. Holiday, Frederick 17 Mar (GR). The last report of the season was one in Roanoke 11 Apr (PL). Two Trumpeter Swans

were seen on the Shenandoah R., Clarke 22 Apr (JF). One with wing tag P61, present during the winter, continued in Augusta 1-29 Mar (AL, GM). One hundred sixty-four **Lesser Scaup** were tallied in *Augusta* 2 Apr (EC, AL, PW), for a new spring peak count in that county. Single Whitewinged Scoters were photographed at L. Merriweather, Rockbridge 16 Mar (BE, JP), at L. Shenandoah, Rockingham 3 Apr (DL), and L. Holiday, Frederick 6 Apr (JF, GR), the latter seen again 9 Apr (GR). A new peak count for Augusta of 13 was set 2 Apr (EC, AL, PW). Long-tailed **Duck** sightings included one at Silver L., *Rockingham* 1–19 Mar (m. obs.); 5 at Willow L., Rockbridge 20 Mar (LN); 2 in Augusta 2 Apr (SS et al.); 12 at L. Frederick, Frederick 2 Apr (DC, BW); 15 at L. Holiday, Frederick 2 Apr (GR); and 6 at L. Arrowhead, Page 19 Apr (JF). Two hundred thirty-five **Ruddy Ducks** were in *Augusta* 19 Apr (AL). **Northern Bobwhite** detections are infrequent these days. Among the few reports that reflect this species' scarcity were one at Leonard's Pond, Rockingham 10 Apr (KF) and

5-6 May (m. obs.); 3 near Broadway, Rockingham 15 May (DH); one in Rockbridge 20 May (DM); one at Blandy 23–28 May (m. obs.) with 2 there 30–31 May (DC); one in Maurertown, Shenandoah 30 May (DH); and one in Bath 31 May (JSp et al.). Horned Grebe observations included 11 at Claytor L., Pulaski 2-3 Apr (MM); 16 at Carvins Cove, Botetourt 2 Apr (BE); 19 in Staunton 2 Apr (PW); 20 at L. Frederick, Frederick 2 Apr (DC); 40 in Clarke 2 Apr (DC); 72 at Stuarts Draft, Augusta 2 Apr (EC); 25 at Willow L., Rockbridge 3 Apr (KK); 15 at L. Holiday, Frederick 3 Apr (GR); and 19 at L. Arrowhead, Page 19 Apr (JF). A **Red-necked Grebe** was seen in *Clarke* 4 May (JL) and an **EARED GREBE** was found at Carvins Cove, Botetourt 9 Mar (BE, MJ). A Virginia Rail was at Abrams Cr. Wetland Preserve, Frederick 26 Apr (JF). Elsewhere, one was at Gala Wetlands, Botetourt 28-29 Apr (KD, BE, BK), one was in Blacksburg 19 May (RM), and one to 5 were at Stuarts Draft, Augusta 21 Apr-22 May (m. obs.). **Sora** records included one to 5 at Stuarts Draft, Augusta 21 Apr-24 May (m.obs.), one at Bent Mt., Roanoke 23 Apr (JD, KD), one in Blacksburg 22, 29 Apr and 5 May (RM), and one at the Gala Wetlands, *Botetourt* 28–29 Apr (KD, BE, BK). A Common Gallinule was observed in Staunton 27 Apr (AL, PW). Two AMERICAN AVOCETS were seen at L. Holiday, Frederick 5 May (GR, NR). A Black-bellied Plover was found near Dublin, Pulaski 5 May (AK, CK). Semipalmated Plover reports included 4 in Rockingham 13 May (BB, VL), 2 at RSTP 15 May (PL), 4 in Frederick 21 May (SM), and 5 in Rockingham 23 May (MG). An **Upland Sandpiper** found near Swoope 31 Mar (BWr) was Augusta's 5th spring record and set a new early date for the county. A flock of 57 WHIMBRELS was photographed at the Rockfish Gap Hawkwatch, Augusta/Nelson 20 May (JDy et al.). Dunlin reports included 3 at Leonard's Pond, Rockingham 1 May (VL, GM); one in Bridgewater, Rockingham (HS) and one at Oakwood Dr., *Rockingham* 5 May (DL, WL, ph. GMo); one at Cook's Cr. Rd. Pond, Rockingham 11 May (CT); and one in *Frederick* 14–16 May (DG). There were 5 **Least** Sandpipers at Smithleigh L., Augusta 9 May (m. obs.), 10 in Rockingham 12 May (DL), 9 at Nazarene Church 13 May, 4 at RSTP 15 May (PL), and 4 in Frederick 21 May (SM). A White-rumped Sandpiper was in *Rockingham* 9-13 May (ph. m. obs.); another was at Nazarene Church 15 May (GMo), and one was near New Market, Rockingham 23 May (MG). Pectoral Sandpipers were noted as follows: one in Shenandoah 17 Mar (DH); one in Rockingham 2 Apr (MG); 2 in Rockingham 14 Apr (m.

obs.); one at Smithleigh L., Augusta 3 May (JR et al.); 3 in Rockingham 10 May (WL); and one at Nazarene Church 13 May (DL). The single-day **Semipalmated Sandpiper** high count total was 22 in Rockingham 23 May with 5 near New Market and 17 near Dayton (MG). A Short-billed **Dowitcher** was seen at Swoope, *Augusta* 1 May (VL, GM), and one was in Rockingham 12 May (MG, DH). There were many reports of **Spotted Sandpipers** this season; higher tallies included 7 at L. Shenandoah, Rockingham 1 May (CKy), 6 at Smithleigh L., Augusta 9 May (m. obs.), 9 at RSTP 11 May (KD), and 9 at Abrams Cr. Wetland Preserve, *Frederick* 17 May (DC). The following **Solitary** Sandpiper counts were noteworthy: 16 near Dublin, Pulaski 21 Apr (AK, CK); 22 at Blandy 30 Apr (DC); 13 at Gala Wetlands, Botetourt 3 May (GR); and 19 at RSTP 5 May (KD). Peak **Lesser Yellowleg** totals included 8 at RSTP 18 Apr (KD); 11 in Rockingham 27 Apr (DH); 6 at Blandy 30 Apr (DC); and more than 35 among several locations in Augusta 1 May (VL, GM, EO). Two **WILLETS** were found at Gala Wetlands, Botetourt 28 Apr (BE, BK) and 2 in Montgomery 29 Apr (DW). High counts of **Greater Yellowlegs** included 14 in *Pulaski* 8 Apr (GR), 9 in Rockingham 27 Apr (DH), 17 at Swoope, Augusta 1 May (VL, GM), and 7 at L. Arnold, *Clarke* 29 Apr (AN). A **RED-NECKED PHALAROPE** was photographed on the New R., Montgomery 19 May (LR, JS).

#### **GULLS-DICKCISSEL**

There were 92 Bonaparte's Gulls at Stuarts Draft, Augusta (PW) and 36 on L. Shenandoah, Rockingham 2 Apr (MG, DL). Additional counts had 66 at Claytor L., Pulaski 3 Apr (MM), 38 in Radford 8 Apr (CK), 50 at L. Holiday, Frederick 11–12 Apr (GR), 35 in Giles 15 Apr (GRh), 41 in Montgomery 15 Apr (PL), and 62 at L. Frederick, Frederick 16 Apr (DC). A Laughing Gull was at Claytor L., Pulaski 18 May (ph. PL). Caspian Terns were reported as follows: one at Silver L., Rockingham (DL) and one at L. Shenandoah, Rockingham 2 Apr (MG) then 2 there 9 (GMo) & 19 Apr (MG); 4 at Willow L., Rockbridge 7 Apr (BE, MJ); 2 at Claytor L., Pulaski 3 Apr (TS); 3 at Claytor L., Pulaski 18 (MM) & 20 Apr (PL); 2 at Silver L., Rockingham 26 Apr (LY); and 2 at Swoope, Augusta 27 Apr (AL). Two **Common Terns** were at L. Moomaw, Bath 21 Apr with one there 3 May (PR). Two Forster's **Terns** were observed at Claytor L., *Pulaski* 31 Mar (MAb, JSm), 3 at L. Shenandoah, *Rockingham* 11 Apr (DH), 2 at Willow L., Rockbridge 16 Apr (JP), and 5 at L. Holiday, Frederick 10 May (GR). A Red-throated Loon was seen

and photographed at L. Holiday, Frederick 6-7 Apr (JF, GR, NR). Fifteen Common Loons were seen at Claytor L., Pulaski 1 Apr (PL, GRh, KZ), 6 at Carvins Cove, Botetourt 2 Apr (BE), 16 at L. Holiday, Frederick 3 Apr (GR), and 5 at Willow L. Rockbridge 9 Apr (LN, JP). Two ANHINGAS were found in Crimora, Augusta 14 May (AW), and one was photographed at Sunset View L., Augusta 25–26 May (EC, AL, VL). An AMERICAN WHITE PELICAN was observed at L. Holiday, *Frederick* 11 Apr (GR). Single **American Bitterns** were seen at Stuarts Draft, Augusta 21 Apr (AL, PW), Silver L., Rockingham 2 May (DH), and at Glen Alton, Giles 4 May (MS). Four to 5 Least Bitterns were heard and seen at Stuarts Draft, Augusta 22 May (AL) with 4 there 23 May (GM). A **SNOWY EGRET** was seen near Dublin, *Pulaski* 30 May (MB, SB) and a **CATTLE EGRET** was seen near Fishersville, Augusta 24 Apr (GM). A **SWALLOW-TAILED KITE** was photographed in Hollins, Roanoke 31 Mar (BJ, KJ), and one was seen in Augusta 5 May (EL, NL). A Mississippi Kite was observed at Weyers Cave, Augusta 13 May (BB, VL, BM), and one was at Hillandale Pk., Harrisonburg 19 May (DH). A Sharp-shinned Hawk pair was near a partially constructed nest in *Rockingham* 28 Apr; one was beside that nest 12 May (ph. MG). A Red-shouldered Hawk nest with 3 young was found in Montgomery 11 May (ph. RM). A **Brown Creeper** was seen feeding young in Poverty Hollow, Montgomery 13 May (RM). Seven Red Crossbills were seen in Poverty Hollow, Montgomery 15 Apr (RM), 4 at Paddy Knob, *Highland* 13 May (BB, VL), and 4 in Highland 27 May (JR, JSp). There were also several reports from the Briery Branch Gap area, Rockingham, including six 3 Mar (WL), fourteen 10 May (JP), and seven 26 May (NA, SS). There were many reports of Pine Siskins with numbers less than 10, but reports of twentysix 1 Apr and thirty 9 Apr at L. Holiday, Frederick (GR) were the exception. An American Tree Sparrow was seen in Augusta 6 Mar (EC), and one was at Third Winchester Battlefield, Frederick 13 (BW) & 14 Apr (ph. JF). A Claycolored Sparrow was in Blacksburg 22–24 Apr (ph. m. obs.) and 5 May (RM). A Lark Sparrow, continuing from November, was photographed near Riner, *Montgomery* 1 Apr (PL, GRh, KZ). **Vesper Sparrow** sightings included one in Augusta 22 Mar (GM); one in Rockingham 30–31 Mar and 6 Apr (MG); 3 at Blandy 30 Mar (DC) and 6 Apr (DB); 2 to 5 in Montgomery 31 Mar-14 Apr (m. obs.); one in *Rockbridge* 9 Apr (LN); 2 at Third Winchester Battlefield, Frederick 13 Apr (BW); one in Pulaski 13 Apr (SH); and, one in Winchester 14 Apr (JF). Nineteen **Rusty** 

Blackbirds were in Stuarts Draft, Augusta 7 Apr (BT) and 16 in Radford 7 Apr (CK). Reports of Golden-winged **Warbler** were one near Mountain L., *Giles* 5, 20 & 26 May (m. obs.); one at Monterey, Highland 6 May (ME); 2 in Blue Grass Valley, Highland 9 & 26 May (m. obs.); and 4 in Highland 13 May (BB, VL), then 5 there 29 May (PH, DLb). Sightings of Blue-winged Warblers included one in Clarke 1 May (SBr); singles at Humpback Rock Visitor Center, Augusta (EL, NL); Paul SF, Rockingham, (WL, GMo) and near Zepp, Shenandoah 3 May (ET); one at Hillandale Pk., Harrisonburg 3 & 8 May (m. obs.); one near Toms Brook, Shenandoah (ET); and one in Staunton 5 May (AL); 2 at Natural Bridge SP, Rockbridge 10 (KD, BWt), 14 (JP) & 20 May (DM); and, one at Garden Mt., Botetourt 20 May (ABo). Prothonotary Warbler observations were one in Shenandoah 15 Apr (DD); one at L. Shenandoah, Rockingham 22 (DY, JY, LY) & 26 Apr (JSh); one at Wildwood Pk., Rockingham 23 Apr (m. obs.); one at Crimora, Augusta 2 May (AW); 2 in Clarke 16 May (DC); one at Abrams Cr. Wetlands Preserve, Frederick 17 May (DC, JF); one at Glen Lyn Town Pk., Giles 17 May (JPh); one near New Market, Rockingham 23 May (MG); 2 in Warren 25 May (RK); one in Bridgewater, Rockingham 27 May (RS); and one at L. John, Warren 30 May (JF). Mourning Warbler reports included one at Paul SF, Rockingham 10 May (WL, GMo); one at Hillandale Pk., Harrisonburg 15 May (GMo); one at Augusta Springs, Augusta 27 May (AL, VL); and 3 at Sapling Ridge, Highland 29 May (m. obs.). A 3-egg Dickcissel nest was found near Blacksburg 27 May (RM). The nest contained 6 eggs 30 May. Other sightings included 4 birds in Augusta 15 (EO), 20 (NN), & 26 May (VL), and a maximum of 10 in *Rockingham* 28 May, including a f. carrying nesting material (MG).

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#### WATERFOWL-WARBLERS

A Ross's Goose was at Cavitt's Cr. Pk., *Tazewell* 1 Apr (ph. Anonymous). The **TRUMPETER SWAN** that was near Hansonville, *Russell* during the winter season was last reported there 3 Mar (ph. AD). A **Virginia Rail** was a surprise visitor to a parts trailer at a surface mine on Conaway Rd. in the Big Rock area of *Buchanan* 26 Mar (CB *fide* DO). An incapacitated **Purple Gallinule** was found on the road in Richlands, *Tazewell* 18 Apr (ph. KS *fide* JP). It was taken to a veterinarian in Lebanon, Virginia where it was stabilized before being transferred to the Southwest Virginia Wildlife Center in Roanoke. After making a full recovery it was returned to the wild (*fide* SG).

Two Sandhill Cranes were at Burke's Garden, Tazewell 6 Mar (DS). The highest reported Wilson's Snipe count was 51 at Spring Cr., Burke's Garden, Tazewell 30 Mar (ph. DS). A Great Egret was at Clear Cr. L., Bristol 2 Apr (RH) and one was at The Cove, Tazewell 4 Apr (ph. CD). A Golden Eagle was at Spring Cr., Burke's Garden, Tazewell 2 Apr (ph. WT). An Eastern Kingbird found on Good Hope Rd., Washington in the Virginia Breeding Bird Atlas 2 Abingdon SE Priority Block 11 Apr (RH) was well ahead of this species' Mountains and Valleys 20 Apr average arrival date and just shy of the 8 Apr extreme early date. A Loggerhead Shrike was discovered at a previously unreported site in Bland 29 May (DM). Forty Grasshopper Sparrows were tallied at Southern Gap Business Pk., Buchanan 19 May (CC). Breaks, Buchanan hosted 21 Rusty Blackbirds 4 Apr (DR). There were 4 Swainson's Warblers reported at Whitetop Laurel Fishing and Viewing Area, Grayson 25 May (RR, SR). A Mourning Warbler was video recorded on Compton Mt., Buchanan 15 May (RM)

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Amelia, Appomattox, Brunswick, Buckingham, Charlotte, Cumberland, Dinwiddie, Franklin, Greensville, Halifax, Henry, Lunenburg, Mecklenburg, Nottoway, Patrick, Pittsylvania, and Prince Edward counties; the cities/towns of Colonial Heights, Danville, Emporia, Martinsville, Petersburg, and South Boston

Numbers of many waterfowl species were low, though last season's surprising Brant lingered until late March near Crewe. A few unusual water birds appeared, highlighted by a Brown Booby at Kerr. A Snowy Egret and a Glossy Ibis were found the same day, 25 April, about 9km apart, though neither lingered. Low numbers of once-common species such as Northern Bobwhite and Common Nighthawk continued to disappoint observers, while songbird migration was mixed, with a few species appearing in encouraging numbers though others were scarce. Some songbirds, including several warbler species, are found more frequently in the western part of the Region along the Blue Ridge but seldom away from there, and that was the case again this season; a few exceptions are noted.

#### **GEESE-GREBES**

The Region's first **BRANT**, reported in the winter, lingered until 25 Mar in w. *Nottoway* (ph. AB, TJ, CMS).



Adam D'Onofrio photographed this Brant in *Nottoway* 3 Mar. Migrant **Northern Shovelers** were scarce, reported only in pairs in the narrow date range 4 Mar, at SRR (ADy, JDy, TS, ES), through 11 Mar, on the *Franklin* side of

Hales Ford Bridge, Smith Mt. L. (BE), and only at those locations. The only **American Wigeons** reported were 5 at Dick Cross WMA, Mecklenburg, 17 Mar (JB, AD, PG), and the only report of Northern Pintail was 2 at Palmer Pt., Kerr, Mecklenburg, 17 Mar (JB, AD, PG). A single male Redhead that lingered, perhaps injured, below Kerr Dam for much of the season was last reported 18 May (ph. AB) and was the only report for that species. A single Surf Scoter at SRR 3 Mar (TS, ES) was the only scoter reported, and Common Goldeneye was also reported only at SRR, from one on 4 Mar (TS, ES) to one on 15 Mar (ES), with a pair seen 13 Mar only (ADy, JDy, ES). A single Red-necked Grebe above the dam at Kerr 4 (TS, ES) & 11 Mar (PG), perhaps continuing at this location from the winter, was the only one reported. Unexpected, though not unprecedented at this location, a BROWN BOOBY visited Kerr Dam 31 Mar (m.obs.) & 1 Apr (ph. BE, MJ).

A **Snowy Egret** found 25 Apr near Crewe was a first for *Nottoway* (ph. AB, m.obs.) and our only spring report; it was on the Piedmont Geriatric Hospital property, the same

location as the Brant mentioned above. Prince Edward's second **Glossy Ibis** appeared the morning of 25 Apr at SRR (ph. ES, m.obs.) but apparently departed later that day.

#### **DOVES-FALCONS**

Eurasian Collared-Doves were reported from Crewe, Nottoway 29 Mar (MAn, TD) and 31 May (LA), and at Amelia Court House 22 Apr (MAm), but only from those (previously-known) locations. The only Common **Nighthawk** report was a group of 4 over Farmville, *Prince* Edward 9 May (ADy, JDy); few individuals of this species have been reported in the Region in recent years. The only **American Coots** reported were 3 on lower Kerr, 11 Mar (PG). A single molting **Dunlin** photographed at Dick Cross WMA, Mecklenburg 2 Apr (ph. NN) was the shorebird highlight for the season. Red-throated Loons were reported only from Kerr, in Mecklenburg; the maximum count was 3 seen from Palmer Pt. 17 Mar (JB, AD, PG) and the last report was one above the dam 2 Apr (NN). A Barn Owl near Randolph, Charlotte 16 Mar (ph. JB) was the first Regional record for some time. The only **Peregrine Falcon** noted was one seen over SRR 5 May (ES).

#### **WRENS-DICKCISSEL**

A Marsh Wren was found and photographed below the dam at Bear Cr. L. SP, *Cumberland* 22 Apr (MAn, ph. NN) but not relocated; the species is a rare transient in the Region. The earliest **Veery** was found in se. *Prince Edward* on 2 May (ph. TS), one of only a handful of reports for that species, and the earliest **Swainson's Thrush** was also found 2 May at Boydton, *Mecklenburg* (ph. JB). **American Pipits** were reported only twice, both times from *Prince* 

Edward; 170 were found in the w. part of the county 24 Mar (ES), and 30 in the e. part of the county 7 Apr (TS). Both Purple Finches and Pine Siskins were present into mid-April in modest numbers at scattered locations in the Region (m.obs.). A Vesper Sparrow was at James R. SP, Buckingham 2 Apr (BB, ph. TB, DC), and another was in Farmville, Prince Edward 9 Apr (ES, ph. CMS); the species is a scarce migrant in the Region. A singing male Cerulean Warbler was at Banister R. WMA, Halifax, 29 Apr (PG), while single Canada Warblers were reported from Banister R. WMA, Halifax 6 May (PG), Wilck's L., Prince Edward 9 May (ES), and High Bridge Tr. SP, Farmville, Prince Edward 14 May (ES); both species are much more easily found in the Blue Ridge w. of this Region. Single Wilson's Warblers were at Boydton, Mecklenburg 6 May (JB), and Wilck's L., Prince Edward 9 May (ES), the only reports. The only Dickcissels found were a group of at least 5 along Swan Rd. in e. Appomattox beginning 8 May (ES) and remaining through the end of the season, apparently nesting.

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**Corrigenda:** In the previous winter report, two observers were credited using the initials JB. The **Ross's Goose** in *Cumberland* 27 Dec 2017 was found and photographed by Jessica Bowser, while the other winter reports attributed to JB should be credited to Jeff Blalock.



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Albemarle, Amherst, Bedford, Campbell, Caroline, Fluvanna, Goochland, Greene, Hanover, Louisa, Nelson, Orange, Powhatan, and Spotsylvania counties; the cities of Bedford, Charlottesville, Fredericksburg, and Lynchburg

This spring was very high in species diversity. After a somewhat slow and cold start migrants flooded in in the late part of April. The late part of the season was punctuated by rainstorms that brought several migrant fallouts, namely shorebirds. The Region saw higher densities of mainly midwestern migrants, such as Traill's Flycatchers and Black-billed Cuckoos. Highlight species for the period included Black-bellied Whistling-Duck, American White Pelican, Least Bittern, Black-bellied Plover, Red-necked Phalarope, Scissortailed Flycatcher, Loggerhead Shrike, Orange-crowned and Golden-winged warblers, and Clay-colored Sparrow.

#### WATERFOWL-NIGHTJARS

Seven Black-bellied Whistling-Ducks were found at L. Louisa, Louisa 26 May (ph. RyP, RiP) providing the first record for the Central Region! A Trumpeter Swan present at L. Albemarle, Albemarle 15 (ph. AC) thru 18 Apr was later relocated at Sugar Hollow Res., Albemarle 7 & 8 May (LM, ph. PM, DS). A Tundra Swan was late at Penicks Mill Rd., Bedford 25 Apr (ph. BE). Five Northern Pintails were observed flying up the James R. at Powhatan SP, Powhatan 25 Apr (BN, JR, LS, LB, MD). A f. Long-tailed Duck was found during a rainstorm at Ragged Mt. Natural Area, Albemarle 6 Apr (ph. DS, m. obs.) and a pair was later discovered at MCLP 17 Apr (ph. BE, m. obs.). Most spring occurrences of this species in the Region are weather related. A f. Common Goldeneye lingered from the winter period at the Georgia Pacific Settling Ponds, Bedford until 20 Apr (MS). A f. Common Merganser with 7 ducklings was observed at the Bedford Hydro Plant, Bedford 29 April (ph. BE, MJ). A pair and a single f. were observed on the Rivanna R. at Riverview Pk., Charlottesville 2 & 4 May (ph. MN) and another at the Rivanna Trail Holmes Av., Charlottesville

5 May (ph. WC), suggesting the possibility of nesting in the area. **Hooded Mergansers** nested again at King Family Vineyard, *Albemarle*, with a f. and 11 ducklings observed 11 Apr (PM). Four **Horned Grebes** were found at Chris Greene L., *Albemarle* 19 Apr (ph. PM). A high count of 3 **Black-billed Cuckoos** was very notable at Observatory Mt., *Albemarle* 7 May (PM, m. obs.). A **Chuck-will's-widow** was at Joshua Falls Rd., *Amherst* (BE). The usual breeding birds

in *Albemarle* at Secretary's Rd. returned 28 Apr and continued to the end of the period, and one returned to Blue Bell Ln., *Fluvanna*, 4 thru 16 May.

#### **RAILS-RAPTORS**

Two Virginia Rails were seen and heard at Hidden Swamp, Albemarle 30 Apr (ph. DS, PM). Also at Hidden Swamp were 2 Sora 30 Apr (DS, PM, JP) and another 16 May (BB, MN). Rainstorms 18 & 19 May brought a fallout of scarce shorebirds to Albemarle: 7 Black-bellied Plovers in a flooded field on Langhorne Rd.(ph.DS); a Semipalmated Plover on Langhorne Rd. 18 May (ph. DS, m. obs.) with 3 there 19 May (DS) and another at King Family Vineyard 19 May (GB); a Dunlin at Langhorne Rd. 18 May; and, 6 Semipalmated Sandpipers at Langhorne Rd. 18 May (DS, m. obs.); and one at King Family

Vineyard 19 May (PM, GeB). A **Red-necked Phalarope** was found at Penicks Mill Rd., *Bedford* 25 Apr (ph. BE) and another 26 May at Ryan's Pond, *Amherst* (ph. DMS, BE, MB). Both birds were associated with rainstorms.

Two Herring Gulls were spotted over Jefferson Pk. Av., Charlottesville 2 Apr (ph. BB, TB, DC) and another was at L. Louisa, *Louisa* 14 Apr (RiP, ReP). Rare transients in the Region, Caspian Tern reports included one at Kinloch L., *Goochland* 22 Apr (MA, NN), 4 at Virginia Episcopal School, Lynchburg 25 Apr (LA), and 2 at Chamberlayne Swamp, *Hanover* 26 Apr (CV). Very rare for the Region, a large flock of 9 or more American White Pelicans was seen soaring over Piney R. Trail, *Nelson* 12 Apr (ph. HM). Four American Bitterns were found at two locations, both in *Albemarle*: one was at Hidden Swamp 31 Mar (SM); one at King Family Vineyard 21 thru 23 Apr (ph. AC, m. obs.); and 2 more at Hidden Swamp 30 Apr (ph. PM, DS, JP).

The only report for the period, a **Least Bittern** was at Hidden Swamp, *Albemarle* 23 May (ph. BB, TB, DS). Rare for the Region, an imm. **Black-crowned Night-Heron** was found on the river at Alexander Berger Memorial Sanctuary, Fredericksburg 21 May (ph. AR). Remarkably, 2 **Mississippi Kites** were found; one migrating over Jones Mill Rd., *Albemarle* 29 Apr (PM) and one at Courthouse Rd., *Spotsylvania* 20 May (FA). The latter report was within breeding season for the species, but there are no confirmed breeding records in the Region.

#### FLYCATCHERS-DICKCISSEL

**Alder Flycatchers** were present well above average density: one was at Hidden Swamp, Albemarle 12 (audio recorded PM, DS) & 16 May (ph. ar. BB, MN); another was at Moore's Ck., Albemarle 20 May (ph. AR); 2 were detected at Tucker Pk., Goochland 17 May (audio recorded AR) & one there 19 May (audio recorded NN). Willow Flycatchers were also more abundant than usual, with totals of 7 in Charlottesville, 5 in Albemarle, and singles in Bedford, Hanover, Lynchburg and Spotsylvania. Extremely rare for the Region, a Scissor-tailed Flycatcher made a brief appearance at Phelps Rd., Bedford on May 20 (ph. JE.) A Loggerhead Shrike was present at Ambrose Rucker Rd., Amherst 1 thru 3 April (MH). Given the date, it seems likely this bird was a northbound migrant. Brown-headed Nuthatches continued to establish their foothold in the Region, with reports from Bedford, Hanover, Louisa, and Powhatan. A Winter Wren was found singing on territory in SNP 15 May (ML). There were 3 Marsh Wren reports: one at James R. WMA, Nelson 29 Apr (ph. ES, TB, DC, PB, AB), 4 at Hidden Swamp, Albemarle 30 Apr (ph. PM, JP, DS), and one at Reusen's Dam, Lynchburg 1 May (ph. LA, GB). Rare in the spring period, Lincoln's Sparrows were found at Chancho Volante, Albemarle 22 Apr (PM) and

at Greenbrier Pk., Charlottesville 7 May (ph. DC). Another rare spring transient, a Clay-colored Sparrow was found at Advance Mills Rd., Albemarle 8 Apr (ph. MyA, ph. JD, ph. BD). Thirty-four species of wood-warblers were reported this period, including several notables. A Golden-winged Warbler was at Mint Springs Valley Pk., Albemarle 3 May (AC). There were 3 Orange-crowned Warblers reported: one continued from the winter period at a feeder at Cove Trace., Albemarle until 9 Mar (ph. PM); another was at Riverview Pk., Charlottesville 17 Mar (ph. MS); and one continuing at Georgia Pacific Settling Ponds, Bedford 8 Apr (LA). Transient Mourning Warblers were found at RVT 16 Apr (ph. AR) and at Pedlar R. Res., Amherst 28 May (MH). Dickcissels were again found widely in the Region this year. Up to 5 were at Phelps Rd., Bedford 14 thru 21 May (m.

obs.), one along Grasty Ln., *Orange* 15 (ph. AR) thru 20 (LR,JS) May, and one at River Rd., *Goochland* 17 May (AR).

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Temperatures in the Region hovered between average and slightly above average for the duration of the spring, while precipitation was slightly below average in March and April, then slightly above in May. Although the average temperature ultimately wasn't significantly different from historical norms, things were somewhat slow to warm up in March, with several days recording low temperatures in the 20s including an overall low for the Williamsburg area of 25°F recorded 17 Mar. While temperatures were slow to rise, by early May things were much warmer and several days peaked in the low 90s, with a high for the Williamsburg area of 92 °F recorded 12 May. In terms of avifauna, this spring proved to be good for Anhinga in the Region, with a number of reports widely scattered across the area. Black-bellied Whistling-Ducks also turned up in multiple places. The undisputed highlight of the spring was a completely unexpected Brown Booby seen on the James R. Other rarities and highlights included Swallow-tailed Kite and Snowy Owl.

#### **DUCKS-CRANES**

While even a single **Black-bellied Whistling-Duck** is a notable occurrence in the Region, an amazing count of 18 was at Temple L., Colonial Heights 15 May (JG). The

birds were relocated later that day at the nearby Walmart Ponds, Colonial Heights with a revised count of 19 birds (ph. LB, m. obs.). Three Black-bellied Whistling-Ducks were also spotted on a drainage pond on Barnes Church Circle, Southampton 30 May (ph. BR). A Ross's Goose was at Hog 4 Mar (ph. JS, LR) and lingered through at least 10 Mar (ph. NB). This may have been the same individual that was later seen from College Cr., James City 15 Mar (ph. NB, BT) flying north with a group of Canada Geese. One of the more unusual sightings of the spring was an apparent hybrid Mallard × Northern Pintail on Turkey Is. Rd., Henrico 3 Mar (ph. AB). A pair of Northern Shovelers lingered at the Walmart Ponds, Colonial Heights through at least 17 Mar (JFr). Other lingering waterfowl in the Region included 8 Ring-necked Ducks on Swift Cr. Res. viewed from the pull-off on Genito Rd., Chesterfield 5 Mar (EO); a single Ring-necked Duck at a pond on Old Wagner Rd., Petersburg 12 May (JS, LR); 9 Buffleheads at the Felgates Cr. pull-off of the Colonial Parkway, York 20 Apr (NN); and 3 Ruddy Ducks seen from two vantage points at Swift Cr. Res., Chesterfield 5 Mar (EO). Still more notable was an imm. m. Long-tailed Duck at Hog 6 Mar (ph. AD), an irregular species that far up the James R. A single Common Nighthawk, an uncommon transient on the Lower Peninsula, was at Yorktown, York 11 May (NK). The vanguard of arriving Ruby-throated Hummingbirds included a few slightly early birds at Kingsmill, James City (CJ, SM) and at Shady Bluff Pt., York 4 Apr (LL), and a home on Laburnum Ave., Richmond 10 Apr (EO). Three Sandhill Cranes were observed flying ne. past College Cr., James City 1 May (MB, ph. NB, BT, BW), while another bird was seen on the ground at York River SP, James City 15 May (ph. JG), providing a 6th local record.

#### PLOVERS-PELICANS

American Golden-Plover, though a regular transient, is often infrequently detected, so a flock of 14 at Richmond Airport, *Henrico* 11 Apr (KB) was a good record. The earliest report of Solitary Sandpiper for the Region this spring was a bird at Beaver L. Trail, *Chesterfield* 8 Apr (ph. ZG). A Willet of undetermined subspecies was at Hog 23 May (NN), just barely missing the local late date of 24 May. A Bonaparte's Gull at the Jamestown-Scotland Ferry, *James City* 23 May set a new local late date (ph. NN). An Iceland Gull, possibly an ad., was seen off Jamestown Is., *James City* 23 Mar (EM, ph. BT), providing the 5th local record. This bird or another was subsequently reported from the same area, viewed from James R. Beach Pk., *James City* 3

Apr (ph. JU). Two **Black Skimmers** were at Hog 23 May (ph. NN), one of only a few records from that location and a new local early date. Without doubt the most stunning and unexpected record in the Region this spring was an ad. BROWN BOOBY that was photographed perching in a sycamore during one of Capt. Mike Ostrander's boat tours of Jones Neck, Henrico 2 Apr (MO, BS, ph. ML, JL). This spring proved to be phenomenal for **Anhingas** locally, with reports from several counties scattered across the Region. The highest count was a group of 19 observed flying overhead at the intersection of Forge Rd. and Little Creek Dam Rd., James City 28 Apr (ph. SP). Elsewhere, notable counts included 15 at Dutch Gap 6 May (ph. LA, JF, et al.), and 11 at Harwood's Mill Reservoir, York 14 May (DY). At least 3 were still present at Harwood's Mill as late as 21 May (GM), and this location has had breeding records in past years. Smaller counts of Anhingas included 6 near Walker's Dam on the New Kent/James City border 22 Apr (MB, BWa), 8 over Hog 2 May (BW), 4 (2 m. and 2 f.) on Davis Pond, New Kent 7 May (SB), and one flying over New Quarter Pk., York 15 May (JL et al.). A single Anhinga was also seen at Carson Wetlands, Prince George 15 Apr (MA, ph. AR). This spot has hosted breeding Anhingas for several years, and reports of birds at this location, including higher counts, continued into the summer. As has been the case for most recent years, American White Pelicans were present at Hog this spring in varying numbers. The first report was 4 at Hog 4 Mar (ph. JS, LR), and reports continued through 23 May including a high count of 69 there 24 Mar (JS, EM).

#### **EGRETS-WAXWINGS**

**Cattle Egrets**, often a sporadic visitor to the Region, were reported on multiple occasions. The first record of the season was a single bird at Gospel Spreading Farm, James City 6 (ph. BW) & 7 Apr (ph. MA, NN). One was also observed there 9 May (BT). There was also one at Mainland Farm, James City 4 May (ph. BW), which was joined by a second bird 6 May (HB, MB, ph. MA). A **SWALLOW-TAILED KITE** passed over the James R. from *Surry* to *James City* 10 May (NB), providing only the 5th local record. Mississippi Kites are occasionally recorded in the Region as migrants, but this spring saw multiple reports. One was over Cedar Grove Cemetery, Williamsburg 7 May (ph. NN); one was at Powhatan Cr. Pk., James City 9 May (JA); one was at College Cr., James City 12 May (BT); and one was at an unspecified location in New Kent 19 May (AB). A Snowy **Owl** was at Richmond Airport, *Henrico* 11 Apr (ph. KB),

providing a nice coda to the minor influx in the state during the winter. The first Eastern Kingbird report from the Region, notably early, was from a farm field on Three Creeks Rd., Southampton 8 Apr (ph. MA). Warbling Vireo is typically a very scarce species in the Region, but this spring saw two reports including one in Windsor Forest, James City 9 May (AM) and one at York R. SP, James City 14 May (NB). Among the lingering winter passerines, a Winter Wren put in an appearance at James R. Pk.—Reedy Cr., Richmond 21 Apr (LB). There were also a few late-staying Golden-crowned Kinglets in the Region, with reports from James R. Pk.—The Wetlands, Richmond 17 Apr (JSh) and Chesdin Rd., Chesterfield 19 Apr (BP). An amazing count of 490 Cedar Waxwings on the College of William & Mary campus, Williamsburg 24 Mar (MEH) was a new local high count.

#### SPARROWS-DICKCISSELS

A Clay-colored Sparrow in the Marlbank neighborhood, *York* 2 May (ph. PW) provided only the 4th local record.



Dark-eyed Juncos lingered as late as 17 May at New Quarter Pk., York (JL, SM). Boat-tailed Grackles are highly localized in the Region, and a record of one from Bay Tree Beach Rd., York 18 Apr (JS) was one of the few for that county away from the Goodwin Is. The earliest report of Worm-eating Warbler came from Cannon Cr. Greenway, Richmond 15 Apr (BN), while another report from Bassett Hall Nature Trail, Williamsburg 19–20 Apr (ph. NB) edged out the previous local early date of 23 Apr for the Colonial Historic Triangle. Golden-winged Warbler, though annual as a migrant in the Region, typically passes through in very

low densities and is often quite difficult to detect, so sightings in migration are always special. This spring, there were two reports, including one from James R. Pk.—The Wetlands, Richmond 29 Apr (ph. AB) and a second from North Bank City Pk., Richmond 1 May (MV). An early Hooded Warbler was reported from Spring Hill Pond, Sussex 7 Apr (CN). A very early Yellow-throated Warbler was seen at an unspecified location in Hopewell 3 Mar (ph. AB). Prairie Warblers also arrived slightly early, with records from York R. SP, James City 2 Apr (m. obs.) and the same day at College Cr., James City (BT). Both records were just one day ahead of the previous local early date, 3 Apr. Other early passerine sightings included a Summer Tanager at Old Forty Rd., Sussex 12 Apr (JS). The long-staying Western Tanager at a feeder in Settler's Mill, James City was present through 18 Mar (BW). A second m. Western Tanager at Linden Ln., James City, which had been observed since Nov, hung around through 5 Apr (DC). Two Painted Buntings were present in the Region this spring. A m. visited a home in Rushmere, Isle of Wight 11-16 Mar (RJ), while a second m. that had been present at a residence on Penniman Rd., York since 10 Feb continued through 20 Apr (ph. MW fide DC). A good count of 4 Dickcissels was reported from an unspecified location in Charles City 19 May (AB).

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Essex, Gloucester, King and Queen, King George, King William, Lancaster, Mathews, Middlesex, Northumberland, Richmond, and Westmoreland counties

A total of 228 species was recorded this spring, which is about three species above average for recent springs. Highlights were a Mississippi Kite, 2 separate Sandhill Cranes, a new Regional high count of Black Skimmers, Nelson's Sparrows, Western Tanager, and many Dickcissels.

Data was sourced from the Virginia Birds listserv, eBird\*, NNASnet (Northern Neck Audubon Society listserv), and the Gold Book.

#### WATERFOWL-RAPTORS

A group of 5 Snow Geese was seen resting on a sandbar at Washington's Birthplace 18 Mar, which is typically the last week of this species' push through the Region (LW). A large flock of 225 Brant off Heron Pt. Rd., Gloucester 1 Mar (JS) set a new high count for the Region in eBird. An impressive count of 160 Wood Ducks was tallied on a trip along Dragon Run near Mascot, Middlesex 19 Mar (JW). A pair of Long-tailed Ducks was seen off Hughlett Pt. 3 Apr, which is the latest eBird record for the Region by two days, although it falls well short of the Gold Book late date of 15 Apr (MA, NN). The latest **Buffleheads** of the season were 2 reported 5 May near Reedville, Northumberland (ph. BF). A kayak trip to the barrier island east of Onemo, Mathews 20 May yielded a lingering Red-breasted Merganser (MS). Associating with the aforementioned Buffleheads 5 May near Reedville, was a late group of 7

Ruddy Ducks, a species that lingers most years into early May, however it is still of note so far past that species' peak (ph. BF). Northern Bobwhites were reported from all 11 counties except Middlesex with a maximum of 12 from a private farm along the Rappahannock R. near Chance 28 Apr (JCoo, HC, LF, E&SD); this is a promising showing for a species that has been generally in decline for many years. The first Ruby-throated Hummingbird of the year was found 3 Apr at a private home near Topping, Middlesex, which is nearly a week earlier than the average date of 10 Apr of the past 5 years (CNe). A Virginia Rail was heard grunting from a marsh at West Point, King William 10 Mar (TD), suggesting that it may have wintered in the area as it was found before the main movement of this species. The Middle Peninsula has only one previous record of Sandhill Crane from Gloucester, noted in the Gold Book with no specific sighting information, so the well photographed individual along Tidewater Tr., Middlesex, was an exciting find 20 May (ph. LA). A second Sandhill Crane, possibly the same bird based on its close proximity to the other individual, made the local newspaper after being spotted across from Montague's Farm on Rt. 17 near Laneview, Essex 16 May (ph. CG, MB). Additionally, Hughlett Pt. hosted 3 Black-necked Stilts 23 Apr (ph. JD), which ties the previous high count for the Region from a flooded field off Ditch Bank Rd., Gloucester 4 May 2015 (JS). This spring showed a record number of American Oystercatcher reports from the Northern Neck, where this species is generally an uncommon spring and summer visitor: 2 from a private yard in Palmer, Lancaster 3 Mar (JCok); 2 at Dameron 9 Apr (HC); 4 at Hughlett Pt. 23 Apr (JD); and a single at Dameron 27 May (GR). A flooded field off Ditch Bank Rd., Gloucester hosted a mixed flock of shorebirds for just over two weeks at the end of May, with the highlight being 3 White-rumped Sandpipers 28 May (ph. NN) and a high count of 85 Semipalmated Sandpipers 30 May (JS). An impressive count of 128 Wilson's Snipe 31 Mar at a private location near Elsing Green, King William, along the Pamunkey R., constituted a new eBird high count for the Region (FA). At the same location and date, 106 Lesser Yellowlegs also established a new eBird high count for the Region (FA). Naylor's Beach, Richmond, hosted 3 late **Bonaparte's Gulls** 21 May (GR); this eclipses the previous eBird late date for the Region 20 May 2012 (FA) by one day. A new Regional high count of Black Skimmers was established in dramatic fashion with 93 seen from a kayak on a barrier island south of Bethel near Onemo, Mathews 27 May (MS). The observer noted that they appeared not to be nesting at the time. The previous high count for this species was 32 at Bethel 3 Aug 2016 (EO). Additionally, the first eBird record for Lancaster was of 3 individuals seen 29 May at Windmill Pt. (GR). A Red-throated Loon seen from The Pocket, King William 10 Mar represents the furthest upriver sighting for this species on the York R. and its tributaries by nearly 20 mi. (TD). At the Rt. 360 Bridge, Essex, a single Brown Pelican 10 May marked the only notable upriver appearance of this species in the Region (MA). A steady stream of "hundreds" of Northern Gannets was noted during the last week of Mar from Bluff Pt., Colonial Beach, Westmoreland (BWa). Additionally, hundreds more Northern Gannets were seen 1 Apr near Callao on the Yeocomico R. and Potomac R., Westmoreland (MW, PW). An American Bittern, possibly chased by a different individual, was seen 20 May at a private location in Leedstown, Westmoreland (FA), which is the final day of the expected window for this species in the Coastal Plain according to the Gold Book. Cattle Egrets were discovered at two locations this spring, with 2 at Hopyard Farm, King George 20–21 Apr (SB) and a single individual along Strangeway Rd., Richmond 15 May where it represented a first county record in eBird (ph. GR). A Black-crowned **Night-Heron** in *Gloucester* near Severn 11 May (HC) was one of only a handful of spring records for the Region. A Glossy Ibis at a private location near Sealston, King George 14 Apr (ph. FA) was one few spring records from the nw. portion of the Region; however, a pattern of midand late Apr sightings of this species in King George and Westmoreland seems to be emerging. At Bowlers Wharf, Essex, 3 Glossy Ibis were seen flying 25 Apr (MC, JCok). A Mississippi Kite, only the fourth eBird record for the Region, was spotted during a VBBA2 point count s. of Rt. 30 between West Point and King William, King William 17 May (BN). This species has increased dramatically over the past few years in the state and may be regular in parts of the Region, although no nests or patterns have yet been

discovered. The only **Broad-winged Hawk** of the season was seen 7 May at Land's End WMA, King George (PJ). Continuing from this winter, a **Snowy Owl** was last seen at West Point, King William 8 Mar (ph. NG). Transmitter data from a Snowy Owl named "Lenape" indicated that the imm. m. spent a few minutes at the southern tip of New Point Comfort NAP, Mathews, around 9:04pm 7 Mar before continuing to Northampton, n. of Cape Charles (Project Snowstorm). These were apparently the first spring records for the Region, however, both fell well within the 3 Apr extreme date for the Coastal Plain. The Rt. 360 Bridge at Tappahannock, Essex hosted 2 Peregrine Falcons 22 Apr suggesting the possibility of breeding, which has occurred there since at least 2015 (EO). Additionally, a single individual was seen less than a mile west of Dameron 17 Mar (CA, JCok, MC), an uncommon sight along the bayside coast of the Northern Neck.

#### FLYCATCHERS-DICKCISSEL

Willow Flycatchers were reported on two occasions this spring, 26 May along Rt. 632 near James Monroe Birthplace, Westmoreland (BH) and at Fithians Ln., Westmoreland 16 May (ph. GR). A Least Flycatcher was found at Greenpoint Landing, Westmoreland 16 May (GR). Common Ravens continued to cement their presence in the extreme nw. corner of the Region with 2 seen at a private location near Sealston, King George 14 Apr (FA). A small group of 3 **Cliff Swallows** was seen investigating probable nest sites underneath the Newland Rd. Bridge over Cat Pt. Cr., Richmond 15 May (GR); this would be a first breeding record for the county if confirmed. A Marsh Wren was audio recorded singing from a marsh in West Point, King William 22 Apr, which is within the VBBA2 expected breeding dates (CNo). Whether or not this bird stayed to breed is unknown; however, such a breeding record would be without precedent in this part of the Region. A single Pine Siskin lingered until 9 May at a feeder in Vir-mar Beach, Northumberland, well after the rest of its kind had left the residence; the individual was noted as looking unhealthy (E&SD). Perhaps one of the most exciting records was 2 singing Nelson's Sparrows at Dameron 27 May (GR). Although this record is quite late, there is precedent for singing migrants of this species lingering through the end of the month; the Gold Book extreme date for this species is listed as 8 Jun. A late White-throated Sparrow was heard singing from Mt. Holly Rd., Westmoreland 21 May (GR). The high count of **Rusty Blackbirds** for the season was 18 off Custis Millpond Road, King William 21 Apr (BWi),

which is about average for the past five years. Overall, occurrences of this species are consistent in number and quantity with other recent years, hopefully suggesting that this species' decline has leveled off. Approximately average for the past 5 years, 27 warbler species were reported this spring. Highlights included 3 separate Orange-crowned Warblers, with one banded bird seen at Wilna 4 Mar (AW), one at Tayloe 3 Mar (MD), and an exceptionally drab individual at West Point, *King William* 10 Mar (TD); **Kentucky Warblers** seen in 8 of 11 counties in the Region, a new high mark for the spring season, with a maximum of 2 from Poor Jack Farm, Westmoreland 16 May (GR); a singing Blackburnian Warbler near Sassafras, Gloucester 13 May (EB); and 2 Wilson's Warblers at Norwood Rd. Bridge, King and Queen 5 May (JCok, MC) and one at Wellford 6 May (JCok, MC). The star of the spring was an ad. m. Western Tanager that frequented a private feeder near Topping, Middlesex 19 Apr to 6 May (ph. CNe). It proved to be another productive spring for Dickcissels with multiple individuals from 6 sites in Westmoreland, Northumberland, Lancaster, and King William. The maximum number came from a weedy field off Dabneys Mill Rd. near Manquin, King William, which hosted over

a dozen birds 20 May (BN). In *Lancaster*, a single bird was found along Field Trial Rd. near Alfonso 15 May (JCoo), a number which grew to a maximum of 4 by 28 May (JCok, MC, GR). In *Northumberland*, 3 m. were flying in large loops around 2 f. while singing aggressively at Palmer Dr. w. of Harryhogan 26 May, suggesting a breeding attempt. (ph. GR), and 4 were seen at Kingscote Dr., also 26 May (GR). A single Dickcissel was found off Vault Field Rd., *Westmoreland* 22 May (GR). Further w. in *Westmoreland*, 2 m. were singing in Leedstown 20 May (ph. FA).

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Accomack and Northampton counties; Chesapeake Bay Bridge Tunnel; Pelagic area; the cities/towns of Cape Charles, Chesapeake, Chincoteague, Hampton, Newport News, Norfolk, Poquoson, Portsmouth, Suffolk, and Virginia Beach

The March lion roared over the mid-Atlantic 2–3 March with sustained high winds and rain. An uneventful April was succeeded by the warmest and 8th wettest May on record, a month that saw 27 days of above average temperatures. Undeterred, if not more motivated by the season's weather perturbations and their zeal to pile in to Virginia Breeding Bird Atlas 2 efforts, birders documented numerous species-relevant early and late dates and even took time to put Eurasian Green-winged Teal, Western Grebe, Atlantic Puffins, Bar-tailed Godwit, Black-capped Petrel, and Roseate Spoonbill in the record book.

#### WATERFOWL-ALCIDS

One each Ross's Goose and Cackling Goose were at the Oyster/Cheriton Landfill, Northampton 19 Mar (ph. ESB). A **Tundra Swan** was at Back Bay 19 May (ph. AB, TT) into the summer season (m. obs.). One to 2 m. Eurasian **Wigeons** continued at Chinc. to at least 10 Mar (OM). The m. at L. Joyce /Shore Dr., Virginia Beach, present through 26 Mar (m. obs.), was accompanied by a f. 18 Mar (KS). A m. **EURASIAN GREEN-WINGED TEAL** was at Craney 8 Mar (LS, BT, BW, ph. DY) through 5 Apr (ph. BT, LS). A Harlequin Duck was seen from the CBBT fourth island 30 Mar (CB, CP). A **Red-necked Grebe** was at Ft., Monroe, Hampton 3 Mar (ph. BB, SB). The total of 6 recorded 6 Mar included 2 off the CBBT (AD, JD, ES, TS), 2 at Rudee and 2 at Little Is. (AB). Subsequent reports noted one at Little Is. 10 Mar (AB, TT), 4 at Rudee 16 Mar (AB), and, on 3 Apr, one in Fisherman's Inlet, Northampton (ESB) and 2 at Rudee (AB). A **WESTERN GREBE** was off Assawoman Is., Accomack 17 Mar (ph. ESB); another hastened birders to Horn Pt. Rd., Virginia Beach 6 (ph. K&TB, ph. KL et al.) through 15 Apr (ph. m. obs.). A Black-billed Cuckoo was in the CCCHNAP 21 May (ESB). The season's Common Nighthawk portfolio had 2 at Craney 10 May; one at Deep Cr., Accomack 12 May (SS); 2 near Woodhouse Corner, Virginia Beach 14 May (K&TB); one at Craney 17 May (AM, BT, BW, DY); one at Weyanoke Sanctuary 16 (DSI) & 17 (AB, TT) May; one in Cape Charles 22 May (ESB); and one in Chincoteague, Accomack 23 May (JM). A Chuck-will's-widow was a surprise find at Marsh View Pk., Virginia Beach 30 Mar (AB, ph. RBi, ph. MCM). Three Eastern Whip-poor-wills were heard at Brownsville Seaside Farm, Northampton 28 Apr (AP) followed by one there 4 May (KK). Common Gallinules were reported at Whitehurst 15 Apr (2) (ph. RBi) through 27 May (one) (RBi); one was at Back Bay 14-24 May (ph. m. obs.). A Sandhill Crane was in Locustville, Accomack 18 Mar (ph. ESB, ph. LG, ph. JE) through 3 Apr (ph. SB, ph. VK). The Gold Book's extreme early for Black-necked Stilt is 5 Apr, so one at Chinc. 31 Mar (DS) was a record setter. Subsequently, 2 were at Craney 12 Apr (LS et al.); one to 2 were at Messick, Poquoson 27 Apr (one)(MN) through 5 May (2) (ph. CK); 4 were at Chinc. 30 Apr (J&HL), and one was at Back Bay 25 (BA, RBi) & 26 (SM) May. Season high counts were 14 from the Queen Sound Channel area, Accomack 25 May (DH) and 67 at Craney 31 May (LS, BT, BW,DY). A pair incubating 10 May (AM,BT,ph. BW,DY) established the state's earliest recorded Black-necked Stilt nesting record. The season's highest American Avocet count was 182 at Craney 8 Mar (LS, BT, DY, BW). Elsewhere, one was at Back Bay 15 Mar (DH, LS, DW, TW), one was at Chinc. 22 Mar (DR) with 2 there 30 Apr (CJ, DHr) and 6 were at Anderson Pk. in Newport News 13 Apr (ph. JS). Two Piping Plovers at First Landing 9 Mar (AWa) were six days ahead of the species' 15 Mar average arrival. The annual Whimbrel "leaving count" was conducted at Box Tree Marsh, Northampton 18-27 May. The count's 6815 total included a single-day high 2812 on 22 May (m. obs. fide AW). A "worn second-year BAR-TAILED GODWIT.... hurtled past" Chinc. 15 May (ph. ESB, J&HL). The bird was refound 22 May (ph. GM, CR) and chronicled by m. obs. through 28 May. The highest reported **Red Knot** count was 44 at Chinc. 23 May (JL). Gold Book wisdom cautions that "most [Western Sandpipers] apparently leave in mid-March". Therefore, one photographed (JM) at Long Cr./ Great Neck, Virginia Beach 16 May was an important data point. One "Western" Willet was at Messick, Poquoson 29 Mar (ph. DY). A quartet of **Long-billed Dowitchers** was at Chinc. 15 May (ESB). Four **Red-necked Phalaropes** were at Craney 24 May (AM, LS, BT, ph. BW); 6 were there 31 May (LS, BT, BW, DY); and one was on Ship Shoal Is., Northampton 30 May (ph. ZP, AW). Three Parasitic Jaegers passed Little Is. 17 Apr (AB); one was noted from that site 19 May (AB, TT). A Dovekie was blown to Chesconessex Schooner Bay, Accomack 2 Mar (ph. LG); another was off Little Is. 10 Mar (AB, TT). That same day 8 Razorbills were seen off Virginia Beach with a high count of 5 from Little Is. (AB, TT). A whale survey team tallied 18 **Atlantic Puffins** off *Northampton* 29 Apr (TP et al.).

#### **GULLS-DICKCISSEL**

A Black headed Gull continued at Rudee to 2 Mar (AB) and a late-departing Bonaparte's Gull was at First Landing 31 May (ph. JM). What was probably the same first-cycle Iceland Gull was recorded from 64th St., Virginia Beach 9 Mar (JSc) to 82nd St. 15 Mar (ph. RBi). An ad. was spotted in the 57th St. to 74th St. vicinity 10 & 11 Mar (ph. m. obs.). A first-cycle Iceland Gull was at PHP 13 Apr (ph. AB). The Region's only Black Tern report was of one at Chinc. 31 May (ph. LA, SSt). A Sandwich Tern on the HRBT 3 Apr (LS) reset the species' extreme early

date, formerly 10 Apr, by a week. A Black-capped Petrel was over Norfolk Canyon off Northampton 29 Apr (TP et al.). Anhinga reports included one to 3 at Stumpy L., Virginia Beach 2 Apr-5 May (m. obs.), one at West Neck Cr. Natural Area, Virginia Beach 19 Apr (ph. CB), one to 2 at NNP 13 (ph. AC) & 20 May (SSw); 3 over Dozier Middle School, Newport News 14 May (ph. AC); and one to 2 at Mariners' Museum Pk., Newport News 19 (ph. AC) & 21 May (ph. JS). Five American White Pelicans graced the skies above Shore Dr., Virginia Beach 28 Mar (AS); an even dozen were over Stumpy L., Virginia Beach 1 May (ph. RBi). A **Least Bittern** was at Back Bay 2 Apr (RW), thirteen days ahead of the species' 15 Apr average early date. A Green Heron at PHP 25 Mar (ph. NB) was well ahead of the species' 5 Apr average arrival. Equally exceptional was a Yellow-crowned Night-Heron at PHP 19 Mar (JeMa, BS); this species' typical arrival is 10 Apr. A ROSEATE SPOONBILL at Back Bay 31 May (ph. CB) was part of a broader movement of this species into Virginia that extended into June. A Swallow-tailed Kite was at Back Bay 31 Mar (ED). Subsequently, 2 were at Stony Run Athletic Complex, Newport News 1 May (GH, CJ), and singles were on the ESVNWR (KK) and at Dismal's Jericho Ditch (WF) 3 May, respectively. Mississippi Kites have become regular from late spring through summer in north central Virginia Beach, with breeding evidence there 2014–2017. The first this year was at White House Ln. 27 Apr (TT) where up to 3 were present 12 May. Nearby, singles were reported from Thoroughgood 14 (ph. ESB, SH) to 28 May (BBu, JmBu, JnBu) and in Kings Grant 15-24 May (M& RF). On the Eastern Shore, 2 were in Mogathy Bay/ESVNWR airspace 22 (GM) to 28 May (ph. RBi) and one (of these?) was at Magotha Rd., Northampton 30 May (LA). At least one of the Messick, Poquoson Shorteared Owls reported during the winter season was still on hand 4 Mar (AC). Single Great Crested Flycatchers in Dismal at Railroad Ditch (DS) and the Canal Trail (DG) 6 Apr edged out the Coastal Plain's previous extreme early date (7 Apr) by a day. An Eastern Kingbird was at Windsor Pt., Norfolk 1 Apr (DC); this species' Coastal Plain extreme early date is 27 Mar. A Loggerhead Shrike was at Mutton Hunk 5 (ph. JE) through 7 May (JM). A Warbling Vireo frequented Back Bay 6 (AB, ph. RBi, MC) through 11 May (m. obs.); another was on the ESVNWR 10 May (JW) and one was on MacKay 27 May (AB, TT). A **Cliff Swallow** at Back Bay Landing Rd., Virginia Beach 17 Apr (ph. RBi) was an unusual mid-spring outer Coastal Plain visitor. The currently acknowledged Bluegray Gnatcatcher average arrival date is 30 Mar. Thus, 2 at First Landing 10 Mar (EG) added another piece to this species' over-winterer/early migrant conundrum. A carefully assessed thrush in Weyanoke Sanctuary, Norfolk 14 (ESB) & 15 May (DG) proved to be a **BICKNELL'S**. The average late date for **American Pipit** is 25 Ap. Thus one at Back Bay 27 Apr (ph. EA, TC, BS) through 3 May (MP, ph. EA, TC) was noteworthy. Four **Pine Siskins** flew over Jericho Ditch, Dismal 27 Apr (NF). A Snow Bunting continued at KSP to at least 17 Mar (ph. JM). A pale-eyed Eastern Towhee (Pipilo erythrophthalmus alleni/rileyi) was near the same Back Bay area 19 May (ph. DC) that one was documented 28 May 2017 (ph. RBi). A Vesper Sparrow was off Grimstead Rd., Virginia Beach 17 Apr (ph. AB) and a **Lincoln's Sparrow** was at Wellington Neck, Northampton 29 Apr (RK). A f. Yellow-headed Blackbird was at Chesconessex Schooner Bay, Accomack 16 (ph. LG) to 19 Apr (VK); an ad. m. was at Back Bay 11 May (AB). A **Baltimore Oriole** was noted on Mackay 27 (AB,TT) & 31 May (JMa). An **Ovenbird** in West Neck Cr. Natural Area, Virginia Beach 29 Mar (ph. RBi) preceded the species' Gold Book 31 Mar Coastal Plain extreme early date by two days; one was at Marsh View Pk., Virginia Beach 30 Mar (AB). An **Orange-crowned Warbler** in the Oak Springs section of Virginia Beach through 28 Apr (ph. CPa) extended the species' extreme late date (formerly 25 Apr) by three days. A Prairie Warbler in Lago Mar, Virginia Beach 31 Mar (ph. MCM) may have wintered nearby. Two distinctly different Palm Warblers, one "Western" (MCM) and one, possibly "Yellow" (TT), were at Back Bay 10 May, five days beyond the species' typical 5 May late date. Three singing Black-throated Green Warblers, probably waynei, were in Dismal off Douglas Rd., Chesapeake 16 Mar (NF). The ad. f. **Western Tanager** that wintered at Harding Dr., Cheasapeake reappeared 15 Mar; it was last seen 7 Apr (ph. EM). Three additional reports for this species were a f. at Loch Haven Pk., Virginia Beach 5 Apr (ph. JSn); a f. at a feeder in Kempsville, Virginia Beach 22 Apr (ph. UD); and one that continued in the Alanton neighborhood, Virginia Beach to at least 24 Apr (MP). A Rose-breasted Grosbeak at Chinc. 24 May (DHo, LN, WR) was four days past the species' 20 May average late date. A m. Painted Bunting continued in Pungo, Virginia Beach to 11 Mar (ph. LH); 2 were off Glendale Ave, Chesapeake 21 Mar followed by one there 2 Apr (CA) and a f. was at Back Bay 2 May (ph. SM). A m. **Dickcissel** was at Mutton Hunk 7 May (JM); another was at Little Is. 23 May (TB) and a pair was at Magothy Bay 28 May (ph. RBi, NN).

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
