EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S WELCOME



Deepest gratitude to all of you gathering in Cincinnati, Ohio, for *Current*, the 57th annual conference of the National Council on Education for the Ceramic Arts (NCECA). Arrival here in 2023 represents the culmination of a long and circuitous journey filled with obstacles. Foreshadowed by a crisis of creative expression that emanated throughout the country from this community; disrupted more recently by a pandemic that has altered the ways we live, work, and learn; now reinvented and reimagined as *Current*. This is a moment to express thanks to all who bring NCECA to life through its annual conference.

Like a work of art, *Current* has varied meanings. Linguistically and grammatically, *Current* is a shape-shifter, taking different forms. Whether used as an adjective or noun, pertaining to a moment in time, a force in water, electricity, or air, change, and movement are embodied in its essence. Ceramics involves using the world's most-commonly-found materials, refining, blending, forming, embellishing, and hardening them through the energy of fire. Ceramics is an art of transformation as surely as life is change.

Curator of the 2023 Annual, Garth Johnson, has drawn on Walt Whitman's 1855 poem, *Song of Myself* for the exhibition's title and organizing theme. *I Contain Multitudes*, on view at the Weston Gallery through May 7, 2023, aligns our enduring fascination with the vessel and the poet's celebration of the self as a dynamic, sometimes contradictory, and continually evolving creation—an homage to the clay-like plasticity of the maker's imagination and the self's capacity to evolve. Whitman's voice embodies radical conceptions of America, democracy, spirituality, sexuality, nature, and identity. Like immersion in the history of ceramics, the poem transports us through an array of settings, time periods, viewpoints, and personas.

Two distinct cohorts of Onsite Conference Liaisons have made this conference possible: Marsha Karagheusian and Lisa Merida-Paytes facilitated NCECA's unfulfilled efforts to stage a conference here in 2021, and Pam Kravetz and Calcagno Cullen succeeded them to lead us here in 2023. The Weston Art Gallery and the DAAP Galleries of the University of Cincinnati have twice served as host venues for NCECA's cornerstone exhibitions. Community clay studios, schools, parks, museums, local government, small businesses, and creative collectives have rallied behind the cause of clay and creation to bring the programming and exhibitions of *Current* to life.

On behalf of NCECA's staff and volunteer board of directors, and members of the Cincinnati creative community, thanks to all of you for being at the center of this conference, dedicating your time and sharing your abilities. Mindfully created, grounded in ideas and wonder, working with clay fosters our capacities to manage, embrace, and celebrate the ever-changing world we share.

AIRPORT TRANSPORTATION

Cincinnati Airport, also known as CVG, is the main airport serving the wider Cincinnati tri-state area. You can get from CVG to Downtown Cincinnati or from Downtown to CVG by ride-share services, taxi, or bus.

You visit welcomepickups.com/cincinnati/airport-taxi to pre-book a taxi. A typical trip will take about 20 minutes in light traffic.

Taking the bus is a more budget-friendly transportation option; a direct line that connects the airport to the city center will take you there in approximately 25 minutes.

Travel via bus between the airport and Downtown is cost-effective and relatively easy. The 2X Airporter bus operated by TANK is a direct line with frequent departures that will take you there in about 25 minutes. A single ticket for the 2X Airporter bus costs \$1.50 per rider. You can buy your ticket online through the Transit App or cash on the bus.

AWARDS AND FELLOWSHIPS

NCECA celebrates advancement of the field and the people and organizations who influence its evolution through the following awards:

Honorary Members, Fellows of the Council, Excellence in Teaching, Outstanding Achievement, and Regional Award of Excellence.

NCECA provides opportunities and support to artists, educators, writers, teachers, and learners through the following fellowships: Emerging Artists, International Residency Awards, Helene Zucker Seeman Fellowships for Women, Multicultural Fellowships, Regina Brown Undergraduate Student Fellowships, NCECA Graduate Student Fellowships; and newly launched in 2023, the NCECA Environmental Sustainability Fellowship and Anne W. and Bill Bracker Youth Educator Seed Fellowship.

Day-pass scholarships to high school educators and students are provided through generous donations.

Additional recognitions occur through annual Cups of Merit awards and the NCECA National K-12 Exhibition Educator Award presented in cooperation with the National K-12 Ceramic Exhibition Foundation.

ANNUAL CONFERENCE

The annual NCECA conference gathers people from around the US and throughout the world in a different city each year to discuss, investigate, and celebrate creation, teaching and learning through clay work.

The conference programming results through peer deliberation of proposals submitted from the field and is supplemented with thoughtfully curated content and presenters.

The conference features an array of presentation formats to appeal to all who are interested in ceramic art.

EXHIBITIONS

NCECA organizes and helps to site and promote exhibitions that increase public dialogue, recognition, appreciation, and critical investigation of ceramic art.

The NCECA Annual is developed through the vision of a single curator/juror who frames an organizing concept for the exhibition and invites a core group of artists whose work who creates an organizing concept and animates the core theme. Additional works and artists are selected through an open call for submissions.

The NCECA Juried Student Exhibition is open to those pursuing degrees in higher education programs located throughout North America. Works are selected by two distinguished artists working in the field.

The NCECA Multicultural Fellowship Exhibition provides an annual showcase of works in clay by artists of color who are past NCECA Multicultural Fellowship recipients.

Concurrent Exhibitions proliferate the conference host community and wrap around core conference programming. Resulting through proposals submitted from throughout the world and synthesized with those developed within the local arts and culture ecosystem, NCECA develops an extensive series of exhibitions that expand awareness, open access, and deepen appreciation of ceramic art.

PUBLICATIONS AND RESOURCES

NCECA keeps its members informed of important developments in the field through these publications:

NCECA Journal: Published annually, the *Journal* documents the presentations and events of each conference with reports, articles, and photographic essays.

NCECA eNews: A forum that provides information and a calendar of upcoming NCECA events.

NCECA Directory: A member-accessible online listing of the current membership with contact information to promote communication among members. Members are included in the Directory by default, but may opt out.

Special Publications and Videos: NCECA produces topical publications such as exhibition catalogs, ceramic art resources online, and DVD media.



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By participating across NCECA's live in-person events as well as online platforms you agree to and are bound by these community guidelines and policies. You are responsible for your own voice within these platforms; be respectful and courteous to others, and do not engage in conversations that can make others feel unwelcome.

Communication or conduct that is offensive, degrading, coercive, or disruptive, or that has the purpose or effect of interfering with an individual's reasonable participation in or enjoyment of any event, exhibition, or other programming experience is prohibited.

One of the underlying rationales of these policies is to promote the free exchange of ideas, not to inhibit them. Critical thinking is essential to art making and art education. Discourse and commentary on work, ideas, or research, do not by themselves constitute hostile conduct or harassment.

NCECA has the discretion to determine violations of these policies and may require offenders to cease participation in the relevant forum—as well as bar violators from future events, opportunities, platforms, and membership.

HONORARY MEMBERS OF THE COUNCIL

Those nominated and selected as Honorary Members of the Council have made significant contributions to the field of ceramic art. Through this award, their creative work, critical thinking, and exemplary accomplishments are recognized as essential to ceramic art's cultural importance and continual evolution.



Richard Burkett

Transformation involves, according to *The American Heritage Dictionary*, "a marked change, as in appearance or character, usually for the better." Few individual artists have contributed to change in the nature, function, or con-

dition of ceramic art education as effectively as Richard Burkett. As a maker, educator, and technologist, Richard Burkett's contributions to the field of ceramics worldwide have been transformative. Burkett began one of his earliest contributions to the field of ceramics worldwide when he started writing the software program for glaze calculation, HyperGlaze, offering it at no charge when the COVID-19 pandemic hit. He is a potter, an author, and an innovator. Richard Burkett has changed the "nature, function, and condition" of the field of ceramics, and he has changed it for the better.



Recipients of the Excellence in Teaching Award are individuals who are near or at the end of a career dedicated to the practice of teaching (the award may be bestowed posthumously); have demonstrated excellence in their own creative work; have previous recognition for, and a history of, awards in teaching; and have highly visible former students in the field.



Anna Calluori Holcombe

Having taught at two nationally-ranked ceramics programs (as well as others), Anna Calluori Holcombe has left an indelible mark on students and colleagues for more than

four decades. Having received numerous awards for her dedication to quality teaching, Anna Calluori Holcombe is a renowned ceramic artist who has dedicated her life to education, passing on her vast knowledge, and sharing worldwide contacts. She exemplifies the spirit of the NCECA Excellence in Teaching Award.



Roxanne Swentzell

Honoring the creative paths first blazed by the Santa Clara Pueblo potters and sculptors who preceded her, Roxanne Swentzell's creative vision builds on great traditions and expands into social and environmental engagement.

Among her greatest accomplishments is her co-founding of the Santa Clara Pueblo-based nonprofit organization, Flowering Tree Permaculture Institute, where participants are taught how to farm and garden in the high desert climate with low water use, how to understand micro-climates, and how composting and seed saving are a part of growing sustainably. With her award-winning works held in major public collections, Roxanne Swentzell has demonstrated that she is a citizen of the world and deserving to be an NCECA Honorary Member.



Bruce Dehnert

Often when we think of an Excellence in Teaching Award, we think of desks and blackboards, or even wheels and kilns, in traditional academic settings. Bruce Dehnert has done all of that, but his teaching goes far beyond the

classroom. According to one of his recommenders, "He facilitated all aspects of learning at Peters Valley School of Craft, where he was the ceramics studio director for 22 years." Dehnert has devoted his life to teaching in one form or another. Knowing that his actions and words affect those around him, Bruce Dehnert embodies what it means to be a teacher, formally and informally. He is uniquely deserving of the NCECA Excellence in Teaching Award.

FELLOWS OF THE COUNCIL

Fellows of the Council shall be persons who have made an outstanding contribution to the National Council on Education for the Ceramic Arts. They shall be members in good standing and shall have served the Council in significant ways for at least five years. Up to two Fellows may be elected in any one year. No currently serving Board Member is eligible for election as a Fellow of the Council.



Julia Galloway

It takes a village. Or, as Julia Galloway modestly puts it, "It takes a team." Little that is accomplished by the NCECA Board of Directors, or their committees, is done by just one person. According to colleague Chanda Zea, "Working

with her on the NCECA Green Task Force, she inspires us all with her not-so-quiet commitment to continuous forward movement. Diane Fishbein

Diane Fishbein's career in art and her contributions to art in the Cincinnati area span decades.

Her international experiences include directing a public art commission from Gifu, Japan;

spending six months in India to create home shrines for Pujah worship of Ganesh, traveling on a Kodak grant; and leading "hands-on art-making projects with Children in Mumbai, Kathmandu, and Nepal." As a productive artist and community volunteer, Diane Fishbein has made a difference to people of all ages, kindergarten and beyond. Her commitment to her art, to ceramics, and to her region in Ohio are all reasons she was selected for this honor.



Jill Oberman

In 1992, Jill Oberman attended her first NCECA conference in Philadelphia. Since that time (30 years last year) she has missed just two conferences. Once involved with NCECA, she hasn't stopped working for the organization, and for

the field of ceramics, in one way or another. With more than 30 years in ceramics, Jill Oberman chooses to continue to be involved and to contribute to her chosen field. She has made a difference to the organization that has made such a difference to ceramics in the world.



Willis Bing Davis

Willis Bing Davis's accomplishments as an artist, curator, and educator enrich the greater Cincinnati region and reach far beyond to make national and international influence. The NCECA Regional Award of Excellence

is presented to "individuals or organizations who have made an outstanding contribution to the ceramic arts and or the cultural life within the region of the conference host city." As an artist of acclaim, an award-winning educator, and an individual committed to his community, his art, and artists, Willis Bing Davis deservedly joins a long list of distinguished past awardees whose efforts enhance the lives of others.

OUTSTANDING ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

Outstanding Achievement Award recipients shall be contemporary artists, educators, writers, and others, this award recognizes individuals who have successfully completed a singular project that has contributed to the field of ceramic arts in an extraordinary way. The scope of the venture should be above and beyond what would typically be considered their professional responsibilities.



Virgil Ortiz

Virgil Ortiz is a Cochiti-born Pueblo Indian from New Mexico, a motivated self-starter and a driven learner, "who has carried the flame of his people's history and ceramic traditions, filling them with the relevancy of the present." As an accomplished and internationally-known artist, he feels a responsibility to pass his skills, as well as his business acumen, on to his nieces and nephews. As an artist, designer, and film maker, Ortiz has "looped timelines by retelling an ancient story in a future setting." Giving his life to telling the story of his people through ceramics and other media, Virgil Ortiz meets and surpasses the benchmark for this award, while paving the way for the success of future generations.
