REPORT OF WALTER H. ROBERTS

Arrived here Monday morning, June 4, and was met by Messrs. Lawas and Bagamasbad, the Philippine Resident Inspectors.

In the afternoon we met with Mr. J. M. Donkers of the Verschure Shipyard where we reviewed some of the completed drawings and afterward made a brief tour of the shipyard.

On Tuesday, June 5, I reviewed drawings with Messrs. Lawas and Bagamasbad. Later in the morning, Mr. Donkers took us on an inspection tour of an Indian hopper dredge (completed) and a Portugese hopper dredge under construction. In the afternoon we went via automobile to Haarlem to visit the plant of Conrad Stork where machinery and structural components of the 40-ton crane are being constructed.

On Wednesday, June 6, I went to Kinderdijk with the Resident Inspectors to visit the plant of J & K Smit, where the 1000 cu. yd. hopper dredge will be built. Here we met with Messrs. W. van Beelen and W. W. Kalis, Managing Directors and with key members of the engineering and production staff. We reviewed the principal drawings of the dredge. After lunch at the plant, we crossed the Maas River and visited the plant of Smit-Electro at Slikkerveer, manufacturers of many types of electrical machinery and control apparatus.

We met with Mr. de Vries, Managing Director, Mr. Jan Hofstede, shop superintendent and Mr. Bonebakker of Heemaf Manufacturing Co., subcontractor on small a.c. motors, generators and control. Afterward a tour of the plant was made where electric components of the dredge were in various stages of completion. We returned to the J & K Smit plant at Kinderdijk where we visited the engine shop to see the Smit+M.A.N. diesel engines being manufactured for the 500 cu.yd. grab hopper dredge and the 1000 cu.yd. suction hopper dredge. Afterward we returned to Amsterdam.

On Thursday, June 7, I met with the Resident Inspectors to review our findings and discuss the contract.

On Friday, June 8, the Resident Inspectors and I met with Mr. Donkers at the Verschure Shipyard to discuss the contract as follows:

- The contractor will furnish a construction schedule to the Resident Inspectors in order that the latter can have knowledge of rate of progress expected by the Contractors.
- The 500 cu.yd. dredge is about 30 days behind schedule because
 of a delay in obtaining approval of a change in the propulsion
 equipment. The Contractor will make every effort to compensate
 for the delay.

- 3. The 1000 cu.yd. dredge is behind schedule a few weeks according to the Contractor. Some of the work will be divided up to assist the partner J & K Smit to improve lagging production.
- 4. The opening in the drag of the 1000 cu.yd. dredge has a greater area for passing solids than that in the pump. The Contractor will weld bars in the two drags to be fitted on the dredge and supply material for this addition to the spare drag.
- 5. The Contractor was requested to furnish pricing of individual items of spare parts for future use in budgeting. This will be done on a new extended time spares proposal being prepared by the Contractor.
- The Contractor was requested to furnish for our information the following:
 - a) Line diagram and characteristic curves of speed and torque for the drive on the 40-ton crane.
 - b) Line diagram and characteristic curves for the propulsion and dredge pump motors of the 1000 cu.yd. dredge.
- 7. The several partners of I.H.C. involved in this contract are doing an excellent job of workmanship. Everyone has been helpful in making information available and extending assistance in the furtherance of my inspection visit.

Gentlemen:

In reply to your letter of 10th May last regarding the subject under heading, we must to our regret inform you that in connection with the busy work and interchanging program of our dredge masters and engineers we cannot yet tell whom of them will be chosen to be sent out to Manila, because we do not know the exact date on which you should like to dispose of them in your city.

We hope that the missing details of the names and brief biographical sketches of our personnel that may be chosen to be sent out to Manila, will not inconvenient to you in this stage.

We shall gladly comply with your request to give details of the terms and conditions under which we can send out our personnel according to Item J-7 of the contract, by stating the following data.

In order to have in time personnel at your disposal for the purpose in question, we would like to hear from you at least one month in advance when they should have to arrive in the Philippines.

In connection with the large demand that exist abroad for our dredge masters and engineers, we should appreciate it if the stay in Manila could be settled beforehand and we have in mind a period of three months with f.i. a maximum of six months.

Should you be of the opinion that a longer stay for them than six months is desirable, we are, of course, prepared to take an extension of this maximum period into consideration.

According to Item J-7 of the contract we quite willing to provide you under the proviso as above with one, two or magimum of three competent and English speaking dredge engineers, and one or two qualified English

speaking dredge masters to advise and train the officers and crew of the dredges being procured under the contract dated 8th August, 1960 and to advise on the operation of said dredgers and on the satisfactory maintenance of the dredgers and machinery installation at Manila.

Our above mentioned personnel shall be considered as part of the staff of the dredgers and shall obey the instructions of your department or officers appointed by you as far as the work on the dredgers is concerned.

The cost for the provision of our personnel shall be for your account and shall consist for each engineer or dredge master of:

- a) an amount covering salary, social charges, insurance, etc. being \$750.- per month during the period from the date of departure from Holland until the date of return in Holland:
- b) the cost of travelling by air from Holland to Manila and back;
- c) all cost of travelling in the Philippines as far as this travelling is in line of duty;
- d) living allowance of 30 Pesos (P.30.-) for each day in the Philippines.

The above cost sub a. and b. to be paid by you within 30 days after receipt of our quarterly invokee at our bank, the "Nederlandsche Handel Mij, N.V.", The Hague, in our favour. The above cost sub c. and d. to be paid by you direct to our personnel. Payments to be effected without deductions of any income tax, fees, duties, etc. chargeable by the Philippine Authorities, either in the Philippines or in the Netherlands, as same shall be for your account.

We trust that the above will be of interest to you.

1. We acknowledge with thanks your letters of May 18 and 30, 1962 regarding the above project. Our comment on the various points dealt with is as follows.

2. Visit by dredge design expert to builders' yard.

We note that Mr. W. H. Roberts is visiting the IHC yard this month and again in January 1963. We shall be glad to have copies of his reports when available. We presume that application for disbursement from the Loan of the foreign currency element of Michael Baker's charges for his services will be made in due course.

3. Engagement of one or more qualified persons to advise on (a) the operation and maintenance of dredging equipment and (b) the operation of the slipway and workshop.

We note that you are endeavoring to locate suitable persons for (a) above through Mr. Arvisu and Mr. Lawas. We are already in touch with Mr. Arvisu with a view to assisting him in the matter if need be. We also note that you will send enquiries to the dredge builders regarding (b) in due time. In both cases we shall be obliged if you will keep us informed as to the position.

h. Dredge chief engineers and dredge masters to be supplied by the builders to train dredge personnel.

We note that you have written to IMC on this question, and shall be glad if you will inform us in due course of the arrangements made. In this connection it appears to us important that the dispatch of the men concerned with the lk-in. suction dredges should not be long delayed, since all of these dredges are by now presumably in Manila.

A working party meeting was held on June 14, to discuss the reply to a letter from Mr. A. A. Villanueva, Acting Director of Public Works, regarding loan 290 PH. Present were: Messrs. Sagne, Lowdon, Wiehen, and Rigby.

The main point of discussion was the information, confirmed in another letter from Mr. Villanueva, dated May 30, 1962, regarding the request from Ellicott Machine Corporation to maintain their bid price of \$1,575,500.00 provided the dollar payment will remain at \$1,300,000.00 but the equivalent of its balance of \$275,500.00 will be converted to Philippine pesos at the rate of P 3.60 to the dollar instead of P 2.00 per dollar as provided before. The Bureau of Public Works in Manila considers the offer reasonable, taking into account the present free market exchange rate of the dollar and they have, therefore, requested Presidential authority to enter into contract with Ellicott for the acquisition of the 2nd 20-inch dredge. They will forward to the Bank the contract papers for review and concurrence before finalizing them.

During the discussion, it was pointed out that:

- a) all the bids concerning loan 290 PH. were made in U.S. dollars in 1960.
- b) according to Ellicott proposal, the bid remains in U.S. dollars. The request for revision of the peso part of it is mainly an adjustment of the conditions of payment to take into account the actual rate of the P. and corresponds to the previous 8% increase which has been already envisaged by them.
- c) the \$275,500.00 part which will be converted in P at the rate of P 3.60 per dollar concerns assembling works to be performed in the Philippines. noted

The party/that the Bureau of Public Works - Manila considers the Ellicott proposal reasonable and has requested Presidential approval to enter into contract with Ellicott. It was therefore agreed that:

- a) the Ellicott proposal could be considered a reasonable one by the Bank.
- b) this would be indicated to the Bureau of Public Works in Manila when the contract papers will be sent to the Bank for comments.

Mr. Rigby drew the attention of the working party to some difficulties which may arise in connection with items 1 and 2 of the present list of goods. It was agreed that it was too soon to revise the list of goods, but that it may have to be done at a late date.



You may wish to send the following comments to the members of the working party on the question of the request received for approving the price adjustment of the Ellicott dredge.

The total dollar cost of this item has not changed. The difference lies in the mode of payment according to which \$275,000 will be converted into pesos at the rate of 3.6 pesos to the US dollar instead of the former rate of 2 pesos to the dollar. This means that the Department of Public Works will have to pay an additional 440,000 pesos.

Since it was contemplated from the beginning that part of the construction would be done in Manila, it is presumed the Ellicott people had originally estimated this cost at 550,000 pesos as against their present cost estimate of 990,000 pesos. The question to consider is whether the increase in the local currency cost has risen by about 80%. This is a rather difficult and complicated question to answer. You will note that the price increase in pesos if reconverted to dollars would come to approximately 8% of the total cost of the dredge which is the increase that Ellicott had requested in the first place.

If the Bank does not approve of the proposed payment terms it would mean that new bids would have to be made and this involves loss in time and definitely causes a delay in the conclusion of the project. I also noted from the Department of Public Works: letter that they have asked for Presidential approval for the amended terms but are not requesting that of the Bank although we have told them twice before not to conclude the deal with Ellicott before we had a chance to send our comments. In the circumstances I see no advantage to be gained from objecting to their proposal at this late stage.



I have received the quarterly progress report ending March 31, 1962 which was submitted by the Acting Director of Public Works with his letter of April 23, 1962.

Attention drawn to the following:

- The three 'lli' Cutter Suction Dredges were completed and one dredge delivered in Manila on March 29, 1962.
- B. The three sets of the floating and shore pipdines for the dredges were also completed and the pipelines for one dredge arrived in Manila in January 1962.
- C. The Work Launch was completed last November and delivered in Manila in March 1962.
- D. One of the two diesel driven dredge tenders was completed last December. It is presumed that by now this item is delivered.
- E. The two Echo Sounders were also completed and presumed delivered.
- F. To date no disbursements from the loan account have been made with respect to any of the above equipment.
- G. In paragraph 5 of the Side-Letter dated July 26, 1961, the Borrower agreed to retain the services of a consulting Engineering firm acceptable to the Bank to review the design and specifications for the slipway and workshop. According to the progress report the engineering work is now 10% completed. This continues to be done without the benefit of any advice since no consultants were retained so far.
- H. With respect to the Ellicott Dredge the report claims that the Manufacturer's proposals and a draft of the contract were forwarded to the Bank for comment. This implies that matters with regard to this item are in our hands. In effect we informed the Director of Public Works on April 5, 1962 that the statement from the Ellicott Corporation on the proposed price increase put forth only general reasons. We asked in the same letter that they inform us of the results of their study of the justification for the proposed increase but have not received a reply to this as yet.

Dear Governor Castillo:

On my return from the Far East recently I was informed of the findings of the end-use inspection of the Dredging Project which was conducted early last March. This inspection showed that a number of problems, both operational and technical, continue to exist despite much earlier correspondence regarding them. I feel, therefore, that the Philippines Government should be informed of these problems, which, if allowed to continue, can seriously threaten the timely and satisfactory completion of this project.

Attached are copies of our letters of March 26 and April 5, 1962 to the Department of Public Works. Only the question of the default has so far been resolved and I should like to thank you for the part you played in getting that matter settled.

I am sure you agree that a satisfactory performance in the carrying out of a Bank financed project is in the interest of the Department of Public Works, the Philippine Government and the Bank. I realize that the Department has gone through a period of transition which may account for some of the difficulties being encountered. The fact is, however, that most of these problems arose in the latter part of 1961 and have continued ever since.

The Bank has always been willing to extend any assistance required to overcome these difficulties and I should like to take this opportunity to reiterate this position. The Bank would be prepared to send a staff member to Manila to assist the Department of Public Works

in resolving the existing problems, and at any time in the future that such assistance is required.

I am sure that you share our concern over this situation and that the Government will be able now to set it right. I shall write to you at greater length in a few days about other matters and to thank you for all you did for me on my last visit.

We have recently been advised by our representatives in Manila that you are considering issuance of a change order in connection with the procurement of the above equipment and have requested our approval in connection therewith.

We have received from Ellicott Machine Corporation a copy of 2 proposed Change Order Number One, dated February 6, 1962. We have reviewed same and concur that the items listed, that is (1) additional special tools and testing equipment for the main diesel engine, (2) additional spare parts for the floating discharge pipeline, and (3) additional set of special cutter sheathes, are necessary for proper operation of the dredge unit.

We cannot comment on the prices quoted for these items; however, it is our understanding that the World Bank does not expect us to investigate and justify the prices. This matter of justification of prices might involve extensive investigation if it was made a requirement for approval, and we would have to be advised as to the extent of investigation required. Loan 290-PH - Philippines Dradge Project.

1. We refer to your letter dated February 19, 1962 regarding the above project, the contents of which were discussed with you by Mr. Lowdon during his recent visit to Manila.

2. Visits by dredge design expert to builder's yards.

Mr. Lowdon was informed that Mr. Roberts would visit the IHC yard in Holland about June 1962 and January 1963; however, we learn from your Consultants, Michael Baker, Jr., Inc., that they have not yet received instructions in the matter. We shall be glad if you will confirm that these arrangements have now been finalized and let us know the date of the earlier visit.

3. Engagement of one or more qualified persons to advise on the operation and maintenance of the dredging equipment and on the operation of the slipway and workshop.

We confirm that as Mr. Lowdon stated during his discussions with you, we feel that it is very important that the person or persons who will advise on dredge equipment maintenance and operation should be appointed as soon as possible and not await the arrival of the major dredges as suggested in your letter. As Mr. Lowdon pointed out, it is envisaged that the person or persons will give advice on dredging operations and maintenance as a whole, not merely in connection with the equipment to be provided under the Loan, and that they will be employed for a period of not less than two years.

The location and selection of suitable men for this purpose is primarily a matter in your hands, the Bank's interest being that the qualifications, terms and period of employment of the person or persons selected should be acceptable to it, as agreed in your letter of July 26, 1961. However, it may be difficult to find men of the high calibre required. After

further consideration of the matter, we make the suggestion that one of the most likely ways in which to locate suitable persons might be through the United States Corps of Engineers, with which we understand your Division of Ports and Marbore has had considerable contact in the past. It may not be easy to find a single high calibre man qualified to advise both as to dredge operation and as to dredge maintenance. However there would be advantages in combining the two functions, and we suggest that in the first place efforts should be directed to seeking such an individual.

While the recruitment of a person to advise on the operation of the slipway and workshop is less urgent, since these items will not be completed for some time, we feel enquiries should be put in hand in this case also. Here, we suggest that a suitable man might be obtained through the dredge builders, or possibly from a Philippines firm such as the Atlantic, Gulf and Pacific Corporation.

4. Dredge chief engineers and dredge masters supplied by the builder to train dredge personnel (paragraph 3 of your letter of July 20, 1961).

We understand that these have already been arranged for and shall be glad if you will let us know how many chief engineers and dredge masters are being supplied and the periods during which they will be employed.

5. Alterations to project equipment recommended by Mr. W. H. Roberts.

(a) IHC Equipment

- (1) Will you please confirm that Change Order No. 2, September 28, 1961, has been approved by the Auditor General and issued?
- (ii) Will you please send us a copy of "No Cost" Change Order No. 3, covering the remaining alterations which are being made, as soon as it is issued.

(b) 20-in. Suction Dredge

These alterations were referred to in paragraph 4(b) of our letter of January 16, 1962. Until the uncertainty existing as regards the ordering of the dredge is resolved (see paragraph 7 below), no action appears possible in this matter.

6. Obtaining of consultants' opinion on the design and specifications for the slipway and workshop.

We have examined the draft contract with Michael Baker, Jr., Incorporated, a copy of which was handed to Mr. Lowdon, and see no objection thereto. Will you please confirm that the Consultant will make a report on the designs and specifications finally adopted, of which report you will send us a copy.

As pointed out by Mr. Lowdon, finalization of a contract covering these services is a matter of urgency. We shall be glad if you will keep us informed as to progress.

7. 20-in. cutter suction dredge - 8% increase in Ellicott bid.

This matter was referred to in our letters of November 30, 1961 and January 16, 1962. Your reply of February 19, 1962 included a statement from the Ellicott Corporation putting forth somewhat general reasons for the proposed increase.

We learn from Mr. Lowdon that at the time of his visit you had not been able to check the justification in detail nor had you come to any final opinion as to whether or not the increased bid should be accepted. We shall be glad to learn the results of your study of the justification and your considered views as to the course to be followed, as soon as possible. Pending receipt of this information, we do not feel that we can usefully comment on the reasons given by the Ellicott Corporation in justification of the proposed increase, and reaffirm our request that in the meantime no commitment should be made in the matter.

We would however add that in the light of Mr. Lowdon's discussions with you, and bearing in mind that it is now over two years since the original bids were obtained, we feel that unless a strong case can be established justifying purchase at the increased figure, consideration should be given to the desirability of obtaining new bids if the Ellicott Corporation remains unwilling to adhere substantially to the original price.

Dear Mr. Villanueva:

I wish to thank you for the payment of the commitment charges due March 15 on this loan, advice on which we received this morning.

As we already informed you in our cable of March 27, we regret that we cannot agree to your request of March 21 to revise the List of Goods by creating a new interest, commitment and other charges category. It is true that there have been cases in which the Bank has included in the loan amount the sums to be paid as loan charges during the construction period. However, the Bank has always considered this justifiable only in cases where a project, after completion, produces revenues out of which the loan can be serviced. The Angat Project of the National Power Corporation is an example of this type of loan. Since the Dredging Project is not of this self-liquidating type, we did not consider it feasible to finance the interest during the construction period.

Moreover, to take out \$500,000 from the UNAILOCATED category of the List of Goods would leave the amount for contingencies at \$177,000 which we consider much too small at this early stage of the project. As I am sure you know, this unallocated category is intended to meet any contingency, such as, for instance, increases in the cost of the equipment. It has been our experience that if the amount in this category is left too small it can seriously prejudice the timely completion of the project.

I should also like to mention that during the loan negotiations with Mr. Buendia and Mr. Fojas last June they specifically asked not to include the loan charges in the loan asserting that there were sufficient funds in the Portworks Fund to meet the interest and other charges. From the statement attached to your quarterly report ending December 31, 1961 it appears that this situation has not changed. I would appreciate, however, learning your views on this matter and if you expect to encounter difficulties in the future to meet the loan charges out of this fund.

Dear Filemon:

Thank you very much for your letter of March 21, 1962 and for all the troubles you have gone through in assisting us in this matter. I was somewhat reluctant to ask for your help because it had nothing to do with you. However, because of your thorough acquaintance with our procedures and because you are a friend we can always count on; I thought it would help PWD if you explained things to them.

After receiving your letter we got a letter from PWD requesting a change in the List of Goods and the creation of an interest category in the amount of \$500,000 which they proposed to transfer from the unallocated category. We could not agree to this because it would have reduced the unallocated category to such a small amount that it would not be sufficient to meet any price increase in the cost of the equipment if this should happen. We have accordingly written and told them so.

What really surprised me is the fact that they did not pay this amount from the Portworks Fund. I recall very well that during the loan negotiations I asked Buendia and Fojas if they wished to include the interest during construction in the loan amount and they said definitely no because they had sufficient funds in the Portworks Fund to take care of the interest and other charges. We agreed with them for that reason and because the Dredging Program, unlike a power project, is not a revenue earning project. I am just wondering what happened to the Portworks Fund, and why they take so long in everything they do.

When, by March 27 the amount was not paid I got very concerned because, in the Board's meeting of March 29 it would have had to be

mentioned that the Philippines is in default and this would not have looked good at all. I therefore called Govenor Castillo on the phone and acquainted him with all the details. He assured me he would take care of the matter and he did. The next day the amount was paid.

While I am glad that this is now settled I think we should do something to help the PWD people get things more organized in handling this loan. We shall do whatever we can. The purpose of this letter, however, is simply to thank you for your efforts and to let you know we are grateful.

Within a couple of days we will cable you about the exact timing of the arrival of the Maria Cristina mission. Eric Arnold and Hans Hittmaire are its members but the cable will give you all details.

Thanks again, Filemon, and my warm personal regards to you.

SUBJECT: Philippines - Commitment Charges - Loan 290 PH

I called Governor Castillo in Manila last night and told him that the commitment charges on loan 290 PH, due March 15 were still unpaid. I told him that the Bank had cabled the Department of Public Works twice on this matter and had cabled him also on March 22.

Governor Castillo was very apologetic and quite concerned. He said that he had called in the Public Works people and they had assured him that they had taken care of this matter.

I told the Governor about PWD's recent request to change the List of Goods and establish a new category from which the interest and other charges would be paid. It seems, I added, they are under the impression that this measure takes care of the matter when in fact it doesn't and I explained why.

I also mentioned that if this payment is not made by Thursday March 29 the Board of Directors will have to be informed that the Philippines is in default and this would not look good. I expressed the hope that he will see to it that the payment of \$30,281 is made at once and I told him that we can then straighten out all the existing problems in this Loan.

Governor Castillo assured me that he will make the payment immediately even if the Central Bank had to advance the amount to the PWD. He then said that all the important officials who were acquainted with this loan had retired or resigned and that the new people need help and must be taught all about this loan and the Bank's procedures. He asked me if we could send someone urgently to do so and I replied that I will convey this to the Bank.

I called Mr. Kheradjou at home and informed him what Governor Castillo said. On the question of sending someone from the Bank, Mr. Kheradjou said we should wait till Mr. Cargill comes back.

An informal meeting of the working party, attended by Messrs. Lowdon, Rigby, Wiehen and Sagne, was held March 27 in order to decide what action should be taken with regard to the default situation of the Philippines concerning the Dredging Loan (290 PH), further to the requested dated March 21, 1962 received from the Bureau of Public Works, Manila, to have the loan charges taken from the unallocated amount contained in the List of Goods. It was decided:

- (a) To send cables to the Bureau of Public Works and to the Governor of the Central Bank informing them that the Bank was unable to accept their request and, therefore, requesting that arrangements for payment of the commitment charge be made before Thursday, March 29, 1962 (at this date the Board should be informed of the default). Copies of these cables would be sent to Mr. Jose Cruz, Chief of Ports and Harbors, Manila and to Mr. Paulino Cases, Acting Secretary of Public Works and Communications.
- (b) To send a letter giving the reasons why this request is not acceptable to the Bank.

Dear Mr. Secretary:

I am writing in reference to a Withdrawal Application #1 dated January 12, 1962 in the amount of \$1,537,350.00 which was received in the Bank on March 16, 1962.

In processing this Application the following points emerged as requiring further action and I am, therefore, bringing them to your attention for your kind consideration. Mr. Lowdon's recent discussions in Manila have been taken into consideration in framing these remarks.

- l. The Application was signed by Mr. Julian A. Buendia, who is no longer Director of Public Works. In accordance with Undersecretary Contreras' letter of January 23, 1962 this Application should now be signed either by you or by Mr. Contreras.
- 2. Paragraph 5 of the Application states that at the time of signing the Application no default under the Loan Agreement existed. Subsequently, however, default occurred because of the non-payment of the commitment charges, requested in our statement of February 1, 1962, and due by March 15, 1962. We assume, following our recent exchange of cables on this matter, that by the time the new Application is signed by you or Mr. Contreras, this situation of default will no longer exist.
- 3. With respect to the contract with THC the amendment providing for cash payments, signed on July 3, 1961, still requires the approval of the President of the Republic. We presume that by the time this Application is re-submitted to the Bank this approval will have been obtained and evidence thereof sent to us. Since this amendment is an integral part of the payment schedule to IHC, its approval would not only expedite the processing of Application #1 but would also

entitle you to submit another application for payment of all amounts due to IHC up to the date of signing the Application.

- 4. We note from the documents supporting Application #1 that commission payments to commercial banks with respect to letters of credit have been made. While it is left entirely up to you whether or not to request reimbursement for these charges we feel we should point out that you can, if you so wish, request reimbursement for all such charges.
- 5. We note that the Application requests payment to be made by depositing the amounts involved to the account of "Portworks Special Fund," Bureau of Public Works, Manila, Philippines, with the Central Bank of the Philippines, Manila.

This would entail our sending a check to the Central Bank in Manila which, in turn, would have to send it for clearance with its depository in New York. To expedite payment of Reimbursement Applications we would suggest that the payment request reads as follows:

"Deposit with the (Name of Depository in New York), for the account of the Central Bank of the Philippines, Manila, for the account of Portworks Special Fund, Bureau of Public Works, Manila, Philippines."

Attached please find Application #1 which we are returning for the above changes. We are keeping the rest of the supporting documents since they do not require any change. As soon as we receive the new Application amended along the above lines we shall be glad to give it prompt consideration.

We hope that the above remarks will not inconvenience you too much since they are made solely with the aim of facilitating the execution of this project which, I am sure, is our mutual interest.

A working party meeting was held on 20 March 1962 to discuss a number of problems concerning loan 290-PH, in the light of Mr. Lowdon's recent end-use inspection. Present were: Messrs. Sagne, Dajany, Lowdon, Wiehen, Rigby and Waide.

The working party felt strongly that the inefficiency with which this loan is being administered could have harmful long-run consequences, if remedial action were not taken immediately. The problems outlined were as follows:-

- 1) The commitment charges due March 15, 1962 have not been paid and the loan, therefore, is technically in default. For this reason, disbursement under this loan cannot be made until this situation is rectified.
- 2) Application #1 in the amount of approximately \$1.5 million was dated two months prior to receipt in the Bank and was signed by Mr. Buendia, who is no longer Director of Public Works. Mr. Wiehen felt that a new application, signed by the Acting Secretary of Public Works or the Undersecretary of Public Works, in accordance with their letter dated January 23, 1962, should be submitted.
- 3) The amendment to the IHC contract which provides for cash payments has been approved by the Auditor General but awaits approval of the President of the Republic before it becomes binding. Because the President has not approved the amendment the PWD/DPH consider themselves unauthorized to make cash payments under the arrangement covered by this amendment. This, in turn, may cause IHC to stop the construction work on the dredges.
- 4) No justification has been received for the 8% price increase on the Ellicott dredge. The party felt that if this increase was to be accepted by the Bank, without sufficient justification, the price of the Ellicott dredge would come to within a few dollars of that quoted by the next bidder (IHC) which could bring in protests from that bidder. The party felt that in the absence of a satisfactory justification for this increase, the borrower should be asked to invite new bids altogether.

....

5) The party noted that there was reluctance on the part of the DPH to engage qualified persons to advise on the operations and maintenance of the dredging equipment and on the operations of the slipway and workshop. In his discussions in Manila, Mr. Lowdon pointed out that the obligation was undertaken in the sideletter dated July 26, 1961, and stressed the importance of making arrangements for these appointments as soon as possible.

6) The party noted other minor points such as the fact that no reimbursement has been requested on payments on this project already made by the DPH and felt that these points should be brought to their attention.

In an attempt to resolve these problems, the party agreed that two letters should be sent to the Acting Secretary with copies of each to Contreras, the Undersecretary, and Villanueva, the Acting Director of Public Works. It was suggested that the first letter should deal with application #1 and the disbursement problems and should state all the remedial steps required before the application can be processed. The second letter would point to the technical and operational problems mentioned above.

In the light of Mr. Lowdon's memorandum dated March 16, 1962, and his verbal report in the working party, it was strongly felt that some action, other than these two letters, should be initiated by the Bank to assure the resolution of these problems and the elimination of future procedural delays. Because Messrs. Cases, Contreras and Villanueva are all unconfirmed in their positions and are all serving in an acting capacity only, it was felt that some kind of representation to a higher level in the Government should also be made in order to rectify the unsatisfactory and confused handling of this loan. The party felt that Mr. Dajany could best fulfill this function and, at the same time, could explain to the staff of the Bureau of Public Works and the DPH the procedures with regard to the submission of withdrawal applications.

I am glad to inform you that I was able to hold a meeting yesterday with Public Works personnel on the proper servicing of their dredge loan. Present were Undersecretary R. Contreras of the Department of Public Works and Communications, Acting Director of Public Works Antonio Villanueva, Mr. Jose Cruz, Chief of Ports and Harbors Division of the BPW, and two engineers who are in charge of the implementation of the IBRD loan. Incidentally one of the latter had some training with NPC last November on IBRD procedures upon my suggestion to Mr. Buendia.

One source of difficulty in this case is the fact that all three men who are conversant with the dredge loan have left the government. Mr. Buendia reached compulsory retirement age last January, and both Mr. Moreno and Mr. Bautista, being of Cabinet rank, and in the opposite political party, were replaced by the new Administration.

I showed your radiogram to the group and explained to them the importance of meeting obligations on time, not only because this is normal business practice but to maintain goodwill and an excellent reputation in the Bank which would count much in future loan applications. Mr. Cruz said he received the February 1 letter of IBRD on the same day a radiogram was received. It turned out that the Records Clerk of the Bureau of Public Works, not sure what to do with the letter, kept it for one month. Acting Director Villanueva will investigate.

1. Background

The Loan, US\$8.5 million, was made on July 26, 1961. The project comprises principally a considerable quantity of dredging equipment already being built by IHC, Holland; a 20-in. cutter dredge not yet ordered; and a slipway and workshop, which are in the design stage. - Auditor General, Republic of the Philippines Mr. P. Jiminez

- Auditor, Central Bank of the Philippines Mr. I. Mathay

- Manila Representative, IHC Mr. Van Hagen

A meeting was held with Messrs. Cases, Contreras, Villanueva, Cruz and others on March 12. Messrs. Cases and Contreras said that they intended to visit Washington in the near future, probably arriving about March 22. However, it was heard from a number of sources that Messrs. Cases, Contreras and Villanueva are unlikely to be confirmed in their acting positions.

3. Disbursement

Practically all expenditure so far made for the project is in respect of the PWD contract with IHC of August 8, 1960. This provided for payment under credit arrangements, but at the request of the Bank, an amendment was signed on July 3, 1961 providing for cash payments in the event of a Bank

Some time ago, the PWD sent this amendment to the Auditor General for comment. He returned it on March 7, 1962, raising no objection providing the approval of the President of the Republic were obtained. This was requested in a minute, dated March 12, 1962. It was expected that approval might be obtained in upwards of a week.

In the meantime the PWD/DPH had considered themselves unauthorized to make cash payments under the arrangement covered by the amendment. They had accordingly permitted a letter of credit, already established, for US\$768,675 to be expended, and, as required under the original contract, had opened a further letter of credit for the same amount.

In January 1962, DPH prepared Application No. 1 for disbursement from the loan of US\$1,537,350, i.e., the amount of the two letters of credit, both then fully expended. The covering letter dated January 12, 1962 (copy attached) stated that at that date a further US\$459,730 was due to the builder. I was informed that at February 26, 1962 the amount due was US\$696,680 (see statement attached).

DPH were under the impression that Application No. 1 was in the hands of the Bank. However during an interview with the Auditor General, a copy, with the original attachments, was found on his files. This, together with the actual application, had been sent him by the PWD Auditor. The application itself could not be found, but it seemed certain that it was not sent to the Bank.

I pointed out the unsatisfactory nature of this position at the meeting on March 12 and subsequently to the Auditor General and the Central Bank Auditor. The Loan Regulations requirement that applications for Withdrawal should be made promptly/mot being met, and, moreover, at a time when foreign exchange was urgently required, Central Bank dollars were being used for payments which could be met from the Loan.

The serious nature of the matter appeared to be appreciated and the Acting Secretary undertook that:

- (a) If the original of Application No. 1 could not be located */, a fresh application for US\$1,537,350 would be prepared under Mr. Villanueva's signature and sent to the Bank immediately.
- (b) Presidential approval of the IHC contract amendment would be sought as a matter of urgency; when obtained, an application covering the outstanding payments due would at once be sent.
- (c) Notification of Mr. Villanueva's appointment and authentication of his signature would be sent to the Bank without delay.

In future, applications for disbursement would not be sent to the Auditor General. As regards (c), I pointed out that the Under-Secretary's letter of January 23, 1962 seemed to conflict with 7.04 of the Loan Agreement.

^{*/} A telegram received in the Bank on March 13 states that Application No. 1 had been found and airmailed.

6. Side Letter Requirements Regarding Technical Requirements

The following transpired regarding these requirements:

(a) Visits by dredge design consultant to builders yard during construction.

Mr. Roberts will be instructed to make two visits to the IHC yard, in about June 1962 and January 1963. This appears satisfactory.

(b) Engagement of qualified persons to advise on the operation and maintenance of the dredging equipment, and on the operation of the slipway and workshop.

During the meeting on March 12 it was apparent that the Acting Secretary was reluctant to carry out this undertaking and he criticized the requirement at some length. However, he was not supported by the others present.

I recapitulated the Bank reasons for having made the stipulation and it was agreed that the matter would be further discussed during the forthcoming visit of the Acting Secretary to Washington.

(c) Modifications to equipment recommended by dredge design consultant.

(i) IHC Equipment

Change Order No. 2, September 28, 1961 (copy attached), covering the fitting of a reversible clutch to the grab dredge, was submitted to the Auditor General on October 5, 1961. It was still with the Auditor General on March 12, 1962, but was said to have been approved on that date. The Manila representative of IHC confirmed that the remaining recommendations were being given effect to, and Mr. Cruz agreed that a "No Cost" change order would be prepared to cover them.

(ii) 20-in. Suction Dredge

Ellicott's comments on the consultants' recommendations had now been received and I was given a copy of them.

(d) Obtaining of a consultant's opinion on the design and specification for the slipway and workshop.

A draft contract with Michael Baker for this purpose awaited the Acting Secretary's approval and he undertook to expedite his decision. I was given a copy of the draft and said that the Bank would send its comment thereon after my return to Washington.

7. Purchase of 20-in. Cutter Dredge

At the time the loan was made the acceptance of a tender made by the Ellicott Corporation in March 1960, had been recommended for this item, but no order had been placed. On December 15, 1961 Ellicotts wrote asking an increase of 8% in the bid price, which would bring it to a figure just below that of the next lowest acceptable bid, that of IHC.

On hearing of this, the Bank pointed out that it would need details of the justification for the increase before it could concur in an order being placed. These have now been received.

During discussion of the matter at the meeting on March 12, it transpired that those concerned had not checked the justification given for the increase, nor had they any clear opinion of their own as to whether it was valid. They had in mind to submit the increase to the Auditor General and probably hoped the Bank would give a favorable opinion which they could quote in doing so. However the Acting Secretary spoke rather strongly in favor of acceptance.

I said that I could not give any opinion in the matter, which had still to be examined by the Bank, adding that it would not be possible for the Bank to comment until it had heard the opinion of the PWD as to the justification for the increased price and knew whether the department wished to accept it.

In view of all the circumstances, I recommend that the Bank deal with this matter with caution. Protests from the other bidders are likely: the IHC Manila representative in fact mooted this possibility in conversations with the writer.

8. Future Procedure

I discussed with Mr. Cruz the possibility of eliminating procedural delays such as had occurred and improving communication with the Bank generally.

The gist of his reply was that although he personnally would do what he could to improve matters, until the new Administration had settled down, and the senior civil servants involved ceased to be nervous of the Administration, delays were likely to continue.

8. Action

After discussion of the legal and disbursement matters arising in connection with paragraphs 3 - 5 above, a letter should be sent confirming the Bank's position in the various matters discussed during the inspection. This should be done as soon as possible and should not await the outcome of discussions with the Acting Secretary and Under-Secretary during their projected visit to Washington.

A further visit to Manila in connection with the disbursement application difficulties may prove necessary.

This contract made and entered into in the City of Manila, Republic of the Philippines, by and between -

represented by the Director of Public Works, hereinafter referred to as the BUREAU, and

MICHAEL BAKER, JR., INCORPORATED OF ROCHESTER,

PENNSYLVANIA, UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

a firm duly organized under the laws of the state of Pennsylvania,
United States of America, represented by ROY E. BRADEN, hereinafter
referred to as the CONSULTING FIRM,

WITNESSETH:

THAT

WHEREAS, the BUREAU and the CONSULTING FIRM had entered into a contract on December 21, 1960 in the City of Manila, Philippines, whereby the BUREAU has engaged the services of the CONSULTING FIRM to provide engineering and other technical services in connection with the program of the Republic of the Philippines for a nation—wide harbor dredging in the Philippines and the acquisition of an integrated harbor dredging fleet; and

WHEREAS, the BUREAU in connection with the said program requires the services of engineering specialists qualified to advise in the maintenance of dredges, accessory, vessels and attendant plants and to advise in the operation of the dredging fleet; and WHEREAS, the CONSULTING FIRM, under the contract aforementioned, shall provide such engineering and other technical services: NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the covenants and agreements hereinafter set forth, the services to be rendered and sums of money to be paid, the parties hereto have mutually agreed and, by this Supplemental Agreement, do hereby agree as follows: 1. The CONSULTING FIRM shall provide engineering services in connection with the nationwide harbor dredging program to undertake the following: (a) Advise the BUREAU in its dredging operations and on the proper maintenance of its harbor dredging fleet. (b) Maintain continuous general liaison and collaborate or coordinate and assist or support the work of the BUREAU in the implementation of its harbor dredging program. (c) Prepare recommendations or reports when requested by the BUREAU with respect to the operation and maintenance of the Bureau's dredy and related egypt who necessary dredges, who rejusts by to Bureau. The CONSULTING FIRM, for the purpose of performing the above mentioned services, shall provide the services of the following: assished by One (1) Dredge Operations and Maintenance Specialist and one (1) Dredge Maintenance Engineer with appropriate experiences and qualifications satisfactory to the BUREAU and the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (World Bank). 2 .

3. In consideration of the pertinent services enumerated in this Supplemental Agreement, rendered by the Specialists, the BUREAU shall pay or cause to be paid to the CONSULTING FIRM all its expenses for the Specialists upon presentation of documents satisfactory to the BUREAU and the World Bank at the following rates per month: (a) Dredge Operations and Maintenance Specialits - \$3,000,00 (b) Dredge Maintenance Engineer - - - - - = \$2,500,00 4. The BUREAU shall officially notify the CONSULTING FIRM when the services of the Specialists mentioned under paragraph (2) shall be availed of in connection with the services referred to in paragraph (1) hereof. 5. The Specialists to be furnished by the CONSULTING FIRM shall be under the direction of the Director of Public Works and/or his authorized representatives while in the performance of their duties in the Philippines. 6. The Specialists to be furnished by the CONSULTING FIRM under this agreement shall render these services to the BUREAU for a period of two (2) years. This Supplemental Agreement shall take effect ten (10) calendar days after receipt of the duly approved contract by the CONSULTING FIRM and shall terminate after the Specialists have rendered the service for the period referred to hereinabove. However, this Supplemental Agreement may be terminated by mutual agreement between the BUREAU and the CONSULTING FIRM anytime before the termination of the period of dervice referred to above. The BUREAU and the CONSULTING FIRM further agree on the following: Item A - Back-stopping and Cost of Living Allowances.

The CONSULTING FIRM shall assume all obligations for all back-stopping and cost of living allowances and incidental personal expenses, which shall be deemed included in the compensations of these personnel as provided herein, exclusive of all actual travel expenses (including travel within Philippine territory) of the Specialists while rendering services in connection with these projects. Back-stopping is defined to mean the CONSULTING FIRM's general overhead expenses in the operation of its organization in the United States, profit, goodwill, reputation, fee, and similar items. Item B - Travel Expenses. The BUREAU shall reimburse or cause to be reimbursed all the expenditures of the CONSULTING FIRM for travel and porterage from their point of origin to Manila, Philippines, and return incurred by the Specialists upon presentation of a bill for such expenditures supported with authenticating documents satisfactory to the BUREAU. provided, however, that reimbursement to the CONSULTING FIRM for such travel expenses shall be limited to one round trip for each Specialist. SPECIAL PROVISIONS 1. The BUREAU shall furnish, without cost to the CONSULTING FIRM, all office spaces, facilities, assistance and services, including labor, material and equipment, required in connection with the performance of the consulting services to be provided under the terms of this agreement in the Republic of the Philippines. The Specialists shall have access to all relevant records, correspondence, persons, craft and workshop/concerned. 2. The CONSULTING FIRM and the Specialists furnished by the former under the terms of this agreement, shall be reimbursed for 4

all taxes, duties, customs fees and charges assessed and collected by the Philippine Government, or any of its political subdivisions, provided that such taxes, duties, customs fees and charges are assessed in connection with their services to be rendered in the projects mentioned herein. 3. For the purpose of computing payments to be made under paragraph (3) above, the date of departure from the point of originl and the date of departure from the City of Manila, Philippines, of the Specialists shall be taken as the effective date of initiating and terminating the services referred to in paragraph (1) above. respectively, provided, the travel time from the point of origin to Manila shall not exceed 3 days. 4. The Specialists furnished by the CONSULTING FIRM under the terms of this agreement shall be paid vacation or sick leave at the rate of thirty (30) days per year. Reimbursement of this leave shall be paid upon submission of certified papers, subject to Philippine auditing requirements. 5. The employee furnished by the CONSULTING FIRM under this agreement for assignment for a duration of one year or longer, shall be permitted to transport his wife and eligible dependent children to the Philippines to establish residence. Dear Sir:

On behalf of IRC, we submit enclosed four copies of the minutes of the discussions held in Apsterdam between Mr. Fojas, Mr. Reberts and IRC representatives. Furthermore, please find enclosed four copies of the summary of items discussed with Mr. Fojas during his stay in Holland.

It appears from this, that the discussions with Mr. Noberts and Mr. Fojas have cleared up all outstanding problems, with the possible exception of one item on the Grab Hopper dredge.

In view of the advanced stage of design and manufacture of the wain engine, Mr. Roberts agreed that a change to twin engine propulsion was not to be recommended. As however, good manneuvrability is considered to be of extreme importance, an intermediate solution has been arrived at which consists of the fitting of a reverse clutch between the main engine and propeller, which will be operated from the wheel-house.

The extra cost would amount to approximately \$11,700,-. It is assumed that this extra amount could be taken out of the amount set aside for contingencies under the loan agreement with the World Enak.

We assume that you will want to defer a decision on this item until Wr. Fojas has returned. We have to stress however, that we would appreciate this matter to be decided upon with expediciency, as the design work has to be held up pending the decision.

We trust that otherwise the minutes are self-explanatory.

Boats of discussions are the above-mentioned report, I.H.C. comments on this report and Michael Baker's Jr. Inc. letter to the Director of Public Works, Banils, dated August 14th, 1861, with enclosures.

1. 1000 cub. yard seagoing hydraulic hopper dredge - Yard no. Co. 436

- a) Mr. Noberts is prepared to accept I.W.C.'s figure for hopper loading ratio after a wore detailed explanation of the proposed design of hopper and loading system, I.W.C. claims that their hopperloading system permits the use of a high ratio without unacceptable loss of loading efficiency.
- b) The proposed pumpmeter herespower as described in 1.H.C. o comments is satisfactory.

e) Corrying Capacity

- I.E.C. states that at a draft of 16'6" the vessel can corry 1000 cub.

 yards of 125 lbs/cub.ft, material (plus the fuel etc. as specified). E

 Further the height of the hoppercommings will be increased, so the
 can load 1328 cub.yard of 05 lbs/cub.ft, density. Thus in both cases
 a hopperload of 1830 meteric tons can be carried. To adjust the effective hoppervolume for different materials an adjustable overflow sill
 will be fitted. This sill will be fixed with bolts and can be re-edjusted when the dredge is moving to an other job with different materials.

 Care will be given to the design of this sill with a view to avoiding
 it being wedged fast by sand in the guides.
 - d) The vessel will remain affect with any one compertment flooded and with water in the happer to the line of flooding after flooding. To permit dumping of the happerload in case of flooding of the engineerom, when the hydraulic system cannot be operated, hand-operated by-pass valves will be fitted to open the better doors.

e) Echonounder

Mr. Roberts' requirements for a precision echosounder would be a 6" securacy down to 50 ft.

- The construction of hopperdoors and scaling rubber was discussed son found satisfactory. Mr. Roberts stresses the importance of rigidity of the doors.
- The resulting freehoard of 3'lR corresponds with the expected freehoard, according to International load line regulations, which is approx. 2'l'.

g) Hopper pumpout system Noth Mr. Fojas and My. Roberts consider the proposed pumpout system satisfactory for the naturials encountered in the Philippines, Mr. Moberts doubts its effectiveness in some sands as found in the U.S.A. (very sharp and coarse and tending to form stable area). Up to new I.M.C. has the experience that all materials that has been loaded in the hopper could be pumped out with this system b) Mr. Noberts stresses the importance of a quick acting connection for the shore discharge pipe. A ball joint with wingholts seems satisfectory.

j) Space for future installations of a gas ejection system is available. The required power (2x20 MP) will be available from the auxiliary generator, so the truncion hoist motors will not be working

k) The spare dragherd should in Mr. Roberts' opinion be of the corel drag type as used by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

simultaneously with the ejector system.

1) After some discussions on the design of the draghead gentries and the geometries of the dragpipe suspension, it is agreed that a ?' oftreach of the drag gantry will be acceptable.

m) Sterntube coal

All those present deal that a reliable rope guard design will be preferable to returning to the lignum withe sterntube lining. Mr. Poberts suggests to try and fit the guard to the propellerhub instead of the sterntube to svoid chafing through, Deposit welded cutting knives should be investigated,

m) I.E.C. will install a bellow-type recording load motor without extra charge.

e) I, M.C. has decided to fit the sandpump discharge with an overheadd discharge for light mixture, with welves hydraulically operated from the sheelhousen,

2, 14 inch cutterheed suction dredge - Yard nos, CO, 437/8/9

a) A squirred cage noter drive with hydrodynamic coupling for the cutterhead is considered estiminatory. I.H.C. confirms that the cutternotor can be started on the auxiliary generator.

b) The suction area of the suction pipe, being 17% in excess of the discharge pipe area, is considered sufficient. It is considered that generally the U.S. practice is to use higher discharge velocities than in Europe, this necessitating relatively larger custion pipes.

3. 500 out, ward seasoing srab hopeer dredge - Yard no. CO444

a) Carrying Canadity

A freeboard of 1'9" with a lead of 500 cub, yarde of 95 lbe/cub, ft. naterial (582 metric tons) is acceptable. The trim by the bow is expected to be in the order of 0", which is not considered harmful to course stability.

I.M.C. expects the speed with this load and the increased engine power (500 S.H.F. at 300 r.p.m.) to be approx. 9 knots, as originally spectited,

b) Single versus twin seres arrangement

After careful consideration of the desired manocuvrability, the state of progress of manufacturing of engine parts and design of the bull, it was decided that the extra expense and delay in delivery, caused by changing the design to twin screw, would not be justified by the anticipated gain in overall dredge putput. Manocuvring between finger piers would be easier with a wheelhouse controlled twin screw ship, but the vessel could back out from between piers when the width of the basin is too narrow for turning. The slight increase of time per dredging cycle (inclusive of travel and dumping) will not be important compared with the total time per cycle.

A cable was drafted and sent to Mr. Buendis, advising this gentleman of Mr. Fojas' and Mr. Roberts' decision to scoopt the existing gingle screw arrangement.

An alternative solution would be to fit a reversing clutch with wheelhouse control between main engine and propeller shafting. The price increase for supplying and fitting of this clutch would be approximately DG. 42,000... After consulting the clutch manufacturers, I.S.C. is prepared to accept this price as firm. Both Mr. Pojes and Mr. Boberts recommend this additional feature to be incorporated.

c) The dredging grame of Priestann type 628 will be provided with strute to handle heavy loads without extra charge.

4. 40 ton floating grane

Summary of items discussed between Nr. Fojas, representative of P.W.D. and representative of I.H.C. - Helland.

1. Lubricente

Mr. Fojas states that the fleet will be served by Calter and 1.8.C. will have the local Calter representation prepare lubricating charts for each wessel.

2, 40 tone floating crase - Yard so, CO, 1006

It is impossible to ship the crace poutoon complete, because of the symilable space on cargo ships. Therefore it is decided that the pentoen will be divided in two pieces after triels in Rolland. The two parts will be re-united in Hamila, using the facilities of a local part. Expenses to be for I.E.C. account.

The electrical circuits of the crane itself and the postson are independent. A possibility will be provided to supply current for lighting on the crane from the postson generator and the crane generator can supply surrent for the postson lighting and winch motors.

This facility will consist of connecting boxes and length of flexible cable with plugs and can be used only when the crame is not working. We are writing you with reference to our discussions in your office on Thursday, January 25, 1962, in connection with a number of questions received by you from Mr. Loudon of the International Bank for Reconstruction & Development, concerning the captioned contract. We would like to clarify these matters as follows:

- As indicated in a letter dated January, 1961 from Michael Baker, Jr., Inc. to the Secretary of Public Works & Communications in Manila, which letter has been made a part of their "Report on Survey of Existing and Proposed Dredging Equipment for a Nationwide Ports Development Program", also dated January, 1961, Mr. Walter H. Roberts has reviewed our contract specifications. He commented on certain parts of these specifications to which we replied with our letters of October 7 and November 3, 1961, addressed to the Director of Public Works in Manila, and of which copies are in your possession. The matters referred to in Mr. Roberts' letter of January, 1961 having been resolved, we believe that no further action is required on the part of Michael Baker, Jr., Inc. or of Mr. Walter H. Roberts, with respect to the captioned contract, until this contract becomes effective, at which time they will take up their active duties as consultants.
- b. We fully agree that the captioned contract should be amended to cover the additional equipment offered with our letter of November 3, 1961 and believe that this may be done most effectively by a Change-Order. We are

- c. Paragraph number 1 of Section I of the captioned contract outlines the rights of the Purchaser to appoint two (2) inspectors to supervise the construction of the dredge and pipelines. We are pleased to confirm that we will not interpret this provision as precluding inspections as contemplated by this Section I by the dredge design consultant of Michael Baker, Jr., Inc., even if he is not appointed as an inspector as provided in Paragraph I under this Section I.
- ment in the captioned contract as a result of negotiations carried out by us with your Department in Manila. A similar clause is contained in Ellicott's contract with your Department for the design, manufacture and delivery of an identical 20-inch dredge and equipment for the International Port of Manila, which is being financed under a loan agreement with the Eximbank. This clause does not in any way intend to prejudge the matter of additional manufacturing costs, but simply recognizes the right of the contractor to approach the proper authorities of the Philippines. In view of these facts, we believe that this clause should be retained in the captioned contract.
- e. Concerning Paragraph number 1 of Section U of the captioned contract, we wish to confirm that the "option" of your Government as provided therein to purchase another identical dredge is available to your Government in accordance with said paragraph regardless of the source of the funds used for the procurement thereof. In view of this undertaking on our part, we believe that it is in the best interest of your Government to retain Paragraph number 1 of Section U in the captioned contract.

We hope this information will clarify these questions to your satisfaction.

Dear Mr. Bautista:

On July 26, 1961 we submitted to the Secretary to the Department of Public Works and the Director of the Bureau of Public Works a set of drafts of the proposed agreement to build and deliver one (1) 20-inch hydraulic pipeline dredge and equipment. This draft agreement, dated July 25, 1961, was based on our existing agreement, dated October 6, 1960, which covers the manufacture and delivery of a 20-inch dredge and equipment of identical specifications and performance. However, as explained in our letter of July 26, 1961, reference E-39412, the contract prices of the draft agreement show an overall price increase of eight per cent (8%) of both the U. S. dollar and the Philippine peso portions.

It may be recalled that the existing agreement of October 6, 1960 contains a clause under Item S. 2, reading as follows:

"That the BUILDER, although maintaining the firm price in accordance with the letter of May 4, 1960, reserves the right to approach the proper authorities of the Philippines to request favorable consideration for additional manufacturing costs resulting

'from increase in costs of labor and materials incurred after May 4, 1960."

We now have the honor to request your favorable consideration for such overall price increase of eight per cent (8%) which represents the additional manufacturing costs resulting from increases in costs of labor and materials, incurred after May 4, 1960, up to and until this date of writing.

As regards the manufacturing costs in the United States, as represented by the U. S. dollar portion of the contract price, it has been necessary for Ellicott Machine Corporation to raise their overall wage standards twice between May 4, 1960 and this date of writing, by three per cent (3%) each time. This amounts to an overall wage increase of approximately six and one-tenth per cent (6.1%) over this period,

A careful sampling of our manufacturing records between May 4, 1960 and this date of writing has also shown an increase in the cost of materials for dredges and dredging machinery of identical type manufactured repeatedly during this period of time of approximately ten and seven tenths per cent (10.7%). We have, therefore, established that the overall increase in cost of manufacture at Ellicott's plants between May 4, 1960 and this date of writing, amounts to eight per cent (8%).

Because of the particular nature of our proposed agreement for the manufacture and delivery of one (1) 20-inch hydraulic pipeline dredge and equipment, which calls substantially for the supply of the machinery components from the United States, together with the structural steel and materials and prescribes the final manufacture, erection, assembly, installation and all other work required to make the complete dredging equipment by our licensees in the Philippines, the peso portion of the contract price is essentially a factor of the cost of labor at the plant of our Philippine licensees, the Atlantic, Gulf & Pacific Company of Manila, Inc., with appropriate adjustment for the supply of some locally available materials.

Our licensees in the Philippines have advised us that the cost of labor at their manufacturing plants has been increased by an overall percentage of eleven per cent (11%) during the period starting May 4, 1960 and until this date of

- 1. We refer to your two letters dated December 7, 1961 and enclosures, one dealing with the above project generally, the other with the 20-in. cutter dredge. These two letters, which reply to our letter of October h and reminding telegram and letters of November 13, 22 and 30, 1961 were not received in the Bank until December 29, 1961. Your letter dated January 2, 1962 now received also deals with these matters.
- 2. Referring to the paragraph numbers of our letter of October h, as also used in your general letter of December 7, we would like to make the following comment:
 - Para. 2(a) We acknowledge the receipt of the final version of the dredging program.
 - (b) (i)
 We note that your contract with Michael Baker, Jr., Inc.
 covers inspection by a dredge design consultant during
 building and presume that the consultant will accordingly be Mr. W. E. Roberts. We shall be glad if you will
 inform us of the number of visits which you are arranging for by Mr. Roberts to make and their approximate
 timing, (a) to IHC and (b) in due course to the yard of
 the builder of the 20-in cutter dredge.
 - (ii) Item J, Paragraph 7 of the IHC contract appears to refer to the supply by IHC of dredge engineers and dredge masters, i.e., the men referred to in Paragraph 3 of Hr. Moreno's letter of July 26, 1961, not the qualified persons to advise on the operation and maintenance of the dredging equipment and on the operation of the slipway and workshop dealt with in Paragraph 2 of the same letter, to whom our letter of October 4 referred.

It would appear important that the persons who will advise on dredge operation and maintenance should begin their work without delay. Will you kindly let us know what arrangements you propose to make in this respect and send us details of the qualifications of the men proposed to be appointed, and the suggested terms for their employment as soon as the information becomes available.

- (iii) We are unable to relate the matters dealt with in Annexes "B" and "C" enclosed with your letter to the recommendations regarding the IKC craft made by Mr. Roberts in his report of January 1961. This may be because, as far as we can trace, we have not received a copy of the report on Mr. Roberts' discussions with IHC in September 1961 referred to in Michael Baker's letter to you dated October 5, 1961. Will you please send us a copy of this by return mail?
- (iv) We note that you are arranging with Michael Baker, Inc. to review the designs and specifications of the slipway. Will you please inform us if these arrangements have been finalized and, if so, let us have a copy of the terms of reference you propose to give them in this matter?
- 3. We note that you have requested the Ellicott Machine Corporation to substantiate their claim for an 8% increase in the contract price for the 20-in. cutter dredge, but as of January 2 had not yet received a reply. We suggest that you press for this information, since as indicated in the last paragraph of our letter of Movember 30, 1961, we feel that no final countiteant should be entered into regarding this item until the Bank has had an opportunity of reviewing the detailed justification for the price increase.
- h. We make the following comment regarding the general terms of the draft agreement for the supply of the 20-in. cutter dredge (i.e., disregarding the question of price, which we will deal with when the information referred to in the preceding paragraph is received):
 - (a) We believe that Mr. Roberts examined and concurred in the terms of the agreement. Will you kindly confirm that this was the case?
 - (b) We suggest that either the document should be amended to cover the carrying out of the construction changes recommended by Mr. Roberts and referred to in Messrs. Ellicott's letters of October 7 and November 3, 1961, or a change order covering the work should be signed and issued simultaneously with the signing of the contract.
 - (c) We suggest that it should be made clear that Paragraph 1, Section I. does not preclude visits by the dredge design consultant during building.

- (d) It is felt that Paragraph 2, Section 8 does not serve any useful purpose and might preferably be omitted.
- (e) Paragraph 1, Section U appears no longer applicable and we suggest that it should be deleted.

The modifications covered by this Change orders are enumerated hereunder:

Philippines Dredging Project - Loan 290-PH Contract for 20-in, Cutter Suction Dredge

In our letter of October 4, 1961 we asked to be informed of the position regarding procurement of the 20-in. cutter suction dredge with pipeline, covered by item 1 (b) of Schedule 2 of the Loan Agreement. We also asked the position regarding the incorporation of the alterations in the project equipment recommended by Mr. Roberts, some of which apply to this dredge.

We have not yet received a reply to our letter, a second copy of which was sent with our letter of November 22 as requested in your telegram of that date. However on November 29 we received from Nr. J. S. Arvisu documents showing that Messrs. Ellicott have requested a 15% increase in the price of the dredge on account of alleged increases in costs since the bid was made, and including a draft contract embodying this increase. A copy of the Ellicott Corporation's letter dated November 3, 1961 giving estimates of the cost of various modifications suggested by Mr. Roberts totaling US\$18,680.30, was also included but no reference was made to instructions for these to be carried out.

We shall be glad if you will send us full information on these matters as a matter of urgency, including full details of the proposed increase in price and of the justification for it, a copy of the latest draft contract, and particulars of the arrangements being made to implement Mr. Roberts' recommendations.

In the meantime, it would be appreciated if no final commitment is entered into with respect of this item until the Bank has had the opportunity of reviewing the detailed justification for the price increase together with the latest draft revised contract and formed an opinion, which will be promptly sent to you.

With further reference to the discussions which our Mr. Elijah Rinehart, Jr. had with you and Director Julian Buendia on Tuesday morning, July 25, 1961, we are pleased to enclose a draft of our proposed Agreement to build and deliver one (1) 20-inch hydraulic pipeline dredge with floating and shore pipeline and spare parts, which dredge is to be a duplicate of the 20-inch dredge and equipment which we are to build for your Department in accordance with our Agreement dated December 9, 1980, and which was included in your loan agreement with the Export-Import Bank of Washington, D. C.

We are pleased to learn that your new loan agreement with the World Bank has now been finalized, and understand that this loan agreement includes the procurement of this second 20-inch hydraulic pipeline dredge with equipment, which you are awarding to us as a result of the worldwide public hidding conducted by your Department in May, 1980 and subsequently approved by the World Bank.

Dear Sir:

We are pleased to advise you that our Engineering Department has completed their review of the comments and suggestions contained on pages 17 and 18 and in Annex A of the above mentioned Ports Development Program report, submitted by Mr. Walter H. Roberts, P.E., Special Consultant for Michael Eaker, Jr., Inc. In response to these comments and suggestions, we are pleased to advise you that most of these matters were already incorporated in our design for this 20-inch dredge with pipeline equipment and spare parts, although they were not specifically mentioned in our contract proposal and specifications.

In some other cases we are now preparing a proposal for your consideration, including some of the additional tools and equipment which may be desired by your Department for this dredge.

We would like to reply in detail in the following manner, referring to the paragraphs by references as used in Mr. Roberts' report, pages 17 and 18 and in Annex A:

- 1. Reference Paragraph 4
 Main Deck House and Crew Accommodations:
 - b. The deck over the quarters will indeed extend to the railing line for protection of the quarters against the direct sun.
 - c. All overhead areas in the quarters area and the lever room will be fully insulated, as well as the sides of the lever room. This is in accordance with our standard practice.
- Reference Paragraph 7
 Dredging Pump:
 - a. The dredging pump will be split on the horizontal centerline to facilitate handling and repairs.
 - b. The inside diameter of the suction from the pump to the forward end of the ladder will measure 24-inches, in accordance with Ellicott's standard practice for efficient operation of dredging pumps of this type.
 - c. The flexible coupling installed between the diesel engine and the dredging pump is of the Falk type, which provides for adequate flexibility for both misalignment and for torsional vibrations. The entire installation, including the main diesel engine for driving the dredging pump, the impeller shaft and bearings and the pump impeller, have been carefully designed in connection with possible torsional vibration for the entire operating range of speed for both the engine and the pump, and all necessary provisions have been made to avoid torsional vibrations in this operating speed range.
- 3. Reference Paragraph 16
 Outfitting Equipment:

The outfitting equipment is believed to be adequate for normal conditions of maintenance and operation, but, in accordance with Mr. Roberts' suggestions,

we are now preparing a proposal for your consideration covering some additional special tools and testing equipment which may be desired. This proposal will be submitted to you within the next few days under separate cover.

Reference Paragraph 17 Painting:

All hull sections will be adequately protected with anti-corrosive coating prior to shipment. In addition, all surfaces damaged during assembly will be re-coated, and at least one standard coat each of marine anti-corrosive and antifouling paint will be applied prior to launching and final delivery.

Reference Section II, Paragraph 1 Discharge Pipelines:

All pipes and pontoons of the floating and shore discharge pipeline and auxiliary equipment will be properly painted in accordance with Ellicott's standard practice. An adequate supply of pipeline bolts, rubber seals and swing bolts for the ball joints will be furnished for the complete installation of the floating and shore pipeline prior to delivery. We are now preparing a proposal for your consideration, covering additional pipeline bolts, rubber gaskets and spare swing bolts, if desired, and this proposal will be submitted to you under separate cover within the next several days.

6. Reference Annex A:

The cutter which will be furnished with this 20-inch dredge is of the truncated cone type, with removable sheaths, and two (2) spare sets of cutter sheaths will be furnished in addition. One (1) of these sets will be of the straightedged type and the other set of the serrated edge type. In addition we could furnish a third set of cutter sheaths of manganese steel or chrome-nickel-moly-bdenum steel, with integral cast spike type teeth. While these teeth are not replaceable, they can be rebuilt by welding, in accordance with our standard practice, and detailed instructions for this will be furnished with the dredge. Our proposal for your consideration covering these additional sheaths with spike type teeth will be submitted to you within the next several days.

Philippines Dredging Project - Loan 290-PH Progress Reports, etc.

l. As explained while you were in Washington in connection with the Negotiations for the above loan, it is customary for the Bank to keep in touch with the carrying out of projects in connection with which loans have been made, and to obtain from the Borrower periodic reports showing the progress achieved. We shall accordingly be glad if you will send us progress reports in respect of the dredging project, giving the following information:

- (a) Progress made by THC in building the craft ordered from them, giving an approximate percentage of completion for each vessel together with brief description of the stage which construction has reached. The report should also cover, in due course, the progress made with the construction of the 20-in. cutter suction dredge.
- (b) Progress in connection with the proposed slipway and workshop. Initially this should cover progress in preparing the design and specifications, obtaining the bids, etc. When construction has begun, a simple bar-line or other progress chart, with a brief description of principal happenings affecting progress will suffice.
- (c) A brief report summarizing the progress made with the Department's overall dredging program, listing the ports at which work had been carried out during the period concerned, the amount dredged and the prevailing depths in each port.
- (d) A statement showing the receipts and expenditures of the Port Works Fund during the period concerned, broken down as in Appendix L, Project Studies and Report on Harbour Dredging (Procurement of Dredges Updated July 1960), and giving the amount standing in the Fund at the end of the period.

We suggest that, if convenient to you, the reports should be made at quarterly intervals, and that the first should cover the period October-December 1961. We shall be grateful if the report can be dispatched within, say, a month of the end of the period concerned. We would like to emphasize that we do not wish to impose any unnecessary burden on your staff in preparing reports especially for the Bank. If any reports are already prepared giving substantially the information listed above, e.g. in the case of (a) reports sent to you by IHC, or in the case of (b) departmental reports, copies of these will be adequate for our purpose.

- 2. We shall also be glad if you will send us as soon as possible information regarding the following matters connected with the project:
 - (a) A copy of the final version of the dredging program, with explanatory notes, as referred to in your letter to the Bank dated July 20, 1961.
 - (b) The position regarding the various matters dealt with in Secretary Moreno's letter to the Bank dated July 26, 1961. In particular, we should like to know what arrangements have been made in respect of the following:
 - (i) Inspection by a dredge construction consultant during building (paragraph 1 of the letter).
 - (ii) appointment of one or more qualified persons to advise on operations and maintenance of dredging equipment, etc. (paragraph 2).
 - (iii) The alterations to the project equipment recommended by Mr. Roberts (paragraph 4). Gould we please have a list of the alterations actually to be incorporated?
 - (iv) Obtaining a consultant's opinion on the design and specifications for the slipway and workshop (paragraph 5).

We should also be glad to know the present position regarding the 20-in. Cutter suction dredge, i.e. whether an order has been placed with the Ellicott Company on the basis of their original bid, or whether you have in mind to invite new bids.

- Referring to paragraph 6 of Secretary Moreno's letter, we shall be obliged if you will in due course send us the following in connection with principal contracts not yet let (e.g. the slipway, its workshop and machine tools, and the 20-in. Sutter suction dredge should you decide to call for new bids):
 - (a) A copy of the specifications, principal drawings, invitations to bid, form of contract and other bid documents, sufficiently early for the Bank to comment before bids are invited.

- (b) A copy of the analyses of the bids, and of the bid which it is proposed to accept, sufficiently early for the Bank to comment before a bid is accepted.
- (c) A copy of the contract finally entered into.

We presume that bids will be called for by advertisement in the Philippines press or by notification to the Embassies of Bank member countries. Should in any case bids be invited from a limited number of firms after pre-qualification procedure, e.g. in the case of the 20-in. cutter suction dredge if new bids are requested, we will appreciate being sent a list of the firms applying and of those selected for bidding to enable us to comment before the bids are actually invited.

THE ECONOMIC OUTLOOK IN THE PHILIPPINES

Summary

- 1. The memorandum of July 12, 1961, "Recent Economic Developments in the Philippines", I drew attention to the deterioration in the Philippines external situation which occurred in the first half of 1961, but concluded that this was likely to be reversed by early 1962. It also indicated that there was no basis for modifying the conclusions of the last Economic Report (R 60-52 dated May 2, 1960) that the prospects were good for maintaining a satisfactory growth rate over the longer run. These conclusions are supported, with some qualifications, by the more recent information provided by the Bank mission referred to in paragraph 6.
- 2. In the past nine months external reserves have fallen by 30% and now correspond to less than 3 months imports. This is mainly due to uncertainties and speculation associated with the transition to a freer exchange system now underway, but also in some degree, to domestic monetary pressures. This is a Presidential election year in the Philippines, and the chances are that no major action will be taken to remove the exchange uncertainties or stop monetary expansion until after the elections, which will take place in November. It seems likely, therefore, that some further deterioration will take place between now and the end of the year. Decisive action will be needed to reverse the present trend. The Philippine monetary authorities demonstrated in the period following the 1957 election that they are capable of taking such action. The changes made since 1957 in the exchange system and fiscal policy should make it easier to correct the present situation. On these grounds, it is expected that action will be taken by early 1962, and that a considerable improvement in the external and internal financial position will follow.

- For the longer run, the prospects are that the country should be able to continue increasing total income faster than the population growth. However, the rapid growth in population and labor force which has occurred since the War presents some difficult problems. To prevent large increases in unemployment, it will be necessary to increase the volume of investment substantially. Moreover, with the growth in young population, large increases in outlays on education, housing and other social services will be necessary just to keep per capita standards from declining. To finance these expanded requirements will require higher rates of saving and taxation out of domestic income. But, given the efforts that the country has already made to create a basis for continued growth, and since it is likely that these efforts will be intensified once the magnitude of the country's development problems are fully appreciated, it may be expected that considerable progress will be made during the next several years in coping with these problems.
- In light of all these considerations, it is concluded that there remains further scope for external borrowing by the Philippines on conventional terms. In view of the country's growth prospects, resources should be sufficient not only to meet the rising level of debt service, but also to permit increases in domestic investment and consumption. In the peak years 1965 and 1966, service on presently outstanding debt and on loans likely to be negotiated in the next twelve months including the proposed Angat loan would amount to about 8.5% of 1960 foreign exchange earnings and somewhat less of the earnings projected for that period.

Recent Developments in Production

5. The over-all growth rate between 1955 and 1959 averaged around 6%. In 1960 this dropped to around 4% mainly because of a slowdown in manufacturing, which had been a very rapidly expanding sector in the past. The recent sluggishness of manufacturing appears due partly to some slowing down of demand, a development which was reinforced in 1960 by tight fiscal and monetary policy; and partly to an increase in competition from imports, especially in 1961 when the decontrol program began to become effective. In 1960 and in 1961, output of the main export crops expanded sharply following better growing weather for coconuts and as the result of a higher U.S. allocation for sugar. The growth rate in domestic food crops slowed down in both years mainly because of typhoons in some of the producing areas. Partly because of this, and partly because of distribution difficulties, the country is again importing rice during 1961.

The External Situation

- In the first eight and a half months of 1961, Philippine foreign exchange reserves dropped by \$58 million as compared to a rise of \$108 million between the end of 1958 and 1960. Net reserves now stand at around \$134 million - or less than 3 months imports. Part of this drop is due to extraordinary debt repayment. The remainder is due to the maintenance of imports at or above 1960 rates in the face of a fall in export receipts. In the first half of the year, registered exports were 20% lower than the record rate reached in the first half of 1960, in spite of the fact that output of export crops was higher. One factor was a 20% drop in copra prices; another has been a substantial increase in underporting or withholding of exports in anticipation of a change in the exchange rate. The latter factor has also had a stimulating effect on those categories of imports and invisible payments which are still permitted at a preferred rate. Increases in private credit during 1961 have also helped keep import demand high.
- 7. Introduction of the final stage of the decontrol program, and the establishment of a more definite exchange rate will probably not take place until after the Presidential election in November. In the meantime, the situation may deteriorate and reserves may well drift down still further because of continued speculation and domestic monetary expansion. Once action is taken to remove the uncertainties about the exchange rate, a reversal of recent speculative tendencies is likely to produce a marked short run improvement in the situation. In addition, the Philippines will probably receive around \$70 million in War damage payments from the United States during 1962. Maintenance of external stability over the longer run will, of course, also require action to keep domestic monetary pressures down.

Internal Financial Situation

8. After the foreign exchange difficulties experienced in late 1957 (the last Presidential election year), the Philippines introduced emergency measures which stopped the loss of reserves and sharply reduced credit expansion during 1958. In June 1959 more basic action was introduced in the form of higher domestic taxes and a 25% margin fee on foreign exchange transactions. This led to a sizeable budget surplus during the fiscal year 1959/60, so that despite an \$85 million increase in reserves, the money supply grew by only 1%. Nevertheless, retail prices rose by around 2% and wholesale prices by 4%. Real output also rose, so that total liquidity - measured as the ratio of money supply to GNP at current prices - fell sharply. During the fiscal year ending June 30, 1961, private credit was permitted to rise substantially and the money supply increased by 12.5% even though reserves fell by \$42 million.

In view of the prior drop in liquidity, some increase was probably necessary in this period to permit the economy to adjust to the higher peso cost of imports resulting from the changes in the exchange rate which were introduced in three stages between April 1960 to March 1961. Indeed, prices continued to rise in 1960/61 at only about the same rate as 1959/60, despite a much steeper rise in the cost of most imports, resulting in a profit squeeze on many importers and manufacturers.

9. There are indications that monetary expansion may have slowed down somewhat in July and August 1961. However, the Government has indicated plans for a considerable rise in public spending for the September-December period, and it is likely that private credit will also continue to expand in this period. Thus, it seems probable that final action on the exchange rate will have to be accompanied by action to reduce domestic monetary pressures if financial stability is to be fully restored. However, in view of the performance of the monetary authorities in the 1958-59 period, and of their awareness of what needs to be done now, it seems probable that adequate measures will be taken when the elections are over.

The Longer Run Outlook

10. In the 1950's, real output expanded at a rate averaging 5-6% per annum. Expansion of a similar order of magnitude or even higher will be needed over the next 5 to 10 years in order to sustain growth in per capita income and to prevent large increases in unemployment. The Philippines have experienced an explosive growth in population and labor force since World War II. Total population growth is now estimated to be in excess of 3% annually, perhaps as much as 3.5%. The annual increments to the labor force are now around 3%, as compared to 2% in the early part of the last decade. Moreover, the country is likely to experience a deterioration in its terms of trade with an adverse impact on growth in real income, as a result of the likely lower prices for some of its major export products which face an inelastic world demand.

Domestic credit operations of the Central Bank actually showed a moderate contraction in these months. Data on the operations of the commercial bank beyond June are not yet available.

- 11. In the past 5 years, the expansion in aggregate output of around 5.5% per year has been accompanied by average increases of 4% annually in current foreign exchange receipts. The lower export prices expected for copra and manila hemp (which together accounted for 40% of total commodity exports in 1960) will exercise a dampening effect on growth in aggregate export earnings in the next five years. Total current account receipts will also be affected by a gradual decline in U.S. payments to Philippine veterans. A major offsetting factor is the expansion in the Philippine sugar export to the U.S. provided the country retains the 50% increase in U.S. sugar allocation granted in 1961. With the latter, current account earnings in 1965-66 are likely to be 17% higher than the record level reached in 1960; without an increase in sugar the expansion would be only around 12% or 2% per year.
- 12. It should be borne in mind, however, that the change in the exchange rate has considerably improved the longer-run export prospects for a number of other agricultural crops, for minerals, and even for some manufactured goods. Given time to develop markets and make the necessary investments, a substantial rise in such exports seems quite possible. By the second half of the decade, this could well lead to a higher growth in total foreign exchange earnings than the rate expected in the next several years. Appropriate support from government policies could help considerably in this respect.
- But, in any event, a continued high rate of growth in output for the domestic market will be essential if the Philippines is to achieve what might be regarded as reasonable targets for economic development. In some sectors of agriculture, there appear to be good prospects of expanding output with quite moderate additional outlays on inputs such as fertilizer and better seed. However, in other sectors of agriculture and in much of manufacturing, the most logical areas of further development will involve increased capital intensity: e.g., livestock production, metal refining and fabricating, chemicals, food processing, plywood, etc. This means a greater outlay per job than in the past. Large increases in capital expenditures on transport, communications and power will also be needed to support growth in the commodity producing sectors. At the same time, the increased growth rate in the school age population and in family formation mean a large rise in the need for schools, housing and other social services just to keep per capita standards from deteriorating. All this implies an expansion in the rate of investment and an increase in current public sector outlays. In addition, the country will have to devote some of its resources to increasing its international reserve, if they are to provide adequate support when decontrol is completed.
- 14. While the Philippines may count on continuing foreign capital inflow, it is unlikely that the latter will be available to such an extent as to enable the country to rely mainly on foreign savings for the solution of its development problems. Most of the increase in requirements for private investments and public sector outlays will have to come from savings and taxes out of domestic income. This may prove difficult politically. However, the Philippine authorities have shown on several occasions

in the post-war period that they can take politically unpopular measures when necessary. And since the longer run alternative to early action to increase investment is rising unemployment and deteriorating standards of social services, the chances seem good that once the nature of the problem is understood, intensified efforts will be made by the government along these lines.

15. Between the end of 1959 and mid-1961 the reported external public debt of the Philippines fell from \$130 million to \$113 million. Private debt covered by government exchange guarantees, although rising much less rapidly than in the preceding two years, advanced from \$173 million to \$197 million, thus bringing total external debt outstanding in mid-1961 to \$310 million. The debt service on this amount during the next four years will average 6.5% of 1960 foreign exchange earnings, dropping to 5% in the period 1965-67, and declining sharply thereafter. Within the next twelve months, however, loans authorized or under negotiation may result in new external indebtedness of \$200 million. Formalities following the successful negotiation of the sale of Manila's U.S.-owned electric utility company to private Philippine interests are almost complete and will result in an external debt of \$11 million. The \$62.3 million U.S. Eximbank loan for an integrated steel mill has been approved but signing is not expected until early 1962. Eximbank loans currently under negotiation include loans for a copper refinery and for harbor and civil aviation improvement totalling \$\text{14} l million. These, together with the proposed Angat loan and an allowance for some increase in suppliers' credits, would raise debt service in the peak period 1965-65 to an average of 8.5% of 1960 earnings. This should be well within the Philippines! capacity for debt service considering the favorable prospects for economic growth,

It was a pleasant surprise to get your letter of August 2, even if it was on such a prosaic subject as dredging in the Philippines. I had not heard of you for some time and hope all is well with you. I come up to New York from time to time and on the next occasion we should get together for lunch.

I cannot give a very precise answer to your question about the Philippine dredging program. The largest amount of work has to be done in the north and south harbours of Manila. In addition, substantial dredging will probably be done in Tacloban, Cebu and in the Pasig River. The whole program is, of course, to be carried out over a number of years and will probably be changed from time to time. For what it is worth, however, I attach a list of the ports with the proposed depths; this represents roughly the present thinking. If you want more detail, it would probably be best for your people in Manila to get in touch with the Ports and Harbours Division of the Department of Public Works. However, if there is anything more you think we can tell you, do not hesitate to write.

16. Justification

New equipment is needed to replace the old dredgers and to increase the capacity, to make good the arrears of maintenance dredging resulting from the war: deeper channels are needed because of larger ships; and recurring natural siltation has to be offset.

Adequate depths of the Philippine ports will make possible large but indeterminate economic benefits. Easy access to the ports will safeguard the world market position of the Philippines as affected by ocean transport, trans-shipment and cargo handling costs, keep down the prices of essential imports and stimulate the inter-island trade.

17. Project Description

The Project is the dredging of the Borrower's public ports to provide depths of water adequate for the navigational needs of inter-island and ocean-going shipping, and dredging thereafter to maintain such depths. To this end, the Borrower will, inter alia:

- 1. Acquire, operate, maintain and repair
 - a. One hopper dredge of approximately 1,000 cu. yd. hopper capacity;
 - b. One 20-in. cutter-suction dredge with pipeline;
 - c. Three 14-in. cutter-suction dredges with pipelines;
 - d. One self propelled grab hopper dredge;
 - e. One work launch;
 - f. Two dredge tenders;
 - g. One floating crane of 40 tons capacity; and
 - h. Echo sounding equipment.
- 2. Procure spare parts for this equipment.
- 3. Design, construct and operate a slipway and workshop for repair of the dredging equipment of the Borrower's Department of Public Works, Communications and Transportation.

18. Phasing

- a) Delivery schedule for the loan financed goods: 12 14 months
- b) Financing: The local currency to assemble and commission the bank financed equipment, to operate, maintain and repair it, and to reimburse the government from the debt service, would come from a Fort Works Fund set up by law as a separate account in the National Treasury. It is fed by various port user charges. Should not sufficient local currency be forthcoming from the Fund the Government will make the necessary funds available from other sources.

21. Organization

The responsibility for dredging the national and municipal ports and harbors and for planning and design of port extensions is in the hands of the "Division of Ports and Harbors" (DPH), a division of the Bureau of Public Works, which is an agency of the Department of Public Works, Communications and Transportation. Actual construction of the civil works and their maintenance is carried out under supervision of the local engineers of the Bureau of Public Works itself. The DPH is not charged with the administration of the Philippine ports. DPH's funds are provided by the Port Works Fund. DPH personnel are technically competent. However, the general standards of operating and maintaining the Division's dredging equipment are not at present adequate.

22. Consultants

One or more qualified persons are to be engaged to advise on dredge maintenance and operation and on the operation of the repair facilities. Experienced dredge chief engineers and qualified masters to be supplied by the builders, will be employed to train dredge personnel.

23. Extracts from Loan Agreement

Section 5.02- The Borrower shall cause the goods purchased with the proceeds of the Loan to be efficiently operated and adequately maintained and shall cause all necessary repairs thereof to be made, all in accordance with sound engineering practices.

Section 5.08(a) The Borrower shall satisfy the Bank that adequate arrangements have been made to insure the goods financed out of the proceeds of the Loan against damage or loss during their construction outside of, and importation

into, the territories of the Borrower; such insurance shall be consistent with sound commercial practice and shall be payable in the currency in which the cost of the goods insured thereunder shall be payable.

Section 5.08 (b) Except as the Borrower and the Bank shall otherwise agree, the Borrower shall, in addition to the insurance provided for in subparagraph (a) of this section, take out or cause to be taken out, and maintain or cause to be maintained, insurance with a commercial insurer on the floating equipment financed out of the proceeds of the Loan against such risks and in such amount as shall be consistent with sound commercial practice; such insurance shall be payable in the currency in which the cost of the goods insured thereunder shall be payable.

In the course of the loan negotiations and particularly in discussing Section 5.01 of the Loan Agreement of even date herewith between Republic of the Philippines and the Bank, we advised you that we attach great importance to the efficient use and proper upkeep of our dredging fleet operated by the Department of Public Works, Communications and Transportation, part of which is to be financed under the loan. We are now writing to confirm the following understanding:

- 1. In reply to your letter of the 9th instant, I have the honor to state that the Republic of the Philippines, acting through the President or any representative designated by him, is legally authorized to enter into a loan agreement with the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development, Washington, or any foreign lending institution for that matter, for the purpose of financing the acquisition of dredges and other equipment to be used in the development and improvement of the international port facilities of Manila and other national ports.

Accordingly, a loan agreement of the above tenor, if and when entered into, will be valid and binding upon the Republic of the Philippines.

This conclusion is, in the main, based upon the same considerations which impelled this Department to hold in Opinion No. 27, current series (copy enclosed), that the loan agreement concluded by the Republic of the Philippines with the Export-Import Bank of Washington is legally authorized.

I may add that there is more reason to uphold the authority of the Philippine Government to enter into the proposed loan agreement with the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development. For under the recently enacted Public Works Act of 1961, the acquisition of foreign loans by the Republic of the Philippines for the construction and/or improvement of portworks projects is expressly authorized. See Section 5, Title J(e).

Sir:

This is in reply to your letter of December 5, 1960 requesting opinion on whether the agreement recently concluded by the Republic of the Philippines and the Export-Import Bank of Washington, whereby the latter extends a lean to the former in the amount of \$14,650,000.00 for the purpose of financing the development and improvement of the international part facilities of the Manila harbor, is legally authorized and binding upon the Philippine Government. This opinion, it is said, is required under the agreement and constitutes a condition precedent to the first utilization of the lean thereunder.

Section 4 of Republic Act No. 2701, insofar as pertinent, reads as follows:

"Soc. 4. Apportionment of Portworks Special Fund. The following sums or so much thereof as may be necessary are hereby apportioned out of the Portworks Special Fund that have accrued under Act No. 3592 as amended by Commonwealth Act No. 130 and by Republic Act No. 1216 (and Republic Act No. 2695) not otherwise apportioned, to be released by the Secretary of Public Works and Communications pursuant to the provisions hereinafter set forth and for the purposes mentioned hereunder:

"Title J. - PORTWORKS

*a. For the construction and/or improvement of projects which are to be financed partly from the proceeds of leans from foreign lending institutions:

(Emphasis supplied.)

The underscored portion of the quoted legal provision is indubitably indicative of the desire of the Congress to finance the improvement of the Port of Manila partly from the proceeds of

foreign loans and constitutes, in my opinion, sufficient legislative authority for the loan agreement here in question. Indeed, it has to be so. Otherwise, the contemplated improvement of the Manila harbor will fail of realization for lack of indispensable dollar funds. In this connection, it is relevant to cite the familiar maxim of statutory construction to the effect that an interpretation subversive of a clear legislative objective should, if possible, be shunned. For it is a settled and universally accepted legal principle that a statute should be so interpreted, liberally if necessary, as to effectuate, not frustrate, its purposes and objectives.

This view finds confirmation in act No. 3592, as amended by Commonwealth Act No. 130 and Republic Acts Nos. 1216 and 2695, which provides that out of the total collection of port fees and charges accruing to the Portworks Fund, which is approximately P20 million annually, "there is hereby set aside first, such sums as may be necessary to reimburse the General Fund for the x x x payment of x x x loans acquired by the National Government for the development, construction and improvement of ports". (Section 1)

Having reached the conclusion that there is adequate legislative authority for the Philippine Government to secure foreign loans wherewith to develop the Manila harbor, the question arises: who shall exercise the power? Since the applicable laws do not stipulate any official, I am led to believe that the authority to procure foreign loans, which is clearly executive in character, necessarily devolves upon the President, being himself the Executive. (See Springer v. Philippine Government, 277 US 189, 72 L.M. 845.) But there is no legal necessity for the President personally to negotiate and execute or sign the loan contracts. He may delegate the power to whomsever may merit his trust. (See Opinions of the Secretary of Justice, No. 280, series of 1958; No. 230, series of 1959.)

In view of the foregoing and after having carefully examined the provisions of the instant loan agreement, I have the honor to state that the same has been validly entered into and consequently binding upon the Republic of the Philippines in accordance with its terms; and that the promissory notes therein stipulated, if and when signed and issued in pursuance thereof, will constitute valid and binding obligations of the Philippine Government in accordance with their terms.

FOURTH CONGRESS OF THE REPUBLIC OF THE PHILIPPINES Third Session

[REPUBLIC ACT No. 2694]

AN ACT TO AMEND CERTAIN PROVISIONS OF SEC-TIONS THIRTY-SEVEN AND SIXTY-FOUR OF COMMONWEALTH ACT NUMBERED ONE HUN-DRED FORTY-ONE.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

SECTION 1. The first paragraph of Section thirty-seven and subparagraph (a) of Section sixty-four of Commonwealth Act Numbered One hundred forty-one are hereby amended to read as follows:

"SEC. 37. The annual rental of the land leased shall not be less than three per centum of the value of the land, according to the appraisal and reappraisal made in accordance with section one hundred sixteen of this Act; except for lands reclaimed by the Government, which shall not be less than four per centum of the appraised and reappraised value of the land: Provided, That one-fourth of the annual rental of these lands reclaimed prior to the approval of this Act shall accrue to the construction and improvement portion of the Portworks Fund: And provided: further, That the annual rental of not less than four per centum of the appraised and reappraised value of the lands reclaimed using the Portworks Fund after the approval of this Act shall all accrue to the construction and improvement portion of the Portworks Fund. But if the land leased is adapted to and be devoted for grazing purposes, the annual rental shall be not less than two per centum of the appraised and reappraised value thereof. Every contract of lease under the provisions of this chapter shall contain a clause to the effect that a reappraisal of the land leased shall be made every ten years from the date

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of the approval of the lease, if the term of the same shall be in excess of ten years. In case the lessee is not agreeable to the reappraisal and prefers to give up his contract of lease, he shall notify the Director of Lands of his desire within the six months next preceding the date on which the reappraisal takes effect, and in case his request is approved, the Director of Lands may, if the lessee should so desire, proceed in accordance with section one hundred of this Act."

"SEC. 64. (a) The rental shall not be less than three per centum of the appraised or reappraised value of the land plus one per centum of the appraised or reappraised value of the improvements, except for lands reclaimed by the Government which shall not be less than four per centum of the appraised or reappraised value of the land plus two per centum of the appraised or reappraised value of the improvements thereon: Provided, That twentyfive per centum of the total annual rental on all lands reclaimed prior to the approval of this Act and one per centum of the appraised or reappraised value of improvements shall accrue to the construction and improvement portion of the Portworks Fund: And provided, further, That the annual rental on lands reclaimed using the Portworks Fund together with the fee due on account of the improvement thereon after the effectivity of this Act shall all accrue to the construction and improvement portion of the Portworks Fund."

SEC. 2. This Act shall take effect on July first, nineteen hundred and sixty.

AN ACT TO FURTHER AMEND ACT NUMBERED THIRTY-FIVE HUNDRED AND NINETY-TWO, KNOWN AS THE "PORTWORKS FUND ACT," AS AMENDED BY COMMONWEALTH ACT NUMBERED ONE HUNDRED AND THIRTY AND REPUBLIC ACT NUMBERED TWELVE HUNDRED AND SIXTEEN, AND TO PROVIDE FOR THE DISBURSEMENT OF SAID FUND.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:

SECTION 1. Section one of Act Numbered Thirty-five hundred and ninety-two, as amended by Commonwealth Act Numbered One hundred and thirty and Republic Act Numbered Twelve hundred and sixteen, is hereby further amended to read as follows:

"SECTION 1. All wharfage fees, harbor fees, berthing charges, storage charges, and net income from the share of arrastre charges as defined under Republic Act Numbered Thirteen hundred seventy-one, as incorporated under Republic Act Numbered Nineteen hundred thirty-seven, and all tonnage dues defined under sections fourteen hundred seventeen and fourteen hundred eighteen of the Revised Administrative Code, collected in our ports from the date on which this Act takes effect, shall be deposited in the National Treasury and shall form a special fund to be known as 'Portworks Fund,' which shall be disbursed in accordance with Acts of Congress, for the study, investigation and field surveys, research, planning, development, construction, improvement, maintenance and repair of ports, port facilities and port areas, warehouses, sheds and offices, buoys, lighthouses, and other aides onavigrajon,

including the purchase, maintenance, rental charges, and replacement of necessary equipment: Provided, however, That out of the total annual collection, there is hereby set aside first, such sums as may be necessary to reimburse the General Fund for the redemption or payment of bonds issued or loans acquired by the National Government for the development, construction and improvement of ports: Provided, further, That fifty per centum of the remainder of the fund so formed is hereby set aside for the necessary expenses for the study, investigation and field surveys, research, maintenance and repair of ports, port facilities and port areas including warehouses, sheds and offices, buoys, lighthouses and other aids to navigation belonging to the National Government, dredging, quarrying, and improvements incidental to such maintenance and repair, including the purchase, repair and rental charges and replacement of necessary equipment, to be allotted by the Secretary of Public Works and Communications, with the approval of the President, upon certification by the Secretary of Finance that the necessary funds are available: And provided, further, That the remaining fifty per centum of the remainder of the fund so formed shall be appropriated by Acts of Congress for development, planning, construction, and improvement of ports, port facilities and port areas, including warehouses, sheds and offices, buoys, lighthouses and other aids to navigation, including the acquisition and operation of construction equipment."

SEC. 2. This Act shall take effect on July first, nineteen hundred and sixty.

for dredging equipment

The World Bank today made a loan equivalent to \$8.5 million to the Republic of the Philippines to finance equipment needed for a program of dredging and maintaining harbors and ports at depths satisfactory for ocean-going and inter-island shipping. The island-economy of the Philippines is heavily dependent on efficient sea communications in its foreign and domestic trade. The new equipment will make possible the additional dredging needed for the safe navigation and ready maneuvering of ships using the country's public ports.

Seven private banks are participating in the loan, without the World Bank's guarantee, for a total amount of \$920,000 representing the first five maturities which fall due between September 15, 1963 and September 15, 1965. The participating banks are the New York Agency of The Chartered Bank, the New York Agency of The Hongkong and Shanghai Banking Corporation, Bank of America National Trust and Savings Association, The Chase Manhattan Bank, The First National City Bank of New York, Manufacturers Trust Company and National Bank of Commerce of Seattle.

The Philippine archipelago consists of 7,100 islands, extending 700 miles east-west and 1,200 miles north-south. All towns of any size are located on or near a coast. The coastal towns are not only the trade centers of their local areas but are also clearing points for the foreign and inter-island trade of the agricultural, forestry and mineral areas of the interior. Of the 351 public ports, 25 are ports of entry for vessels engaged in foreign trade.

Manila is the most important port, especially for imports and trans-shipment, but many other ports handle a substantial amount of cargo.

About 5,700 ships a year call at Philippine ports to load exports and discharge imports. The main exports are copra products, sugar, hardwood, abaca and minerals, including chrome, iron and copper. Imports include such essential items as petroleum, machinery, vehicles, wheat, chemicals, paper, yarn and fabrics. Upwards of 8.2 million tons of export-import cargo moved through the ports of entry in the year 1958-59. In the same year coastal and inter-island traffic amounted to about 4 million tons at the country's largest ports.

The dependence of the Philippine economy on ocean transport emphasizes the importance of dredging harbors to accommodate ships carrying its exports and imports. Freight charges must be kept at reasonable rates since Philippine exports are sold in highly competitive world markets and also to avoid raising the cost of imported goods which would have an adverse effect on foreign exchange holdings.

There is now a serious need for additional dredging in Philippine ports for regular maintenance, for port improvements and for greater depths to accommodate the larger ships now in use. Arrears in maintenance dredging trace back to the complete cessation of dredging during World War II. The arrears have continued to grow in the past 15 years because of the age and inadequate capacity of the dredging equipment at the disposal of the Philippine authorities. In addition, port extensions have enlarged the navigational and turning areas which require regular dredging.

Navigational dredging at Philippine ports is the responsibility of the Division of Ports and Harbors (DPH) of the Bureau of Public Works. DPH has worked out a dredging program to be carried out over the next ten years to reduce maintenance arrears, effect improvements and ensure normal maintenance. Channels and turning areas of Manila Harbor will be dredged to 40 feet below the low water mark, most of the ports of entry to 35 feet and the ports for inter-island shipping to depths varying from 15 to 25 feet.

The equipment being financed by the Bank loan will provide some of the equipment needed for this program. It consists of one hopper dredge, one cutter suction dredge, four small dredges and auxiliary equipment, one 40-ton floating crane and equipment for the construction of a slipway and a workshop for the repair of the dredging fleet. Most of the equipment has already been ordered on the basis of international bidding and the remainder will be procured on the same basis.

The loan is for a term of 17 years and bears interest at the rate of 5-3/4% per annum including the 1% commission which is allocated to the Bank's Special Reserve. Amortization will begin September 15, 1963.
