On Our Cover . . .

The history of a group of Eskimos living near Ungava Bay is told Monday, June 17, on *Camera Canada* in a program entitled *The Annanacks*. Film shows their way of life and how it is being affected by the white man's civilization. (See article, page 13.)

Lyal Brown, known to viewers for his work on *Eye to Eye*, will conduct the search into the past, talking to a variety of Manitobans who have lived amidst some of the important events of history, and are able to give first-hand accounts of them.

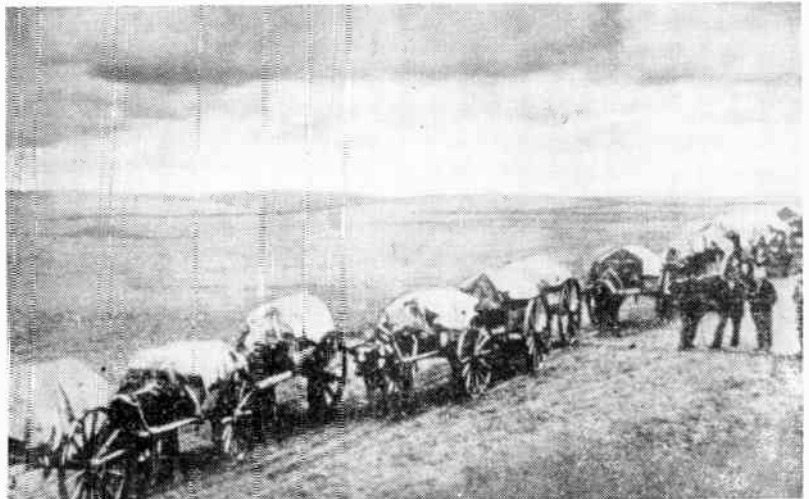
A LIGHT footnote to history is recalled by Grace Tully, President Roosevelt's private secretary, during a filmed interview for *Winston Churchill—The Valiant Years*, seen each Sunday on the CBC television network.

In December 1942, Churchill was at the White House, and Miss Tully came across him in a White House corridor. She told him that she had just seen a news magazine photograph of his recently-born grandchild (Randolph Churchill's son) and that she was struck by the great resemblance between the infant and his paternal grandfather.

Churchill nodded and answered, "Quite. Didn't you know that I look like all babies, and all babies look like me?"

HISTORY IN MANITOBA is comparatively short. The span of a single life reaches back to the beginnings of settlement in the province. The memories of those still living can include a kaleidoscope of major events and minor episodes, stretching back to early pioneer settlement.

A new public affairs program that started June 6 on CBWT, *The Trail of '63* will travel back in time in the company of old-timers to re-create the way of life that shaped the province of today. It will be seen at 10:30 p.m. each Thursday.

The WEATHER:

They're No Longer Just Talking About It

EVERYBODY TALKS ABOUT THE weather, goes the old saying, but nobody does anything about it. The old saw isn't exactly true nowadays, however, for a great many people are studying it, discussing it, even trying to change it. Some of the new theories about meteorology and the modern devices used in weather study will be examined on this week's edition of *The Twentieth Century*, to be seen Sunday, June 16 on CBC-TV.

Such old-fashioned weather indicators as aching arthritic joints and the behaviour of squirrels and woodchucks are no longer accurate enough for serious forecasting, although the farmers' almanacs still confidently predict weather for an entire year at a time, basing their predictions on such phenomena. Today's professional weather-men employ the latest scientific devices — satellites, rockets, computers, radar among them — in attempting to discover not only what the weather's going to be, but *why* it's going to be that way. Man first began wondering about the "why" of the weather almost 2,500 years ago, yet some of the answers are still as remote as they have ever been.

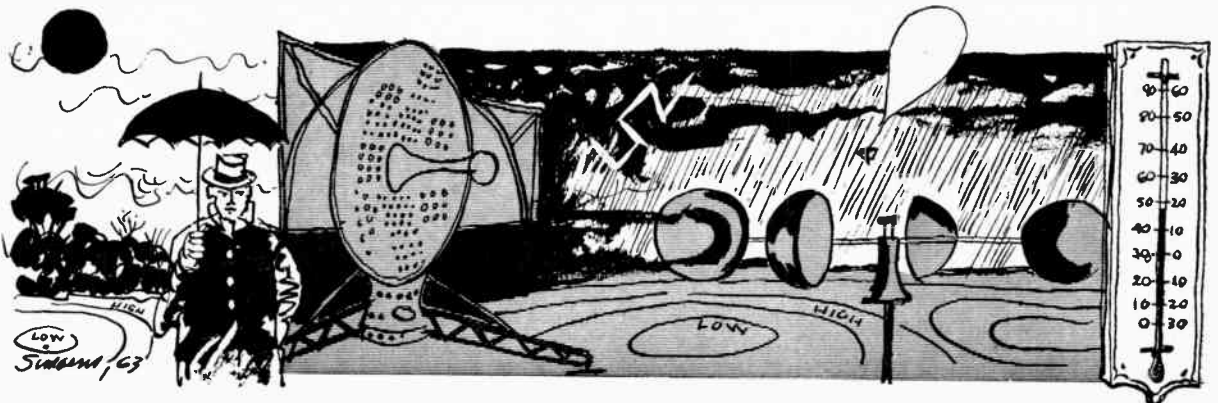
Control of the world's weather, if it were ever achieved by man, would make his earlier scientific accomplishments seem puny by comparison. Nothing in nature wreaks more havoc than the force of weather; hundreds of deaths, thousands of injuries, and millions of dollars worth of damage are incurred every year by the devastation of tornadoes, hurricanes, floods, and droughts. Man could not only protect himself against the depredations of these forces, but could put them to work for his benefit, turning thousands of square miles of deserts into fertile areas, for example, or causing rainfall to be harnessed for power. As a weapon, weather control could be many times more formidable than nuclear power: vast areas could be flooded, enemy forces

could be destroyed by man-made storms, or a country's economy could be paralyzed by the destruction of food crops.

But control of the weather is still a long way in the future, if it ever is to be achieved at all. Some tentative steps have been taken, such as "seeding" rain clouds with dry ice, silver iodide or other chemicals to induce rain, but these are only primitive and rudimentary devices. Of much greater importance is the research being done into weather forecasting. Some of the tools being used by weather research scientists are shown on this week's program: the Tiros satellites, packed with 300 pounds of highly complex electronic gear, including two television cameras, to probe the secrets of the upper atmosphere; the Robin balloons and Arcas rockets, which are sent 50 miles above the earth to find answers so far available in no other way; the Nomad buoys, unmanned weather-reporting stations that automatically send in weather information from lonely ocean outposts thousands of miles from land; the various specially-designed aircraft that are flown directly into the most dangerous storms and hurricanes so that observers can examine the turbulence at close range.

As a by-product of weather study, researchers have come up with some fascinating theories about how the changes in climate and temperature can affect our lives. Day-to-day changes in the weather, it seems, influence the highly sensitive human mechanism in subtle and mysterious ways. Some of the findings: Most of us do our best work in spring and fall, our worst in mid-summer and mid-winter—college students, for example, are said to make their best marks in October and November, April and May; more patents are amended, more books taken from libraries, more symphonies written during good

Norman Birkett's powers of persuasion as a criminal lawyer were said to be a menace to the administration of justice, but he later made amends by serving with distinction as a judge. This radio series presents some of his most noted cases.

Advocate Extraordinary

The Rt. Hon. Lord Birkett.



SIR PATRICK HASTINGS, a prominent British lawyer of a generation ago, once paid this witty tribute to one of his fellow advocates: "If it had ever been my lot to decide to cut up a lady in small pieces and put her in a suitcase, I should without hesitation have placed my future in Norman Birkett's hands. He would have satisfied the jury (a) that I was not there; (b) that I had not cut up the lady; (c) that if I had, she thoroughly deserved it anyway."

The man to whom this generous, if tongue-in-cheek compliment was paid was one of the great trial lawyers of his time. The late Rt. Hon. Lord Birkett, Privy Councillor, during his distinguished career was a Queen's Counsel, Judge of the King's Bench Division, High Court of Justice, and Lord Justice of Appeal. A graduate of Cambridge, where he was President of the Cambridge Union in 1910, Birkett was called to the Bar, Inner Temple, in 1913, and during the 1920s and '30s he became known as one of the ablest legal men in England. He won fame for his ability both in civil actions and in criminal cases, and he gained so many acquittals on sensational murder charges that he dominated that sphere without a rival. One learned judge is reported to have said of him that his powers of persuasion were "a positive menace to the administration of justice."

Lord Birkett became a judge in 1941 (thereby reducing his annual earnings from £30,000 to £5,000), was appointed as one of the judges at the Nuremburg trials of Nazi leaders after the Second World War, and retired in 1958 at the age of 74. He died 16 months ago in London.

This week, CBC Radio begins a series of six programs, prepared originally for the BBC by Edgar Lustgarten, based on some of Lord Birkett's most famous cases. The programs, to be heard on Tuesday mornings, are similar to an earlier series created by Lustgarten (*Prisoner at the Bar*) in which he reconstructed famous trials of the past, playing the roles of all the participants himself.

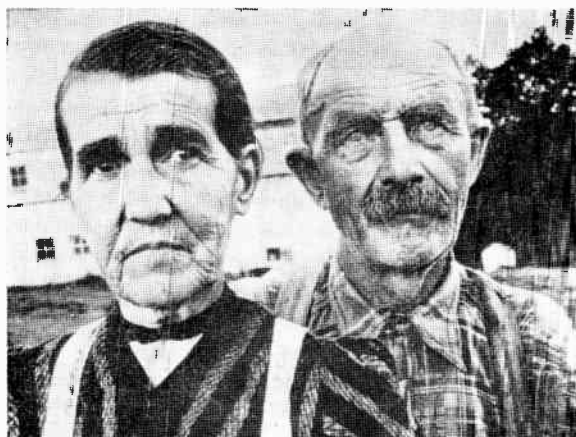
The present series, entitled *Advocate Extraordinary*, will deal with six of Birkett's cases, five of them murder trials, the other an action for libel in which Birkett defended Lord Gladstone, son of the famous British statesman.

The first program, to be heard June 18, concerns the trial of Mrs. Beatrice Pace, accused of murder in 1928 and successfully defended by Birkett. Succeeding broadcasts will deal with: the trial of Mrs. Sarah Hearne, charged with having poisoned her sister and the wife of a neighbour—Birkett appearing for the defence; the Gladstone libel suit; the trial of A. A. Rouse, in 1931, on a charge of murder, with Birkett appearing for the Crown; the trial of Dr. Buck Ruxton, convicted of murder—one of the very few cases in which Birkett was unsuccessful in obtaining an acquittal for his client; and the trial of Tony Mancini, whom Birkett defended in a murder case in 1934.

Edgar Lustgarten is a barrister by training and he has had long experience in radio and films. Regarding the new series of programs, he writes: "*Advocate Extraordinary* differs from *Prisoner at the Bar* only insofar as the title implies. The spotlight falls now entirely upon counsel—and upon a counsel of remarkable attainments. I hope to give, in the series, something not entirely unworthy of the great forensic figure who was its inspiration."

VINTAGE YEARS



Old age is dreaded by many, and seemingly for good reason. It is not the time of tranquillity that it might be. CLOSE-UP points out Sunday, June 16.

“NEARLY EVERYONE wants to live to a ripe age but they don’t want to grow old,” says writer-director George Ronald of CBC-TV’s *Close-Up* series. “According to the experts, aging is a stage in living. It begins with conception and ends, inevitably, in death. But despite its inevitability, everyone wants to avoid it. The experts say we fear aging and worship youth because we can’t stand the thought of death—we equate youth with ongoing life, aging with dying. We see old people not as people, but as people-near-death.”

Sunday, night, June 16, *Close-Up* looks into some of the truths and fallacies about aging and some of its problems in a youth-oriented society. Titled *The Vintage Years*, the program examines arguments about the rejection of old people and about some of their idiosyncrasies. It discusses their loneliness, the jolt of compulsory retirement at 65, the difficulties of attempting to live on the \$65-a-month old-age pension, the compensating friendliness and understanding of second-mile and senior citizens’ clubs, and the sort of housing accommodation planned specifically for old people.

In the course of the program, *Close-Up* attends a 100th birthday party, a religious service in an old men’s home, and drops in at a CBC control room as 79-year-old Maurice Bodington, a long-time radio favourite, and still a regular broadcaster, goes on the air with some of his popular prose and poetry readings. The oldest participant who tells viewers about his vintage years is 103-year-old Joseph Smart of Chelmsford, Ontario.

Around Chelmsford they’ll tell you that Smart celebrated his 100th birthday by splitting two cords of wood and drinking 24 bottles of beer. “True enough,” he admits, “but that’s not the whole story.” When it came to wood-splitting and beer-drinking, his centenary was really no different from any other day. “I cut 100 cords of wood just before I was 100 years old. Did it to pass the time,” he says. And the beer. “I used to drink a case of beer a day.” (No more beer now, says his doctor, who allows Smart “one good belt” of whisky a day).

Smart says he’d like to live to be 200. “The longer I live the better I seem to get along. I see more people that have a little knowledge in their head. The old people didn’t have the learning that the younger generation is getting.” The secret of his longevity? “Work,” he says emphatically. “I haven’t done a day’s work lately, but until late years I’ve worked hard. Work. Nothing but work.”

With relatively good health, and good living accommodation and two war-service pensions in addition to the old-age pension, Smart is pretty well fixed. But there are many old-timers for whom old age is endurable only because of welfare allowances and the

"North America's oldest continuously-run horse race."

This, for many years, was the main promotion line for the Queen's Plate, a horse race that takes place for the 104th time Saturday, June 15. Both CBC Radio and Television will carry the event live.

Today, however, the Queen's Plate has become much more than just a horse race that's been run for a long time. It is now worth \$50,000 added, plus 50 guineas, presented to the winning owner as a gift from Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth.

Last year the winner was from Windfields Farm, a speedy bay filly named Flaming Page. Flaming Page's victory was the sixth for E. P. Taylor's stable since 1950. He won with Major Factor in 1951, Lyford Cay in 1957, New Provi-

dence in 1959, and Victoria Park in 1960.

This year's winner is difficult to predict, but many people are stating a preference for Royal Maple, owned by a Montreal man.

It might have been different.

A horse named Jet Traffic, owned by an American named Firestone, could have been an easier winner than Victoria Park, which won by more than 30 lengths. Victoria Park finished in the money in both the Kentucky Derby and Preakness that year.

Jet Traffic is a Canadian-bred colt, but a few weeks ago someone raised doubt about the three-year-old's eligibility. It was then learned a slight mistake in filing nomination money had been made. Directors of The Jockey Club, which runs the Queen's Plate, took action. They barred Jet Traffic from the race. This created a furor.

Many of the horses eligible for this year's edition of the Plate are owned by directors of The Jockey Club. It looked like a whitewash. To many, it appeared the Jockey Club owners didn't desire to face competition from Jet Traffic, which has run the fastest mile of the year, slightly more than 1:34.

It has since been pointed out several times by officials connected with The Jockey Club that a rule was broken in the filing of fees in connection with the race, and in the racing game rules are not made to be broken. Whenever they are the penalties are severe. In the case of Jet Traffic, the penalty is, indeed, severe.

The absence of Jet Traffic undoubtedly clouds the race in a year when there are few outstanding three-year-olds in Canada. A western-owned horse, Welcome Partner, is among the many possible winners named by racing experts. A win by Max Bell's horse would be a first for the West in the plate.

The Queen's Plate isn't the only action for CBC Television viewers this week-end. Major league baseball's game of the week, Saturday, features the Detroit Tigers at New York. Winnipeg will be blacked out for this game. There will also be the regular Saturday bowling feature.

How Women Work For the Church

HERITAGE shows the varied roles of women of three denominations, Sunday

A PROGRAM EXAMINING the role of women in church life and work will be presented this week on CBC-TV's *Heritage* series. Entitled *Through These Doors*, the program will be shown on Sunday afternoon, June 16. It is a CBC Vancouver film production, written and narrated by Peter Haworth, filmed by William Roozeboom, and produced for *Heritage* by Michael Rothery.

Through These Doors is in three parts, each dealing with a different aspect of the subject. The first part was filmed in Vancouver's skid row and shows the work being done by women of the United Church and the Salvation Army in helping the needy and trying to rehabilitate women who need guidance and counsel in sorting out their tangled lives.

The second sequence illustrates a completely different way of life of women in the church — that of the convent. It was filmed at the monastery, located near Mission, B.C., of the Sisters of the Order of St. Clare, an "enclosed" order founded in the 13th century whose members have little contact with the outside world. The CBC Television crew were the first outsiders, other than doctors and priests, to be allowed inside the monastery. (By coincidence, St. Clare was recently named as the patron saint of television.)

The third segment of the *Heritage* program concerns the work of Dr. Norah Hughes, one of the few women ordained as ministers of the United Church of Canada. Ordained in 1940, Dr. Hughes now serves as minister of three churches in British Columbia's Gulf Islands. She holds regular Sunday services at Ganges and Fulford, on Salt Spring Island, and at North Pender Island.

The Annanacks

THE FIRST ENTERTAINERS were probably the tellers of stories. They had a captive audience, for, in centuries when communications were slow and difficult, it was the storyteller who carried the news, who told tales of derring-do, adding colour and warmth from his own personality and excitement with the inflections of his voice. Even today few of us can resist a good raconteur.

Because of their isolation even in the modern age of swift transport and radio, the Eskimos have continued to depend on and develop the art of storytelling, and their tales ring with the horrors of bitter weather, and of famine which has compelled whole families to leave their homes.

On CBC-TV's *Camera Canada* this Monday night, June 17, an Eskimo, George Annanack, tells of such a migration that ended 50 years ago and resulted in the founding of the George River Es' no settlement near Ungava Bay. Today the Annanacks are the pioneers of the true economic and social revolution in the North. They were the first Eskimos to organize a co-operative. How it started and how it works is the subject of part of the film, which was made for the CBC by Crawley Films Limited. After the story of the past (the starvation) and the present (the co-operative) the film shows something of the futurist civilization, which the Eskimos think our cities represent. In amusing fashion it shows the reactions of three Eskimos who have gone south to Montreal and Ottawa to see how the white man lives.

food-at-cost available at second-mile and senior citizens' clubs. The program examines the plight of these people.

"For some," says Deryck Thomson, executive director of the Family Service Agency of Greater Vancouver, "aging in this country is something they can really look forward to. For others it's a time filled with dread and doubt and fear — not a very pleasant or a happy time at all. Thousands of Canadians are, in effect, 'invisible.' And these people are eking out a very miserable existence during the last days of their lives in flea-bitten, rat-trap, rundown tenements in the centre of the decaying inner-ring of the cities. Nobody is interested in them. They're not a part of society any longer. They're not a part of the community any longer. . . . They're just vegetating, vegetating in isolation, not because they want to but because we, society, in large measure have forced them into this situation."

Thomson, whose views are shared by many other social workers and experts in fields dealing with the social, economic and psychological problems of old age, says that "If we want to deny that there's such a thing as aging, if we want to deny that there are older people in the community, if we want to stick our heads in the sand about this thing . . . the situation will persist. There has to be some leadership, I think, in this country — possibly from my own profession, or maybe the medical profession — in a greater and clearer explanation of what it is when we say people are growing older; what it means to them psychologically, emotional and every other way."

Master of Ballantrae

MANY INSIST that *The Master of Ballantrae* is Robert Louis Stevenson's best novel, although *Kidnapped* and *Treasure Island* are probably much better known. *The Master of Ballantrae* does not, perhaps, have the background detail of the other two, but it has fine character delineation, and a captivating plot which moves along swiftly, and doesn't seem too far-fetched. Recently a six-part television adaptation of the book, by Constance Cox, was filmed in the BBC's Glasgow studios. It will be shown on CBC-TV Thursday afternoons, beginning June 20.

The story begins in Scotland in 1745, at the time when Bonnie Prince Charlie, the Stuart Pre-

tender, lands in Scotland to assert his right to England's throne—with force of arms, if need be. The Durries family of Durrisdeer decides to steer a middle course and have a foot in both camps. Lord Durrisdeer has two sons. James, the elder, played by John Gairney, is Master of Ballantrae. Henry, his younger brother, played by John Breslin, is as unlike him as possible—serious, and concerned with the proper management of the estate, even though his flamboyant, incorrigible brother gambles the profits away.

When news of the landing of Prince Charles reaches Durrisdeer, the brothers decide that one of

them will join the Prince while the other remains at home for King George, thus preserving the estate whichever side wins. A coin is tossed, and James joins the Stuart cause. From this decision springs a chain of events which take the brothers across the seas to the story's tragic end in the New World.

During the six episodes viewers will meet many fascinating characters who seem as alive today as when Stevenson created them 73 years ago; cousin Alison Graeme, who loves one brother but marries the other; Irish adventurer Colonel Francis Burke who shares James' adventures in India and America; a mysterious Indian, Secundra Dass, who claims he can bring the dead to life; Captain Teach and the pirate crew aboard the *Sarah*; and Mr. Ephraim Mackellar, the Steward at Durrisdeer, who is the narrator of the story.

In the first episode James leaves his cousin and Fiancée, Alison, to go off to join the Pretender. She is deeply in love with him, but he is more interested in her money than in her. A few weeks later news comes of the Battle of Culloden, and James' death. Henry, whose efforts to raise money for the profligate spendthrift have gained him a reputation for meanness, is accused of betrayal. Though she does not love Henry, Alison agrees to marry him.

Big Man of Showbusiness

VENTURE on Sunday, June 16,
presents a 60-minute portrait
of this noted actor-folksinger

BURL IVES is usually thought of as a folksinger who has recently switched to acting, but actually he is an actor - turned - singer - turned actor again.

The burly balladeer started his professional career about 25 years ago, by acting in a dozen or so plays, before discovering that there was a financial future for him in singing, which he'd been doing for free all his life. During the succeeding decade - and - a - half Ives built an international reputation as an interpreter of American folk music, with occasional sorties as an actor into the world of theatre and films. He won a Donaldson award on Broadway as best supporting actor for his work in *Sing Out, Sweet Land* in 1944, and made his first movie, *Smoky*, in 1945.

But in all the plays he appeared in after making a name as a singer he was inevitably cast in a singing-acting role. He wanted to try meatier dramatic parts, and claims that he even resorted to a subterfuge in an effort to get one, growing a beard and taking an assumed name for a Hollywood screen test. "I was tested for a straight dramatic part and was about to be signed when my true identity leaked out," he reported. "The producer told me it wasn't a singing part and closed the door."

It's hard to believe that anyone connected with theatre or show-business would have been fooled

by a beard and a false name, because Ives' six-foot-one, 300-pound bulk makes him an imposing, outstanding figure in any group. Born June 14, 1909, on a farm in southern Illinois, Burl Icle Ivanhoe Ives was one of a family of six, all of whom were big, healthy specimens. Burl, who played professional football, worked in logging camps and steel mills, and "rode the rods" around the country in his youth, says: "I don't think people see me as fat, just as big."

His size had something to do with the switch in his career, which dates from the mid 1950s with his appearance as Big Daddy in both the stage and screen versions of Tennessee Williams' *Cat on a Hot Tin Roof*. That role was an outcome of his casting as the Sheriff in *East of Eden* two years earlier, both productions being directed by Elia Kazan.

This week, CBC Radio's *Venture* presents an hour-long portrait of Burl Ives. The program, to be heard Sunday, June 16, at 5 p.m., will feature an interview in which Ives talks about his early years spent roaming America during the depression, his musical family, particularly the grandmother who taught him many of the folk songs he gained fame for, and one of the high points in his singing career—the one-man show he put on in London's Royal Festival Hall before enthusiastic thousands.

he always manages to make himself the centre of attention, but he does it with such charm that few object.

It's hard to believe that Stanley Holloway is 73—he's so youthful-looking and sprightly. His family has been in showbusiness for generations, and the Palladium has been his stamping ground ever since his first appearance there in 1924, when he was known as a straight baritone. It was there he introduced the most famous of all his creations, the pathetic Sam Small, the soldier who dropped his musket, and on a point of principle refused to pick it up until the Duke of Wellington pleaded with him to do so as a personal favour. Holloway presents the monologue again on the *Jo Stafford Show*.

Sam has played a big part in Holloway's life for more than 30 years, on stage, in films, on television and radio and on records.

Morecambe and Wise are zany comedians whose act is full of action and off-beat verbal antics. In one of their saner moments Morecambe has been heard to tell Wise: "I began my career in a nude show. I used to paint the chorus girls' legs for 30 shillings a time. That was all I could afford." The comedians have worked together for 21 years, ever since they entered and won a talent contest as school-boys.

weather than during extreme heat or cold; children gain more weight during summer and early fall than at other times of the year; crimes of assault and battery occur most frequently in July and August, least often in January; the suicide rate is highest when the barometer is low, lowest when the mercury is high; and infractions of rules in schools and prisons occur most frequently during spells of muggy weather.

It is the opinion of many amateur climatologists, and that includes almost everyone, that weather conditions have changed drastically in the past couple of decades. Relying solely on memory, many point out that winters used to be colder, summers milder, and the weather was generally more constant a generation ago. But meteorologists don't agree with this view, maintaining that weather trends take much longer than 25 years to develop. They point out that there has been a trend towards higher

average temperatures in North America and Europe, but in Ontario, for example, the rise amounts to a mere two degrees in 100 years, hardly a perceptible increase. Even such unexpected phenomena as Britain's last two winters of unprecedented severe cold are dismissed as unusual short-term effects, having no relation to overall trends.

Forecasting and possible control of the weather are subjects on which co-operation is obtained from all countries of the world, even those behind the Iron Curtain. Last summer a three-week conference was held in Toronto, under the auspices of the World Meteorological Organization, at which weathermen from every continent met to discuss such topics as protection of crops against frost damage, forest fire services, weather influences on plant diseases and pests, and atmospheric pollution. With the continuation of such world-wide co-operation and the combined efforts of scientists in many different fields, progress into weather research will go forward. We may never be able to do anything about the weather, but at least we'll know what to expect.

Experience or School?

Best Training For Actors

CBC Wednesday Night

presents a survey of Canadian actors and directors on why drama schools are needed

WITH THE OPENING of the Stratford (Ontario) Festival on June 17, and the graduating of the first class of students (15) from the National Theatre School, which annually moves from Montreal to Stratford for the season, that long-debated question comes up again: Should an actor rely on instinct and training in the school of experience, or should he learn his trade formally like any other craftsman? Stratford performers represent both schools of thought.

To find out what some leading professional actors and directors in Canada have to say on the subject, Desmond Scott, a director at the Manitoba Theatre Centre, travelled widely around the country recording a variety of opinions. They will be presented on CBC Wednesday Night this week, June 19, at 8:05, in a documentary program titled *National Theatre School* with comments on the three-year-old National Theatre School by its directors, Jean Gascon, James Domville and Powys Thomas, and by some of its students, who are also heard in various classes at the school, the only bilingual theatre school in the world.

"I didn't go to a drama school, but it would have helped me a great deal," says Jonathan White, who has been in the acting business for 15 years, "because drama students usually come into the theatre from the school much more equipped than I did. The only thing I could do was sit very quietly in a corner and pick up from other actors. This is not always a good way of doing it, because you pick up bad faults as

well as good ones. It took me a long time to let go the bad ones, and I've still got many of them."

John Colicos, who plays, among others, the title role in *Cyrano de Bergerac* at Stratford this season, told Scott that, "When young people have come to me for advice I've always tried to steer them away from a school because it seems to me, particularly in the U.S., that a great many who are teaching are unscrupulous. It's largely a commercial business. They are usually actors or directors manqué, and pour into the students the bitterness they've experienced through their lack of success in the commercial theatre. Young people wind up terribly confused and full of ideas that have absolutely no relation to what's going to happen in the practical theatre if they ever get into it."

Dinah Christie, a young actress at the start of her career, agrees with Colicos. So does Douglas Campbell, leading actor and director at Stratford since its inception and founder of the Canadian Players, who is now in Minneapolis as assistant to director Tyrone Guthrie. Campbell advises young people *not* to go into the theatre. "But if you have to, the best way is to find either a good amateur company you can join, or get yourself a job as a truck driver for a touring company, or maybe as a call-boy in a theatre. Most people want to go into the theatre to become successful, important, glamorous, but they don't want to learn to act because it's a job. I'm opposed to formal training. The best way is to do it by experience."

Most directors Desmond Scott talked to agreed that formal training offers great advantages for actors in all media. "You don't ask a plumber to come into your house without professional training," pointed out CBC producer-writer John Reeves. Murray Davis of the Crest Theatre in Toronto deplors the fact that "people feel they can go on the stage and act a part because they are 'right' for it, without any kind of technical training at all."

Why Have We Rejected Our Legacy From France?

Canadians have not yet learned to benefit from the two great cultural heritages that are theirs, two programs in the LEGACY series point out

Thursday, June 20 and 27 on CBC Radio

AFTER 300 YEARS, Canada still has not found a way to reap the rich harvest which many Canadians agree should have resulted from the planting of two great European cultures side by side in the northern expanses of the New World. French- and English-Canadians, to a large extent, remain strangers on each other's land, display only a grudging acceptance of their nation's duality and describe each other in sweeping generalities of which the tone is either condescending or disparaging.

The result, well illustrated by the growing cries of "Québec libre" on the one hand and the increasing but rather vague talk about "biculturalism" on the other, is an impasse.

Making a move to break this impasse is Betty Shapiro, Montreal journalist and broadcaster, who thinks the perennial mistake made by English-Canadians has been always to compare French-Canadians with other North Americans and to come up with a list of "differences," which have a negative value, are too liable to be thought of as "abnormalities" and thus create social stigmas.

Mrs. Shapiro proposes a more positive approach: to compare French-Canadians with the French of Europe, a process which would discover more similarities than differences and which would allow normal evolution to be considered as a reason for those differences that do exist. Most important: English-Canadians making such a comparison might well end up in a state of understanding instead of bewilderment.

Betty Shapiro has done more than merely propose this new approach. She recently spent three weeks in France putting her theory into practice. The results of her research will be heard on CBC Radio's *Legacy* series in two one-hour programs entitled "*Les Petits Cousins*" on Thursday, June 20 and 27, at 11 p.m.

Most of her travelling was done in Normandy and Brittany, where the majority of French-Canadians wishing to trace their ancestry go to thumb through dusty parish records. Normandy, which provided the greatest number of settlers for New France, is not unlike southern and western Quebec, being mainly an agricultural and pastoral region. Brittany, on the other hand, can boast only pockets of fertility, depends mainly on fishing and somewhat resembles the Gaspé Peninsula and the North Shore of the St. Lawrence.

Perhaps the first similarity noticeable between Quebec and northwest France is one of language. Some Parisian French is spoken in Normandy and

Brittany but one hears a great deal of *patois*, often remarkably like *québécois*. Indeed, Parisians have more difficulty communicating in Normandy and Brittany than Quebeckers do, and the transition from "Comment allez-vous?" to "Comment ça va?" and from "Mais oui" to "Ben oué" is quite apparent as one travels west from Paris. This then is why English-speaking Canadians find their school French of little practical value in Quebec.

Possibly the most important link between French-Canada and France to be taken into account by the Anglo-Saxon Canadian is the one concerned with scales of values. Too often, the rest of Canada has referred to the *habitants* as "peasants," "backward," "uneducated," "bigoted" and "stupid." Even Sir Wilfrid Laurier, himself a French-Canadian but one who finally lost the trust of his own people, referred to the *habitants* as "hewers of wood and drawers of water." The image sticks, because of a fundamental misunderstanding. Before a qualitative judgment can be made of the French-Canadian, it is necessary to dispense with the scale of values on which other North Americans base their lives and discover, and make an effort to understand, the values uppermost in the minds of a people whose heritage is in France, not England.

Normans and Bretons display a rather cavalier attitude towards life. For them, living rates higher than working. This does not mean that they are in any way indolent; they merely regard work as a means to an end, instead of as an end in itself. They are not lacking in ambition, but their goals are different from the Anglo-Saxons'. Settled family life of the type that permits generation after generation to boast the same hometown is worth far more than high social status and material wealth gained by continual relocation in pursuit of a career. Children remain close to their parents. Life is pleasurable. And when a Frenchman is observed sitting in the sun he is praised for his *joie de vivre*.

Yet the French-Canadian, who has inherited the same philosophy, is denounced for his lack of "get-up-and-go." He finds himself pulled by his roots in one direction, by his environment in another. He lives in an American context, feels himself caught up in an American rhythm of life and is just as frustrated as his Anglo-Saxon neighbours by the elusiveness of a common basis for understanding. As Betty Shapiro concludes her *Legacy* documentary, not to see the sadness of French-Canada's story is to contribute to a potentially dangerous situation.

LIME CHEESE CAKE

- 1/2 box Graham Wafers
- 1/4 lb. margarine or butter
- 2 tbs. icing sugar
- 1 pkg. lime jelly powder
- 1 cup hot water
- 1 1/2 lb. cream sandwich cheese
- 1/2 cup white sugar
- 2 tsp. vanilla
- 1 can evaporated milk
(chilled overnight)
- 12 x 10 pan

Dissolve jelly powder in boiling water and put into fridge until partially set. Prepare wafers by rolling fine. Melt butter, add icing sugar and mix with wafers. Cream cheese, sugar and vanilla. In separate bowl whip milk until consistency of whipped cream. Fold in cream cheese mixture and partially set jelly. Mix well.

Put 3/4 graham crackers in bottom of pan. Pour on cream mixture. Sprinkle rest of crumbs on top. Put into fridge to set.

(Be sure the pan is deep as this makes a very large dessert.)

No Holding Pat Back

"When I first heard that applause following my songs, there was no holding me back," says Pat Hervey. "I made up my mind to make showbusiness my career." And a very successful career it has been thus far for the 20-year-old Toronto singer. As featured vocalist on CBLT's *Club 6* series for teenagers and later as a guest star on CBC-TV's *Parade* and other shows, she has become widely known for her fresh, youthful personality and her pleasantly swinging interpretations of popular songs.

The applause mentioned above was garnered during her first professional engagement, when she first sang in public at a dance hall in Toronto. She had answered an advertisement in a newspaper, auditioned for the job, and got it. Pat was just 17 then, and was a student at R. H. King Collegiate in suburban Scarborough, where her favourite subjects were English, French, and the extra-curricular glee club activities.

After her first stage appearance. Pat took part in many musical shows in and around Toronto, sang at teenage dances, and was a frequent guest on CBC radio's *Tommy Hunter Show*. She was a featured vocalist on a Western-music series shown over a Hamilton, Ont., television station, and was a member of the chorus on CBC-TV's *White We're Young* during two summer seasons. Since appearing on the *Club 6* show in the 1961-62 season, she has been seen as a soloist on some of the *Sing, Sing, Sing* programs presented as part of the *Parade* series, in which she has been joined by the Gino Silvi Singers and Bert Niosi's orchestra. The *Sing, Sing, Sing* format, originally planned as merely one show in the *Parade* season, proved so popular with viewers that six more shows were scheduled during the past two seasons, all following the same general pattern.

During the past season Pat has made once-a-month guest appearances on CBC-TV's *Country Hoedown*, has starred in stage shows in many different points in Ontario, has made a number of recordings for Chateau in Canada and RCA Victor in the U.S., and is busily engaged in the commercial jingle business. During the summer she will be featured in one of the programs of the *Front and Centre* series on CBC-TV. Pat's chief ambition is to become what she terms "a well-rounded show-business personality." In the comparatively short span of her career, she seems to be well on the way to achieving her ambition.

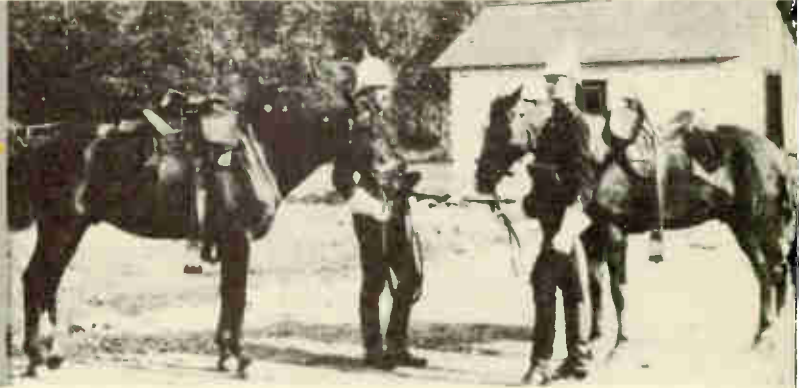
